FINISHING WORK BEGUN PREVIOUSLY

In 2020, we began replacing the Sound System in the Sanctuary, then replacing Spot Lights which were obsolete with new LED fixtures. Last Summer we replaced all of the Chandelier fixtures with LED Bulbs. For each of these we needed to rent a powered lift to reach the ceiling, which cost \$500-700 per use, and was more power than we were comfortable using. Someone suggested purchasing a simple scaffolding and lo and behold we already owned one that had not been used! !

December 10-11th we began by putting the scaffolding together, which took several hours. Simultaneously, Skip Berry began balancing the colored Par Can lights to a white, and investigating how to store the setting so we do not have to reset every time we turn on the lights!



Les Walter and Rick Nau then investigated why the Choir Speaker did not function, and added a second speaker. Skip Berry investigated through You-Tube and found how to program this set of speakers to work with our other speakers. Pastor Craig re-aimed the microphones for where our Choir actually sit.



Les then continued replacing all of the aged plastic lights above the choir with new 3000 watt LED spot lights. In addition to assisting with all of the above Custodian Steve Hart worked with three college students to provide all of the heavy lifting.

Sunday morning worshippers described that the Choir was no longer in the shadows: Choir members described hearing the sermon for the first time. There will continue to be adjustments as we balance everything. But finally, all of the electrical components have been replaced and are working; everyone can hear!





What do we believe about our future? Several of the television situation dramas have included a disclaimer at the beginning and end which states that in this time, their producers have chosen to imagine life in a post-pandemic world. Numerous books and movies of the last ten years have envisioned circumstance in a dystopian world after the next war, nuclear fall-out, climate crisis, etc. The Old Testament prophets leading into the Babylonian Exile, afterward and envisioning the coming Messiah, each provided prophetic image of their future based in part on the reality they knew. What do we believe about our future?

First and foremost, different from our not-so-distant past, we trust and believe Valley Presbyterian Church does have a future! And a very bright future, indeed. On the 3rd Sunday of Advent, Choir members commented: "We heard the sermon and prayers for the first time, and like what we heard!" No longer are we so afraid, as COVID19 has become endemic, we are back to passing friendship pads. Winter residents have returned to their schedule of making certain everything is in place, leaving for Christmas to return for long winter months in Green Valley. We know that, if ever there is a crisis of any kind, our leadership are concerned about the health and safety of the most vulnerable among us. We know that, everything could be shut-down by our leaders or government, and still we would be able to worship God from the comfort of our home (but we want the fellowship of seeing one another)! Just as there are members who have only ever attended worship on Christmas Eve and Easter, there are now "virtual members" who will never physically be present in our Sanctuary, and yet who attend worship weekly and support the missions and ministry of our church. There is laughter and joy in our worship of God, sincerity of faith and prayer. Insofar as there are persons who want to attend Bible Study, or participate in meetings from other parts of the Country or globe, our church has the ability for people to participate fully from anywhere.

At present, we end 2021, praying for family and friends recovering from the Pandemic, from Hurricanes and Fires. We are thankful for health and strength, for God's blessings, for this congregation and our staff. Merry Christmas to all, and wonderful good wishes for the New Year.

I remember when 2020 began and people said the same thing about that year. One person wrote an article with high hopes for 2020 because it represented "perfect vision."



2020 started with the horrific fires in Australia (remember?) Then came the virus, and everything as we knew it changed.

So here we are starting a new year. I always look forward to a new year, a reset, a refresh, a new hope. But this year I struggle. I find it hard to believe that things will get better. I watch as people walk away from God and the church. America is awash in anger and violence. The environment protests our poor care of it and is responding in destructive ways. And that detestable virus won't go away. As I write this, a neighboring church is closed for Christmas (canceling their Christmas Eve services) just as we did over Thanksgiving.

The world (and me) needs a reset.

