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

That Sunday, we were able to serve Communion in Worship, then at La Posada, at Arroyo Gardens, at Silver Spring, at Canyon Valley, and with 5 home-bound parishioners.

The Monday morning of Patio Sale Set-up, we received an unexpected request to fly to Washington DC to say our Goodbyes to Judy's Mom. Pastor Diane, Lead Amigo Carmen, and our Staff could not have been more empowering and supportive to us. We left our Spaniel Annie with a couple in the Church and drove to Phoenix, making every connection to Washington. There were glitches with the Organ Installation, which Wes Moulton managed, and Randy and Steve patched plaster. Returning to the Office Monday morning, the Patio Sale had set yet another Record for sales, the Organ Wiring and Speakers were all installed and the Console arriving Wednesday March 15th. I was back for the Scissor Lift to be removed, negotiated with a couple from the Border to take all of the furniture which had not sold (for FREE) and greeted GVCC for their Concert Rehearsal!

Sincerely, I do feel loved by God and by our Church. Not so long ago, if a pastor announced they needed to leave, there would have been great anxiety... Instead, this was one of the best organized sales ever (I even purchased a Breakfast Egg & Sausage Burrito Monday morning); the new Organ is ready for worship; our Church has advertised for our new Organist/Accompanist and our Organist Search Committee is meeting together; we have 6 Memorials in planning before mid-April; and we received the love and prayers from you in the passing of Judy's Mom. Thank you for being the Church for us!

From Pastor Diane

As I write this article for the April Valley Voice, it is mid-March. For the next month during Lent and Easter, we have six memorials. It is common knowledge among pastors that deaths increase during the holidays, particularly Christmas and Easter. When I tell people this, the next question is "Why?"

Scientists say people's diets are a major cause. During holidays, people eat more rich foods, smoke more, exercise less. People are more stressed and sadder. People who don't feel well as the holidays approach put off seeing a doctor so they can spend time with family at the holiday.

Whatever the reason, I consider it an amazing privilege to conduct a memorial around the holidays, especially Lent and Easter. We walk with Jesus towards his death and in his suffering only to sing with joy at the news of the Resurrection. As a person dies in this season, they are an example of this walk of suffering and the hope of the Resurrection.

A couple years ago, I did a memorial for a gentleman who passed away the day before Easter. At his memorial, I said:

On Easter, we celebrate the resurrection of Jesus Christ. And yes, even though the Resurrection is something that happened over 2000 years ago, we still celebrate it today. Because what it says is that Jesus is alive and is here among us today.

It also says that Jesus conquered death.

Therefore, we have the hope that there is more after this life. That this earthly life is not the end. Because Jesus conquered death, we too will live eternally. And that is why we are here today...to celebrate the resurrection and the life that [] is now experiencing.

As we go through these memorials, I hope you will participate. Even if you do not know the person, you come as a representative of Valley Presbyterian to uphold the family and celebrate the Resurrection.

He is risen. Alleluia!





Hope for Overcoming Depression

April 17, 24, May 1, 8 9:30 – 10:30 a.m. in Classroom 5 Your teacher: Tom Lobb

Do you know of someone who always seems to be "blue"? Do you have a friend who thinks negatively most of the time? Do you tend to be "down in the dumps" much of the time, or are you unhappy with the life that you have been dealt with? If so, your friend might have depression, or you might be struggling with a mental health issue.



Do not worry! Help is available in many forms. Mental health counselors are available to share concerns with. Taking medications is also an important possibility. Medical treatments are also available to treat any depression that might exist in a person's life.

Books and classes also exist for dealing with depression and its symptoms. Valley Presbyterian Church will soon be offering a class called Hope for Overcoming Depression. This class is based on the book "Overcoming Depression: A Personal Journey of Hope." This class will emphasize the hope that God will help us overcome depression. It will cover the symptoms of depression, myths about this illness, the caregiver's responsibility and frustrations, how to survive depression, and other important topics. It will also discuss a medically-sound procedure for treating the brain.

If someone you know (including yourself) might have depression, this class could be a useful tool on the road to recovery from this malady.

VPC member Tom Lobb will be teaching this class using the book "Overcoming Depression". He is the author of the text, which is based on his decades-long experience with this disease. 

Samaritan Purse Operation Christmas Child Shoebox Update!





