

Being the Church Together Submitted by: Pastor Craig

I am 3rd generation Presbyterian, and yet I confess, being Presbyterian, being the Church together, is hard. More than being the Bride of Christ, the chosen people, this is about listening to one another and to GOD, to how we are different now than even 5-7 years ago, to recommend what leadership we need. When waiting for what is next, it would seem easier to have a Bishop or authority to decide for us, except that as the Presbyterian Church, wherever we could have deferred to a priest, a bishop, instead we have done the hard work of listening, praying, working together, to decide what we want and even more: need.

Our Session and our Presbytery agreed to a process, far different from the routine, for our Church. Last July, 6 months before our Associate retired, Session appointed a Commission of 6 people, 3 men, 3 women, to try to determine who our church is, and what our church needs.

This is an overwhelming process: gathering all of past reports of the last 45 years; interviewing different members; listening community's leaders; to gathering all the facts about: how many members, affiliate members, regular attenders, visitors; our regular attendance, physically and virtually; our giving patterns; our assets; our resources; trying to process census information and survey data. What has been learned thus far, is the full history of this church. We are now informed by the past, yet we are different from whom we were even before COVID. Throughout our history, growing to be 1600 members, struggling through 20 years of becoming less than 400 members, we have had as much staff as 1 Pastor, 3 Associate Pastors & an Administrator, to having only a solo Pastor. Like graduating from High School, we are listening for where to go and who to be. This search is about "right-sizing" what we need now and next.

From Pastor Craig

Our Mission Study Planning Commission has been meeting about every two weeks. At the meeting January 17th I named that "Even though we met two weeks ago, it feels like it has been months!" In those two weeks, we had shifted from Christmas and New Years and 2023; to 2024, where there have been 12 Hospital Calls, a Wedding, a Memorial, 14 Committee meetings, Communion, Ordination and Installations, a Mission Breakfast, Faith Formation Workshop, teaching 3 classes, plus meeting with Prospective Members and planning upcoming events. Is this too much work to tell you the truth I am having fun!

For 35 years, I worked a six-day work week, with meetings every night 7pm - 9 or 10pm, with Weddings and rehearsals 30 weekend out of 52 per year, and a Confirmation Class weekly after our Worship of GOD. One-night last week, I actually felt tired going home from work! Which actually, is the first time I have felt tired since coming to serve as your Pastor. That is one of the insights I have had in coming to serve as Pastor of Green Valley: My hope is one day to retire, and to be able to do what I want to do purely for the joy of doing. While gainfully employed, serving as Pastor of your church, I look forward to working, giving everything I can to serve GOD and to serve your needs. I look forward to being tired every night!

The other truth I have known in the ministry is that there are times when communities of faith like any family can be dysfunctional, when the congregation, the community, the Presbytery, are at war with one another, harming each other and disagreeing... That is exhausting, spiritually, intellectually, emotionally. There are other times, where New Member Classes are filled with enthusiastic people! When Faith Formation and Worship committees are filled with ideas and voluntarism! Where Session and Deacons, as Officers of the Church, laugh together while doing good work! When we end the year with more persons having been served, greater depth of faith, greater giving and mission service, than ever before, which is life giving and fun. There was a time, I had come through a dark night of the Soul, then I came to Green Valley, then we all adapted to COVID; afterward, every day has been hope filled (at times over-whelming) and rewarding as we are doing what GOD created us to do, serve as caretakers for GOD's creation.

AND here comes LENT! While there are Christians who have approached Lent with sadness, with fasting and temptation; personally, I have understood Lent as that season of Jesus greatest ministry, His parables and sermons, giving the Sacrament of the last supper, and His passion. This is the time where our faith and understanding and service all get stretched in new ways.

Sunday, February 4th, I am privileged to share worship with a Jewish Scholar! We are honored to be able to partner with Beth Shalom Synagogue in GOD gifting them the TORAH. Can you remember: When you were Baptized and claimed by the Body of Christ? When you first received your own Bible? When you confirmed your faith in Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior? When you became part of the Body of Christ? When you were Ordained? All of that touches on this gift to this people of God, that we are partnering to accomplish!

