From Pastor Craig

Listening For God

Thus far in life, as an ordained pastor, I have yet to see/hear the clouds part and a voice proclaim what I/we were to do. There have however been times when I have heard a nudging of how to respond and how to not respond, where I listened to God. Oh how I wish God would speak more often!

Thirty years ago, I was the President of a City's Ethics Committee. My undergraduate degree was in the Political Science and Economics of Urban Planning so I thought this a good use of my education. The Committee was designed by the Mayor and City Council to be a "blue-ribbon appointed committee" intended to provide the appearance of transparency and good government without really doing anything aside from verifying Conflict of Interest statements from all City/Police/Fire employees.

After three years, the Committee recognized that while the City Attorney and a Council member had together bought farmland for speculation when that property came up for utilities development, they had not disclosed that they were the owners who would benefit from the City installing roads, electricity, sewers, and water. When we began a very quiet investigation (our confidentially reviewing the City Council Minutes), the Mayor and Attorney threatened those of us on the Ethics Committee with the power of their offices. I listened and did not challenge them. When it was my turn to speak, I disclosed that a city is accountable to the County and to the State Ethics Commissions and while the separation of Church and State did not prevent a pastor from serving as a volunteer for the City, elected officials threatening that pastor and their church was. Two days later, the Mayor, City Attorney and Council member all resigned from office.

Twenty years ago, refugees, the church had assisted to live in America, described their inability to leave our country to go in search of their families and need of someone to go on their behalf. I offered that I had time and resources to go. I heard in my mind the Isaiah 6 verse "Here am I send me!" What I had not anticipated was their response of what it meant that their pastor would leave everything on their behalf; what it meant to seek and find the lost; and just how severe the circumstance of entering into a warzone in Saharan East Africa as I came close to death.

The more recent was when a parishioner came to the church stating that she had no one, so who would be there for her when she died. I heard the response, "God will be with you, your church will be with you, I will be there with you." A few weeks later she had designated me as her POA, POHC, POMHC, Executor. Throughout the last year of her life, I had the honor/responsibility of walking beside her, always aware that as long as she could make decisions, she needed to do so. There were times I found services and resources for her, that she was not ready to have, but later we knew where to go for assistance. I visited her in the hospital and in her home and prayed with her, including on the night she was passed from our care into GOD's arms. Afterwards, I went to the Mortuary to present her wishes for her remains. Then I went to her attorney, who had written the paperwork for me to have these responsibilities, and I named to him that I needed him to step up as it would be a conflict of interest for me to serve as her Executor. He named that I was not personally to benefit from her estate in any way, so it was not a legal conflict of interest. I stated that that was true, but the Church stood to be a recipient of her estate, and as pastor, to me that represented a conflict of interest.

I have not yet heard GOD leading me into battle, or that the church should do a building campaign, etc. There have been several times in sermons, in meetings, in life, when I believe GOD was speaking and I was privileged to serve as an instrument if I could get out of my own way.

From Pastor Diane

Starting January 1, I will no longer be your pastor.

What does that mean for you? For me?

It is common practice in a church that when a pastor leaves, that pastor is not allowed back on campus for a specific amount of time. This is done to protect me, the outgoing pastor, so I am not drawn back into the things of church. It protects Pastor Craig because he is your pastor (not the ex-pastor who keeps showing up). It protects any new pastor coming in, so I will not interfere with that person's work and keeps you from comparing this new pastor to me. Pastor Craig and I have agreed that I shall remain off campus for at least one year. After one year, I will contact Pastor Craig, and we will discuss if it is appropriate for me to come on campus.

Pastor Craig and I have also agreed that I can socialize with you as long as it is off campus and not a sponsored church event. I will make the stipulation that we do not talk about church. If we do, knowing me, I may be tempted to give my opinion as a former pastor!

No longer being your pastor means I cannot do a memorial for you or a family member. Pastor Craig is your pastor, and he is the one who will do all memorials. If you do ask me, please forgive me, I will say "no."

Email blasts will continue, even though that has been my "baby." We started these daily email blasts during the pandemic so we could stay in contact with you on a regular basis. The Faith Formation Committee will head that up along with Pastor Craig. At least a couple times a week, you will see devotions written by members of our congregation. I know much of this sounds harsh. Some of you have said, "It sounds like you are being exiled. This is not fair to you."

Please understand pastors are taught this in their training. We know this is coming. That does not make it easy or fair, but it is necessary.

A question people keep asking is "Are you counting the days?" My answer is no. I am looking forward to retirement, to a new adventure in my life, but I am not looking forward to not worshipping with you. You have become my family.

At the beginning of my pastoral ministry, I attended a conference for pastors on relating to church members. We were told not to make friends with our congregants. All of us pastors in attendance looked at one another. I knew what they were thinking: too late.

