From the Pastor

One Sunday morning, I was asked repeatedly, "Is it appropriate to applaud in worship?" Personally, I believe that worship is our response to God. We refer to this regular time, seasonally and each week, for our conversation, as individuals and as the body of Christ, to talk with God. While our pastors, worship leaders, elders, deacons, teachers, and choirs are exceptionally gifted and trained, and while we do our very best to motivate the people of God, divine worship is not a public performance. Our study, preparations, and rehearsals are not for our consumption as an audience. That said, if we feel spontaneously moved to laugh, to cry, to clap, to rise to our feet in joy and affirmation, where better than in the worship of God?

I challenge us this new year, to not feel obligated to go through the motions of what we feel should be expected of us, or what we have always done, but instead to speak and act and live our relationship with God. How different life would be if, instead of living routines six-and-a half-days/week, coming to confess our sins on Sunday morning, seeking absolution - if instead, we lived each moment of each day attempting to follow Christ's commandment that, "We love one another as he has loved us." What if we perceived that our every spoken word, our actions, the thoughts of our minds: we said and did to God? In this way, the living of life would be an act of faith. Worship on Sunday mornings would change our roles... Recognize God is the audience; we, each, are the performers of life; pastors and choirs are the stage prompters who cue us and give us lines we could not come up with on our own. Instead of praying for our doctors and nurses to do their best, we would pray for God to use the doctors and nurses and staff to use the gifts given them for healing. In these ways, we would not have to restrain ourselves from applause, or tears and weeping, or laughter, as if trying to stay in character and being stoic. We could be real with one another and with ourselves. Beethoven's "Hymn to Joy" describes flowers and mountains singing to God! How great our lives would be, how divine our worship would be, if we allowed ourselves to live life, where our "Yes" meant "Yes", and our "No" was heard as "No," if we bridled our tongues from harshness, and forgave one another as we have been forgiven, and we lived life to the glory of God.

Eating, Again.

Lately, we have been eating a lot of meals together as a church: Women luncheons, meals after Taizé worship, NOC gatherings to welcome Pastor Craig, Mission Breakfast, Kettle Dinners, Thanksgiving Dinner, potluck at the 4 p.m. Christmas Eve worship... just to name a few.

As I attended many of these meals, I thought: "Aren't we overdoing this a bit?" But then, I remembered in my August Valley Voice article that I had encouraged you to eat together more. Why? Because it worked for Jesus: "The Son of Man has come eating and drinking" (Luke 7:34). So much so that Jesus was known as a "glutton and drunkard."

Then, of course, one of the most important commands Jesus gave us involves a meal. Jesus reminded us that faith is as simple as food. "When Jesus wanted fully to explain what his forthcoming death was all about, he didn't give a theory. He didn't even give them a set of scriptural texts. He gave them a meal." (N.T. Wright)

"Taste and see that the Lord is good" the Psalmist says. (Psalm 34:8)

The first description of the early church was about eating: "They broke bread in their homes and ate together with glad and sincere hearts" (Acts 2:46). I love how Rachel Held Evans describes it in her book *Searching for Sunday*: "The first thing the world knew about Christians was that they ate together....They remembered Jesus with food, stories, laughter, tears, debate, discussion and cleanup."

Wonderful things happen at meals. It happened at our Thanksgiving meal. When I arrived most of the tables were filled and I had to search for an open spot. I found one such table with one empty chair.

I asked if the chair was taken (it was not). As I sat down, I realized I did not know one person at that table. We introduced ourselves, but somewhere in the midst of the discussion, I discovered they were my neighbors, and had been invited by Betty Kiesle-Yoder. I was stunned! I know. It sounds strange that your pastor does not know her neighbors, but the houses across the street from my home are up on a hill, so I do not interact with them as much as the neighbors next to me.

What a delight that was! Out of all the tables at the Thanksgiving meal, God directed me to this one. And the irony: I had to go to a meal at our church to meet my neighbors. Taste and see that the Lord is good.

All of this to say is that you all have been following Jesus pretty well this past several months. So, keep on eating.

Last week, after I had finished cleaning out everything I needed, the Presbyterian folks took over. I had tried, without success, to find a particular ring that I knew my mom wanted me to have. A few hours after I relinquished the keys, one of Mom's friends came over with a gift for me, a little red pouch with a ruby ring and my name on a sticky note inside. She said they had found it, hidden away, the very last thing they found, and they knew it was for me.

