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Around the Table

It is said that Christmas, Mother's Day, and Easter are the biggest outreach days for the church.

With that in mind, last Christmas Eve we tried an experiment. We took our usual 4 p.m. Family Pageant service, moved it from the sanctuary into the Fellowship Hall, and placed people at round tables. THEN in the middle of worship, we stopped and ate dinner. And THEN after eating, we had communion together at our tables, serving one another the elements in a continued time of worship. All of it tied together with the singing of Christmas carols. We called it "Around the Table" worship service.

There are two things that stand out for me as I look back at that service. One, we had lots of visitors. There were so many faces I did not recognize. I was rather stunned actually. I shouldn't have been. We had mailed 13,000 postcards to Green Valley residents inviting them to the service.

As we worshipped at round tables, I wondered what the visitors thought of our rather un-orthodox service. I can't begin to tell you how many of them came up to me after the service was over and said how wonderful it was. Several mentioned it was a great way for a new visitor to enter into a church.

The second thing that stood out is that we didn't have enough food! I foolishly (or rather generously) said on the Christmas postcard if you are a new visitor, come as our guest to the service and potluck meal. The visitors took me up on it. None of them brought food. Since the visitors outnumbered our church members, food was rather scarce that night.

So foolishly (and hopefully generously), we are going to try this service again. Again, we sent out 13,000 postcards to our neighbors inviting them to our Christmas Eve services. Again, we are inviting the new visitors to our potluck meal and worship service as a guest.

Again, I ask for your help. Please come to the 4 p.m. Around the Table Christmas Eve service on December 24 and bring a dish to share at the potluck meal. We will provide the meat. As a result, I hope our table can be overflowing in generosity to our visitors and neighbors.

And of course, don't forget the beautiful 7 p.m. Candlelight service later that evening.

Being Counter-Cultural

One of the marvelous identities of Valley Presbyterian Church is how "Counter-Cultural" we are! Judaism was not intended to be normative, Israel was called to be a voice to the nations, to call all the world from their lives and desires to come to God's holy mountain. The followers of Jesus were regularly challenged for not following the Levitical and Pharasaic laws. Jesus was crucified as a means of shame, but not even death could prevent the love of God through this one. The early Christian church was an underground movement for centuries.

Where the rest of the country and western Europe have been waning in worship participation in the last 50 years, VPC is vital and alive with new visitors every week. Throughout the world, missions have been struggling for support and VPC is committed to a host of missions changing the world. Many churches have given up on the glorious music of choirs, and the singing of actual music by following the projection of words, VPC is gifted with incredible choirs, concerts of fabulous music, and singing from new hymnals in a larger type font. Churches throughout the world cannot view the world through stained-glass windows, and this congregation looks to the high hills from whence our help comes! In the first weeks of November, when the rest of the nation plunged into ice, snow, sub-zero temperatures, Green Valley has come to life with residents returning home to Arizona!

Is life hard? You betcha. Are we confronted with the same problems we had years ago? Yes. But none of that stops us, or seems to matter. We are having too good a time to notice, and we believe in the possible, in reconciliation beyond our differences, and in resurrection beyond this life.

I have been reading through our chronology of Annual Reports as a congregation, only to discover that circumstances changed years ago, not because of this pastor or that one, and not because of decisions of the denomination. After our first 20 years, there appears to have been a tiredness, a milieu that settled in as if every church was the same and people could shop for what was most convenient. Today, we are leaner, but once again anything is possible. I am reminded of the Genesis story of the Tower of Babel. The problem was not a lack of leadership or faith or resources. Genesis states that the people settled. They tried to reach heaven by building towers to show the world they possessed the ability to do anything others could do. Therefore, God frustrated them. Until a day of Pentecost, when disciples discovered a flaming passion and that each one had gifts. No two possessed the same gifts, but they each were able to speak in ways that strangers could understand. We are discovering that every person, regardless of limitations, has abilities and faith.

This year, our Advent Taizé services will center around a group of Bible scriptures that traditionally make up Advent Lessons and Carols services. The scriptures are: Genesis 3:1-22, Isaiah 40:1-11, Jeremiah 31:31-34, Isaiah 64:1-9, Isaiah 35: 1-10, Baruch 4:36-5:9, Isaiah 7:10-15, Zephaniah 3:14-18, and Isaiah 65:17-25. Why do we Save Plastic Bottle Caps?

Nearly a year ago, the Women's Ministries at Valley Presbyterian decided to get involved in a Presbytery de Cristo project that benefits sick children in Mexico. Donated bottle caps are collected by women's groups at many of the Presbyterian churches in the Tucson area, and are dropped off at Immanuel Presbyterian in Tucson. There, Lucy Greenleaf sorts through the 1,000-plus pounds of donations she receives every month, to make sure there is no metal or other items that aren't bottle caps.