Whether it was a good thing or not, you have become my friends. This leaving will be as hard on me as it will be for you. So no, I am not counting the days. I ask December to slow down.

There will be plenty of opportunities for us to say good-bye during this last month. We have been through so much together. We have gone through good times and awful times, and together, we have experienced the joy of God's resurrection of VPC.

I love you with all my heart. So why am I leaving? Because the call is over. Not by the church, but by God. You will hear more about that call when I revisit our 14 years together in my last worship service with you on December 31.

And I hope you will all come to the party on January 21. And party we will!

GIFTS AT THE END OF THE YEAR

ZAMBONI. While our Sanctuary and Offices are carpeted, much of the Church building has hard surface floors that require mopping. While not actually a Zamboni used at Ice Rinks, we have a new machine that is a Walk-behind Floor Scrubber which washes, scrubs, and squeegees the floor for a cleaner finish than ever possible before. This new machine will save hours of time for our custodial staff and provide better care for our hard surface floors.

NEW WIFI. For years our Church building has had WIFI with cabling and distribution Routers providing a signal in the Offices and Room 5. During COVID19 our use of WIFI increased greatly. We now have new wiring throughout the Fellowship Hall, Charter Hall, Spiritual Life Center, with signal available in the Sanctuary and throughout the building at 4 Bars! In the Robe Room there is now a new Switching Station.

PARKING LOTS RESURFACED. In 2022 we had all of the parking lots resealed, however the product which the Paving Company used proved to not wear well. We contacted the Company about this, and free of charge they came back after temperatures got below 100 degrees and resealed the entire parking lots and restriped. We are thankful to have a great company that stands behind their work.

CHOIR SOUND SYSTEM. Finally, after decades of the Choir being unable to hear our Worship of GOD, and 6 months of the parts being on order, a new kind of speaker has been installed on the Chancel aimed for the Choir to hear without hitting the windows which would reflect, or the microphones which would re-amplify. Now the question is if the Choir will appreciate what they hear clearly? A new Blue-tooth Dante Sound Board is still on order, factory delayed due to COVID19. Once installed the new Sound Board should improve our Sound System even more and create possibilities for better balancing of microphones.

ESTATES. Our congregation passed many long-time devoted leaders into the resurrection this year. What was not known in their lifetimes is that several of these not only donated the contents of their homes for the Patio Sale, they also donated the sale of their homes to the church. When gifts like these come to the Foundation, the estates become part of the investments of the Foundation (separate from the Operating Budget) to benefit the church for perpetuity. Annually, as available, the Foundation Board determines what funds are available from annual Interest income on these investments, which our church then uses to pay for Capital Improvements like these mentioned above. What a wonderful legacy these members have given our church both in their lives and now for evermore.




If You Are Feeling Blue, There Is a Stephen Minister for You

And what about those shepherds. Just lowly workers out in the field. Tired and dirty. Nonetheless they listened to the angels, went in search of Jesus and spread the news!






For your reading and viewing pleasure, Advent/Christmas books and DVDs in the church library.



Many years ago, a person came into my office, tears rolling down, stated "I cannot do this. I cannot talk about this." Two months after this statement, the same person came in with a smile, and said "I did it. I feel great and shared this with my family."

There are others on the AzHDR; This is a newer website in our state, Arizona for Advanced Directives Registry. Under the tab Registry, you will find a tab for consumers, and they have a 23-page advanced directive that can be filled out on-line and registered with the state. These are just two examples of advanced directives available.

God is always there for us. We need to remember this in the times of uncertainties, in times of illnesses, in times of stress, during tragedy, or loss, and during the Holidays.

May you be blessed every day through all the work you do, however big or small, every smile you create, every person you touch, and everything you give to others.

May a renewed sense of love and peace fill your hearts in this Christmas Season and throughout the New Year.

THE CONGREGATION, PART TWO

Last month I talked about the benefits of being a member of a congregation. This month, I want to explain what it means to be a part of a Presbyterian congregation.

First, let's go over the three main types of church government, Hierarchal or Episcopal, Congregational, and Presbyterian.

- 1. <u>Hierarchal or Episcopal</u>- Episcopal comes from the Greek word "episcopos", which means "bishop." It is marked by authority provided by a bishop. Here the authority comes from above and moves downward, from Pope or a council of bishops to bishops to priests. Examples include Roman Catholic, Episcopal, and Methodist.
- 2. **Congregational**—puts all power in the hands of the people. Decisions are made by the congregation and each one acts independently. Theoretically everyone votes on every issue on every occasion. In practice, churches often have a board of deacons or trustees to handle many issues, but the congregation can still seek to vote on any matter. Examples are Baptist and United Church of Christ.
- 3. <u>Presbyterian</u>—is democratic and representative. The word "Presbyterian" comes from the Greek word "presbuteros", which means "elder." Oversight is done by a group of elders called a session and elected by the local congregation. Representatives of each session in a geographical area come together to form a Presbytery. A group of Presbyterys form a synod and all synods form the General Assembly. Decisions of lower governing bodies are reviewed by higher bodies. Presbyterians believe this governing system is established in accord with Scriptures and exists to further good order in the church.

