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

Thanksgiving and Fear

Over my lifetime, Thanksgiving was one of those Norman Rockwell kind of holidays. Relatives and friends came over, the house smelled of cooking, and then there was the feasting, parades, and football games. The last two years have been different. Our world has lived in fear. We could not gather at the table together. We could not pass along recipes, by teaching next generations in person. Thanksgiving is different, when we are simply thankful, it is harvest season; than when we live with fear of being

exposed and exposing others to something which make us sick or die. What more explicit symptoms could there be than to lose your sense of taste and smell at Thanksgiving dinner!

I do not want to live in fear; I choose to live out my concern for others, for you. Why have we cancelled the Church Thanksgiving Dinner and asked everyone to again mask? In the last three months, we have had thirteen friends who have positively contracted COVID 19. They were not all at the same events, these are simply 13 persons who all happen to also go to church here. Our Church is not a Health Care Facility, we are a community of Christian caregiving and love. To me this means we are not bound by HIPPA, but I am bound by Pastoral Trust. The question is not whether Masks are Mandatory, or that anyone will be excluded, but rather that out of concern for one another, trying to protect each other, we are taking every precaution.

In many ways, this Thanksgiving seems especially poignant, because we could not gather a year ago, and this year if we gather it has to be because we really work to do so, with concern for one another.

Blessing Even in a Pandemic

On a recent Sunday, we reported that we received amazing blessings during 2020-2021. First, while many are now developing less severe cases, as a congregation, we were spared deaths from COVID19. Thank God!

Second, churches are treated very strangely according to economics. "The Constitutional Separation of Church & State" prohibits the Government from dictating to the Church; the Constitution does not in any way restrict the Church or believers from providing leadership in our society. In fact one of the original signers of the Declaration of Independence was an ordained minister, and he was a Presbyterian! The land on which our House of Worship resides is designated as Tax-Exempt; however in the State of Arizona, churches are required to pay Sales Tax. Legally, we are a corporation, a business with a financial bottom-line, employees and responsibilities, utilities and capital expenditures.

All of that is important to recognize, because in 2020, the Federal Government offered all businesses the PPP (Payroll Protection Program), as part of the Cares Act, to guarantee full salaries and benefits to businesses for all employees during an economic season hard-hit by an International Pandemic. The Financial officers of Valley Presbyterian Church appropriately applied for and were granted \$101,400 which was placed in a savings account and drawn from every two weeks to pay the salaries of our pastors and staff. Meanwhile, our program continued with Broadcast Worship, Zoom Meetings, even Bible Study. As such, our donors generously fulfilled their pledged contributions, such that when the forecast economic crisis ended, our staff had been paid and we had a balance of like amount.

A Church is unable to post Capital Gains or a profit, to offer dividends to stock-holders, so when the Federal Government ultimately declared the PPP would not be a loan accruing interest, but instead a Federal Grant to stimulate the economy, what was anticipated as a loan became unanticipated excess income. After prayerful consideration, the Finance Committee recommended to our Session, which acted to grant our Missions an additional \$10,000 over and above what has already been budgeted and received for this year. We also recognize that our Sanctuary and grounds are over 40 years of age, at which time, buildings begin to need a great number of Capital Improvements. Therefore, the balance of this unanticipated income will be reserved as "seed-money" for anticipated Capital Improvements.

The Valley Presbyterian Foundation invests reserves of the church, generating about \$50,000 annually to provide a resource for the Session to make Capital repairs. This was incredibly insightful and has recently allowed replacing the sound system and lighting, the painting of the exterior of the building, as well as annually replacing individual air conditioners. However, we have a contract that in July 2023 we will finally owe the full cost of the Solar Carport. Our Organ is +20 years old and the anticipated replacement is every 25 years. This monsoon season, we suffered a number of roof leaks. We have an aesthetically spectacular Sanctuary, which has acoustic problems that could possibly be improved. But each of these will require an expenditure of about \$100,000. Thank God for the wisdom and foresight of those prophets among us who have anticipated that Valley Presbyterian Church will have a future!



