As a result of the department heads meeting, we formed a committee who volunteered to get together and discuss all the options and possibilities that could lead to a sale. We don't know when, we don't know how, and we don't know what it will look like, but we have an intense desire to hold this sale in some form. Stay tuned!

Right now, our reality is a world in

chaos/darkness, plagued by an invisible evil that took more lives yesterday than the day before, than any day prior all year. BUT still Christ comes, still God enters in to offer us love. Nothing can stop the love of God in Christ Jesus, not even this virus. This is not a Rudolph or Frosty-kind of message, but the true meaning of Christmas, that when we are most afraid, lost, depressed, GOD will not leave us, but enters in because God loves us.

Taizé Worship


Wednesday, January 6, 5 p.m. online







A focus on their mission field follows.

The region of Muslim South Asia is made up of North India, Pakistan, and Bangladesh. Joshua Project reports that these countries are three of the top nations with the highest number of unreached people groups in the world and have, on average, one full-time Christian worker for every 500,000 Muslims. It is projected that by 2030, India will be the nation with the largest number of Muslims in the World. OM's goal is to launch fresh church planning initiatives that will be led by national workers, which would be self-sustainable



St. Andrews Children's Clinic

Virtual Christmas Concert Submitted by Kay Brouwer

Over forty years ago, seven mothers and their children with cerebral palsy gathered at a home in Nogales, Sonora, Mexico in search of opportunities for their children to receive the best medical treatment. That small gathering became what is known today as St. Andrew's Children's Clinic in Nogales, Arizona, which provides no-cost medical attention to over 250 Mexican children on the first Thursday of every month, except July. With over 40 volunteers, including doctors, medical professionals, and administrative support, the Clinic's mission is to help children receive the medical attention they are unable to find in their home country and support them to achieve a healthy, successful future.

This year has been difficult for the Clinic. Due to the risks of COVID-19, they held their last Clinic in March. Like most people and organizations, they have had to start thinking "out of the box" and find creative ways to keep providing services. Through telemedicine and virtual presentations, they have continued to connect with donors and help patients receive care and continue with their medical treatments.

Even through all the difficulties this year has brought, they wanted to come together to celebrate their children, honor their donors, and support their beloved Clinic. This is why they invited us and other friends to their first-ever Virtual Christmas Concert on December 13, 2020. St. Andrew's Children's Clinic was proud to present about 12



children served by the clinic who sang for an afternoon of holiday music and cheer. At the end a guitarist and singer performed Spanish songs plus "Snow is Falling all Around" and "We Wish You a Merry Christmas." Much love and joy were expressed by performers and the audience.

Crossroads Mission, Nogales AZ

On December 3, 2020, via a phone call, I spoke with Ben Wenke, Co-Director of Crossroads Mission, and received the following information: First off, Ben said he had some heart problems the day after Thanksgiving that lasted for 3 days. He wasn't able to do much of anything. Ben and Bert Wenke (his wife) are the founders of Crossroads Mission, which opened May 24, 1994. What amazing work they have done in these years! The Mission remains open during this year of the coronavirus. One of the women's transitional houses had to close because one of the ladies living there got COVID-19 from shopping at a store in Nogales. She and her baby are now staying at a house next door to the transitional house until such time as the transitional house is completely sanitized from roof to floor before it can reopen.

The Mission served 150 Thanksgiving dinners this year. Due to the coronavirus and the U.S.-Mexico border being closed, this total is about half what is usually served. The Nogales Chief of Police was there at the dinner and said he was excited that the local people who were in need of food got a wonderful dinner. Also, the Nogales International Newspaper had a story in their newspaper about the Thanksgiving dinner event.

Good news, over-and-above what food was served at the Thanksgiving dinner, a donation of Thanksgiving food, worth \$6,000, was given to the Mission by the Nogales' Safeway store. This food was packaged so each recipient got a frozen turkey, mashed potatoes, gravy, stuffing and cranberry sauce.

More good news, there was a \$5,000 gift from an unnamed donor which was used for a new transmission in the Mission's food van. This van is used to pick up food donated to the Mission, and for food the Mission buys from Costco.



As we begin a new year, we take stock of the things for which we are thankful. Reviewing this past year, Valley Assistance Services (VAS) wishes to thank all who have helped carry out our mission in this very difficult time, namely helping seniors, families and individuals remain safe and independent through a combination of social services and community health programs. The COVID-19 Pandemic has hit our community particularly hard. The loss of jobs, reduction in work hours and increase in prices of basic commodities have adversely affected many families in our area, and have been especially devastating to people who were already living paycheck to paycheck. As difficult as the financial hardships have been for our clients, the social and emotional stresses caused by the pandemic have been equally destructive to their well-being. The need for social distancing has been very isolating for many seniors and disabled persons. We are genuinely thankful for all the members of Valley Presbyterian Church and all that they have done, but the needs continue to outstrip our resources.

What gifts can you give to the less fortunate in our community this Holiday Season?

Volunteer: of particular need are people with experience and expertise in financial matters, drivers to transport clients to essential appointments and handypersons to do light maintenance in clients' homes.

Donate gift bag items: personal hygiene items, small gifts, work puzzle books, Sudoku books, large print books, writing utensils and notebooks, non-perishable food, etc.

Become a Sustaining partner: set up auto-pay through your bank, or authorize a monthly charge on your debit or credit card. No amount is too small.