Several times a month, Lucy drives down to Nogales, Sonora, MX to deliver the caps to Pastor Jorge Pazos. In turn, he makes trips further south to Hermosillo to drop the donations off at a children's hospital that arranges for recycling of plastic caps. The money earned from this joint project is used to finance chemotherapy for children whose families cannot afford the treatments.

So, next time you empty a prescription bottle, drink a soda, or finish a larger beverage container that has a plastic cap, bring the cap in on Sunday and drop it off at the Women's Ministries table in Charter Hall. It feels good to know that if we all pitch in, the sum total can make a big difference to families in financial distress due to illness.



Mission Trip to St. Andrew's Children's Clinic

On Thursday, November 7, six people toured the clinic. Mission Quilters gave four quilts to donate. Our tour leader, an Episcopal priest from Tucson, was knowledgeable and thorough. This monthly clinic provides free, specialized medical care to children living in Mexico who cannot get, or cannot afford, the care they need in their home country. On this clinic day, the staff saw approximately 220-250 children. The church/clinic was "organized chaos" as we saw many children and their families being served. After our tour, our group went to lunch at Wisdom's Café. Our day was enhanced by eating outdoors with good food and conversation. The "Wish List" below was suggested by the clinic. In the 1920's, people came home from work each week with a "pay envelope" of cash, and distributed so much into each envelope for the milkman, the gas-meter, the water-meter, taxes, groceries and the church. From this practice, churches created pew envelopes, and we each became accustomed to having our assigned number that stayed with us year after year. Technology has changed. Many of us have already been contributing by check, others by automatic withdrawal, some by stock, or once-a-year contribution. Because of this, the Session decided early last February TO DISCONTINUE HAVING BOXES OF OFFERING ENVELOPES. There will be generic envelopes in the pews, so if you contribute cash, please place it into an envelope and write your name on the envelope so we can credit your donation. If you have been looking for your envelopes, there are none anymore. This represented a significant financial savings in the operating budget. PLEASE, PLEASE continue to contribute to the church, your support in so many ways is vital to the existence of VPC. We know that this represents a change to how we have always done things.

Twice in the past week I have received emails from people at VPC asking me questions about promoting events at the church. Many of you are involved in ministries, committees, or even outside organizations offering events or activities that benefit the people in our community by providing information, services, or

entertainment. You want to get the word out to as many people as possible, but how?

There are a number of free resources you can use to promote these events, and while this is by no means a comprehensive list, it's a good starting point. For events that directly involve our church, including the ministries we support, you can share information via our weekly Sunday bulletin (handed out during Sunday worship), our weekly e-blast (goes out by email to subscribers), our monthly newsletter (goes out by email to subscribers, and printed versions are available at the church), the church Facebook page (seen by anyone who "likes" that page), our church calendar (found on our website, www.valleypresbyterian.net) and the News & Events page on our church website. You can get information to all of these areas at once by sending an email to **notices@valleypres.net** with information about the event and where you would like it to appear.

There are two additional, free options for providing information to the community via the Chamber of Commerce and the Green Valley News. We have left brochures at the Chamber of Commerce promoting events happening at the church, and at times they have even sold tickets for us. This is especially handy on Fridays when the church office is closed. Please stop by and talk to the people at the Chamber for more information.

The Green Valley News charges for ads, of course, but you can promote events for free on the event calendar found on their website. If you want to see what's going on in our area, or list an event for others to see, go to **gvnews.com/events**. You can search for an event, browse the list of upcoming events, or if you want to list an event, you can click on the green "+PRMOTE YOUR EVENT" button in the upper right corner. It will take you through a series of questions about your event to make sure readers get the information they need. The GV News selects items from this list to feature on the What's Happening page of the printed newspaper, so you may get additional free advertising that way. Note, however, that we have no control or influence over which items are chosen, it's something the people at GV News decide for themselves.

Those are just some of the free and easy ways I know of to promote events that are relevant to our church and surrounding community, but I'm sure there are many more. Local radio stations and other area websites and publications may offer additional ways to share information for free, and it certainly never hurts to ask.

