


Our Valley Voice August, 2021



We have been learning about "the Winds" in the Southwest. For a decade we lived in Wisconsin, where the bitter cold winds were dried out as they came across the plains. Encountering the Great Lakes, the winds formed sheets of ice on roads and trees, like a treacherous glass fairy landscape. For two decades we lived in the Northeast, where the same winds had gathered up moisture blowing over the lakes, which the winds dropped in over 200 inches of snow each year. But two years ago the same winds of heaven brought us to Green Valley, where as the temperatures increase tropical storms in the Pacific and Sea of Cortez bring monsoons to the desert Southwest.

This is more than a basic review of meteorology and weather forecasts, when we consider the Biblical word for WIND can be translated Holy Spirit or Breath of God. For a long time, we have been in drought, without the regular visit of monsoons. But now, after all the problems and circumstance of the last few years, how the winds are blowing! We have begun to be visited by monsoons, replenishing life and faith in the desert and as in the case of the Haboob (dust storm): a bit frightening and dangerous.

I have a new friend who is Native American, who tells me that in July and August as temperatures are in triple digits, he prays that our lives would get hotter! Because if temperatures cool, the winds quiet down and the monsoons do not come. But when things get hotter, as we become more passionate and excited, the winds of heaven do increase bringing the monsoons to replenish the earth and our lives.

FINALLY THE EXTERIOR PAINTING IS DONE

After five weeks of work and over 400 gallons of paint, from the top of the spires to the columbarium, Valley Presbyterian Church again gleams in the sunlight. Our church staff did become concerned one morning as we witnessed a neighbor going out of her way to walk her dog across the parking lots to have an animated conversation with the Painters. When asked, the painters laughed stating that rather than complaining, she had

gone out of her way to compliment them on what a wonderful job they were doing and how beautiful the church building looked fresh and clean, ready for our next chapter.

PAYING ATTENTION TO OUR AUDIENCE

March 2020, when the world shifted responding to isolation orders related to COVID19, Valley Presbyterian Church began video-recording our Worship for viewers to visit at our website Valleypres.net. Beginning Memorial Day weekend 2021, we have been learning to broadcast our Worship of God live. This has been a complex endeavor, with a great deal of technology, and our volunteers are to be awarded for their hard work and never giving up. Each broadcast has been a significant improvement over the past. This summer of 2021 we have had great attendance in worship (complete with COVID-free/ Alcohol-free/ Gluten-free Communion; 2 Congregational Meetings; and a Believer Baptism), and yet we have also had an equal number of additional devices observing on-line (and these may have 1 to 80 persons per device). However, there is an important reminder when worshipping in person, or through technology: Worship is not a performance, like a Play, a Concert, a Movie, Radio or Television. In Worship, the audience is always GOD. The actors and performers in life are all of us. Your pastors have the distinction of being the Stage Managers, who prompt others with their lines, prepare sets and design scenes. But all of life is for the glory of GOD.

ENHANCEMENTS IN LIGHTING

The Building and Grounds Committee have received special donations to change all of the bulbs in the Sanctuary chandeliers to LED lightbulbs; as well as to change all of the Choir recessed lights to LED bulbs. Please know that when designated gifts are received, we can only use these for that purpose, these are not Operating Budget expenses. Multiple benefits from these donations include: far lower energy costs, longer life to the bulbs (meaning fewer burning out on an annual basis), 4X brighter illumination, reducing the heat from that of incandescent lighting. In order to clean the chandeliers and replace the bulbs at 20 feet above the Sanctuary floor, we will need to rent a Boom-lift one weekend. Different from the Scissor-lifts we have used previously which only go up and down, the Boom-lift will be able to reach out over the pews to the chandeliers, as well as to the recessed fixtures above the Pipes of the Organ and above the Choir-loft. One year ago members of the Building & Grounds Committee were able to re-program our existing Digital Light-board, from all-on/ all-off; to instead permitting each

different set of lights to be controlled independently, and each on dimmer switches. This provides far greater flexibility for our Sanctuary in Worship and concerts. We hope to be able to make many adjustments and enhancements in our sanctuary while the lift is on-site this summer. Brighter illumination should improve reading hymnals.