I was so touched! That ring will always be special. Another group might have seen it as a real "score" and sold it, but the Presbyterian angels made one of the most difficult days of my life more bearable. I know Mom is happy that it all worked out.


Mission Sunday - January 19

Hands of a Friend (Genesis House)

Most of us are so fortunate to be in a warm, comfortable home during these winter months, but there are women and children who are not so lucky! The local Genesis House shelter is run by Hands of a Friend, and is partially funded by donations from Valley Presbyterian Church as one of our missions (noisy offering on December 29 will go to this mission). Proceeds from DaZee consignment shops also help with funding for Genesis, so any gently used clothing would be appreciated.

Serving as a "safe Haven" for female victims of domestic violence and sexual assault, Genesis House has provided over 80,000 bed units since its opening in January, 2007. The shelter currently has 35 beds, at an expense of approximately \$45 each day. Victims range in age from newborns to 87 years old, and may stay in shelters for up to 24 months. THIS INCLUDES A NEW SENIOR SHELTER.

Additional services provided by Hands of a Friend include: Poverty and Payroll program (an aid to employment development), parenting classes, child development aid, nutrition and health counseling, a GED program, computer classes, and medical and dental emergency work. Foundation and Genesis House Shelter are run entirely with volunteers. Because Hands of a Friend is a faith-based agency, they accept no county, state or federal funding.

HOW CAN YOU HELP?

First, donate clothing and small household items to the DaZee's consignment shops, or volunteer your time at the shops, located at 231 Duval Road. Second, contribute financially through the church or directly to Hands of a Friend. Up to \$400/person or \$800/couple may be used annually as an Arizona Tax Credit.

Our purpose in separating these meetings is to encourage swift action in providing leadership for the church in January, while providing adequate time to thoroughly review the finances, for full transparency.

I've talked about LastPass in past articles. To review very briefly, I've talked about how important it is to create strong passwords, and that it's a bad idea to use the same password for multiple sites or logins, but if you make a bunch of different, complicated passwords, how do you remember them all? LastPass is the answer. It

stores all of those passwords for you in a very secure way, such that you can retrieve your passwords using your phone or any internet connection. This month, I've found yet another great way to make use of LastPass. In addition to your passwords, LastPass recently added the ability to store addresses, payment cards, membership info, Wi-Fi passwords, drivers licenses, passports, insurance policies, and more. Some of these features can be very useful when traveling, and might be a real life-saver in the event you lose (or forget) an important document or other information when traveling.

What to store in LastPass before your next trip:

Driver's License(s)

Having a record of your license is helpful if you ever need to report it as stolen or need to quickly look up your license ID when you don't have your wallet with you. In LastPass, use the "Driver's License" note to store the ID number for each family member with a license. Take a photo or scan a copy of the license, then add the photo as an attachment to the note.

Passport(s)

Having a digital record of your passport is helpful if you need to look up your ID number or report your passport as stolen. LastPass recommends including the contact information for the embassy or other overseas agency that can help you should you need to replace a stolen passport or ask for help. In LastPass, use the "Passport" note to store the information for each family member.

Addresses

This is especially important if you're traveling overseas. When going through customs in many foreign countries, the customs agents will ask you for the address(es) where you will be staying during your visit. In LastPass, use the "Address" note to store the location for hotels, family, or friends.

Credit cards

Having a record of your credit card is helpful should you ever need to report it as stolen. Be sure to include the phone number for customer service should you need to cancel the card and ask for a replacement. In LastPass, use the "Credit card" note to store the card number, expiration date, security code, customer service phone number, and any other relevant details.

Insurance (health, car, travel, etc.)

Hopefully you won't have to use insurance while traveling, but it's better to prepare for the unexpected. Make sure your policy information is easily accessible should you need it. In LastPass, use the "Insurance" note to record the policy holder, policy number, customer service phone number, and other relevant details.

These are just some of the things you can store in LastPass. Get a free LastPass account and look around at all the options to see which ones you might like to use. It's easy to create digital records and store photo attachments of important documents, and you can even share those records with another family member through LastPass by adding individual items to a Shared Folder that syncs with a family member's LastPass vault. Then you will both have access to the records you might need.

Give it a try and then, before traveling, download the mobile app to your smartphone and log in to your account to sync all the information you might need on the road!

