

December has always meant COOKIES! Caroling, gathering with friends, poinsettias, concerts, family coming from near and far. We as a church have wonderful opportunities to gather and celebrate the anticipation of the coming of our Savior.

For those who may not have been in worship in early November, we announced several wonderful gifts are coming to our Church. The Acousticians have determined a problem in our Sanctuary is the Carpet on the Chancel (the Stage for the Communion Table, Pulpit and Choir) absorbs sound! So, we are pulling it up, to be replaced with porcelain tile to reflect the sound. Before Easter, we will have installed a new Organ! There was a time, when it was illegal to wear a Scottish Tartan, a Kilt, or to play the Bagpipes. So once a year, families brought their family colors to the Kirk (the Church) to bless their family heritage. Whether you are Scot or not, this will be a grand day, and our Annual Meeting too!

I love the preparation seasons for the big festivals in Christianity. Advent, the 4 weeks before Christmas, prepares us for Christmas. Lent, the 40 days before Easter, prepares us for Easter. These seasons prepare our hearts and souls and minds for the big event.

The word Advent means "arrival," and contains the theme of waiting. The Jews were waiting for their Messiah. They had many promises from the Old Testament prophets of the one who will come to save. Advent, in a sense, simulates this waiting time. We commemorate Christ's first coming and we anticipate His second coming. As Israel longed for their Messiah to come, we Christians long for our Savior to come again. Advent prepares our hearts for Christmas and for the eventual return of Christ.

This year, Advent begins November 27, the Sunday after Thanksgiving. I am so excited for what we, as a church, are offering in this preparation time for Christmas. The season of Advent has its own color – purple (some use royal blue). You will notice the purple draped in front of the pulpit. Look at the choir and notice the purple around their necks. Pastor Craig and I will wear purple stoles (that piece of material that hangs around our neck and down the front of our robe).

One of the most common of Advent traditions involves the use of evergreen wreaths, branches, and trees. Notice our Christmas trees outside the sanctuary. On the chancel up front will be an Advent wreath – an evergreen circle with four colored candles surrounding a white one in the middle. The candles are lit one at a time on successive Sundays as we anticipate and wait for Christmas.

The children will receive Advent calendars. The calendar contains covered windows that are opened one a day until Christmas Day. Sometimes it is hard opening just one! It is the practice of waiting.

We will offer an Advent class on the four angels of the Christmas story. We have written our own Advent devotional, readings for each day in Advent. On Thursday evenings will be special worship services followed by a bread and soup meal followed by our Advent Class. Details of all of this is on page 4.

I hope and pray you will take part in our Advent season. I find that when I do, as I take those four weeks to prepare my heart, Christmas takes on a deeper meaning.

I can't wait.



The Life and Times of Jesus the Messiah: His Final Week

Part One: The Temple: Its Ministry and Services as They Were at the Time of Jesus Christ

The Second Temple was destroyed in 70 AD. What can we know of it now, almost two thousand years later? Sound scholarship and archeological evidence, however, along with Jewish writings and oral tradition, informs our knowledge of what it looked like, and how it functioned, in the time of Jesus.

In the mind of the Jews of Jesus' time the Temple and Jerusalem were essentially one and the same. This was the most holy place on earth. It was where Abraham met Melchizedek and was blessed by him. This was where Abraham would have offered Isaac. This was where the heart of every exiled Jew turned toward home. It was where heaven and earth met.

The New Testament makes frequent reference to the Temple. We see the father of John the Baptist ministering the burnt incense; the Virgin Mother at her purification; the child Jesus among the Rabbis; the showing of the healed leper to the priest; His cleansing of the hucksters. The roof of this Temple was where Satan brought Jesus to be tempted, and this is where Jesus made His triumphal entry only days before His death.

What was this place like? What happened there and what were the Sacrifices and Feasts pointing to? In Part One of *The Life and Times of Jesus the Messiah* we will attempt to understand the Temple, referring to the *Misnah*, biblical texts, rabbinical teaching, and archeology to see how the sacrifices, feasts and rituals foreshadowed the Messiah Himself and His Saving Work.