Twenty-three years ago, I remember the sermon I preached for my ordination exam. Presbyterians have a lengthy ordination process. One requirement is to stand in front of Presbytery and give a sermon. After the sermon, the floor is open to any questions, criticisms, and hopefully encouragements. Waiting to give my message, awash in nerves, I remember thinking over and over, "It's only 10 minutes out of my life." (It went fine, by the way, which is why I am here.)

The title of my message was something along the lines of "Our God Is Too Small." For a visual, I had a box with me. I said that sometimes we place God in the box of our own making and expect God to act within that box. We keep stuffing God in that box.

I think I am doing that today. My God is so small that I can't see how we can/will change for the better. I want to believe.

So here is my New Year's Resolution: to trust in a BIG God who is continually doing new things. We have just come off the worship of a tiny baby. When we think of Jesus only as a baby, He becomes safe and predictable, controllable in our nice box. The Bible, however, ends with a vision of Jesus "clothed with a long robe and with a golden sash across his chest" sitting at the right hand of God. This is the One who will come to make all things new. In fact, making things new today, too. This is "the One who comes to upend our expectations and set God's will loose in the world" (Jill Duffield, *Advent in Plain Sight*).

This is what I choose to believe as we enter 2022. Let us believe it together. Pastor Diane,

December 2021 Valley Voice - Financial Update (Based on Financial Data through October 31, 2021)

Since there was no Finance Committee meeting in December, the committee received the November financial statements and reviewed them individually with questions directed to the Finance Office. Basically, the committee was pleased with the year-to-date reports. We have left off the anticipated Reserve budget support because we do not feel it will be needed to support operations for 2021. As of November 30, 2021 our financial report continues to be positive:

We are very grateful for the positive position we see currently. Not only are the revenues up, but the expenses are down considerably. We were definitely discouraged as we worked on the 2021 budget at the end of 2020 and were in fear of the large amount of expense that would have to be covered by reserves. But through your generosity and each department's work in controlling spending, we see that VPC is healthy going into the new year.

In October, we approved the 2022 operating budget to go to Session for approval. Session approved that budget in October and that budget as amended will be presented to the congregation at the annual meeting on January 30, 2022. We hope to see a large gathering of members and friends at that meeting.

The Finance Committee will continue to keep you informed of the financial status of VPC. Thank you all for your continuing support.

Valley Assistance Services (VAS) fills Empty Bowls all year long

The Empty Bowls that are distributed at Valley Assistance Services' annual fundraiser are beautiful works of art crafted by local artists, but their emptiness represents a more-difficult truth, that many people struggle to fill their bowls all year long. Sometimes this emptiness is literal, people do not have food to fill their bowls, but sometimes it represents other needs as well, including a lack of transportation, financial difficulties, isolation and loneliness, and health changes.

Please join VAS on Saturday, February 19, 2022, at the 16th annual Empty Bowls Event, as we fundraise to fill the bowls of persons in our community all year long.

Over the last year, there has been a dramatic increase in the number of persons seeking assistance. Our financial

assistance program alone has grown over 1,000%. Current trends and predictions do not indicate a reduction in the level of need in our community. Please support VAS in its effort to fill the empty bowls in our local area. Proceeds will support the following programs:

Going Home with Care: Care transitions from hospital to home in partnership with the local Green Valley/Santa Cruz hospital, a post-hospital discharge program with specific diagnoses to help ensure recovery and discharge follow through; our VAS RN provides home visits to assess each client's health for care needs, makes sure clients have needed medications and knowledge of medication use, to reduce readmissions.

<u>A Touch That Cares</u> ®: RN Medical Advocacy for seniors facing chronic illness including inhome health education and medical support; health advocacy between patients and physicians, pharmacists, and other care providers, and assistance to help clients improve their quality of life through coordination of a personalized care plan, medication education and management, exercise education and assessments, and family/caregiver education.