In addition, while the new Hymnals, acquired at the end of 2019, have far larger print-font than previous hymnals (PICA Size 12 compared to ELITE 10), several individuals requested even larger print. Hearing you, 20 Large Print Hymnals (Black Cover) are now available in the racks at the rear of the Sanctuary and the Welcome Desks. In order to provide the largest font available, the publishers have printed these supplemental 20 Hymnals without musical scores, only the texts of hymns.



CELEBRATION OF LIFE FOR PUNKY GRIGGS August 25th at 3pm

Standards of Ethical Conduct Introduction

The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church took action in 1999 adopting a written statement and policy that provides guidance, direction, and a standard for ethical conduct for ordained officers, employees and volunteers in the Presbyterian Church. A standard that can be read and referred to by members, volunteers, employees, and church leadership when ethical dilemmas or situations present themselves provides that written accessible reference.

Seeing the value of the written standards, the Personnel Committee reviewed and recommended adoption to the Session and in May, 2021, the Session of the Valley Presbyterian Church unanimously adopted both the "Standards of Ethical Conduct for Ordained Officers in the Presbyterian Church," and the "Standards of Ethical Conduct for Employees and Volunteers of the Presbyterian Church.

LIFE TOGETHER IN THE COMMUNITY OF FAITH: STANDARDS OF ETHICAL CONDUCT FOR MEMBERS OF THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH (U.S.A.)

As a member of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), in obedience to Jesus Christ, I accept Christ's call to be involved responsibly in the ministry of the church, confirm that Jesus Christ is the pattern for my life and ministry and, relying on God's grace, commit myself to the following standards of ethical conduct.

I will conduct my life in a manner that is faithful to the gospel and consistent with my membership in the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). Therefore I will:

Practice the disciplines of study, prayer, reflection, worship, stewardship, and service; Be honest and truthful in my relationships with others;

Be faithful, keeping the covenants I make and honoring marriage vows;

Treat all persons with equal respect and concern as beloved children of God;

Maintain a healthy balance among the responsibilities of my life's work and church membership, my commitments to family and other primary relationships, and my need for spiritual, physical, emotional, and intellectual renewal;

Refrain from abusive, addictive, or exploitative behavior and seek help to overcome such behavior if it occurs:

Refrain from gossip and abusive speech; and

Maintain an attitude of repentance, humility, and forgiveness, responsive to God's reconciling will.

I will conduct myself within the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) so that nothing need be hidden from sisters and broth- ers in Christ. Therefore I will:

Bear witness to the gospel of Jesus Christ with courage, speaking the truth in love; Honor the sacred trust of relationships within the covenant community and observe appropriate boundaries;

Be judicious in the exercise of the power and privileges of positions of responsibility I hold;

Avoid conflicts of interest that might compromise my witness and relationships within the community of faith;

Refrain from exploiting relationships within the community of faith for personal gain or gratification, including sexual harassment and misconduct as defined by Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) policy;

Respect the privacy of individuals and not divulge information obtained in confidence without express permission unless an individual is a danger to self or others;

Recognize the limits of my own gifts and training, and refer persons and tasks to others as appropriate;

Claim only those qualifications actually attained, give appropriate credit to others where due and observe copyrights;

Be a faithful steward of and fully account for funds and property entrusted to me; and Accept the discipline of the church.

I will participate as a partner with others in the ministry and mission of the Church universal. Therefore I will:

Participate in the mission and governance of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) and work for the unity of the holy catholic church;

New AED at VPC

Over the last few decades, we have heard the importance of having an AED. What exactly is an AED? An AED is a portable automated external defibrillator and used during an emergency to help during a life threatening event such as a cardiac arrest. This can aid the first person on the scene to guide them through CPR and the AED diagnoses life - threatening cardiac arrhythmias, which it can treat through defibrillation. Minutes matter when there is an emergency. The AED that has been at VPC has been one from the original Sarver Heart of Banner, almost a few decades old.