Sanctuary Flowers and Poinsettias for Christmas



Have you noticed the beautiful flowers in our sanctuary on Sunday mornings? These flowers are purchased by our congregation:

- to honor special people in their life
- to celebrate a special day such as an anniversary or birthday
- in memory of a loved one

After worship, the flowers are then broken down into 3-4 smaller arrangements and brought to the homebound or those in need.

We are taking orders for the year 2022 through the end of December. If you would like to reserve a bouquet, sign up in the Fellowship Hall on Sunday mornings. The cost for the large bouquet (\$50) and (\$10) for poinsettias amount is due when you sign up. If you are not able to come to church on Sundays, you may call the office to reserve a date. If you have a specific date in mind, make your reservations early as flowers are reserved on a first-come first-served basis.

Poinsettias cannot be removed from the church until after Christmas. Poinsettias order deadline is December 19th.

It is sincerely appreciated.


In October, 71 lbs. of food was delivered to the Food Bank and \$822.00 evenly split between the Green Valley and Amado Food Banks.

As I come to the end my year of monthly articles, let me share what it means to me to be Presbyterian in just three points:



Because of the committee structure, I have been able to practice my patience and self-control gifts of the Spirit. And I have continually schooled myself to bring my frustrations to God. I clearly remember one time, when my position on a question was not in the majority, telling God that "you need to open their eyes to the right answer, Lord." Talk about arrogance on my part!

2. <u>Shared Leadership</u>. Not only are decisions made by committees, but the people comprising these committees are not only pastors, but people who were "called by God through the voice of the congregation" to serve in positions of leadership. These believers are in varying stages of their faith journeys; some newly converted and some long-time believers. It is always a unique mixture.

When I was ordained I thought that I could be a "better" Elder by learning everything I could about my faith. The concept of growing my relationship with God was beyond my understanding – facts I could deal with – feelings, not so much.

3. <u>We could be wrong</u>. When the Presbyterian Church was founded in America, the original constitution included the concept that even most faith-filled and earnest of leaders can make mistakes.

The VPC Library has a wide group of books designed to make holiday preparations and celebrations more meaningful. Books for the season can be found on the tables in the library.

Here are a few suggestions from members of the Library Committee.

101 things Jesus has done for you. Jessica Inman. (232 In6)

What better time is there than the Christmas season for you to reflect on the many ways Jesus has affected your life. This book is a collection of scriptures, quotes, and meditations which will guide your thoughts during the Advent and Christmas seasons.

Amazing peace: a Christmas poem. Maya Angelou. (811.6 An4) This tiny, but beautiful book consists of the poem read by Ms. Angleou at the lighting of the National Christmas Tree in Washington, D.C. on December 1, 2005. Out of our fears and doubts, Christmas season and the joy of Christ's birth arrive with a sense of peace for the world and its many religions.

Because of Bethlehem: love is born, hope is here. Max Lucado. (242 LUC) Max invites us to look at the Christmas story from a different perspective. He reminds us that Christmas is about more than a pretty tree with presents piled up underneath it. Christmas begins what Easter celebrates: the child in the cradle who goes on to become the King on the cross.

God is in the small stuff at Christmas. Bruce Bickel. (242 B47) Want to <u>really</u> experience Christmas this year? Join the author for an inspiring look at the joyous season of Jesus' birth. Featuring the characters and places, symbols and celebrations, and thoughts and feelings of the Christmas season, this book combines the best features of a devotional with the traditional appeal of an Advent book.

Honest Advent: awakening to the wonder of God-with us then, here, and now. Scott Erickson. (242 ERI) Through powerful benedictions, prayers, and questions for honest reflection, you'll discover how the wonder of God-with-Us is still happening today: in your unexpected change of plans, your unaccomplished dreams, your overcrowded lodging, and your humble stories of new beginnings.

Incarnation: rediscovering the significance of Christmas. Adam Hamilton. (242 HAM) Adam Hamilton examines the names of Christ used by the gospel writers, exploring the historical and personal significance of his birth.