Session Highlights from October meeting

Summary of Session Actions

- MSP to allow request for a person who has been a member for less than a year to be elected as a Deacon as a one-time exception.
- MSP to accept the recommendation of the Organ Commission to purchase a Rodgers Infinity Series Organ model 367 at a cost of \$150,366.90, with the addition of a date of delivery and installation of March 1st.
- MSP to transfer the undesignated funds from the Gifts and Memorials fund to the Capital Reserve to be used for the organ purchase.
- MSP to take funds left in Foundation Capital Reserve fund from 2021 of \$1,205.22 to reduce what is owed on relocation of the sound board to sanctuary.
- MSP to approve funds from Peace and Justice Committee for Judy Aguayo to visit the Café Gusto Coffee Co-op in Mexico.

Discussion: A bid from Green Valley Cooling and Heating was accepted by the Building and Grounds Committee to replace the air conditioning units damaged by the hailstorm. Insurance will cover the cost.

Session did not meet in November. The next meeting will be on December 8th.


There is also a time of remembrance of loved ones, and the grief of those who have passed away recently. Many will feel many emotions, many of them mixed emotions of current and past.

With billions of emails sent globally each day. It's no wonder that email compromise has become one of the largest and most financially damaging online crimes. In an email-based scam, fraudsters send an email that appears to come from a known or reputable source with a legitimate request, such as updating a mailing address or payment instructions.

Here are 5 steps you can take to protect yourself:

- Set up two-factor (or multi-factor) authentication on any account that allows it.
- Be careful with information you share online, and the details others share about you.
- Think before clicking on downloading
- Verify email addresses.
- Compare the from address to the replay to address.

This will enable the full impact of the reason we give the gifts. We will hear sometime between December 15 to mid-January where our boxes from this church went and we will notify you of that.

It was the first opportunity for over 40 children and families to experience examinations and treatment at their new location – the former K-Mart store, at 2021 N. Grand Ave. in Nogales, Arizona. Laura Romero, staff, and volunteers have spent many hours during October, working to make this building into a useful Clinic. The lobby and exam rooms have been freshly painted. There was a new, clean, and friendly atmosphere throughout the area. This is partly because of the joy everyone feels about having their first **very own** building.

A TV for use by waiting children has been donated by our VPC's Holiday Patio Sale. Les Walter along with other volunteers will get it installed next month. To add a festive touch this season, Les presented a Christmas tree and lights donated by the same sale.

The Clinic on November 3 was just a small start for what is to come. There are 3 rooms now available for departments of Orthopedics, Speech, and Cleft Lip/Cleft palate where Shriner volunteers were working. Rooms will be added for Dermatology, Cardiology, Vision, Occupational & Physical Therapy, Pediatrics, Audiology, Nutrition and Equipment/Prostheses. A large empty warehouse space in the back will be re-modeled, with the help of an architect, to accommodate more exam and treatment rooms, offices, kitchen, and storage.

December 1 will be the next Clinic which will also be the St. Andrews' Clinic Christmas Party. They have much to celebrate this year and anticipate an attendance of 80 children and their families along with St. Andrews' Staff and volunteers.

Laura Romero and St. Andrews' Children's Clinic express sincere thanks to the Valley Presbyterian Church congregation for prayers and support, helping to successfully overcome the challenges of the past 2 years.


Crossroads Mission expects to giveaway 3500 bags of food and serve 10,045 meals during the holiday season.

Equipping for healing in Rwanda

This month I (Kristi)was in Rwanda for two big events related to the Healing Hearts, Transforming Nations (HHTN) workshop that we have been doing in South Sudan. First, I served on the facilitation team of the International School of Reconciliation (ISOR), training new facilitators for this workshop who came from nine different countries. It was an intense time of learning and sharing together as we faced the wounds within us and within our countries. Nearly 10 delegates came from Ethiopia, where war is devastating the country and the social fabric. Four South Sudanese pastors came from northern Uganda, where they live in refugee camps after fleeing their homes in South Sudan during the crisis of 2016.

At the end of the training, the new facilitators conduct HHTN workshops in groups in the community. I helped to coach one group as they prepared to teach, including learning dramas and figuring out how to make the teaching interactive and personal. Teaching in a workshop in a way that touches the heart and not just the head is not easy! Add to that the language challenge – most of our new facilitators were not Rwandan, so they spoke in English which was translated into Kinyarwanda.

But they also do not speak English as their first language, so they are having to teach in a language that is not their most comfortable language. For some, this meant laboriously writing out what they wanted to say to make sure they would be clear. I was humbled and blessed by the hard work and caring hearts that each person in my group demonstrated. A few of them even incorporated testimonies of their own pain into their teaching which I know is difficult, but it served to open the hearts of participants and give them hope for healing in they heard how God can bring healing.