In 2022 a huge milestone was reached by Samaritan Purse for Operation Christmas Child Shoeboxes as the 200 millionth packed shoebox was received and sent since 1993. Gift filled shoe Shoeboxes were delivered to 175 countries and territories around the world. Over 9.3 million shoebox gifts were collected in the US durring National Collection Week—the most ever! Many times, this is the first gift a child has ever received, and it opens doors for the Gospel in countries where Christians are scarce and cults are common.

We are very thankful and appreciative to all who participated in the operation this past Christmas season. These simple gifts continue to open doors for the local participating partners in remote and impoverished communities to share the Word of God's love for them.

200 million boxes total over the years...astounding when one thinks of it! And EACH box is important. EVERY box prayerfully packed in Jesus' name is special. One never knows how a life may be transformed by a shoebox, by a gift that asks nothing from the receiver in return, that brings a smile to a life that may have never known anything "new". Or have seen much in life but hardship.

Over 120 boxes were packed by individuals at Valley pres and returned this year, and we were able to pay for the shipping on all our boxes and include the greatest Journey Bible Study series for each because of the monetary donations to the program. All of this was a significant contribution, as 200 million boxes are reached by each box one by one, year after year.

We were notified that our boxes went as a unit to the Philippine Islands, reaching some islands that are remote and accessible by canoes and barges only. May you continue to pray for the child that received it. The Mission Committee could not do this project without you, and we are happy to be part of the global evangelical project. But to God be the Glory, forever and ever.

St, Andrews' Children's Clinic Mission – April 2023

Laura Romero, the executive director, said that about 40 children with volunteers and staff participated in the Clinic on March 2. There was a lovely snowfall that day. The children were delighted, but it made for a wet, cold clinic. Most departments provided services. More space needs to be created so that all departments can function well. The clinic had hoped to get more space by taking over an adjacent area of the building, but the county decided to let Pima Community College have that space. There is a large room at the back of the clinic which might be re-modeled to accommodate clinic services.

Donors have been very generous. One donor provided warm breakfast sandwiches from McDonalds for all the children, many volunteers and families. Juice was provided by the Clinic. Donors also contributed floor mats for the Physical Therapy department to use. The Rotary Clubs have been very supportive of the Clinic with donations. A lady who loves to bake brought cookies for everyone. She plans to continue her joy of baking for the benefit of St. Andrews' Clinic.

VPC is in the process of donating a large screen TV for the children to watch as they wait for appointments. Les Walter will get this installed later this spring. A temporary kitchen is available with a large refrigerator and microwave. A more adequate kitchen is needed.

At present, Laura feels they must limit services to 50 children. The children are vulnerable and must be protected from infections and diseases. The current space is congested, so numbers must be limited for the safety of the children. In the past, the Clinic was able to serve 250 children on the first Thursdays. That number is not possible now. The clinic is proceeding slowly but surely, and safely. It will be different than it was at the St. Andrew's Church, but it will be successful to meet the needs of many children.

The committee members suggested some solutions to the limited space. Kay will talk with Laura about these items and report in April.

The need for money, prayers and support continues. VPC has been very generous and helpful. The Clinic sends us their sincere thanks for all we do.

Egg Casserole (from the March Mission Breakfast)

Servings: 12

Preparation time: 30 minutes

Start to Finish Time: 1 hour 15 minutes.

Cook Time: 45 minutes.

Can be put together the night before. Cheddar-jack cheese works well also. Do not salt, the cheese is salty enough.

6 extra large eggs, slightly beaten
1 pint 4% cottage cheese
1 cup Bisquick baking mix.
1 cup whole milk
1 stick butter, melted.

10 ounces Rotel brand tomatoes & Green chilies, drained well, 1 pound jimmy Dean regular sausage, cooked and crumbled pepper to taste.

Beat eggs, add the remaining ingredients, and mix well. Pour into greased 9x13 inch pan. Bake 45 plus minutes at 350 degrees. When knife inserted in middle comes out clean it is done.

The Bee Sting

South Sudan is no stranger to division, brokenness, and pain. At the highest levels of government, within the church, within families, and across communities, what separates us defines us and keeps us from one another. Since 2013 alone, not to mention two previous horrific civil wars which lasted almost fifty years, hundreds of thousands of South Sudanese have been killed during an ethnic, internecine, and bloody civil war. Fear continues to walk alongside us, uncertainty calls our name, and violence runs deeply as the most trafficked way of relating to one other.