<u>SHIM</u> ®: (Safety and Health in Motion), a partnership with the Green Valley Fire District is an evidenced-based fall prevention program designed to identify medical fall risks, reduce fear of falling through an in-home assessment of fall risks: home, medication, lifestyle, and health. The program provides in home safety assessments followed by installation of needed safety equipment including night lights, reach sticks and smoke alarms.

Neighbors Helping Neighbors in Green Valley/Sahuarita and Tubac Regional Neighbors Helping Neighbors: Volunteer Transportation and socialization program. Trained volunteers provide transportation to medical appointments, grocery shopping, and other essential trips, as well as performing errands for homebound, isolated seniors. (in partnership with Pima Council on Aging Neighbors Care Alliance).

<u>MAP (Map a Plan program)</u>: Monetary assistance for rent, utilities, to prevent evictions and homelessness, including required attendance in 6 hours of budgeting classes. Savings and benefits information and resources including on-line SNAP (food stamps) application assistance and Arizona Self-Help program are available to all clients.

<u>Workforce Training/Career Path Building and Computer Lab:</u> including resume writing, mock interviewing, and job search, each individual works with a workforce coach.

Neighbors AIM (Awareness in Memory Loss): ongoing support classes and peer-support groups support loved ones, family, friends, and neighbors of dementia sufferers, and those with early-stage dementia through creative events, simulation experiences, and education. This program, overseen by RN's and a counselor, creates a community/neighbors sense of caring for those with memory loss and their loved ones. Dementia and memory loss are challenging

Pam and Dave Update 2021

PAKISTAN: MINISTRY ON THE CUTTING EDGE

I was able to finally get back to Pakistan after two years delay due to Covid. In the end, I almost did not get there as the airlines kept changing the rules about who could fly depending on what PCR test you needed and arbitrary questions about my visas.

I had an amazing but intense 6-7 days of meetings with about 45 senior OM Pakistan staff who serve in 26 teams in 10 cities for evangelism, church mobilization, and church planting.

JORDAN: STRATEGY MEETINGS TO REACH 940 MILLION UNREACHED MUSLIMS

Pam and I just returned from a 12 day trip where we met with 25 key senior leaders from 14 countries across the Persian world, Turkic world and South Asia. We were teaching and training, coaching and counseling, and praying and planning in how to best reach the most unreached peoples who have never heard the Gospel in these countries.

AFGHANISTAN: THE FORBIDDEN HARVEST?

Our teams have been reaching to out to help Afghan refugees in India, Pakistan, and other places by providing food aid, clothing and other support to 100's of families who have fled the Taliban inside Afghanistan. Over 13,000 Afghan refugees have also come to Wisconsin and Pam will head up to Camp McCoy Dec. 5-10 to help with ministry to Afghan refugee women and children.

Dave flies to Bangladesh Dec. 4-12 to meet with over 40 national staff for teaching, training and encouragement plus to meet with Bangladeshi leaders for future strategic thinking and planning in how to reach the 170 million people of the great land. Please pray for safety, anointing and wisdom.



Bangladesh: The Golden Harvest

Pam and Dave L are International speakers for Operation Mobilization with responsibility for activities in Pakistan, Bangladesh, Iran, and North India. Speaking Farsi, they have been active in Iran with Afghanistan refugees who have no legal status in Iran and are cruelly treated. When they write "AFGHANISTAN: MY TEARS" it is they deep personal experience and is reflected in their work in Wisconsin.

AFGHANISTAN: MY TEARS!

We have been networking with our teams internationally to see how we can best respond to help the Afghan people in the midst of this crisis. We have been able to help about 50 local believers who have had to flee the country and are working to help them find their next steps. We are also helping 100's of Afghan refugees in practical ways like providing food packs and other initial aid.



We are also trying to help with the influx of Afghans here in Wisconsin. It has been a confusing and sometimes difficult process to know how and when best to help. We are planning to provide orientation and training for local Christians and churches who want to help Afghan refuges resettle in the Milwaukee area. Please pray for open doors and wisdom in how we best can help.