The company of this older style of AED has changed its name and the parts are difficult to find with expensive batteries and pads due to this model being outdated. Our older model of AED is also quite heavy. The newer models have a more user-friendly guidance through CPR and initializing shock, both with verbal commands and visuals.

Technology has changed over the last 18 - 20 years, and the AED's are now light- weight and designed for more people to use. The Faith and Health Committee/Parish Nurse has researched new models of AEDs over the last few months. A new Phillips HeartStart AED has arrived at VPC. This new model will only be 3.5 pounds and has a trainer video for training staff, ushers, Deacons, and others who may need to know how to use this in case of an emergency. Classes and/or self-study will be scheduled soon. The new Phillips AED is also capable of assisting with children and infants. Thank you to the Gifts and Memorials Committee for funding this new emergency AED. With this new user-friendly, lightweight AED, more people can be trained, and it can be used for all ages at our church. It is so important to keep the congregational members safe and have the right equipment to use if an emergency does happen, minutes matter.

The Faith and Health Committee/Parish Nurse will be reaching out to groups/committees for training. A DVD training kit of CPR is also available to be checked out for self-study, for those who may want to review CPR without a certification.

Being Presbyterian - The Book of Order

This month's article will focus on Part II of the Constitution – *Book of Order* – that has four parts: The Foundations of Presbyterian Polity, the Form of Government, the Directory for Worship and Rules of Discipline.
Each of these sections have been thoughtfully worded and challenges you to really think through such basic concepts as the mission of the church in the world of today. Our denomination recognizes that, when led by the Holy Spirit and faithful to Scripture, things change. Here are just a couple of concepts that got me thinking that are found in the first section – Foundations.

Holy catholic church. I know that these words from the Apostle's Creed seem odd to those of us who grew up associating the catholic church with the Catholic denomination whose head is the Pope. I know when I was younger — Protestants were right and Roman Catholics were wrong. But take time to read these two paragraphs from the Foundations section - they really got me thinking!

F-1.0302c The Church Is the Body of Christ

Catholicity is God's gift to the Church in Jesus Christ. In the life, death, and resurrection of Christ, by the power of the Spirit, God overcomes our alienation and repairs our division. Because in Christ the Church is catholic, it strives everywhere to testify to Christ's embrace of men, women, and children of all times, places, races, nations, ages, conditions, and stations in life. The catholicity of the Church summons the Church to a deeper faith, a larger hope and a more complete love as it bears witness to God's Grace.

F-1.0402 Ecumenicity

The presbyterian system of government in the Constitution of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) is established in light of Scripture but is not regarded as essential for the existence of the Christian Church nor required of all Christians.

Wow – the power of those words – "summons the Church to a deeper faith, a larger hope and a more complete love" challenges me to re-think some of the ideas of my youth. What about you?



Solar Power System Status Report

ENERGY COST SAVINGS

Since the commissioning of the Solar Power System in late May 2018, Valley Presbyterian Church (VPC) has saved approximately \$20,562.75 in energy costs. This includes the monthly power purchase fee we pay the California leasing company, Technology Credit Corporation (TCC). During the second quarter of 2023 we will have the opportunity to purchase the system from TCC which will relieve VPC from the lease and all power generated by the system will be at no charge with the exception of Tucson Electric Power (TEP) monthly grid charge, maintenance and insurance. Currently the TEP grid charge is \$79.50 per month, we are estimating the maintenance to be \$900 per year and the insurance rider will be minimal. After the purchase we are estimating a yearly energy cost savings of approximately \$14,000 per year.

PERFORMANCE

The system has outperformed the installer's estimates by 6.19% over the past three years which should meet all of VPC's power requirements going forward. Bear in mind other factors (new air conditioners, "smart" thermostats and LED lighting have all reduced our power requirements.

FUNDING

Thanks to the matching funds (\$19,140.00) pledged by one member our congregation, we are well on our way to the outright purchase of the solar system in the 2nd Qtr of 2023 without having to tap our Capital Reserve Account. The chart below reflects the current funding status. Expect another campaign solicitation in mid 2022.