Healing and Forgiveness in Malakal

Malakal is a large city in the Upper Nile region of South Sudan, where the Presbyterian Church has had its base for the last one hundred years. We have been told that during the conflict in 2013 and 2016, Malakal changed hands at least five times as militia groups fought for control of the region. The city was destroyed, and most people fled their homes. One friend has described how he hid in the ceiling of his house during that time until he and his family fled to a refugee camp. The soldiers who occupied the area moved into his house, and he cannot return. Until now, nearly 35,000 live in an Internally Displaced Persons (IDP) camp near Malakal. Many of them have not stepped foot outside of the camp for years, afraid of being attacked by an opposing tribe.

When SSPEC leaders considered the best place for our reconciliation team to do a Healing Wounds Transforming Communities (HHTC) workshop, Malakal was a priority. Finally, a couple of weeks ago, our team was able to go to Malakal for the workshop. The workshop was done inside the IDP camp and included people from the Nuer and Shilluk tribes. There was a diverse group of men, women, and youth at the workshop, and three languages were used to make sure that everyone understood what was being taught. There is one united church inside the camp that worships in the Nuer language, comprised of members from seven different denominations. We are grateful for that tangible expression of unity, and glad that people from different backgrounds could all participate.

We praise God for this opportunity to witness to God's love and power to heal after tragic pain. We pray that the healing journey continues in Malakal. Our team is doing another workshop this week in the city of Bor, and we welcome your prayers!

PREPARING FOR THE END OF LIFE TOPIC OF DISCUSSIONS

How do you want to live out the last years or months of your life? Are you willing to move to a facility where you will receive care, or are you determined to stay at home until they carry you out feet first? Do you want to live as long as you possibly can, or are they conditions under which you would want the doctors to stop trying to

save you?

In a book titled *Being Mortal*, Dr. Atul Gawande writes about what he learned about the last stages of live from his experiences with patients and, especially, with his father. Contrary to what would make good sense, he says that doctors are not required to take a single course in geriatrics or in death and dying, but they are trained to find cures and look for solutions to any health situation.

In six weekly sessions that will meet for 90 minutes each session beginning at 2;00 PM on January 13th, we will discuss the issues raised by Dr. Gawande. Participants will be required to have access to the book and read chapters as they are assigned. You can buy your own book or get one from Pastor Diane. November 28-December 19th, Christmas Joy Offering

What a great name for an offering. What is the Joy Offering? Our denomination has four denomination-wide offerings. The Joy Offering, taken at Advent/ Christmas time, is one of them.

In simple terms, it develops and sustains leaders in our denomination by providing assistance to current and retired church workers in their time of need. It also develops future leaders at Presbyterian-related schools and colleges equipping communities of color. This has been a Presbyterian commitment for nearly 140 years.

New Class: Faith Works Tuesdays, 4 p.m. beginning January 11

Classroom 5 Your Teacher: Chuck Ramsay



President Woodrow Wilson was once asked how he was able to cope with life. His response was that he lived "From Sunday worship to Sunday worship." And so, it is with us as Christians at Valley Presbyterian. I am so totally transformed by our worship experience each week that I do not want it to be over. But it does end. Monday cometh. The world in all its ugliness (and beauty) comes in!

How do we make sense of the complexity of modern life from a Christian worldview? Seems to be getting tougher. In partnership with the Faith Formation group, I want to facilitate a new Faith Formation class beginning on Tuesday, January 11 at 4pm called "Faith Works"! The Faith Works Experience will be different than traditional expositional Christian education. It will center on lively discussion about current events. We will use as curriculum a web site called the "wiredword.com" most of the time, but we will always allow for more current events to be discussed. We need everyone to come and come with an open mind.