Entering Jerusalem

We bumped along a rocky, rutted dirt road past the outskirts of Juba city. We left our taxi at an intersection to meet some people from the church we were visiting and walk the last kilometer into the IDP (internally displaced persons) camp. It was only 6:30 in the morning, and we were grateful for the cool air as we started walking. We came upon a group of children, lined up and wearing uniforms. As we neared them, they started singing and we recognized Changkuoth, a former student at NTC who leads a significant children's ministry in his church. After a joyful greeting, we followed the children as they sang and marched down the road and onto the small path that led into the camp. As we neared the church, two other choirs of older children and teenagers met us on the way. We were amazed at the number of children and blessed by their joyful singing.

The church we were visiting is called Jerusalem, one of several churches in the camp. The pastor of the church is David, a recent graduate of NTC and someone who has become a friend and now also a research assistant for Bob. We were encouraged and inspired to see Chankuth and David using their gifts and empowering people in the significant ministry that the church has in the community. During the week, the church turns into a primary school. And while conditions are harsh and people are often discouraged by life in the camp, the church is a place for community, empowerment, and hope. After several choir and congregational worship songs in the Nuer language, the children came in to sing. Several rows of chairs were stacked up and removed and adults waited outside so that the children would have room to sing - more than 100 in the choir! They sang in both English and Nuer, complete with dancing and gestures that showed the long hours of practice they had put in. Bob preached from Hosea, reminding us of God's faithfulness and love despite people's unfaithfulness. We encouraged everyone with the greetings and prayers of churches in the U.S., and we reflected together that God alone is the hope for our broken world. We felt humbled to sit and be present with people who have overcome many obstacles and persevered through so many challenges, continuing to praise God and trust God through it all. And it was a good reminder to continue to pray for peace in South Sudan and that people would be able to leave the camps. Please join us in praying for God's provision and protection on all people in South Sudan. And please pray for students at NTC to be equipped to minister in these challenging sit

Being Mortal

Preparing For the End of Life Thursday Beginning January 13, 2022 2:00 P.M. in Classroom 5


How do you want to live out the last years or months of your life? Are you willing to move to a facility where you will receive care, or are you determined to stay at home until they carry you out feet first? Do you want to live as long as you possibly can, or are they conditions under which you would want the doctors to stop trying to save you?

In a book titled *Being Mortal*, Dr. Atul Gawande writes about what he learned about the last stages of live from his experiences with patients and, especially, with his father. Contrary to what would make good sense, he says that doctors are not required to take a single course in geriatrics or in death and dying, but they are trained to find cures and look for solutions to any health situation.

In six weekly sessions that will meet for 90 minutes each session we will discuss the issues raised by Dr. Gawande. Participants will be required to have access to the book and read chapters as they are assigned. You can buy your own book or get one from Pastor Diane. Both large and small group discussions will be facilitated by Eloise Fredrickson, an experienced teacher; nurse Chris Erickson, and one of the pastors of Valley Presbyterian Church.

Sample discussion questions include:

- What are your feelings about nursing homes? What would be ideal? What would be unacceptable?
- What experience do you have with talking to doctors about end-of-life preferences? Have you had that same conversation with your spouse or children?
- What part of the aging and dying process will take the most courage for you to face?

The plan is for Ben and Bert to leave and return home to the Midwest this coming January with the Mission Board over seeing the operation from then on. Ben Wenke is worn out and needs to recuperate. His non-stop activity for so many years has caught up with him. The staff members feel sad about his condition but yet are confident they can continue with the vision that Ben and Bert started many years ago. Ben's attitude was contagious and uplifting . A true servant of the Lord.

Community Food Bank of Arizona has given \$50,000 of non-directed funds from \$71 million dollars to a political program in Tucson to "fight for \$15 campaign". A letter from Sio Castillo, Chief Development Officer, regarding the Mission Committee's inquiry of involvement with this program states in part-

'We do support the initiative- not only philosophically but financially. We believe that one of the ways to move people out of poverty is to raise the minimum wage to \$15.

