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

Roof Repairs

This year's major Capital Improvement has been to replace the tile roofing around the perimeter of the building. In the process Lynch Roofing discovered that originally this structure was built to last, with roof decking boards a full inch thick instead of the current $\frac{1}{2}$ -3/4". Also, in recent decades, the underlayment was simple felt paper, which was cheap but did not last. This time, after the dangling tiles and loose cement were removed, a fiberglass vapor barrier was glued down and steel endplates installed before the new tile were stacked in place.

From Pastor Diane

I have a church calendar that gives the scripture readings for each Sunday and lists the church seasons. You will notice in the picture that all of the month of March is in the color purple.

Each season in the church has its own color. Green is for "ordinary time." Ordinary time is any time of the year between Easter and Advent, and between Christmas and Lent. I love that phrase "ordinary time" because life is filled with the everyday of sleep, work, rest, eat. When the church has a season called ordinary time, it says God is in our everyday life.

White is reserved for special events such as Communion Sunday, Christ the King Sunday Christmas Day and Easter. White is worn by the pastor during funerals and memorials to signify the Resurrection.

Red is for Pentecost (50 days after Easter). It is the birthday of the church and the arrival of the Holy Spirit.

Purple is the color of Advent and Lent (sometimes royal blue is used). Purple symbolizes penance, sacrifice and preparation.

You can tell the church season by the use of color in our sanctuary. Look at the piece of cloth on the pulpit (called a parament), the stoles on the choir and the pastors. All matching the color of the season. Since Lent is purple, the sanctuary will be filled with purple during the month of March.


Why the color purple for Lent? Keep in mind the purpose of Lent - to prepare us as we walk with Jesus towards the cross. In biblical times, purple was typically associated with royalty as it was a more expensive color to dye. As Jesus faced the court after his arrest, soldiers placed a purple robe on him to mock him as "King of the Jews."

One of my favorite movies (and I try to watch during Lent) is *The Robe.* Made in 1953, it stars Richard Burton as the soldier who crucified Jesus and wins the robe during a game of dice. The soldier, Marcellus, gives the robe to his slave, and eventually the robe becomes lost.

Traumatized by his role in crucifixion of Jesus, Marcellus begins a journey to find the robe and destroy it in order to be healed. Along the way, he meets Christians and learns about the man he crucified. Marcellus discovers forgiveness and the love of God. In a moment of repentance, he dedicates a life of service to Christ.

In a way, Lent is a re-dedication to Christ. It is a season of prayer and fasting and repentance. The color purple, the color of Jesus' robe, reminds us to do so. Let us walk with Christ to the cross and remember the love of God that calls into a relationship.






Every Wednesday in Lent beginning on March 1, 2023, (March 8, in the Sanctuary and no soup/bread meal) we will have a Taizé-style service based on the Stations of the Cross. During the pandemic, we presented the Taizé Stations of the Cross online. This Lent, we bring it to you live.

The Stations of the Cross follow the path of Jesus on his way to the crucifixion. The Stations have been celebrated by our Catholic brothers and sisters for centuries. We Protestant Christians can partake in this rich pilgrimage as they remind us how far Jesus went to save us, and what a miracle it truly is that He rose from the grave.

Each Taizé service will contain two stations of the cross (there are a total of twelve), and will give you opportunities to think, pray, sing, and meditate at each station. It is an intentional way to spend time with Christ, giving thanks and praise.

Each Lenten Taizé will be followed by a simple Lenten soup and bread meal. We hope you will join us in this special time of worship of candlelight, music, and prayers.



Hope for Overcoming Depression

Do you know of someone who always seems to be "blue"? Do you have a friend who thinks negatively most of the time? Do you tend to be "down in the dumps" much of the time, or are you unhappy with the life that you have been dealt with? If so, your friend might have depression, or you might be struggling with a mental health issue.



Do not worry! Help is available in many forms. Mental health counselors are available to share concerns with. Taking medications is also an important possibility. Medical treatments are also available to treat any depression that might exist in a person's life.

Books and classes also exist for dealing with depression and its symptoms. Valley Presbyterian Church will soon be offering a class called Hope for Overcoming Depression. This class is based on the book "Overcoming Depression: A Personal Journey of Hope." This class will emphasize the hope that God will help us overcome depression. It will cover the symptoms of depression, myths about this illness, the caregiver's responsibility and frustrations, how to survive depression, and other important topics. It will also discuss a medically-sound procedure for treating the brain.

If someone you know (including yourself) might have depression, this class could be a useful tool on the road to recovery from this malady.

