

Administration

There have been churches where you could determine their vitality by how many weddings and baptisms they had per year, versus how many funerals; but making couples fall in love, produce babies, or dying are not circumstances we can influence or control. You can look at a balance sheet, of income versus expenses, the number of members and attendance, but that is administration. What I have come to recognize is a clear indication of the vitality of a congregation's faith is listening to the church's desire for Communion.

When COVID19 began in March of 2020, for safety we stopped sharing the Sacrament, while some churches continued and had super-spreading events. Then in 2021 our Valley Galley and Communion Preparers produced what we described as COVID Bread, hermetically sealed in zip-lock bags. I have known churches which celebrated Communion weekly, others monthly, a few quarterly, one seasonally; we have shared by dipping into a common cup, and by having everyone sit at table to serve one another; once, recognizing the Priesthood of all believers, I served the first person in line, then gave them the elements to serve the next person, who served the next. Here at our Church, the Session share the Sacrament of Communion at the beginning of every Session meeting. Throughout Lent 2022, we as a body have waited to share the Sacrament, in part because of concern over passing the elements; in part out of desire to return to the traditional Presbyterian manner of two separate elements being passed in separate trays.

On Maundy Thursday, our April 14th 5pm worship celebrating Jesus serving his disciples, and again at the 9:30am Worship on Easter Morning, we will share the Sacrament of Communion! Routinely, we react to a circumstance and move on to "normalcy" or the next crisis. As much as we all want to move on, none of us will forget this two-year world-wide pandemic, those who became ill and those who died, as well as the caring and leadership demonstrated. Breaking the Bread of Christ and sharing the Cup as sign and seal of God's New Covenant will be demonstrations of our Church's vitality and hope in the midst of life.

2022 Capital Improvement Craig Lindsey, Administrator

In Arizona we do not have to contend with salt and frost wedging, but the heat does bake the oils out of pavements, causing buckling and cracks. Last summer the exterior of our church building received a fresh coat of paint. In the next month, we will have all of the cracks in both parking lots cleaned and filled, and when temperatures permit both parking lots will be freshly sealed and painted. Please be attentive when cones and workers are out, individual entrances may need to be blocked off for a day, while there will always be access into and out of our church property. Our thanks to our VPC Foundation, and to those who have contributed to these reserves which annually generate Interest Income that underwrites Capital Improvements like these.

CREDO PROGRAM

Pastor Craig has only been with us two and a half years and at 63 is one of the youngest people in Green Valley, but he has been in pastoral ministry for 38 years. Once in a career in ministry, the PC(USA) Board of Pensions invites Pastors to a week-long Retreat program called CREDO to reflect on their years of ministry, all the relationships, and to plan for eventual retirement. Pastor Craig will be away May 7th through 15th for this program which begins each day in worship, includes daily sabbath-time, workshops and evening prayers. This is designed as a time of discernment to understand God's Journey and what you may be able to do with the next chapters of life. As we held Pastor Diane in prayer during her Sabbatical and her trip through Greece, please pray for Pastor Craig at this time, and maybe invite Judy for dinner.

Session Highlights for February

Your Session took the following actions at the February meeting:

Resurrection

A man came into our office the other day and expressed that he and his wife will be returning to Valley. As we chatted, I said, "We are experiencing Resurrection."



"I heard that," he said.

Word is getting out that this church is experiencing Resurrection. In order to have resurrection, you need death. Those of you who have been here over 5 years know that we have come through a very difficult time. We did walk through the valley of the shadow of death, yet experienced God was with us and God restoring us once again. This is good news.

This is the month when we think about Resurrection more than any other time. Everything in the Christian faith hinges on the fact that Jesus rose from the dead, which we celebrate on Easter, April 17. This is good news.

We are reminded in memorials of the Resurrection. I conducted a gravesite not too long ago, and the son said, "Please make sure that people hear what Jesus said: 'I am the Resurrection and the Life. Those who believe in me, will live...Do you believe this?' Because Jesus lives, so shall we, now and in the life to come. This is good news. Ukraine is going through a death. Because I believe in the Resurrection, I pray someday they will experience it, too.

When someone comes into my office and needs guidance, prayer, reassurance, I pray Resurrection in their life.