February 14th this year, we share in both Valentines' Day and Ash Wednesday! There will be Drive through Ashes from 9am until Noon, there will also be ashes at a Worship service with Communion at 4:30pm.

Saturday, February 17th Valley Assistant Services is celebrating their Empty Bowls event at our Church.

Being the Church continued from front cover:

In January, the agenda of this Commission shifted, from gathering and digesting past reports and history, to listening to your current ideas and prayers for our future.

- We asked for word descriptions about our Church. Our church is now: very hopeful, open and faithful, struggling with the hard work of reconciliation and forgiving one another.
- The Commission will distill all of that information and come back with a list for you.
- Meanwhile, we want to ask the next questions of you:
 - ➤ "What are the three greatest strengths of our Church?" the following week,
 - "What are our three greatest weaknesses?" then,
 - > "What do you perceive are three problems for our Church to address?

Please, go to our Church's Website or send emails to our Office with each of these.

Because I am continuing as your Pastor for the next several years, and because I have had decades of experience guiding congregations through this search process, I have been asked/allowed to staff the Mission Study Planning process. When that Mission Study Planning is complete, a report will be issued to our Session, for further input. That revised report will then be given to our Presbytery Commission on Ministry (COM), for their input. Then the report will be shared with our full congregation, for your input and acceptance. At which point, we will all know the full history and DNA of our church at this time. Beginning at that time, I cannot have, I do not want to, and I should not be involved in determining what you want in pastoral leadership, or who you want to be our Associate or the next Pastor when I retire. At this time, it is my responsibility to provide leadership, staffing the Session and Committees and Church. Good news: my retirement is still years away; also, if/when we call an Associate, or when we call the next Pastor, we should not need to repeat the process; everything will be approved to Search for an Associate and or Pastor to provide consistent pastoral leadership for our future.

Forgive me for beginning this "thank you" sounding more like a pastor (former).....

Last Fall, I gave a sermon called "To Know Christ." I talked about the Apostle Paul who was a man in love...with Jesus. He cannot stop talking about Jesus and nothing will distract him from following Jesus.

I thank you for not filling up the time with all kinds of entertainment (it was just enough), for it gave me time to go to each table and say goodbye to everyone. I appreciated that time so much.

Thank you, all of you, for all your words of encouragement, for expressing how my ministry touched your lives, your hugs, your love which you expressed in so many ways. I have not begun to open all my cards and gifts. I am going to make it last by going ever so slow.

Thank you, Pastor Craig, for upholding my ministry. We had a great time together. We prayed and laughed often. And thank you for offering up something I hold dear in my heart, something that contains many memories...a table made out of mesquite and inlayed with turquoise. That table was used in hundreds of worship services in the sanctuary and in the Spiritual Life Center. It has scars of much use and candle wax from many Taizé services. I will treasure it (I know it was not easy to give that table up). I am sure it will become an altar in my home.

I end with something I have learned in my first three weeks of retirement. It is from a book I am reading: *Aging Faithfully: The Holy Invitation of Growing Older* by Alice Fryling. Here it is: God invites us to be more fruitful at a time when we cannot be as productive as we used to be.



The Caregiver's Compass " Compassionate"



Stephen Minister trainees learn about the Caregiver's Compass in their very first lesson. The Caregiver's Compass provides direction for the journey on becoming a Stephen Minister and at the end of every lesson the trainees are asked to relate what they had learned in the lesson that relates to each "direction" of the Caregiver's Compass. You can see a prettier version of the Caregiver's Compass in Classroom 5.

This month I will give my viewpoint on what it means for Stephen Ministers to be compassionate, at the top of the Caregiver's Compass.

