

EVALUATING HOW WE EXPRESS OUR FAITH

Medieval churches were designed to have "Confessionals" before entering the Sanctuary Nave, to unburden yourself of the weight of sins before entering the house of God. There was a time, when persons would run from church to church trying to see how many times on a Sunday they could "See Jesus" in the breaking of the bread. I served one Presbyterian Church that had footrests on the backs of pews, so worshippers could put their feet up to reflect during the sermon. Another had coffee

mugs lining the walls of the Church, to encourage you to sip a hot beverage during worship. One wedding had the 7-11 Slurpee Wagon parked outside, for guests to enjoy a flavored snow-cone drink on a hot summer afternoon.

A colleague posted an evaluation survey for worshippers:

How many people welcomed you before the Worship of God began? Did people come to greet you, or did you need to find your own way? Are Visitors made to feel like strangers or as welcome new friends? Do people take an interest in you and introduce you to others? Was technology used to assist worshippers or as a gimmick? Did quality music enrich faith or was this a performance?

Comments shared at differing churches: "Someone told me I was in their seat, in a Sanctuary for 1000!" "Children were clearly not welcome." "The preacher was driven to worship in a limousine, arriving late, then drove off before we could talk with them." "Folks thought they were friendly, because they greeted their friends and talked with them."

Presbyterian (Reformed) Worship is designed around the Sermon, as the point where we hear God's Word interpreted for our lives. Catholic (Orthodox) Worship is designed around the Mass where individually we receive the body and blood of Christ. But as your Pastor, I believe the most important thing is that there was attention to you. People come to Worship: searching for God, grieving hurts, mourning, feeling loneliness, being

isolated and afraid, wanting love and justice. I work, hope and pray, that our experience of God listens to and speaks to your needs, in order that you can hear God's Word, listening for application of this to our lives, all to encourage us to let down our guard, unburden our sins and wounds, to share fully in communion both the Sacrament, as well as spiritual communion with one another and God.

I am so excited about Pastor Diane and Katie Sayre tracing the journeys of Paul. As a Pastor, I have had a lifetime of relationships in Presbyterian churches and with ecumenical partners, over 35 years ordained experience, ten years of higher education, but actually going to locations outside our comfort zone challenged my faith in different ways. I pray even more for this experience for Pastor Diane and Katie.

HURRY UP AND WAIT

Two couples have donated the cost of replacing all of the Sanctuary Chandelier bulbs with LED Bulbs. These will use far less electricity, should be brighter, and will only need replacing every 4-5 years instead of annually. However, as these bulbs now need to be dimmable, there is a backlog due to COVID and we hope for their arrival by early August. The ides of March 2019 was the last Sunday we celebrated with our Choir. Since that time, we have replaced the speakers, reprogrammed the Sound system, replaced the microphones, replaced the Chancel lighting, placed a separate microphone on the Piano, repaired components in the Organ, installed Live streaming video and practiced with how to use it. However, we will not actually know how well the changes have improved circumstance until our Choir are able to sing together again.

Baptism in Philippi

On Wednesday, our Greece tour went to Philippi where the Apostle Paul converted a woman named Lydia, a woman who had her own business making purple cloth. Philippi is also the place where Paul was beaten and thrown into a cell for talking about Jesus. (We saw this cell and it was more like a cave. You can read these stories in Acts 16.)

At the place where Lydia was baptized, we had the opportunity to renew our baptism vows. I took my sandals off and walked into the creek. Our tour guide, Rev David Stark, asked me to

reaffirm my faith in Jesus Christ as my Savior, and continue to follow him

wholeheartedly. As I answered in the affirmative, he placed water on my head from the river. I was filled with joy. The joy of knowing Jesus. The joy of serving him as I do and promising to continue as I always have. The joy of being in the same place as a baptism in the scriptures that took place almost 2000 years ago.

Now hear Katie's experience in her own words:

Today I had the opportunity to reaffirm my baptism in the waters of the stream where Lydia was baptized by Paul. My original baptism was at 9 months old in my hometown Presbyterian church. My father's family had a "family pew" there and I went to Sunday School, Youth

group, got confirmed and was ordained as a Deacon when I was a Junior in high school. While these were all important events in my life, they were expectations and invitations that I felt more externally compelled to fulfill.

Today, as I was invited to reaffirm my baptism, it was a very emotional moment as I stood in the cold waters and pledged my belief and dedication to my Lord and Savior not because someone expected it, but out of love for Jesus. - Katie Sayre

SYMBOLS FOR THE FOLDS OF THE FLAG

On Monday, May 31, in partnership with the American Legion Post 131, and our bugler Denny Schreffler, we held a Memorial Day celebration which was well attended, and quite poignant. This included the singing of our national anthem, the pledge of allegiance and the bugler playing taps.

We were all emotionally moved at the descriptions and meaning of each of the 13 folds of the Armed Forces memorial flag-folding ceremony.

The flag folding ceremony represents the same religious principles on which our great country was originally founded.

FOLDS OF THE FLAG Con't

The **first fold** of our flag is the symbol of life.