Patio Sale Financial Report

(This text was run last month, but the actual financial report was not included. Editor's error.)

We, the Amigos, frequently get asked how we're doing. Are we making money? How do we keep track of our expenses and income? Where do we stand year-to-date? Well let's see if we can shed some light on this subject by first acknowledging that we can always do a better job of reporting our YTD Patio Sale (PS) expenses and resulting income for all to see.

Before looking at where we are in 2021, it needs to be noted that the PS is a year-around activity from January through December filled with income and expenses each and every month. The final net results are not known until the books are closed at year-end. It is from the net profits achieved each year that are given in support of the Mission Committee's recommended recipients, as endorsed by the Finance Committee and approved by Session, for the **next calendar** year.

Typically we have a large March sale with a smaller Holiday Sale in November and a lot of miscellaneous sales in between, whose expenses occur throughout the year. The financial accounting for all this activity is inputted by the Church Bookkeeper, using sign-off and approval procedures.

"I have seen you"

Recently on a Sunday afternoon I was sitting at the edge of our couch, dusting one of our two statues representing the pastoralist Turkana people of Northern Kenya. I heard a voice in the hall followed by an exclamation of surprise, then a knock at the door. When I opened our door, shock, disbelief, and joy were felt on each side of the threshold. "Susan!" I exclaimed. "Bob!" Susan cried out. Kristi joined the circle and we reveled in each other's presence. Several times during that chance encounter Susan said, "Rabuna fi," "the Lord is here." Susan, a former cleaner in our building, happened by the building that day and saw me from the hallway. We were so blessed to experience her presence and her friendship again. Susan saw us and



then acknowledged the presence of the Lord. It was a holy moment.

In <u>The Primal Vision</u>, a seminal work on African Christianity, John V Taylor describes the delight and wonder of human relationships in Africa. As he describes the agreeable and amusing account of twelve-year-old Nantume paying him a visit while ironing a shirt in his hut, the reader is mesmerized by the glory and beauty of human interaction and connection. Taylor describes Nantume's curiosity in the hut, coupled with her sense of

feeling at home as she leans her body into the wall, "as relaxed as a young antelope asleep in the sun." Taylor describes how in Africa one can enjoy the presence of another without pressure or feeling hurried or troubled, whether in conversation or in silence.

I confess that I often struggle with this concept. I feel like I need a purpose when I visit someone. I also feel like there should be conversation when perhaps silence and just being present to one another is the more agreeable option. Taylor describes how in Africa a visitor is never an interruption. In the introduction to Taylor's book, theologian J.N.K. Mugambi depicts how the interaction between Nantume and Taylor is about presence. Nantume closes her visit with the words "I have seen you." The primal vision, as Bishop Taylor describes it, is a world of being present to one another, of seeing one another. It is the universe understood in the language of "I and Thou." While such an encounter between Nantume and Bishop Taylor sounds simple, Mugambi describes it as the core of the Gospel, that even as God encounters us in Jesus Christ, Christian mission should be first and foremost about acknowledging the presence and integrity of others, of 'seeing the other' as modeled by Jesus in his life on earth (Taylor, 2001).

Recently I enjoyed a long phone conversation with a friend and colleague. Over the course of the call my friend mentioned how he had observed Kristi and I during a recent Zoom call. It was obvious that my friend was present to the moment and present to us, even over Zoom. He then asked an important follow up question from his observation which allowed our relationship to take a deeper turn towards mutual understanding and appreciation. At the end of

our conversation, I felt like my friend could have said "I have seen you." Another colleague, John, described for us an experience he had in Ghana. Being present to the moment and the people around him, he was able to deeply connect with a young woman who was troubled. John spent time with this young woman and spoke words of life, hope, encouragement, and strength to her. At the end of their meeting, truly, John could have said "I have seen you."

