

### Thoughts for the Journey

Dear Friends,

The Season of Lent is upon us. The theme for this season is "Events on the path to Golgotha." The biblical understanding of Golgotha is the hill outside Jerusalem where Jesus was crucified. Another word that is a synonym for Golgotha is Calvary.

Originating in the fourth century of the church, the season of Lent spans 40 days (minus Sundays). For us, Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, March 6, climaxing during Holy Week with Holy Thursday/Maundy Thursday, April 18, Good Friday, April 19, and concluding the Saturday before Easter. April 21 is Easter, or The Resurrection of the Lord. Originally, Lent was the time of preparation for those who were to be baptized, a time of concentrated study and prayer before their baptism at the Easter Vigil, the celebration of the Resurrection of the Lord early on Easter Sunday.

Today, Lent is marked by a time of prayer and preparation to celebrate Easter. Since Sundays celebrate the resurrection of Jesus, the six Sundays that occur during Lent are not counted as part of the 40 days of Lent and are referred to as the Sundays in Lent. The number 40 relates to many biblical events, but especially with the forty days Jesus spent in the wilderness preparing for His ministry by facing the temptations that could lead him to abandon his mission and calling. Christians today use this period of time for introspection, self-examination, and repentance.

Lent has traditionally been marked by penitential prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. Lent is really a preparation to celebrate God's marvelous redemption at Easter, and the resurrected life that we live, and hope for, as Christians.

Please join in the Lenten season by traveling with Jesus along the road to Jerusalem. The cross of Jesus is before us, the tomb of Jesus is inevitable and the promise of the resurrection of Jesus is awaiting us.

# A Different Spin on Lent

Lent and Easter are my favorite times in the church calendar.

What is Lent? Lent is often described as a time of repentance, a time of soul repair, a time of mediation and soul searching. When described this way, it sounds all so very serious.

So let me put a different spin on Lent. The word "Lent" comes from the Old English word "lengten," which simply means "spring." Spring is a time when the days lengthen and new life springs forth. It is a time in the church when we anticipate the victory of the light of Christ over the darkness of sin and death. C.S. Lewis described Lent as a season of "happiness and wonder that makes you serious."

So yes, Lent begins with the reminder of our brokenness on Ash Wednesday, but as days grow brighter, we experience the wonder of God's redeeming grace. Just as we prepare for the big events in our personal lives, such as weddings and graduations, the season of Lent makes our hearts ready for remembering Jesus' death and resurrection.

This year, Lent begins March 6 (40 days before Easter, minus Sundays).

We will help you make your hearts ready for Jesus' resurrection. I am offering a class called "Liturgy of the Ordinary." We will take the ordinary things we do every day and learn how to make them holy (Tuesdays, beginning March 5, at 1:00 p.m.).

Look for the article called "Wednesdays in Lent" (page 8). Every Wednesday in Lent (starting March 6), we are setting aside a special time at noon for recitals and classes, and at 5:00 p.m. for Taizé worship.

And as we do every Lent, we offer a Lenten Devotional, which contains daily readings. This year, our devotional is "On Calvary's Hill" by Max Lucado. Lucado says, "Draw near to the Savior and prepare to celebrate the greatest miracle ever conceived." We encourage you to purchase one for yourself (\$5), and purchase one to give away to a neighbor, friend, or family member.

I encourage you to enter into Lent with your whole heart and soul, so you can wholeheartedly join in the celebration of the Resurrection. Your pastor and friend,

## An Opportunity to Help the Homeless

Our Mission Committee is planning a church-wide effort to make bags of food for the needy.

Matthew 25: 35 "For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in."

Last April, our Mission Committee decided to try an idea shared by Lois and Tom McFarlane to assemble Ziploc bags of snacks and water to give to the homeless. Our plan was to have snack bags ready in our cars to provide to people who were soliciting help on the streets of downtown Tucson. We tried this project on a "small scale" within the committee first, and this year we want to widen the project to our full Congregation.



Our "food drive" for the homeless will take place in March, and we are asking the congregation to help fill the snack bags. We will be collecting a variety of 10 items to fill the bags. The 10 items are: bottled water, tuna and cracker packets, peanut butter cracker packets, cheese and cracker packets, granola bars, gorp/trail mix (in small packages), Vienna sausage, apple sauce cups/fruit snacks, peanuts, and wet wipes. Monetary contributions are welcome as well, and we will use donations to purchase items needed to complete the snack bags.