While we will always be here to provide emergency food assistance to anyone who needs it, we know that bigger change is needed. This past year, we spent \$11 million dollars on food distribution programming and distributed 82 million pounds of food...

Please do know that CFB does not endorse or oppose any political candidate or party, but we will always advocate and engage in community issues relevant to our mission. We have always been committed to addressing the root causes of hunger and advocation for social justice."

The response letter, of which is a selected portion, outlines their many positive and vital programs for our community and states as a long-time supporter-


"...we have the right to restrict our donations to hunger relief only programs. Checking Valley Presbyterian Church's record, all gifts have been designated to areas you have chosen for specific programming. None of your funds were used for endeavors outside your area."

This states that contributions from Valley Presbyterian Church either from the mission budget or from pass-through giving are used for hunger relief programs only. This also means that monies given in a non-designated manner (direct checks) can be used for non-designated purposes in the Food Bank of Southern Arizona. If you wish your direct checks to go to local hunger relief, consider using pass-through giving by writing your check to the church with Food Bank in the memo line on the check (individuals names can be forwarded if desired).

4 Ways to Lead Your Church through Inflation

Edited by Suzanne Mandeville, Bookkeeper, from a post by <u>Aaron Buer</u> on December 9, 2021 on the Breeze Advice Blog (Breeze provides the software the church uses to track almost everything.)

- Have you bought groceries lately?
- Have you recently ventured into a home renovation project or had to replace a vehicle?

If so, you've likely bumped into the impact of the rise in inflation. From what I've read, <u>inflation is hovering</u> <u>between 6-10%</u> right now.

That means families are currently able to afford about 6-10% less than they were a few months ago. As a church, how should we respond to inflation?

Here are four suggestions for how your church might want to respond to the impact of inflation.

Offer Guidance

Inflation leads to difficult decisions.

- What should you do when you can't afford to do everything you want or need?
- What should you do when there isn't money for the spring break trip, the car repair, or even the groceries?

The sad truth is, some of us are often inclined to make unwise decisions in financial shortage. Put it on the credit card...

Because inflation drives up the prices of gas, food, and many other necessary commodities, people need the guidance and challenge of Scriptural wisdom regarding money.

What a great time to talk about contentment, debt, giving, and gratitude.

Budget Expectations

I'm feeling a little intimidated by the budget process this year.

Why? With inflation on the rise, I believe it will be prudent to anticipate congregational giving could be down. People who are feeling the financial crunch could be less inclined to be generous or simply may not be able to give as much as they have in the past. In addition, we know our 2022 budget will need to reflect the rising prices of paper, gas, electronics, etc.

With that, I would argue this year's budget process will require extra careful thought and planning.

Cost of Living

One of the obvious challenges of inflation is that people can no longer afford what they were able to previously. For example, <u>Medicare premiums are projected to rise by 5% in 2022</u>. That is a massive and unheard-of increase.

I would encourage you to consider how the rising cost of living may impact your church staff this year as you plan for salary increases. This could be tough to hear if your church is already struggling financially. However, this could be one of the more important investments you make in the health of your church. Financial stress at home will impact the quality of work your staff brings to their jobs. Also, a significant cost of living increase during this season would send a strong message to your staff. We see you. We care about you. We value you.

Discipleship

Every crisis brings opportunity.

During the financial stress people are experiencing, there is an opportunity to provide care, resources, training, and most importantly...Jesus.

With the rise in inflation comes an opportunity to improve our systems and processes around benevolence and care. This will ensure people coming to our churches for help experience wonderful hospitality and excellent counsel, whether they are church members or disconnected people from the community. Every benevolence opportunity is a Gospel opportunity. Every benevolence opportunity is a discipleship opportunity.