Being Scammed

On a recent Saturday morning, an email was sent to several people at VPC stating that "Pastor Craig" needed a favor, and if the recipient responded, they were asked to "Please purchase \$300 of eBay gift cards for someone in need and send the identification codes to a third address." Within minutes, the recipients were phoning Pastor Craig asking questions and offering help. Thank you! What incredible actions of response. We live in a world where criminals use the computer and telephone for malice and theft. When a message begins "I need a favor," it may indicate a scam. When this happens, contact us directly so that we can know this scam is happening and get to the bottom of it. We will never ask for you to go through a third party. But, if anyone was taken in by these thieves, thank you for having a generous and caring heart.

Being Scammed - Part II

The scam Pastor Craig mentioned above was one of the most recent examples, but the staff at VPC has received several of these types of emails in the past year or two. This time it went out to some of our congregation as well as the staff. Since that scam email went out, yet another email came to the vpc-office@valleypres.net email address from a known congregant's email that contained a virus. In both of these cases it seems extremely likely that someone's email was compromised (hacked). In the first case, the scam email came from a fake email address (one that didn't belong to Pastor Craig at all, but was created using his name) so there's no way to know whose email was hacked, but given the people it went out to, we might assume it was one of those people or someone who corresponds with that group of people (members of a certain committee, etc.). In the second case, the sender's email was a known, legit email account, but of course the sender did not send the email which means someone got into their account and sent it.

If you are part of a group of people receiving these kinds of emails from a fake account, or if your actual email address was used to send a virus or scam email, don't panic. However, you should immediately change the password for your email account to something secure. Secure means something that isn't too short - I recommend a phrase rather than a word - and has capital and small letters, numbers, and symbols in it. For example, take the phrase "Tom Brady is the GOAT" (for the curious, GOAT=Greatest Of All Time *wink*) and remove the spaces, then replace some letters with numbers that look similar (1's for I's, for example) and throw a symbol in there somewhere. The end result might be "TomBr@dy1stheGOAT." This would be a very secure password. If you use LastPass (read the article on the previous page) to store your passwords, you don't have to commit these difficult passwords to memory because LastPass does that for you. Even better, if you don't want to have to come up with those tricky passwords, LastPass will create highly secure passwords for you - and remember them, of course. Passwords created by LastPass are random assortments of letters, numbers, and symbols which is about as secure as you can possibly get. I have LastPass create passwords for my bank accounts and other very sensitive sites (like Paypal), but I use my own phrases for things that aren't quite as sensitive.

As always, be very careful about opening email attachments or responding to suspicious emails. Be aware of those little red flags you sometimes feel when reading something that doesn't seem quite right. No matter what, it never hurts to change a password periodically, especially if you tend to use the same ones repeatedly or if you have used passwords that aren't terribly secure.

Just Coffee & More (Café Justo y Más)

After worship, on two Sundays a month, you will see a table of coffee for sale. If you are a current purchaser, you know how good this coffee tastes. Perhaps you have noticed you need to use less of this coffee.

Once upon a time, in the southern hills of Mexico in the small town of Solidad Urbina, Frontera de Cristo (a non-profit border organization) assisted in forming a co-op of coffee bean farmers, who were selling their coffee to a "middle man" for very little money. This co-op had a vision of selling directly to customers by distributing the coffee through churches. The farmers had to agree to strict quality control and produce only organically grown coffee. This co-op has grown to over 100 farmers, and includes five women participants.

Through Frontera de Cristo, a group of 13 delegates and two escorts drove to Hermosilla and then flew to Tapa Chula near the Guatemalan border. From there, we drove to Solidad Urbina. We stayed with the co-op farmers and their families, sharing and learning about each other.

We visited the coffee farms, where the coffee trees are planted in rows on slanting hills under a canopy of taller trees to provide shade. We picked the ripe beans (red) and put them in baskets which hung around our necks. The trees need to be picked every few days during the ripening season because they do not all ripen at the same time. The ripe beans are then spread out on the farmers large patios to be dried in the sun. This can take several days. One day, we helped push all the drying beans into a pile to be covered because the rain was coming. After the rain, we spread them out again. After drying, the beans are taken to the Café Justo headquarters where the seeds are separated from the chaff. The seeds are then dried in a dryer. After drying, they are sorted in a machine. Only the uniform seeds are packed in 50 lb. sacks and shipped to Agua Prieta where they are roasted and packaged for sale to churches all over the US. The remaining seeds are roasted and sold locally.