The Moving Chancel

On October 1, Craig Lindsey came to worship as our new pastor. On November 1, after trying things the way they had been for several weeks, a few changes began taking place. The Oasis of Grace pitcher and crystal bowl moved from a small table to the baptismal font, representing that VPC is an "Oasis of Grace" and that as we worship, we reflect upon and re-new our acceptance of our baptismal covenant of grace. Then, the pulpit became central! Some of our preachers have been on the left and some have been on the right. Our hope is to cut right down the middle, comforting the afflicted and challenging us all when we get too comfortable. Acoustically, the spoken word "projects" and carries more articulately down the center of the room, to all corners, rather than diagonally cutting across. Also, by centering the pulpit behind the communion table, in practicality we create a lot more room for the hand bell choir, the Orff ensemble, etc.; while spiritually we are making the claim that the Word of God and communion of the Holy Spirit are not extraneous, but are central to all we do. We are not moving pews, nor the time of the worship service. There will always be three hymns, an anthem and offering, a desire that all God's children have a place here and are welcome, but more minor things may continue to change from time to time.

The Inquisitors Early Christianity: The Experience of the Divine

Join the Inquisitors as we watch and discuss "Early Christianity: The Experience of the Divine." After 2,000 years, Christianity is the world's largest religion and continues to prosper and grow. What accounts for its continued popularity? Simply put, Christianity is powerful and persuasive as a religion. It offers a convincing personal experience of ultimate, or "divine," power.

In Early Christianity: The Experience of the Divine, Professor Luke Timothy Johnson maintains that the most familiar aspects of Christianity - its myths, institutions, ideas, and morality - are only its outer "husk." In this two-part course, he takes us on a journey to find the "kernel" of Christianity's appeal: religious experience. We will travel back to Christianity's origins, its first 300 years, to identify the elements that first made it appealing and which still hold the secret to its ability to attract new followers.

In his presentation, Professor Johnson employs scholarly techniques that have only recently been applied to religion. By combining such disciplines as history, the social sciences, and comparative literary analysis, you look at religious experience and behavior from a fresh perspective. We have experienced Professor Johnson's courses in the past and they have been some of our favorites.



Financial Update

(Based on financial data through October 2019)

The Finance Committee met on November 20 to review financial activity through October. As of October 31, 2019, the financials show that we are remaining in a positive position as we have been fortunate to report for each month of 2019.

When we look at budget-to-actual, the revenues exceed the year-to-date budget by 7.8% and expenses are under budget by about 4.2%. This puts us significantly ahead of our budgeted year-to-date as shown below:

The Finance Committee watches the results closely each month. The difference between this year-to-date and last year at this time shows that our bottom line for the year-to-date has improved by \$138,643. Our operating reserves stand at \$165,945. To date, we have collected and paid \$9,019 (45.2%) of the Presbytery de Cristo assessed \$19,949 per capita. This has been paid only as collected. We have recommended to Session that the full per capita for 2019 be recorded as payable in anticipation of a positive year end position. That was our commitment to the Presbytery when we asked for time to stabilize our finances.

We gave Session an estimated expense budget at their October meeting. We are now waiting for the results of the Stewardship Committee's Generosity Campaign to determine if changes need to be made to the committee expenses. We remain confident that we have laid the groundwork for a successful 2020.

Thank you to all who are continuing to meet your pledge for 2019. We were informed at the November meeting that collections on the 2019 pledges are currently at 92%. A sincere thank you to all for your continued support of Valley Presbyterian Church.

A New Start for Farming

Food insecurity continues to be a major problem in several parts of South Sudan. The conflict and instability has displaced many people from their homes and made it unsafe for others to farm fields, which exacerbates the food insecurity problem. But this year, with a tenuous peace in the country, church leaders wanted to help people in stable areas to be able to 'restart' their farms. The SSPEC (South Sudan Presbyterian Evangelical Church) received a grant to provide seeds and tools to some of its congregations where people were able to farm but did not have the means to get started. They sent funds to a few congregations in different regions of South

Sudan this year, investing in and hoping for long-term development.

Here are some pictures from Pochalla, from clearing the field initially, to sprouted peanut plants, and finally the hard work of drying and shelling the peanuts.

In the region of Pochalla, there were multiple congregations involved, with a committee established to coordinate the work. As you can see from the photo on the bottom of people shelling peanuts, everyone got involved. I was encouraged to see that even men participated! The shelled peanuts spread out to dry in the last picture is the culmination of months of work and collaboration. And it is a great motivation and encouragement to people wearied by war that they can have a hand in changing their situation.







Unfortunately, this month there has been flooding in several parts of South Sudan. People are again displaced from their homes, forced to rebuild, and struggling to find food to eat. As far as I know, Pochalla has not had floods, but several other areas have. Please pray for the recovery efforts, and that South Sudan would again become a source of food rather than just a recipient.