The beauty and glory of the Gospel is that Jesus sees people. In fact, during his pubic ministry here on earth, Jesus chose to see the very persons whom others had overlooked or chose not to see. He saw the ostracized Samaritan woman at the well. He saw Zacchaeus up in a tree. He saw a man with a withered hand in the synagogue on the Sabbath. He connected with each of these persons, offering them in their personhoods dignity and value.

Jesus, unhindered and unhandicapped by self pre-occupation, worry, and the emotional trauma which seemingly perpetually beleaguer us, lived in the moment and was fully present to those around him. I confess that too often I fail to fully live in the moment and be present to others.

I pray for growth in this area.
I pray that after each meeting with

someone, planned or unplanned, I can say, "I have seen you." May that be so for all of us who attach ourselves to Jesus Christ, our Lord and Savior. Operation Mobilization

Pam's father had a major stroke May 14 and then in the next few weeks continued to have more strokes and died June 14. After that we were busy planning for the funeral and then going to see the lawyer etc. It has been a tumultuous time to say the least.

We have been extremely busy all these months in ongoing ministry especially in reaching Muslims in North India. As I'm sure you're aware, Covid hit north India in the month of May like a tsunami. We know of at least 600 pastors who died and of course millions who were suffering being pushed into abject poverty with lack of work and faced even starvation.

Our partners with their teams have reached out to 1600 families in North India as we reached out with the love of Christ to Muslim communities to share the good news and demonstrate the good news of the gospel in practical ways by providing food and healthy packs.

We've also been coming along side widows and orphans who are left behind after their husbands, who were pastors and evangelists, had died. Many of them were formally with OM.

We would appreciate prayer for wisdom as we're supposed to go overseas at the end of August and then I should be in India at the end of September, in Bangladesh in October, and then the Middle East in November. Sometime in there I need to be in Pakistan as well.

Covid continues to put so much of this up in the air.

We're also just printing nine more books in Turkey which we will distribute to many different organizations and work to get them inside Iran to help the underground church. Please pray as we are also are producing 20,000 SD cards with 64 GB of materials for discipleship and leadership training as well as of course Scriptures.

Thanks again for your partnership and prayer.

Laura Romero, the executive director at St. Andrew's Children's Clinic expressed concern about the upcoming trips to the Hermosillo Hospital with children who need Cleft Lip and Cleft Palate surgeries. With the increase in COVID cases among adults, the hospital beds are becoming full. The St. Andrew's staff and volunteers want to take no chances of exposing the children to this virus so they are being very cautious, monitoring the conditions in Hermosillo, Sonora, Mexico.

Unless things get worse, they will move forward as planned. In September

they will take 25 pre-selected babies and very young children for first-time surgery for cleft lip/cleft palate. At the first of November, 25 toddlers will go for their second surgery.

Laura hopes that more clinics will be held before the end of 2021. One of her goals is to have a December Clinic which will also be the Christmas party for 15 children and families. At this time, she's still hoping that St. Andrew's Church will be able to serve as their Clinic each month. COVID has been a challenge for this mission. Above all, they certainly need the prayers and support of Valley Presbyterian Church.



Ben has had health problems the past few years because of a fall, which has sent him in-and-out of hospitals and rehab facilities in Phoenix and Tucson. Ben fell in 2018 and bruised his brainstem and cerebellum of the brain. Bert was happy to report Ben will be coming home July 15, 2021, after months of rehab. Ben is still having problems with his right arm and his body still shakes. His left arm has a steel plate from the elbow to the wrist. Ben's arm will heal but the shaking will get worse. Training to Become a Stephen Minister

Stephen Minister training is a Christ-centered experience that equips participants with essential caring and relating skills. Trainees learn how to listen to, care for, and walk with those going through difficult times in life. Stephen Ministers are trained by their congregation's Stephen Leaders using resources from Stephen Ministries St. Louis. The training they receive in the congregation equips them to provide high-quality care to people who are hurting.

Here at Valley Presbyterian Church, we conduct our training on Fridays for 10 weeks between January and March. It is a total of 50 hours of in class time. 