The second big event was a forum for practitioners who are using this workshop in healing and reconciliation ministries in this region of East Africa. It was a rich and meaningful time together, and I got to meet some faithful heroes that I have heard about for years. One group serves in Eastern Congo, visiting remote villages and promoting healing in places that have been repeatedly terrorized by militia. Four of us from South Sudan attended the forum, and it was inspiring to learn from others and see that ours is not the only country with challenges of instability and conflict!

One of the central parts of the HHTN workshop is the session on the cross, where we take our pain to Jesus as the pain-bearer (Isaiah 53:4). During the forum, there was a chance for all of us who regularly conduct the cross workshop for others to participate in it ourselves, sharing our pain and giving it over to Jesus. As we stood together around the cross, several people shared of deep pain that weighed them down and we prayed together for freedom and healing. I was grateful for this safe space where all of us who are pour out for lives for others could share our own pain and find love and support.

I give thanks for this gift of connection, inspiration, and equipping with others in this ministry. Please pray with us that God continues to use us as agents of healing and reconciliation in South Sudan and brings the transformation and wholeness that only God can bring.

Memory loss that impacts daily living is nothing to ignore

Can't find your car keys? Forgot your grocery list? Can't remember the name of the personal trainer you liked at the gym? You're not alone. Everyone forgets things occasionally. Still, memory loss is nothing to take lightly. Memory often changes as people grow older. Some people notice changes in themselves before anyone else does. For other people, friends and family are the first to see changes in memory, behavior, or abilities in their friends or loved ones. Memory loss that disrupts daily life is not a typical part of aging. People with one or more of these warning signs should see a doctor to find the cause. Early diagnosis gives people a chance to seek treatment and plan for the future.

- Difficulty completing familiar tasks at home, at work, or at leisure: having problems with cooking, driving places, using a cell phone, or shopping.
- Confusion with time or place: having trouble understanding an event happening later or losing track of dates.
- Trouble understanding visual images and spatial relations: having more difficulty with balance or judging distance, tripping over things at home, or spilling or dropping things more often.
- New problems with words in speaking or writing: having trouble following or joining a conversation or struggling to find a word you are looking for (saying "that thing on your wrist that tells time" Instead of "watch").
- Misplacing things and losing the ability to retrace steps: placing car keys in the washer or dryer or not being able to retrace steps to find something.

- Decreased or poor judgment: being a victim of a scam, not managing money well, paying less attention to hygiene, or having trouble taking care of a pet.
- Withdrawal from work or social activities: not wanting to go to church or other activities as you usually do, not being able to follow football games or keep up with what's happening.
- Changes in mood and personality: getting easily upset in common situations or being fearful or suspicious.
- Memory loss that disrupts daily life: forgetting events, repeating yourself or frequently relying on more aids to help you remember (like sticky notes or reminders).
- Trouble paying bills or cooking recipes you have used for years challenges in planning or solving problems.

Many conditions are progressive, which means that the signs of dementia start out slowly and gradually get worse. If you or someone you know is experiencing memory difficulties or other changes in thinking skills, don't ignore them. See a doctor soon to determine the cause. Professional evaluation may detect a treatable condition. Even if symptoms suggest dementia, early diagnosis allows a person to get the maximum benefit from available treatments and provides an opportunity to volunteer for clinical trials or studies. It also provides time to plan for the future.

This week was quite busy, as there are more and more migrants arriving every day. We heard several comments among them, that they hope that Title 42 will be lifted soon, and with this their hope grows. It is always a challenge to listen to their stories, sense their frustration, and above all to see their children play in the park most of the day because there is no other place to go. There is desperation, because the number of days they are allowed to be in the shelter are running out. And when the days run out, they don't know where to go.

Every time we distribute food, we stay almost three hours to listen to them and pray with them-in fact the vast majority-are looking for a place to rent and work, since they must feed their children. In all my time living here, I had never seen so many migrants that it exceeded the capacity of the shelters to give asylum. Sleeping in parks in the spring is not that much of a challenge but sleeping with your children in the park and with no security is very, very difficult.

Sister and brothers in the US, thank you for continuing to pray for this project. We really need it! It is not just physical tiredness, it is emotional, with so much listening and not being able to do more. The good and wonderful thing is those times of joy where they can smile for a while and sing and praise and see the invisible God smile through others. It reminds us that we are not alone.
