## How is Our Church Doing?

When visiting parishioners, after discussing their concerns, people often ask; "How is our Church doing?" Honestly, I feel sheepish responding. The world is still emerging from the most severe pandemic in history, the American economy is struggling with inflation, mass murders continue weekly, due to other priorities our building and property needed significant care; AND our Church is Wonderful, Healthy and Caring.

Remembering that Easter was the first-time we felt healthy enough to share the Sacrament of Communion in the traditional style; for the month of June, in triple digit temperatures, our in-person worship attendance averaged 150, with new visitors every week (in June), and another 150 worshipping on-line, plus over 700 regular hits to our Website Valleyprebyterian.net.

While budgets provide incentive for goals many churches rarely meet, due to good administration, our income continually exceeds all expenses. In addition to the extraordinary work, our Mission Committee, the congregation and staff provided \$10,000 for mission relief for tornadodestroyed communities in the Midwest and southeast United States.

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

# From Pastor Craig Presbyterian Church (USA) 2.0 "Power is Shifting to Partnerships"

Among the questions Elders and Pastors promise in their Ordination and Installation is to serve on Committees and Councils of the Church. As such, I am completing a term (my 5<sup>th</sup> term of 3 years) on the Conflict Resolution Team of the Commission on Ministry for our Presbytery; and also, the Chairperson of Task Force on "Mid-Council Conversation." That is a fancy title for coordinating the relationship between our four Presbyteries and the Synod of the Southwest. After meeting by Zoom for the last year, May 26-27-28 we had our first face to face meeting in Phoenix.

The Presbyterian Church was originally formed in Philadelphia over 200 years ago (before that we were part of the Church of Scotland). There were several hallmarks in governmental structure about being Presbyterian. First, because of wars between Scotland and England, as well as Protestants and Catholicism, rather than having any individual in authority like a Bishop, Canon, King or Pope, at every level in the Presbyterian Church we have committees making decisions, and those committees at every level of governance have equal membership elders and deacons, male and female. Second, the organization of the denomination was based on judicial courts, with the congregation governed by the Session. When there are issues that affect larger than the local congregation, or there is disagreement with the Session, decisions are appealed to the Presbytery, which for us is the southern half of Arizona. When decisions are larger than a Presbytery, or if there is a disagreement with Presbytery decisions, these are appealed to the Synod, in our case four presbyteries in New Mexico and Arizona. When decisions are larger than the Synod, or there is disagreement with a Synod action, these matters are referred to the General Assembly which meets every two years.

At this meeting two power shifts were represented. First, for the last few years, the Presbytery deCristo (greater Tucson) and the Presbytery of Grand Canyon have been separate governing bodies, but have shared our meetings, shared budgets (we pay 30%/ Grand Canyon pays 70%) and shared staff, so we have cooperated fully instead of being in competition. Second, rather than the Synod of the Southwest being described as the Governing Body "over" the four presbyteries, the Synod leadership described themselves as equal partners with the four Presbyteries. This may not seem monumental, but churches are known for disagreements and power issues, particularly over their authority and over money. For our presbyteries and Synod to work in partnership represents an entirely new day.

When Russia began invasion and destruction of Ukraine, our Church immediately raised another \$25,000 for Disaster Assistance (and also a dozen handmade quilts).

- Music in the Valley ended the season with a fabulous concert by the Tucson Boys Choir!
- Legion Post 131 led a wonderful Memorial Day Celebration for a standing-room only crowd in SLC!

While doors had been refinished, entryways were shabby with carpets a tripping hazard, and these have now been replaced with epoxy non-slip coating that sparkles like gold in the sunshine.