"When he (Jesus) went ashore, he saw a great crowd and he had compassion for them and cured their sick." Matthew 14:14, NRSV. Every potential Stephen Minister I have met is naturally compassionate. They feel compassion in their hearts. That is why they are drawn to Stephen Ministry. They want to find real ways of showing compassion to those who are sick, whether it is sick physically or sick emotionally.

"For he (God) says to Moses, 'I will have mercy on whom I have mercy, and I will have compassion on whom I have compassion.' Romans 9:15, NRSV. When an individual reaches out to ask for the help of a Stephen Minister, I believe that the individual is seeking out a compassionate person who will ensure them of God's compassion for them.

"As God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, meekness, and patience." Colossians 3:12, NRSV. This is one of my most favorite versus of the Bible. It is also one of the most difficult for us imperfect humans to achieve. Stephen Ministers are chosen, I like to think by God, and then train and learn, and even continue their training after commissioning as a Stephen Minister. They also talk with each other and ask for support and prayer when they fall short (all of us do at times) in their caregiving relationships.

Unless you have been a Stephen Minister yourself and understand the blessings they receive as caregivers to hurting individuals, you may not understand how much joy Stephen Ministers receive in showering compassion on others. Will you ask for a Stephen Minister today to provide him or her with that blessing of getting to know you? I don't think you will be disappointed.

Next month I will talk about how Stephen Ministers are "Full of Faith."

The Lamp Stand is a bite sized story from Matthew 5: 14-15


"You are the light of the world. A city set on a hill cannot be hidden. Nor do people light a lamp and put it under a basket, but on a stand and it gives light to all in the house."

The Healing Power of Music

Research indicates that at least some musical education has a positive impact on the social and cognitive development of children. And these effects are long lasting - better hearing, better motor skills, improved memory, better verbal, and literacy skills.

Alan Harvey - Neuroscientist and Musician

On December 27, my family's lives changed in one moment. Our AJ was not ok. 911 to ambulance, to ER, to PICU, and after many tests including an angiogram, AJ was diagnosed with an AVM, Arteriovenous Malformation. During these last few weeks of healing, music has played a HUGE part. I've always known the power of music, but now? Music reminded me that my boy was ok. Movements and lyrics to songs were the first way he communicated with us. Examples included AJ doing dance moves in a hospital bed to "Matilda" songs during an echocardiogram, or at first when he was asked if he knew where he was it was rehearsal or a performing arts center, or when I used an album of songs that he listened to as a baby to put him to sleep at age 11. The little hints of AJ's improvement because of music was a very powerful realization for me. The healing power of music is beyond amazing!

And then there's the outpouring of love, thoughts, prayers, visits, FOOD, shoulders to cry on, SUPPORT! We are so blessed with our church family! We love you and thank you for everything! It is an added relief to feel the constant support from everyone! As I was reminded from a dear congregant, "AJ has more Grandpas and Grandmas than most kids!!" I look forward to the day when my whole family is back at VPC!



Recipes from the January 16, Women's Gathering Luncheon.

On January 16, the Women's Gathering Luncheon served a lunch of *Baked Ham and Cheese Party Sandwiches* and *Creamy Basil Tomato Soup*. The recipes are below.

Baked Ham & Cheese Party Sandwiches

Terry Hokeness

Serving: 16

Sauce

1/3 cup mayonnaise
1 tablespoon poppy seeds
1 ½ tablespoon dejon mustard
½ cup butter – melted
1 tablespoon onion powder
½ teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
16 dinner rolls (I like Hawaiian Sweet rolls, but you can use any rolls you like.)
1 pound thinly sliced ham
1 pound thinly sliced swiss cheese.

Slice buns, put on ham and cheese, and put into cake pan.

Whisk together sauce and poor over rolls.

Cover and let for 10 minutes.

Bake @ 350 for 10-15 minutes, till warm and melty.

Uncover and bake 2-4 minutes till slightly brown.

Creamy Tomato Basil Soup

First Watch copycat

Servings: 10

Preparation time: 5 minutes

Start to Finish Time: 30 minutes.