We will collect these items before and after our services in Charter Hall on three Sundays: March 17, 24 and 31. We will assemble gallon Ziploc bags with the collected snacks on Tuesday morning, April 9, at 10:30 a.m. in Classroom 1 (following our Mission Committee Meeting). All are welcome to join us for the assembling.

Completed bags will have two destinations:

- 1. We will deliver many to The Hospitality House of the Salvation Army, who welcome individuals who are homeless.
- 2. Individuals in our congregation who wish to take some to keep in their cars to deliver to homeless people they encounter on our streets.

THANK YOU for helping with this outreach. We look forward to the opportunity to assemble many bags for those who have very little.

#### Mission Trip to St. Andrew's Children's Clinic



#### **Home for Children Mission Breakfast**

On February 9, 2018 the Mission Committee sponsored a breakfast for Casa Vida Nueva para Niños. 132 people attended which included 13 people from New Life Church of God in Tucson, AZ and eight people from Home for Children (six of which were children). Donations of toilet paper, paper towels, and cleaning supplies were given to the Home. The kitchen staff needs special recognition for their super





support (see photo on left). After breakfast, Reed Olson gave an overview showing the past four years of support from VPC and the Green Valley community, then Elias and Myrna Herrera, Directors of the Home, gave their overview with a video. A special "Happy Birthday" cake was given to Myrna. Thank you all for attending and showing your love and support for these children. Next event is the March 23 trip to the Home – which is already filled up.



For most Apple and Android products (including smart phones, tablets, and sometimes computers), there is a feature called "find my phone" or "find my device" that you should be sure to turn on. This feature allows you to go onto a website from any computer, log into your account, and locate your device if it is lost or stolen. I

have personally used this feature when my daughter left her phone on a school bus. It pinpointed, with pretty impressive accuracy, right where her phone was, and we were able to retrieve it. It's To be honest, most criminals know enough to turn a stolen phone off so the feature can't work. However, even if the phone is off (such as if the battery died before you realized it was lost) you can often set it up to show you the last known location. Also, you may also be able to lock the phone or even completely wipe it, which you would want to do if it was stolen. Another common feature is that you can make your phone emit sound, so if it's somewhere nearby and on, but you still can't locate it, it will make noise even if it's on vibrate. Without getting too device-specific, I will give you some general areas to look to set this feature up.

You can find directions for various Apple devices at <a href="mailto:support.apple.com/en-us/HT205362">support.apple.com/en-us/HT205362</a>. For the iPhone and similar devices, though, you go into Settings, then your name, then iCloud. Scroll down until you see Find My iPhone, and slide to turn on Find My iPhone and Send Last Location.

For Android, it should be called Find My Device. There is a comprehensive article about setting this up at <a href="https://www.androidcentral.com/dont-get-lost-set-find-my-device-soon-you-get-your-phone">www.androidcentral.com/dont-get-lost-set-find-my-device-soon-you-get-your-phone</a>. It is often turned on by default, but in some cases it may not be installed at all. In those cases you can download the app from the Play Store.

When you need to use the service to locate your phone, you log into your iCloud account, making sure it's the same account that's set up on the device, or go to android.com/find, again logging in with the same Google account used on your device. The links above provide more details and instructions.

Be sure to look at the links because sometimes additional settings need to be adjusted. For example, location has to be turned on for Androids. Those links should tell you everything you need to know to give you as much protection as possible against a lost or stolen device.



# More Blog Readers Wanted (13 and Counting)

A blog reader is anyone with access to a computer who can type in "bobandkristi.blogspot.com." Have you ever wanted to read a missionary's diary? Consider reading the real-life story of Bob and Kristi Rice, who share, on a weekly basis, the story of God working in their lives.

#### **Knowing God as a Loving Parent**

I looked over and realized that the participants were listening intently, leaning forward and thoughtful as Omot taught about what might block us from experiencing God's love as a 'heavenly father/mother'. I couldn't understand what was being said in the Anywaa language, but I could see that people were being touched. Later, I learned that Omot, who grew up in the town of Pochalla where we were currently sitting, was sharing his own story. As is typical in the Anywaa culture, his father did not show affection to his children. He gave orders rather than listening, and he expected results. It was not until Omot attended a training in Rwanda called Healing Hearts, Transforming Nations (HHTN) that he realized how this lack of love from his father had affected him, and he was able to experience God's unconditional love in a deeper way.