VPC member Tom Lobb will be teaching this class using the book "Overcoming Depression". He is the author of the text, which is based on his decades-long experience with this disease. The Life and Times of Jesus the Messiah: His Final Week

Part Three: Nisan 14, AD 33 (April 3rd)

"Ecce homo", declared Pilate, as he commanded the crowd to behold Jesus, soon to be the slain Lamb of God. Jesus' final week on earth has drawn to a close and the hatred of the Jewish leaders has worked the crowd, who a mere four days earlier had hailed their Messiah on Palm Sunday, into a frenzy of "Crucify Him!" After establishing the New and Everlasting Covenant in His Body and Blood hours before, he was betrayed and deserted by those closest to Him.

It took 46 years for the Second Temple to be completed by Herod the Great in AD 27. Yet, for all its magnificence, it was destroyed only 43 years later in 70 AD by Titus, fulfilling much of Jesus' prophecy given in the Olivet Discourse. That no stone should lay on top of another was literally accomplished as the Temple and Jerusalem were laid desolate with the death, or the enslavement, of 2,500,000 Jews who came for the Passover. Pilgrims were allowed entrance into Jerusalem, but the Romans refused to let them out. They were trapped.

We will look at the events of Nisan 14, 33 AD, from the Last Supper to Jesus' giving up of His spirit at 3:00 PM as the lamb slaughter began. We look at the seismological, astronomical, and meteorological evidence from secular sources that attended the crucifixion. We will learn more about Josephus and his contribution to Jewish history.





Veggie Quiche
6 servings



Group picture of models

- 19 inch pie shell: blind baked or sprinkle bottom with finely crushed dried bread crumbs
- 1 heaping Cup of cooked well drained veggies: zucchini, summer squash, broccoli, red pepper, chopped spinach, asparagus (could also use roasted veggies)
- 2 Cups of shredded cheese (I used a mixture of Italian cheeses plus ¼ Cup of Parmesan cheese
- 4 large eggs
- ¾ Cup regular milk
- 1 Tablespoon flour added to well drained veggies.

Beat eggs with milk, add cheeses, add ¼ teaspoon each salt, pepper, paprika, garlic powder, onion powder and ½ teaspoon Italian seasoning and dash of Worcestershire sauce (secret ingredient)

Add the floured veggies and pour mixture into pie crust.

Bake in preheated oven (35 degrees) for 40 minutes (should be pretty firm at this point) it will have puffed up but will shrink as it cools.

Stephen Ministry Christ Caring for People Through People

On Feb. 14, several Stephen Ministers from VPC attended the Santa Cruz Valley Community Stephen Ministry Retreat at St Francis in the Valley Episcopal Church. The program was presented by Carol Collins on the topic "Stephen Ministry Caring for Survivors of Suicide." Carol Collins is a survivor herself, having lost her son to suicide several decades ago.

Survivors of suicide include a broad range of people who had a relationship with the individual: parents, spouses, siblings, grandchildren, aunts, uncles, friends, health and mental health caregivers, co-workers, and many more. Many survivors will grieve and try to make sense of the suicide for years and decades after the death.

Carol emphasized over and over again that survivors were not responsible for the death. The one who took his or her life is the only one responsible for the death. Stephen Ministers can help survivors by listening to them and providing them with reassurances such as:

- Anger, guilt, confusion, forgetfulness are common responses; you are not crazy.
- You may feel guilty for what you think you did or did not do; guilt can be transformed into regret through talking about it with a good listener.
- Remember, the choice was not yours; no one is the sole influence in another's life.
- Call on your personal faith to give your strength and comfort.
- Wear out all your questions, anger, guilt or other feelings until you can let them go; letting go doesn't mean forgetting.
- It's okay to reminisce and laugh at the good memories.

Jack Jordan, a psychologist who has studied suicide bereavement, describes three aspects that research shows make suicide grief unique:

- 1. "... Suicide loss survivors seem to struggle more with questions of meaning-making around the death ('Why did they do it?') ... survivors often struggle to make sense of the motives and frame of mind of the deceased."
- 2. Suicide loss "survivors show higher levels of feelings of guilt, blame, and responsibility for the death than other mourners ('Why didn't I prevent it?'). ... Occasionally, survivors feel that they directly caused the death through mistreatment or abandonment of the deceased. More frequently, they blame themselves for not anticipating and preventing the actual act of suicide ..."
- 3. Suicide loss "survivors experience heightened feelings of rejection or abandonment by the loved one, along with anger toward the deceased ('How could they do this to me?')."

Laura, her staff and the volunteers feel that the name of this clinic needs to be changed. They are no longer located at St. Andrews' Episcopal Church but have a home of their own adjacent to Pima County Community College at 2021 N. Grand in Nogales, Arizona. Whatever the new name, it will be announced and installed at the front of the building for all to see.

There is still much work to do to get the new building remodeled for the operation of a more efficient clinic. Progress is slow but is coming along. Laura is very grateful to the Valley Presbyterian Church for our prayers and support through the years.