One 92 year-old man, who couldn't work a tree farm any more, did the job of planting the best seeds and growing the sprouts to a size that could be planted on the farms. He sold the plants to the co-op farmers to plant in their orchards. He had so much fun explaining what he did. He brightened our days with his enthusiasm.

We all came together for a big feast on the night before we left and sang songs, prayed, and ate together at one grower's place. There were many tears of parting, as we made so many friends. God truly blessed us all (and I believe the coffee, too)!

Please consider trying the coffee if you haven't already. It helps not only the growers, but the town of Solidad Urbina. And, it's really good coffee.

Being Mortal Preparing for the End of Life

Six sessions beginning Tuesday, January 14 at 1:00 p.m. in Classroom 5

How do you want to live out the last years or months of your life? Are you willing to move to a facility where you will receive care, or are you determined to stay at home until they carry you out feet first? Do you want to live as long as you possibly can, or are there conditions under which you would want the doctors to stop trying to save you?

In a book titled *Being Mortal*, Dr. Atul Gawande writes about what he learned about the last stages of life from his experiences with patients and, especially, with his father. Contrary to what would make good sense, he says doctors are not required to take a single course in geriatrics or in death and dying, but rather they are trained to find cures and look for solutions to any health situation.

In six sessions that will meet for 90 minutes each, we will discuss the issues raised by Dr. Gawande. Participants will be required to have access to the book and read chapters as they are assigned. You can buy your own book or sign up for one at the Faith Formation kiosk on Sundays during September. Both large and small group discussions will be facilitated by Eloise Fredrickson, an experienced teacher, Chris Erickson, our Parish Nurse, and one of the pastors of Valley Presbyterian Church.

Sample discussion questions include:

- What are your feelings about nursing homes? What would be ideal? What would be unacceptable?
- What experience do you have with talking to doctors about end-of-life preferences? Have you had that same conversation with your spouse or children?
- What part of the aging and dying process will take the most courage for you to face?

The Inquisitors Early Christianity: The Experience of the Divine

Fridays at 1:30 p.m. in Classroom 1

Join the Inquisitors as we watch and discuss "Early Christianity: The Experience of the Divine." After 2,000 years, Christianity is the world's largest religion and continues to prosper and grow. What accounts for its continued popularity? Simply put, Christianity is powerful and persuasive as a religion. It offers a convincing personal experience of ultimate, or "divine," power.

In Early Christianity: The Experience of the Divine, Professor Luke Timothy Johnson maintains that the most familiar aspects of Christianity - its myths, institutions, ideas, and morality - are only its outer "husk." In this two-part course, he takes us on a journey to find the "kernel" of Christianity's appeal: religious experience. We will travel back to Christianity's origins, its first 300 years, to identify the elements that first made it appealing and which still hold the secret to its ability to attract new followers.

In his presentation, Professor Johnson employs scholarly techniques that have only recently been applied to religion. By combining such disciplines as history, the social sciences, and comparative literary analysis, you look at religious experience and behavior from a fresh perspective.

Elected, Ordained and Installed

The Presbyterian Church (USA) is the only Christian church, the only organized body, which "elects, ordains and installs" our leadership. In order for ministers to go to seminary, or Elders and Deacons to be chosen to serve and lead, they must first be elected by a particular congregation. In the same way, our Ruling Elders and Board of Deacons are elected by the congregation. Once elected and trained for our roles, Teaching Elders (Pastors) and Ruling Elders (Session Members) and Deacons are spiritually ordained for their responsibility. Ruling Elders and Deacons are then Installed on rotating three year terms. Pastors serve as long as it is healthy for the church, and pastor, and Presbytery. Once ordained, we are always ordained. However, when serving on Session, elected ordained leaders from the congregation are called Ruling Elders. Once we go off of Session (our term expires) we are simply called Elders. Pastors have been called a lot of things over the years; when first ordained, Pastor Craig was a Teaching & Ruling Elder, which then transitioned to being called "a Minister of Word and Sacrament," and more recently, a Teaching Elder. As Installed Pastor, Craig is the moderator of the Session and congregation (not the corporation).

The government found out about it and decided to teach him a lesson. They sent thugs to beat him up, take his wallet and his cell phone. Even though he was intimidated, he is determined to follow Jesus. Pray that *Sayed remains faithful to Jesus as our team in Tehran closes. The God story for Sayed is not over. (*not real name)

May you be blessed every day through all the works you do, however big or small, every smile you create, every person you touch, and everything you give to others. That is what the New Year should be about.