When we experience loss of health, loss of loved ones, loss of material things, I pray Resurrection in their lives. That God will take what was and make "all things new."

The Bible says that the earth will experience a resurrection as someday there will be a new heaven and earth designed by God. This is good news!

This Easter, as we celebrate the Resurrection of Jesus Christ, look for ways that God has resurrected the dead things in your life, restored the people in your life (whether on earth or heaven), and made those things new. He is Risen! He is Risen indeed!

Easter Watch Prayer Vigil Good Friday – Holy Saturday 7 p.m. (April 15) through 7 p.m. (April 16)

The Saturday between Good Friday and Easter is often called Holy Saturday or Silent Saturday. We don't know what the disciples did that day as we can imagine they were in shock and grieving the loss of Jesus. Perhaps hidden in a room somewhere in fear of their own lives. Their whole world had been turned upside down.

As our world is being turned upside down, let us come to a time of prayer on this silent day. We invite you to sign up for a half hour time slot of prayer to pray at home. We will start at 7 p.m. on Good Friday (after Wes' organ recital) and run a 24-hour prayer vigil. Pastor Diane will provide prayer aids and suggestions.

You can sign up for a half hour prayer slot in one of two ways: Go to our website at valleypres.net. Look for the brown button at the bottom of the home page. Choose a time, and type in your name and email address, so Pastor Diane can send you her prayer aids.

You can also sign up by contacting Pastor Diane with your choice of prayer time (<u>pastordiane@valleypres.net</u>; 520-625-5023). She will let you know if that time is available. If not, she will offer a time slot close to your preference.

Let us spend time in continuous prayer together on this most holiest and silent of days.






enter the sanctuary should some of the facets of worship become overwhelming.

HOW MARTIN LUTHER CHANGED HISTORY

There can be no appreciation for the Reformation until one sees the great spiritual need in the Sixteenth Century. After 1500 years, the Christian Church was entirely corrupt in its practices, in its scandals, and an ever-expanding unbiblical list of dogma. By the time that Martin Luther, the great reformer was a teenager, the de Medici and Borgias crime families were extorting a fortune of silver from the peasantry to enrich themselves while forbidding the Bible and teaching only Salvation by Works. Luther was not the first reformer, preceded by John Wycliff (d. 1384) in England and Jan Hus (d. 1415) in what is now the Czech Republic, but a new technology was on the scene, just as world changing as the Internet in our time, the printing press. His teachings went viral. In this three-week Zoom course, we will explore the life and times of Martin Luther and how he changed history and the course of Western Civilization.

MARCH 2022 PATIO SALE UPDATE



Almost every month I write to tell you about the wonderful musical opportunities within our church walls. This month I would like to touch on the power of music and how it has brought countries together during this time of need. From 2007-2012 I was a music director for Holland American Cruise Lines. Not only did I see the world, I met and worked with amazing musicians from all over the world. The message below was written by the wife of a duo that I had the honor to work with somewhere in the middle of the Ocean. Rebecca is a singer and her husband, Kuba, is a Polish mallet player.

Rebecca writes,

"More updates from Ukraine and Poland. Kuba received a request Tuesday afternoon from a friend (working on a ship) whose mother was leaving Ukraine. She was having much trouble just getting transportation to get out. Cannot imagine how difficult it must be. She did manage to get to a bus and while traveling 26+ hours, Kuba worked his magic and by the time she made it safely to Warsaw, Kuba's brother arranged to have a neighbor friend pick her up and host her. This morning, Thursday, Kuba received a call from the hostess and she said "Mom" was doing well and had finally eaten. She wasn't able to when she arrived and had a hard time sleeping, but she's better now. She will go to Łódź next and they have insisted they will drive her so she does not need to take the train, since she is alone and traumatized. So many thank you's from her son on the ship. These stories are hard to hear without getting choked up.

The little boy Maks (11) in our flat in Łódź has a Ukrainian Polish language teacher now. His big sister turned 22 and we got to see her birthday celebration in our living room which was surreal but very heart warming. And internet and tv for them was arranged by one of my Polish family members.

He wrote to me these words:

"They say thank you many times. Today Maks asks me, 'Why do you help us?'" He said his throat tightened. He replied, "Because we can. Because we are the same people. Because you are running from war." Continue to keep them all in your prayers. If you know someone who needs help finding a place to stay, let us know. We will do our best and have lots of friends and family over there, mostly in Łódź, at the ready with Polish meals and loving shelter as long as they need it."