4 tablespoons salted butter

2 cups onion, chopped

4 each garlic cloves,, coarsely chopped

2 tablespoons tomatoes paste

56 ounces whole tomatoes, San Marzano

3 cups chicken or vegetable broth

1 teaspoon kosher salt

½ cup fresh basil (approx. 2T dried), roughly chopped

½ cup heavy cream

Sugar, to taste

Salt and pepper, to taste

Parmesan cheese

In a Dutch oven, sauté onions and garlic over medium heat until translucent. Stirring until it starts to brown.

Pour in chicken stock and scrape the bottom of the pot with a wooden spoon to remove any caramelized brown bits, add both cans of tomatoes, including juice, and bring to a boil. Reduce the heat and simmer for 10 minutes.

Use an immersion blender to puree the soup right in the pot.

After mixture is pureed, add in the basil and pulse a few times to incorporate. Then whisk in heavy cream and season with additional salt, pepper and sugar to taste.

A sprinkling of ground Parmesan cheese may be added if desired.

Viewing the New Receiving Warehouse at More Than a Bed Wowed Mission Quilters





What to Bring to a Church Potluck by Region

All of us know, the potluck dinner is a much-loved part of church fellowship. This is a guide to help one prepare the proper dish to bring to a potluck based on your geographic region. Of course, here at Valley Presbyterian, we have people from all different parts of the country, so that would make any dish appropriate to bring to a potluck!

First of all, it is important to define the types of dishes that are welcome at a potluck. They are **the salad, the casserole, and the dessert.**

Now, **potluck salads** are quite different from actual salads. In preparation for making a potluck salad, ask yourself three questions:

- Is this dish mostly meat-free?
- Can this dish be served with a spoon or salad tongs?
- Can this dish be served chilled?

If the answer is "yes" to any of these questions, consider the dish a potluck-eligible salad.

The **potluck salad** contains three important parts: **the mixture, the crunchy stuff, and the glue.** The **mixture** is the foundation of any potluck salad. It gives the salad a sense of direction. If at all possible, use ingredients that are indigenous to your area. For example, broccoli, lettuce, apples, and macaroni are common in more temperate climates. The **crunchy stuff** gives life and pizazz to an otherwise bland salad. Examples include tortilla chips, shoestring potatoes, onion crisps, or fried pigskins. The **glue** holds the salad together. The variety of available types is stunning, ranging from a traditional oil-based salad dressing to mayonnaise and Cool Whip. Use your imagination. Consult regional recipes for exact ingredients. Note: Some salads are best when made well in advance and allowed to sit overnight. This is called *marinating*, or "controlled decomposition". Also, do not use actual glue adhesive.

The casserole is typically a three-layered dish. In order to make each casserole as culturally relevant as possible, use the following guidelines:

	STARCH	MEAT	CEREAL
East Coast	pasta or rice pilaf	sausage or pheasant	corn flakes
Midwest	rice, potatoes, noodles	ground beef or SPAM	corn flakes
South	grits	crawdad or marlin	corn flakes
Southwest	black, red, or pinto beans	pulled pork	corn flakes
West Coast	tofu	tofu	tofu

Dessert is the most highly valued dish at a potluck. It can be the simplest and most fun to make. There are two key ingredients: flour and fudge. Regional differences can be quite profound. Here are some examples of typical desserts around the country:

Cleveland—fudge brownies with fudge frosting

Kansas City—triple fudge fudge with fudge sauce and a side of fudge

Los Angeles—tofu fudge

Miami—fudge

½ tsp salt

2 tsp cinnamon

2 large eggs

2 cup buttermilk

10 Tbs butter, melted

½ cup pecans, chopped

New York City—cheesecake with fudge drizzle

Additional concerns

- Use caution when preparing a dish. Adding local ingredients to any meat, salad, or dessert can increase the fellowship factor or your potluck exponentially. It also raises the risk of a "flop."
- Always follow safe food-handling guidelines.
- Any combination of flavored gelatin, shredded carrots, mini-marshmallows, and canned pears
 is an acceptable "utility" dish, should you be unable to prepare one from the above categories.