In the Presbyterian church, there are three categories of membership. They are:

- 1. <u>Baptized Member</u>- a person who has received the Sacrament of Baptism, but who has not made a profession of faith in Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior.
- 2. <u>Active Member</u>-a person who has been baptized, made a profession of faith, and been received into membership of the church.
- 3. <u>Affiliate Member</u>-a person who is a member of another congregation who has temporarily moved or is a part-time resident.


The church also welcomes people who are not members of, or who may have ceased active participation in the church, to participate in the life and worship of the church.

When each of us joined Valley Pres, we promised to be a faithful member of the congregation, to give of our time and talents, and to seek the fellowship of the church. We made a commitment to participate in Christ's mission. That includes being present at worship, casting a vote at congregational meetings, serving on committees, volunteering when there is a need, etc. The Book of Order Section G-1.0304 outlines the responsibilities of membership. They are:

- 1. Proclaiming the good news in word and deed,
- 2. Taking part in the common life and worship of a congregation,
- 3. Lifting one another up in prayer, mutual concern, and active support,
- 4. Studying Scripture and the issues of Christian faith and life,
- 5. Supporting the ministry of the church through the giving of money, time, and talents,
- 6. Demonstrating a new quality of life within and through the church,
- 7. Responding to God's activity in the world through service to others,
- 8. Living responsibly in the personal, family, vocational, political, cultural, and social relationships of life,
- 9. Working in the world for peace, justice, freedom, and human fulfillment, caring for God's creation,
- 10. Participating in the governing responsibilities of the church,
- 11. Reviewing and regularly evaluating the integrity of one's membership and considering ways in which one's participation in the worship and service of the church may be increased and made more meaningful.

Wow, that is a lot of stuff to do! Donald K. McKim, in his book <u>Presbyterian Questions/Presbyterian Answers</u> states: "Uniquely, the church is the only organization where to become a member one has to admit one is unworthy of membership!" It might seem like that at times, but being a member of a Presbyterian congregation has many rewards. Everyone has a voice, and everyone has the opportunity to serve and be served. The church does not just have a mission, but is a mission, and we are summoned as followers of Jesus to not only go to church but to be the church.


The new classroom building will occupy the space between our current two buildings shown in this photo.



Samaritan Purse is a nondenominational, evangelical, Christian organization that shares the good news of Jesus Christ through the Operation Christmas Child Shoebox program. This is one of many of their projects, and one Valley Presbyterian has been participating in for many years. Samaritan Purse invites churches worldwide to fill Christmas shoeboxes with toys, clothing, school supplies and other various small objects for daily living.

After sharing the story of the Good Samaritan, Jesus said, "Go and do likewise." That is the mission of Samaritan Purse—to follow the example of Christ by helping those in need and proclaiming the hope of the gospel. For over 25 years, SP has been distributing Shoeboxes gifts to millions of children in over 100 countries into very remote areas. The ultimate aim is to make known the life-changing Gospel of Jesus Christ as the shoeboxes offer a gift of love and hope and leads to hearing the Gospel by the local trained leaders.

Valley Presbyterian's role in this worldwide project is to facilitate the dissemination of the empty shoeboxes, provide information on the correct filling of the box, collect, and store the filled boxes once they have been returned, the n deliver the boxes to the appropriate processing center (for us in Tucson), to be shipped out on the designated date to the various countries.

Prayers are asked to be said for the receipt of the box and the child and the child's family. Info is provided later as to which country our boxes from Valley Pres were shipped.

This year 2023 88 boxes were filled and delivered to the Sahuarita Calvary Church for processing November 16. In addition, every single box this year was returned with the shipping costs included of \$10 per box. Monies were left over from the shipping due to further general donations to the project yet still coming in which the Mission Committee voted to be given to SP for cost of the "The Greatest Journey" Bible Study series which accompanies the boxes to the local destination.

HOW CAN YOU HELP?

Keep praying all year for the child that received your box and for the Operation Children's Shoebox mission...to hear and spread the word of God throughout their lands.

The Valley Pres Mission Committee also needs volunteers for this project to assist with assembling of boxes, the work on Sunday morns of distribution and receipt of the boxes, publicizing the project, and delivery of the boxes to the Processing Centers.


Food Bank Sunday is December 3rd. VPC has always shown tremendous generosity and we hope to continue doing so.