- Landscaping was more than volunteers could cut down, we have now hired the father and sons' company Imurez Landscaping to work two days every month (already making a great difference).
- With roughly an acre of parking lots, the oil from our asphalt bakes-out in the sun, and after repeated efforts scheduling, the parking lots are now fresh and clean.
- In a retirement community, we have 45 people coming midweek for line dancing (and laughing)!
- Volunteers have replaced the fountain pump, and repaired wiring to outdoor lighting.
- Our staff is working very well together and enjoying one another's company.
- The "proof-copy" of our first church Photo Directory in seven years has been returned to the company, as we now await being able to recognize who everyone is without facemasks or nametags.
- > We know that roof tiles need to be replaced, but thus far the roofs are not leaking. With monsoons beginning, we have three bids for doing this work in the new year, and contracted repair if needed.
- ➤ While we have an outstanding debt, we have the cash in hand, to pay this off in full in June 2023.
- ➤ I explained to one good friend, "No pastor will ever say: we do not have challenges ahead of us, and we do, but God continues to bless us richly."

#### One Another

I have several people in my life that I keep in contact on a regular basis. Every day, I call my Mom, who is in Minneapolis. I am the health advocate for a friend in a care facility in Minneapolis. I make sure to contact him at least once a week. I have two good girlfriends that I have known for forty years. We live in different parts of the country, but the other day, we connected through a Zoom call. Staying in contact with one another enriches our lives.

There are scripture passages in the Bible called the "one another" passages. These passages instruct us on how to relate to others. Here are some examples:

Love one another (repeated at least 16 times)

- Build up one another
- Care for one another
- ➤ Honor one another
- Serve one another
- > Bear one another's burdens
- Encourage one another

There are at least 35 additional "one another" exhortations in the scriptures. God, who demonstrates relationship within the Trinity, created us to be in relationship and to connect with one another. The purpose of the "one another" passages is to show us how to build community and relationships with each other.



This is the purpose of Network of Caring (NOC). NOC is one of the oldest ministries of Valley Pres. Its purpose was to make sure each member and regular attender was contacted at least once a month by phone. The ministry divided Green Valley up into areas, and each area had a leader and callers. As Green Valley grew, the number of areas grew to twenty, and as you can imagine, became difficult to manage. Plus, other means of contacting people (besides phone calling) have come into existence over the past 30 years.

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This summer, the NOC leadership team and I are redesigning NOC. Our first step was taking the twenty areas of NOC and reducing them to a manageable eleven. As we continue to work on the new details of this beautiful ministry of our church, we are looking for people who enjoy connecting with others and believe it is important to stay in contact with one another. # Patio Sale Financial Update January-May 2022

The Amigos and Patio Sale Coordinating Team are frequently asked about the Patio Sale finances – "How much money have we made?" – "Where do we stand year-to-date?"

Before reviewing where we are year-to-date, it needs to be noted that the Patio Sale is a year-round activity from January through December with income and expenses each month. The final net results are not known until the books are closed at year-end. It is from the net profits achieved each year that support is given to the Mission's Committee's recommended recipients, which were endorsed by the Finance Committee and approved by Session for the <a href="next">next</a> calendar year. We have now completed the large March Patio Sale and have the smaller Holiday Plus sale in November.

All financial accounting is input by the Church Bookkeeper, using sign-off approval procedures, and reported using the church's accounting format. Below are the income and expenses associated with the Patio Sale from January – May 30, 2022.

### A Different World

My usual Valley Voice articles are about a specific health difficulty: vision, blood pressure, depression, taking care of oneself, caregiving, etc. This Valley Voice article might just be a little different, as our times now affect all the above in one way or another. There are more people who cannot afford groceries, gas, rent, and are having a challenging time navigating the healthcare system of healthcare providers that are full for 6 months to a year at a time. Stressors have escalated all around us this past month and have resulted in people needing to talk with someone else, having someone with them with while they are sick, caregivers that are wearing down, and amid this, the loss of peace/joy, with emotions are the brink of being irrational.

It is a different world. COVID began a turning point to see the health, social, economic, and emotional changes. This past week, I was at a business waiting to present information and on the television was the series *The Waltons*. This series began in 1972 and continued through 1981, with a few more episodes after that year. This series was about a family living through difficulties in depression and war times. Lots of the stressors we see today were still there. People connected more and communicated more. Why is it such a different world? We now must ask for someone to talk with us or be with us if we are ill. Dealing with health problems, healthcare providers are limited, and much of the time someone returning your call is not the healthcare provider. Every cost, from groceries to gas, is escalating, with more unable to live on fixed or low incomes. Computers, cell phones and other technology devices have decreased our connection in person. Have we lost human caring?