Donate to the VAS Diaper bank: diapers and personal hygiene items are not covered under most state benefits. Donate these items to VAS to be passed on to our clients in need.

Donate money: The financial assistance program at VAS has seen an increase of over 1000% in the number of clients since the pandemic started in March. Many clients have not paid their rent/mortgage and utilities since March. It is taking more money than ever to stabilize a family in need. VAS is a Qualifying Charitable Organization for Arizona tax credit purposes. Also, all taxpayers can claim a special \$300 deduction on their Federal return this year due to the pandemic, even if they only take the standard deduction.

Being Presbyterian - Why Committees?

During 2021 I will be sharing monthly articles celebrating my experiences of being a Presbyterian. Since so many of our members here at Valley do not have a background in our denomination, I thought my writings could help explain of few things about why we are organized the way we are and how I thank God for lessons I am learning because of our polity.

This month – *Committees*. Session (the major decision-making body of a congregation) is divided into committees. Presbytery is divided into committees. Synod – well, you get the idea. It is at the committee level where the real work of the church gets done. Any member of the church can be on a church's committee –I was on my first church committee in High School.

So, why do we have this structure? It flows from the basic concept that every person's opinion has value. Each person's voice on a committee is of equal weight. Pastor's opinions are not more important than anyone else's. Decisions are based on the will of the majority, but only after we hear from the minority positions.

Yes, this means that decision making can be ponderous and slow and complicated. But I am frequently learning valuable discipleship lessons because of working through committees:

I'm constantly learning something new – and I've been doing this for 50 years!

Very few decisions are so time sensitive that I cannot take time to listen to another.

I am regularly being humbled. I come up with a great idea, and then it is pointed-out that I have overlooked a key factor. The best decisions are made when more than one person has input.

I must figure out how best to articulate my position; sharing why I think this way. And this means tying it to, however obliquely, a basic Christian concept.

I encourage you to appreciate the work of our church committees. It is a valuable way we can develop our discipleship.



January 2021 Valley Voice Financial Update

(Based on Financial Data through November 2020)

The Finance Committee met on Wednesday, December 16th to review the current financial activity through November. We continue to remain in a positive position. In the following report we have defined "Giving Support" as contributions for current operations and "Other Support" as Patio Sale Fund or other Fund transfers in support of operations, investment income, fees for services (memorials, events, concerts, etc.):

This report shows that we are behind the 2020 Budget in both income and expense. So, we are actually ahead of budget and are projecting that we will add to our reserves at the end of the year. This has been a challenging year with Covid-19 affecting 75% of the year 2020 attendance and activities at Valley Pres. We are grateful for the positive position we have held onto for most of the year. We are seeing that many are still sending in their pledges and that online giving has increased significantly. To date, the 2020 pledges are 97% collected.

There is some concern regarding the generosity campaign for 2021. The 2021 pledges are lagging way behind the VPC norm at this point in the year. The Finance Committee has received all of the committee budgets to date, but we are having difficulty projecting the income for 2021 and have requested a second letter be sent to members who have not yet answered the call for 2021. Because of this we are not presenting a budget for approval to the Session in December and will hopefully have a balanced budget to submit for approval in January 2021 in time for the annual meeting on January 31, 2021. Your continued support in this effort is appreciated.

Parish Nurse

There are so many things to write about for this Valley Voice – COVID is all around us, emotions are high because of the time of year, and stress. Look around and listen to it in our voices, watch the emotions of people's faces and see how this year has really affected us all. What we do with this and how we handle it is up to us. We can either choose stress, being frazzled, or we can choose joy. The choice is up to us. Yes, there is always a choice. I choose Joy.



Many of us face uncertainties. We can dwell on things that may arise, maybe COVID or the Christmas Season and how to visit. There seems to be stress all around us: plans or complicated plans of the holidays (can I see my family this year), financial concerns and disappointments (I cannot afford presents or just a few, those who have lost jobs during COVID, bills mounting), there are stomach aches (stress, eating too much, or eating poorly), there is the Blue Christmas (a time of remembrance, of loved ones or of a loss of independence that may be associated with depression), there is social distancing and the inability to go places or celebrate, there is change of weather (a colder, drier air and allergies and sinus problems that may make us not feel well), there are illnesses and other health changes, (COVID, colds, flu, pneumonia, infections, etc.) there is dehydration (just as critical as in summer), and the weather has led to a more toned-down, browner look to nature in our community.

But it is also the most beautiful time of the year with the most glorious birth, and with that love: He washes away our uncertainties with perfect love.

Just recently, there was a prayer chain that was being created in my office. This reminded me of when I was very ill. It has been 11 years since I was on a ventilator in the hospital. As peace came over me, a gentle touch rested on my shoulder. There, I put my concerns into the hands of God. With a prayer chain over my head made by a special group of people from VPC, I talked to God, and handed Him my concerns, my worries, and my wishes. I then felt His presence. We need to remember that He is always there for us. We need to remember this in the times of uncertainties, in times of illnesses and COVID, in times of stress, during tragedy, and during the Holidays.

May you be blessed every day through all the works you do however big or small, every smile you create, every person you touch, and everything you give to others. May a renewed sense of love and peace fill your hearts in this Christmas Season and throughout the New Year of 2021. Choose Joy and show Joy to others.