During these very scary and uncertain times, I am constantly reminded of the power of music. Sarah Dessen says, "Music is the great uniter. An incredible force. Something that people who differ on everything and anything else can have in common." Music is Amazing!

When is it Depression? Part Two

Depression can affect people differently, and different with age. Younger adults maybe more irritable, complain of hypersomnia, weight gain, and have a negative view. They also may have other disorders with this such as anxiety, social phobia, panic disorder, and substance abuse. Middle-aged adults have depressive episodes, night insomnia, or wake up early. They may also have gastrointestinal problems. Older adults with depression experience sadness or grief or may have symptoms that are less obvious. They may report lack of emotions and may not be willing to talk about their feelings and may have other medical illnesses or pain that may cause or contribute to depression. With more severe cases, memory or thinking problems may be seen.

Depression can occur at any age. Certain people are at a higher risk of depression. If you are an older adult, you may be at higher risk if you:



- Are female
- Have a chronic medical illness, such as cancer , diabetes or heart disease
- Have a disability
- Sleep poorly
- Are lonely or socially isolated
- You may also be at a higher risk if you:
- Have a personal or family history of depression
- Use certain medications
- Suffer from a brain disease
- Misuse alcohol or drugs
- Have experienced stressful events (loss of a spouse, divorce, or taking care of someone with a chronic illness)

Do you feel tired, helpless, hopeless? Have you lost interest in many of the activities and interests that you have previously enjoyed doing? Are you having difficulty sleeping, eating, working, and functioning? Have you felt this way day after day? If you have answered yes, you may be experiencing depression. If you think that you or a loved one may have depression, it is important to seek treatment. Please talk with your healthcare provider. It is important to be honest and open about your symptoms. The right treatment may help improve your overall health and quality of life. The primary treatment options for depression include medication and psychotherapy.

Don't ignore the warning signs. A person may really be asking for help. Take comments about suicide seriously. If they are in immediate distress or thinking about hurting themselves, call 911 and ask for the MAC (mobile crisis team in Pima County) The National Suicide Prevention Lifeline is 1-800-273-TALK

In March, we enjoyed a lunch gathering where we learned about Ronald McDonald House which we supported not only with our Presby Gift, but also by having a McDonald's meal.






Matthew's Genealogy of Jesus By Merryl Blair With Suggestions for Leaders by Magdalena I. García




A lot of renovation work will be needed, and YOTO plans to move to their new location in late 2022 or early 2023!!



TRUST RESTORED

□ Trust in the Community Food Bank of Southern Arizona has been restored. In 2021, Community Food Bank (CFB) gave \$50,000 of non-directed food bank funds to a political program in Tucson to "fight for \$15 campaign". The use of non-directed food bank funds for political ends has created a trust problem. Can undirected monies given to CFB be used for political social change instead of hunger relief? Trust in the Community Food Bank of Southern Arizona has been restored. Leadership at CFB has changed and the Board of Directors on November 4, 2021, issued new guidelines (available for review in the church office) which greatly improve accountability and transparency in the use of CFB's funds and severely limits or prohibits the use of CFB's funds for any political purpose or grant. Trust in the Community Food Bank of Southern Arizona has been restored.

Contributions from Valley Presbyterian Church (VPC) either from the mission budget or from pass-through giving have been used for only hunger relief programs. Not only have and are monies from VPC been used locally at Green Valley and Amado Food Banks but the revenue is used specifically for milk and eggs. As a result, our funded agencies always supply eggs and milk to the hungry while other agencies, on a regular basis, may not have these resources.





Christmas Box Follow–Up

Last Fall, we worked together to assembly Christmas gift boxes for children in need around the world. Here is just a little information about where the boxes went. The Tucson area assembled over 10,000 boxes. The western region collected almost 400,000 and the US over 9 million!

We are told the boxes from Tucson went to Peru, El Salvador, and Ecuador. All boxes are examined for proper gifts and corrections made if needed. There were boxes filled in other countries as well and all together they brought happiness to children in many countries around the world. They were most appreciative of what Valley Presbyterian and many other churches did for the least of these, my children.