Ephesians 4:32 Be kind and compassionate to one another, forgiving each other, just as in Christ God forgave you.

Inflated stressors not only affect how we care for others, but care for ourselves. We need to look at the stressors and what they are causing. What happens to us when we have a projection of negativity, long and exhaustive days, impairments of our health status, impairment of our financial, emotional, or social status, and/or the lack of care given to oneself? It is like a domino effect. As one thing is affecting us, more tiles fall down the line. Try to decrease stress or built-up stress, which might be caused by these fixed stressors of today's different world. Sometimes by exercising, meditating, keeping a journal, getting enough sleep, and connecting with others, we can learn to take a deep breath, laugh, and smile.

A sense of peace and joy might just start to return.

## Capital Improvements Plan

A great deal has happened in recent years, without any extra appeals for money! How is this possible? Are the projects just taken as ideas, or is there a plan behind all of this?

<u>IMPORTANT NOTE</u>: VPC Foundation was established, in order to invest bequests and gifts outside of the Annual Operating Budget (pledged giving), to annually generate Income on Investments, to be used the following year by VPC Session action for Capital Improvements.

Based on current assets, and the Market 2019-2022, this has generated about \$50,000/year for Capital Improvements. Several projects had not been addressed for decades, requiring significant investment at this time, that will not need to be addressed again for years. Let us emphasize that this is using Interest Income on Investments and not costing the Congregation additionally.

#### **COMPLETED 2020**

Installed electronic sign, upgraded internet service for ZOOM, kitchen cabinets painted, replaced door mechanisms, replaced sanctuary lighting, replaced sanctuary sound system & updated carillon.

#### **COMPLETED 2021**

Installed live-streaming for worship, painted exterior of church building, refinishing doors, and replace irrigation system.

#### **BEING COMPLETED 2022**

Epoxied entryway sidewalks, repaired outdoor lighting and fountain, filled asphalt cracks & resealed, hired year-round landscaping, and relocating sound system into sanctuary.

#### **FOR 2023**

Re-tile roof perimeter.

**SOLAR CARPORT** In addition, in 2020-2022, parishioners took it upon themselves to contribute an additional \$100,000 which is being held to pay-off the solar carport purchase in 2023. Over these last four years, this solar system has saved our church over \$16,000; once the financing company is repaid (July 2023) this will provide a savings of \$14,000. annually, while TEP is raising utility costs.

#### Special thanks to Rick Nau and Les Walter, our Building & Grounds Committee and Staff!

<u>WISH LIST</u> There are a variety of additional concerns for the future: Replace the digital organ, sound system for the choir, a quiet ice machine, a blue tooth hearing impaired system, additional video cameras, and 25 air conditioning units which need to be replaced on a rotating basis.

Laura Romero, the Executive Directory of St. Andrew's Children's Clinic, said that the clinic met with 18 children on June 2, 2022, at the Knights of Pythias center in Nogales, Arizona. This facility is rent free and a temporary location for the Clinic which formerly met at St. Andrew's Episcopal Church in Nogales.

Much work was required of local volunteers to put up and take down clinic facilities in one big room. Disabilities served were Orthopedics, Pediatrics and Prostheses. Services of speech and hearing could not be provided in June with the amount of noise. The room was full echoes of Prostheses' construction and lots of people conversing in one area. There was no lunch space except for a small kitchen where volunteers could get their own lunches. In this one big room, many children, families and volunteers worked together to serve as a clinic.

July has always been an off month for the clinic, but it will resume on August 4, 2022, hopefully in a more adequate facility. The attendance for August has already reached its limit of 20 children. The professional volunteers (doctors and specialists) have been promised a clinic in September to serve children with Dermatology and Hearing problems.

This summer, several children have been selected have orthopedic surgery in Spokane, Washington. This will be in coordination with the Shriners' organization and hospital.

Laura has been searching, contacting agencies like Rotary, who know about adequate and available facilities in the Nogales, Arizona area. A permanent home for the Children's Clinic is needed and they are trying to find something.