The past blogs read like a real-life novel, chronicling God in action through the writings of Bob and Kristi Rice. Please join me in following our missionaries, and let me know if you have joined the blog brigade by telling me in person, or emailing douglasclark68@me.com.

Pam & Dave L. - Women's Traveling Team

This women's team in Pakistan goes from village to village, and city to city, with the gospel to reach women and children. During the door-to-door visitation in Bakhar, the team met a married lady who has been childless for several years. She was so disappointed and discouraged and shared, "I don't pray anymore because God doesn't listen to me." The Women's Team encouraged her through the Word, and shared Hannah's faith story from the Bible with her. The lady realized that she lost faith in God and prayed to God with tears, asking for forgiveness.



The team reached 672 people through film shows, Sunday school, Christian literature, door-todoor visitation, and women's fellowship meetings during this visit. 144 people accepted Jesus Christ as their personal savior.

By My Side Chorus

Giving Voice is the name of a chorus in Minneapolis for those living with dementia. There are now 40 choruses for dementia around the country with two in the Phoenix area. Each have their own select names.

Valley Presbyterian Church is exploring the view of being a dementia-friendly church and starting a Giving Voice Chorus (GVC), that will be called By My Side Chorus. We are looking for volunteers to get this amazing opportunity off the ground and will hold an informational meeting on Sunday, December 8 at 11:30 a.m. in the Spiritual Life Center. Speakers include Marlys Fiterman, whose vision is to start this very first chorus in our area, and Heather Mulder, Outreach Program Manager from Banner Alzheimer's Institute. The Faith and Health Committee has been meeting with Marlys and will sponsor this health related activity.

Giving Voice Chorus is a performing chorus that uses the irrepressible power of singing to move people with Alzheimer's (or other dementia diagnoses) and their care partners to rediscover themselves, make new friends, laugh together, learn together, empower and support each other, and create something unique together. In the process, the singers and their communities develop a new understanding of what life with Alzheimer's can be. Singing in the chorus is a meaningful way to engage in community life, and give joy and purpose.

We know from research that music and poetry are the last memories to stay with people who struggle with dementia, and we know that people with dementia are often marginalized and nearly invisible after a diagnosis. The priority is to engage and embrace people with Alzheimer's who have fewer opportunities to socialize and contribute. Similarly, their care partners often feel more isolated and alone. While many people living in care facilities could also benefit from participation in a chorus, we chose to direct our limited resources to where we see the greatest need, where those with dementia still live at home.

This chorus is vastly different to music therapy. Music therapy is the clinical and evidence-based use of music interventions to accomplish individual goals.

By My Side is also different than a sing-along. It will offer a unique depth of learning and participation. The songs are in SAB (soprano-alto-bass) parts, unlike sing-alongs which are usually a single melody. The fun is in learning three-part music, and provides socialization and support before, during, and after.

There will be regular, weekly rehearsal where the singers meet for a total of two hours on Thursday mornings (with an exercise break) and the ultimate goal is to have a concert in April.

Besides care partners, there are volunteer singers who help singers with dementia manage their printed music, follow instructions, and generally help make sure the rehearsals run smoothly.

By My Side Chorus in Valley Presbyterian Church will cost \$25 each to cover the costs of printing name tags and materials (folders/music). This chorus will have volunteers to provide assistance, music direction, and accompaniment.

Who helps our chorus? Volunteers. Below are some of the ways in which volunteers can donate their time.

Volunteers are essential to the By My Side Chorus life and operation. Volunteers can be musicians, singers, advisors, ambassadors, and help with day-to-day operations.

Volunteers are needed to help with registration, music collation, snacks and greeting, publicity for membership and for upcoming concerts, ticket sales, and programs.

Volunteer singers are a familiar, welcoming face as singers arrive for rehearsal each week. Each sings alongside

a person with dementia, helping him or her follow the music and lyrics, taking instructional notes, and ensuring everyone has an enjoyable experience during rehearsals and performances. Volunteers commit to attending all weekly rehearsals and performances. Volunteers receive training on Alzheimer's and other dementias and dementia-friendly communication strategies. Volunteer ambassadors help spread the word about the chorus. They are well informed about the activities and plans of the chorus, and make valuable connections in the community, generate enthusiasm, and promote understanding of living well with Alzheimer's.

The words of the well-known song Side By Side by Kay Starr describe the By My Side Chorus' empowerment and hope which will create a new world of support and joy:

Oh, we ain't got a barrel of money
Maybe we're ragged and funny
But we'll travel along, singing a song
Side by side
Don't know what's coming tomorrow
Maybe it's trouble and sorrow
But we'll travel the road, sharing our load
Side by side