Into this maelstrom of fear, uncertainty, and violence, has entered messages of healing, peace, justice, and reconciliation. These messages were most recently brought by leaders from the highest levels of the ecclesial and religious landscape known to our twenty-first century. It is almost unbelievable, but for the first time in five hundred years, an ecumenical peace pilgrimage was made by Catholic, Anglican and Protestant leaders to South Sudan. Pope Francis, Archbishop of Canterbury Justin Welby, and Moderator of the Church of Scotland Rev. Iain Greenshields responded to an invitation to come to South Sudan after South Sudanese political and ecclesial leaders visited the Vatican in 2018. To have participated in this historic event last week was an amazing privilege and an unforgettable blessing.

The events began in earnest Friday afternoon when the Pope arrived at the airport from Kinshasa, Democratic Republic of Congo. As the last vehicle in a long line of cars going to the airport to welcome Pope Francis on a sultry Friday afternoon, we stopped, and I marveled at the thousands of South Sudanese lined up peacefully and joyfully along the road. The immediate line of persons held hands, serving as a buffer, a human chain, shielding all safely behind. Those behind were beaded with drops of sweat, the unforgiving sun bearing down as they sang choruses and danced, sweet smiles from young and old greeting me. One group of Catholic pilgrims walked nine days to Juba; a woman among them said, "When you have smelled and seen death and hopelessness, then you will search for peace with all the might that you have." The true and enduring strength of South Sudan was on full display as we waited for Pope Francis.

The next few days were a whirlwind of activity. On Friday afternoon the three faith leaders and other notable faith leaders among them visited the President and the five Vice Presidents at the Presidential Palace. On Saturday morning each faith leader spent time with their respective faith communities. The Presbyterian Church of South Sudan and the South Sudan Presbyterian Evangelical Church hosted a reception and worship service today for the Rt. Rev. Dr. Iain Greenshields, Moderator of the Church of Scotland, and Rev. Shavon Starling-Louis of the Presbyterian Church (USA), along with other members and leaders from both denominational bodies. It was a joyous occasion with almost sixteen thousand in attendance, including Spirit inspired worship through song and messages about unity, love, and our shared history and hopes for our shared future. It was an extraordinary event, and it served as a reunion of sorts as Kristi and I saw many church leaders whom we know and several of my former students. Entering into that worship space in its magnitude defies description. Seeing the smiling, joyful faces welcome us into the huge blue and white tent will forever be etched on my soul.

That afternoon we joined hundreds at Freedom Hall where Pope Francis and the others welcomed internally displaced persons from all over South Sudan. Three children from the IDP camp in Malakal shared their stories of life in the camp and the significant challenges they face regarding daily life and schooling.

To our surprise, Kristi and I were included with the ecclesial leadership community, both from South Sudan and abroad on the stage where the Pope and others led us in an ecumenical prayer and worship service. The following morning, I joined colleagues as we worshiped at the same venue, the John Garang Mausoleum, participating in the Mass with the masses. Both Saturday night and Sunday morning, it is reported that between fifty and seventy thousand people were present. Everyone who came walked long distances as there was no public transport in operation. Mama Lucia, a colleague and friend, told Kristi that she was so tired Saturday night when she finally arrived home after two hours of walking. Yet, she was there the next morning to help with a medical effort as people had no means to eat, had stayed at the worship site all night, and were now suffering from dehydration, lack of access to food and water, and a hot sun.

The Red Cross was present to assist those who had waited all night without access to food or water The choirs, singers and dancers help us worship as the Pope preached from the Gospel of Matthew, announcing that we are to be the salt of the earth, the light of the world!

By Sunday afternoon, all the notable visitors had left, but a palpable sense of hope continued to fill the landscape. On the following Friday, our friend and colleague Shelvis Smith-Mather connected us with Bishop Paride Taban, a notable Catholic bishop best known for his peace-making efforts over the last forty years. When asked about the Pope's visit, the aged and wizened bishop said to us in characteristic African proverbial fashion, "The Pope's visit is like a bee which came to us, stung us, and has now left us. We trust and pray that the 'itch of peace' left by his sting will remain."