The **second fold** is a symbol of our belief in eternal life.

The **third fold** is made in honor and remembrance of the veterans departing our ranks, and who gave a portion of his or her life for the defense of our country to attain peace throughout the world.

The **fourth fold** represents our weaker nature; as American citizens trusting in God, it is to Him we turn in times of peace, as well as in times of war, for His divine guidance.

The **fifth fold** is a tribute to our country, for in the words of Stephen Decatur: "Our country, in dealing with other countries, may she always be right, but it is still our country, right or wrong."



The **sixth fold** is for where our hearts lie. It is with our heart that we pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America, and to the republic for which it stands, one nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all.

The **seventh fold** is a tribute to our armed forces, for is through the armed forces that we protect our country and our flag against all enemies, whether they be found within or without the boundaries of our republic.

The **eighth fold** is a tribute to the one who entered into the valley of the shadow of death, that we might see the light of day, and to honor our mother, for whom it flies on Mother's Day.

The **ninth fold** is a tribute to womanhood, for it has been through their faith, love, loyalty and devotion that the characters of the men and women who have made this county have been molded.

The **tenth fold** is a tribute to father, for he too has given his sons and daughters for the defense of our country since he or she was first born.

The **eleventh fold**, in the eyes of Hebrew citizens, represents the lower portion of the seal of Kind David and King Solomon and glorifies, in their eyes, the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob.

The **twelfth fold**, in the eyes of Christian citizens, represents an emblem of eternity and glorifies, in their eyes, God the Father, the Son and Holy Ghost.

When the flag is completely folded, the stars are uppermost, reminding us of our national motto: "In God We Trust."

Regarding Ruling Elders

The Rev. Dr. Rodger Nishioka

I was privileged to serve on the faculty of Columbia Theological Seminary when Dr. Laura Mendenhall was called to be our ninth president. In her first official meeting with the faculty, she described her leadership style. She explained she sees conflict as something that naturally occurs among people who are thoughtful and passionate. Over the years, she has discovered that when it comes to conflict, her tendency is to lean in. She is intrigued when others disagree with her, and she seeks to better understand the other's



perspective. She leans in, not because she's trying to convince them to agree with her, but because she is worried she's missing something, that she is not seeing something they see. In broadening her perspective, she becomes a better leader, a better pastor, and ultimately a more faithful follower of Jesus. Over the years, I watched her do this. When conflict arose, she approached the person and asked to meet with them on their timeline and in their preferred space. I learned much from her.

Conflict is inevitable. The best leaders do not run away from conflict; rather they accept it and seek to understand and learn from it. Mendenhall was clear about the power imbalance. She was the president, after all. But she brought such humility and a remarkable non-anxious presence to each conflict that people felt heard and respected, even when the result was to "agree to disagree." Jesus leaned in. Whether the conflict was with his disciples or the scribes or the Pharisees, he leaned in.

When I am in conflict with a person, I have learned to use the language of "please help me understand" as in "please help me understand how you see this differently" or "please help me understand how I have disappointed you." To be clear, I do not like conflict. As an Asian American, much of my cultural heritage teaches me to avoid conflict, to save face. But being called to lead means we need to be about healthy ways of loving one another in order for the body of Christ to grow and thrive. In the midst of conflict, leaders lean in.

Being Presbyterian - Seal of the Presbyterian Church (USA)

When the Presbyterian Church (USA) was formed in 1983 by the reunion of two major branches, this new denomination required an identifying Seal or Logo. A committee was formed to explore a new way to convey the church's heritage, identity, and mission in a contemporary form.

The basic symbols in the seal are the cross, Scripture, the dove, and flames.

CROSS – if you take away the flames, the lines which are left are in the shape of a cross – the universal and most ecumenical

symbol of the Christian church.

SCRIPTURE – In experimenting with the basic lines and shapes of the cross,



the contour of a book began to emerge in the horizontal section. This represents the emphasis which the Reformed tradition has placed on the role of Scripture as a means of knowing God's word.

DOVE – As a symbol of the Holy Spirit, the dove is intimately tied to the representation of the Bible, affirming the role of the Spirit in both inspiring and interpreting Scripture in the life of the church.



FLAMES – The flames convey a double meaning: a symbol of



the revelation in the Old Testament when God spoke to Moses from the burning bush and a suggestion of the beginning of the Christian church when Christ manifested himself to his apostles at Pentecost.

People have also seen the outline of a fish (Jesus' miracles), a cup (from the Lord's Supper) and a pulpit (preaching of the word). Personally, I envisioned the middle vertical line as a stole, maybe because of the years I've sung in choirs. What other symbols have you found?

Preparing for General Assembly

Our church partner, the South Sudan Presbyterian Evangelical Church, is busy preparing for a General Assembly in October of this year. This is a time when elders, pastors, and representatives of all the congregations come together to share their joys and challenges, elect leaders, and connect as part of the body of Christ. Long meetings do not sounds too exciting, but it really is significant for isolated congregations to feel connected to a body larger than themselves – to support one another and have a voice in the decisions being made.