I have years of success using this curriculum in my previous Presbyterian church. The point of the class is to first bring about peace. I love VPC's theme of "Let there be peace and let it begin with me!" That means it must begin IN you. Discussions with other persons about the tension inducing events of this life can let that peace begin IN and with You! Secondly, we seek to accept this world as Jesus Christ did. Not being able to accept things the way they are leads to a whole host of problems like anger, guilt, and confusion. The church seeks to confront these polarizing issues with Faith Formation. Hostility kills the soul first. And lastly, we seek understanding and therefore Christian wisdom (James 1:5). Presbyterians are known as a church that does not require you to check your brain at the door (or your opinions). Remember this: We can disagree as Christians, but we cannot be disagreeable!

I am ready and excited to go, but I need one more ingredient: YOU! Please come. Each class is self-contained so if you miss a session, you are never behind or not caught up. Please come see us **Tuesday, January 11 at 4pm in Room 5**.

Pass Through Giving for Missions

Christ has given us the model of self-sacrificing love through the cross and Christmas is a time of giving. Please consider additional funding for needy missions. Pass through giving for missions are funds which are given outside of the church's mission budget. The needs of our 15 agencies are great and for some critical. Pass through giving for missions is an extra source of income for a specific mission which would be delivered through our church. These pass through funds outside of our mission budget are available for special giving and come from many sources:

- 1) Extra envelope giving such as Food Bank, PCUSA Special Giving (for example monies for Christmas Joy).
- 2) Addition checks given to VPC for specific Mission Agencies (for example monies for Casa Vida Nueva, Crossroads Nogales Mission, VAS, etc.) as noted in memo area on the check. The advantage of giving to agencies through the church includes easy bookkeeping as these contributions are listed in your Annual Giving Summary. The pass-through monies are given to the agency as a check from VPC which reflects our church's involvement in the community. By request, you can be identified by name.
- 3) Projects which generate income such as Mission Breakfasts, Noisy Offering (if identified by check or in Special Offering Envelope) etc.
- 4) Undesignated gifts to the Mission Committee are placed in the Emergency Fund and are used in that calendar year for emergencies as identified.

Pass through giving is a way to help meet VPC's mission needs. Agape love is self-sacrificing Love.

A keepsake Christmas. Alice Gray. (394.21 G79)

This delightful book is filled with thoughtful ways to observe Advent and prepare for Christmas. Six sections highlight different things to do while getting ready for Christ's birthday. Spiritual passages, phrases from Christmas carols and beautiful photographs lead the reader through the Advent Season. There are even recipes for special foods to share with those we love. It is a book to savor and enjoy as one prepares to receive the greatest of Christmas gifts, Jesus' birth.

Unwrapping the names of Jesus: an Advent devotional. Asheritah Ciuciu. (242 CIU) By focusing on the person and character of Jesus throughout the Advent season, readers will prepare their hearts so that when they admire the live nativity, sit in the candlelight service, or wake up on Christian morning, they can join the faithful who sing from the bottom of their hearts, "O come, let us adore Him, Christ the Lord!"

A weary world: reflections for a blue Christmas. Kathy Escobar. (242 ESC) Great book for anyone experiencing a less-than-perfect Christmas. The author is honest, non judgmental, and full of solid guidance for people whose holiday doesn't match up to the "perfect holiday" the rest of the world likes to pretend exists.

The whisper of Christmas: reflections for Advent and Christmas. Joe E. Pennel, Jr. (242 P33) Often, words of inspiration come to us as a whisper, and sometimes we do not hear them. This book of reflections for the Advent and Christmas season takes us through the season quietly with gentle reminders of the true meaning of this season. Take the time to be quiet; prepare yourself to face the hustle and bustle with calm in your heart.

The women of Christmas: experience the season afresh with Elizabeth, Mary, and Anna. Liz Curtis Higgs. (232.92 H53) When we think of the women of Christmas we always think of Mary and Elizabeth, but we should not forget Anna. In *The Women of Christmas*, we get to look into the hearts and lives of these inspiring women. Their stories encourage us to look at our own lives and our relationship with the Messiah. This is a busy season, but I consider this book puts all the holiday preparation in perspective.

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