In the meantime, children are being served regularly by telephone conversations with the St. Andrew's staff and volunteers.

Laura and the Children's Clinic are in desperate need of our prayers for a home in which to continue serving many disabled children.

# Please, Go and Listen to My

# Students! A Letter from Bob and Kristi Rice,

Serving in South Sudan Spring 2022



Philosophy of Religion Class-Nile Theological College

Dear Friends,

The greatest joy for me serving in South Sudan these five years has been my students. I am always amazed by their curiosity, thoughtfulness, intelligence, good humor, hard work, and care for me as their teacher and brother in Christ. This semester has been no different. In Philosophy of Religion, we have tackled questions such as "Why is philosophy important?" "What is God's central attribute according to many theists (believers in God)?" "What analogies help us better understand the Trinity?" "How can Jesus be both fully divine and fully human?" "What is the major weakness of Calvinism?"

This week we examined the greatest potential "defeater" for those who believe in God, the question of suffering and evil. As always, it was helpful for me to do the reading and preparation, and the lecture and discussion time were rich. Together we responded to this central question –

"Can I be mature, both intellectually and spiritually, be aware of the enormous and impressive amounts and depths of suffering and evil in our world, be aware also of the best anti-theistic arguments starting from the facts of evil, and still be such that Christian belief is rational and warranted for me?" (Plantinga, 2015: 117).

My students, all of whom have lived through war and suffering at unfathomable levels, thoughtfully and carefully answered "Yes," that we can have rational and warranted Christian belief in the face of evil and suffering. We discussed at length God's goodness in creation and His ongoing care for us. We also discussed the idea of "sensus divinitatis," the experience of God's divine presence as further evidence of God's existence and goodness. One student, a pastor, described how members of his church did not want to leave church on Easter Sunday because they had experienced God's presence amongst them.

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# PRESBYTERIAN MISSION

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We then discussed how we could experience God's peace during times of suffering, an experience we believe is not irrational, and how the reality of suffering requires a loving, pastoral response. Furthermore, we discussed how God Himself has fully entered and experienced suffering in the person of Jesus Christ, evincing that while there is terrible suffering in this world, God himself has fully entered it, suffering also.

Lastly, we discussed the breathtaking idea that our human condition is actually better off than it would have been otherwise because of evil and suffering. Our broken estate and our sinful and rebellious condition open the door for redemption, inviting us into full and eternal fellowship with a loving and merciful God. We are like the "Prodigal Son" (see Luke, chapter 15). To fully know the depths of the Father's love, we must go astray, going our own way, before being able to comprehend the comprehensive and unfathomable love of God.

Suffering and evil are fitting themes as I reflect on these last few months. At the beginning of the year, the local market across from our former apartment was demolished . We have many friends and acquaintances whose lives and livelihoods were supported by "Suk Malakia" (the local market). Our friend Mary had a tea shop. Jimmy and his crew fixed televisions and radios. Kapita, Amina, Saida, and Alima sold vegetables, fruits and other sundry items. We saw, visited and connected with these friends and these friendly faces multiple times each week.

They were our community, providing us with a sense of belonging in Juba. With the destruction of our market, this community was no longer present. Our friends scrambled to find new ways to support their families. Over these last few months, reading about the war in Ukraine has been terribly heartbreaking. I am always astounded when one leader causes such horrific pain and suffering for countless millions. These last few months have also been a tumultuous season for us at Nile Theological College.

Yet, in these experiences, which include the deep sadness I have felt over the fate of friends and strangers and the trauma we have experienced at the college; I can only agree with my students. Evil and suffering are not a "defeater" when it comes to the evidence and our experience of a loving, kind, and merciful God. Some persons will inevitably exclaim, "How can you believe in God with the overwhelming evidence of evil and suffering in the world?" I would gently reply to such persons, "Yes, there is evil and suffering in our world, but maybe you have not considered all the evidence when it comes to belief in a loving, just and merciful God. Please, go and listen to my students."

Thank you, as always, for your prayers, love, and support as we serve alongside friends and colleagues in South Sudan. We wish you God's peace and blessings during this Eastertide Season.