Overnight Coffee Cake (Served at the January 13, Mission Breakfast:

The Pecan store, Green Valley News Servings: 1

2 cups all-purpose flour	Butter and lightly flour a 9x13 inch pan.
1 cup sugar	Combine flour, sugar, ½ cup brown sugar, baking soda, baking
1 cup brown sugar, firmly packed	powder, salt and 1 teaspoon of cinnamon in a mixing bowl and
1 tsp baking soda	mix well.
1 tsp baking powder	Add buttermilk, butter, and eggs to the mixing bowl, beat at low

Add buttermilk, butter, and eggs to the mixing bowl, beat at low speed until moistened, increase speed to medium for 3 minutes. Spoon batter into prepared pan.

In septate bowl, combine the remaining ½ cup brown sugar, pecans, and the remaining 1 teaspoon cinnamon. Springle crumb mixture over the batter and chill in the refrigerator for 8 – 12 hours.

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Bake coffee cake uncovered until lightly browned for 30 to 35 minutes. Serve warm. Garnish with candied roasted pecans and caramel sauce.

For the past 50 years, St. Andrew's Children's Clinic has provided free, specialized medical care to children living in Mexico who cannot get or afford the care they need in their home country. The Clinic is held at 2021 N. Grand Ave. in Nogales, Arizona, adjacent to the Santa Cruz / Pima County Community College. It is a non-denominational, non-profit organization, with a volunteer professional health care staff. The staff sees approximately 60-70 children the first Thursday of each month except July. Every October, in cooperation with Children's Surgery International, children have cleft palate/cleft lip surgery in Hermosillo, Sonora, Mexico.

To celebrate their 50 years of helping handicapped children from Mexico, the St. Andrew's Clinic Board of Directors is having a celebration on February 3, 2024, in Tubac.

The best way to understand St. Andrew's Children's Clinic is to see it in action. Children come across the border to be diagnosed and treated by volunteer doctors, assistants and staff. Tis the Season...for Baptisms!

During the Christmas season in South Sudan, many congregations celebrate baptisms. It seems a fitting connection, that as we remember God leaving his glory to be born as a human and suffer with us, we also celebrate people declaring that they repent of their sin and join Christ in his invitation to new life in Him. This weekend, we were invited to worship with one of these congregations' celebrating baptisms, and it was truly a joyful celebration.

More than 15 children were baptized, along with around 10 teenagers and adults. What struck me as remarkable is that this is a new congregation, less than 1 year old. This is the first time they have celebrated baptism in the congregation, and the number of people is a sign of the strong growth they have experienced.

The lead pastor of the congregation, Rev. Samuel Jock, began the church as an Arabic-speaking congregation several years ago. They have moved around to various locations and in 2022 finally built their own building next to the offices for SSPEC. They discovered that in the neighborhood around their new building there are many Nuer people. The congregation worshipped in the classical Arabic from Khartoum, which many of their neighbors did not understand. So, they started a second service in the Nuer language and assigned one of the Nuer members to lead the service. As a practical service in the community, they started offering classes in the evenings, teaching people to read and write in the Nuer language, because many were not able to go to school, and children today only learn to read Arabic or English. The Nuer service has grown dramatically, and now has an active youth choir and a children's choir. Pastor Samuel assigned a young man, Moses, to be the primary one leading the activities of this Nuer congregation. Another young man, Lony, has taken the responsibility of leading worship and directing the choirs, including teaching some of the members to play the keyboard! As Pastor Samuel recounted this progression to me, he rejoiced at how God has opened this door, and that the congregation is obviously meeting a need.

We praise God for giving new life and celebrate baptism as a sign of spiritual vitality in that new life. Next week we plan to visit another congregation in Juba also planning to do baptisms - on Christmas Day! Please join us in praying for the Holy Spirit to continue this work.