Now, we were in Pochalla, seated in a shady clearing and conducting the same workshop we had experienced in Rwanda last year. After Omot shared his testimony, he asked participants whether there were things they lacked from their earthly parents. God, the only one who can love us perfectly and unconditionally, wants to make up for those things that we lacked and heal those wounds. After a time of silent reflection and prayer, Omot invited people who felt they had lacked something or been wounded by their father or mother to come forward and receive a hug from a man or woman standing at the front, to represent God's embrace and offer healing and acknowledgement of those wounds from the past. This is not easy – facing pain of the past and seeking to forgive and heal. But many did, and would return to their seats to cry, to pray, to sing with the music in the background. It was truly sacred space, where people had opened themselves up to God and to each other.

The following morning, we asked participants what they had experienced during that time. Mary was the first to offer her story. When she was two years old, her mother died in childbirth. Her father demanded the return of the dowry from his wife's family, because he thought that Mary and the new baby would not survive without their mother. Mary was raised by her mother's family, but always felt resented. When her younger brother grew up, their father agreed to help with his dowry, but communicated such a negative message to his son at his wedding that Mary's brother later committed suicide. Mary felt alone and rejected, and wanted to curse her father's family. She was a Christian, and had her own children, but still felt weighed down by the burden of rejection. During the

session on the father's heart, she recognized the source of this rejection, and finally felt able to forgive and be released from the burden.

During the teaching, Omot emphasized the responsibility of parents to show love and affection to their children. He encouraged participants, most of whom were parents, to go home and tell their children that they loved them. The testimonies of how this went were both humorous and moving! One woman called

her son to come from where he was playing, but he was afraid to come, because he was afraid his mother wanted to beat him. Another woman shared that she had a daughter who was often stubborn, but she was able to affirm her daughter for her good qualities and say that she loved her. We hope that this 'counter-cultural' way of verbally communicating love to children will continue and spread in Pochalla, helping children to know they are valued and loved.

That was just the first day of this workshop focused on healing, forgiveness, and reconciliation. We continued to see God work over our three days together, and praise God for the ways He is bringing healing to people around Pochalla. Thank you to many of you who prayed for this workshop — truly, we were dependent on God and know that He heard your prayers. We will share more in our newsletter, but wanted to give you a brief taste of the impact of this significant workshop.

We are receiving many requests for these workshops that help people to experience healing from trauma, forgiveness, and a path to reconciliation that is based on Christ's work on the cross. Transport in South Sudan out to remote regions is expensive, but we know that there is great need in those places. If you would like to support this ministry, you can do so at the following link. ## **Congregational Care at Work**

Many have asked, "What does Congregational Care do?" Congregational Care is a multi-faceted caring ministry. Here is just an example of how Congregational Care can help:

Mr. and Mrs. Doe have been very involved with Valley Presbyterian Church for 20 years, but now things have changed. John is quickly declining in health. Jane has stopped attending certain committees and does not drive. They used to be active and now are feeling lonely, and overwhelmed with life's changes and bills. A neighbor calls the church regarding John and Jane. She has become the caregiver to John and now has health changes. John will be going into an adult care home.

Congregational Care can help and care for this family of Valley Presbyterian in a number of ways: the Parish Nurse can visit, assess, and provide advocacy for them for changing health, life and all that might be affecting them, Network of Caring - caring for those in their neighborhoods/areas - can call and visit, Facility Visitation can visit John in the adult care home, Communication of Care to the Congregants can send cards and flowers to John and Jane, Stephen Ministry can visit with them if needed, Rideshare can bring Jane to church to increase her support for other activities, Extended Communion can bring Jane and John communion where they reside, Prayer Ministry can pray for both John and Jane, and a Prayer Shawl, which is prayed upon, can be delivered to them.

If you envision a large tree with branches and many hands on each branch that embrace everyone in its path, that is Congregational Care. Many branches, many parts, but all one body, one ministry working together to care for those in our congregation. 