According to the church constitution, a General Assembly should be held every two years. However, because of civil unrest in South Sudan, it has been more than eight years since the last General Assembly was held. Many of the congregations are in rural areas, and some among refugees displaced to nearby countries, which makes it difficult, expensive, and sometimes dangerous for representatives from those regions to travel.

Finally, though, it appears that South Sudan is becoming more stable and that people could travel to Juba. The leadership has set a date in October and started planning and raising funds. They hope to be able to cover some of the travel for all the representatives, but it is a daunting task. The total budget is more than \$100,000. But rather than let the funds needed be another reason to put it off, they are pushing forward in faith, trusting that God will provide or help them find creative ways to overcome the shortfall.

Operation Mobilization(OM)

continues to be hands and feet of Christ

The COVID-19 pandemic is terrible in North India. Hundreds of thousands of people have died due to a second deadly wave of this disease. The complexity of medical care and frustration is illustrated by the story of Lakshmi a 57 year-old widow who fell sick with COVID, passed it on to her daughter-in-law, and her 5 year-old grandson while her son Balu lost his job due to COVID. He gathered what little money he could find to send them to an expensive private hospital which provided no help. Then he took them to a government hospital, where they were turned away. It wasn't until a health worker from an OM supported local church in a newly- converted clinic in Jeedimetla that Balu's family received the help they needed. A healthcare worker counseled them on what to do, gave them medicines, a pulse oximeter, and a simple thermometer to monitor themselves at home. "We had lost hope." Balu said. "We felt so helpless, but then you came and gave us much more than we could afford. This assistance was just what we needed. Thank You!" OM is giving HPOE in the name of Jesus.



Genesis House & Hands of a Friend

The Executive Director of Hands of a Friend, Colleen Hanson, came to our last Mission meeting. She explained in clear detail the activities and functions of Genesis House in Green Valley. It is a domestic shelter for dangerously abused children and women. Not like other temporary shelters, Genesis House allows residents to stay up to 2 years. Abused women can apply to enter the home and will be screened through interviews by the director.



Sometimes friends, relatives, hospitals and law enforcement will recommend a woman in need of help. Women residents are encouraged to attend classes to enhance their self-concept and gain skills to become a wage earner. Counseling is offered for all women. A new house manager has been hired who has experience in marriage and family counseling and trauma treatment.

Hands of a Friend does not receive Federal or State aid so it is not required to follow Government restrictions. Funding comes through grants.



Hands of a Friend runs the thrift store DaZee's, which sells gently used donated Items, providing funds for the Genesis House.

These 18 months of COVID have given St. Andrew's Children's Clinic many challenges, but the smiles of children that have benefited from the past Cleft Palate and Cleft Lip Mission trips inspire them to move forward and come back better and stronger. After having to cancel last year's Mission trip to Hermosillo, they have found creative ways to keep serving their new and

previous patients and prepare them for this year's Mission trips. At the end of September, a number of pre-selected babies and very young children will go to Hermosillo for first-time surgery for cleft lip/cleft palate. At the first of November, toddlers will go for their second surgery. 25 children will go on each one of these clinics this year. This is a great start for opening of St. Andrews' Children's Clinic services after Covid held them back. Laura Romero and the St. Andrews' staff express sincere thanks for the prayers, concerns and support of the Valley Presbyterian Church.

Painting the Church

For a time it seemed Valley Presbyterian was marked with Petroglyphs, but these were only the many stucco cracks being filled before painting.





From Tower peaks to Columbarium the whole exterior was painted in May and June 2021. While many questioned what color blue was used on the domes, that is actually oxidation from the copper roof tiles. While Dave Appleton describes the 2' x 2' Copper tiles originally installed glimmered in the sunlight, just as they describe on The Antiques Roadshow, we are not supposed to remove or clean the oxidation off, as that would damage the metal surface.

We, the Amigos, frequently get asked how we're doing. Are we making money? How do we keep track of our expenses and income? Where do we stand year-to-date? Well let's see if we can shed some light on this subject by




first acknowledging that we can always do a better job of reporting our YTD Patio Sale (PS) expenses and resulting income for all to see.

Before looking at where we are in 2021, it needs to be noted that the PS is a year-around activity from January through December filled with income and expenses each and every month. The final net results are not known until the books are closed at year-end. It is from the net profits achieved **each year** that are given in support of the Mission Committee's recommended recipients, as endorsed by the Finance Committee and approved by Session, for the **next calendar year**.

Typically we have a large March sale with a smaller Holiday Sale in November and a lot of miscellaneous sales in between, whose expenses occur throughout the year. The financial accounting for all this activity is inputted by the Church Bookkeeper, using sign-off and approval procedures. All is input into the Church's standard accounting format that we can report out YTD results whenever requested.

So, here we are YTD. Going forward we plan to use this format to report our progress throughout the year. Your questions and suggestions are welcomed.


Thank YOU for your constant support and patience as I put the finishing touches on our year!