Recipe for FRUIT SLUSH that was served at the Mission Breakfast, February 11, 2023

Fruit Slush

Lois Macfarlane

Servings: 16

Use 5-ounce cups to get 24 servings.

2 1/1 cups water

1 cup sugar

6 oz frozen lemonade concentrate

6 oz frozen orange juice concentrate

3 bananas-mashed

20 oz crushed pineapple & juice

1 can mandarin oranges-drained

6 oz strawberries, frozen

1 jar Maraschino cherries

Boil water and sugar until dissolved, cool slightly, add concentrate, and set aside. Mash bananas, add pineapple, oranges, and strawberries. (I usually put everything in my mixer) For more color you can add Maraschino cherries. Add liquid and mix. You can freeze it in the bowl and scrape it out into dishes when ready to serve OR put into individual cups or dishes and freeze. You should take it out of freezer for about 1 hour before you serve.

Our "Reality Check"

Twice per week Susan comes to clean our apartment. Susan does not speak English, so we are wonderfully obliged to practice and speak the local Juba Arabic with her – Susan has become one of our many, patient, and gracious language teachers. Susan is from the Torit area of Eastern Equatoria, and she often walks a long distance to cultivate her fields. In many ways, Susan represents the simplicity of rural life and thinking, yet finds herself transplanted into the urban metropolis of Juba.

We sometimes refer to Susan as our "Reality Check" here in South Sudan. Her life belies and represents the suffering of so many, yet "Susan mashi hal," Susan pushes along. Having given birth to ten children, only a few remain, most having died because of disease or due to the violence and trauma which continues to inflict this land. Last year Susan's sixteen-year-old son was shot and killed in broad daylight at a birthday party. Susan's grief was immeasurable, and her willingness to forgive divine.

Within our first few months of being here, I was targeted and overtaken by "Toronto," thieves who travel by motorcycle and swipe possessions from unsuspecting pedestrians. I came home feeling victimized. Susan, while not discounting my trauma, said to me, "Bob, do not condemn them for what they have done...have compassion, they are acting out of their own desperation." On another occasion, Kristi and I bemoaned the fact that rats continued to invade our apartment at night, eating into our bananas and causing general havoc. When we informed Susan about our "rat problem," she sympathized, but responded with this rejoinder – "Ah, you have rats, that means you have food. You are blessed to have food!" She later told us that in many homes, rats come and nibble at people's toes at night because there is no food.

Most recently, since we arrived back in Juba almost three weeks ago, we rejoiced to see Susan glowing! After months of melancholy since the death of her son, Susan seemed to have regained a sense of hope and joy. Yet again, the challenges of this country would land themselves square on her shoulders. One day last week Susan confided to Kristi that in the afternoon she would go across town to Jebel to pick up the three children of her late brother and sister-in-law, taking them home to care for, to feed and send to school. The following week Susan would report to me that previously she had taken in another three children from the same brother and that of his first wife after the first wife had died and her brother and his second wife were unwilling to care for them. It seems that HIV/AIDS had wiped out at least two of the parents, leaving behind a retinue of orphans. Susan said when she thinks about the needs of her household, it is too much, she is overwhelmed. "But I put God first," she says smiling, "and have faith that He will provide."

What can one say when confronted with the life of Susan? What words of comfort or encouragement can one provide? I am left speechless and dumbfounded by Susan's witness of resilience and faith. Could I endure what Susan has endured and keep going? I do not know. What Kristi and I do know, however, is that Susan is our "Reality Check." She is our inspiration.

A dementia-friendly community for everyone Is Green Valley ready?

You've heard the jokes about memory loss and aging. Some are really humorous because forgetfulness can happen to everybody at one time or another, but memory loss tied to dementia is no laughing matter.

As older adults move toward the age of retirement, more and more people find themselves facing Alzheimer's and other forms of dementia. In 2022, the Alzheimer's Association reported that approximately 6.5 million people were living with Alzheimer's, the main cause of dementia.

A dementia-friendly community is a city, town, or neighborhood where people with dementia are understood, respected and supported. Too many people affected by dementia feel society fails to understand the condition they live with, its impact, or how to interact with them. People with dementia sometimes feel they need to withdraw from their community as the condition progresses. If appropriately supported, they can continue to play an active and valuable role even years after diagnosis.

In 2020, Pima Council on Aging was selected as one of the 12 organizations in the nation to receive funding for a three-year program to improve dementia-specialized support for people living with Alzheimer's Disease and related dementias and their caregivers, with a special focus on those living alone and underserved populations.

PCOA's three-year, one-million-dollar award has been funding various community initiatives to increase an understanding of Alzheimer's and related dementias.

PCOA joined forces with the United Way of Tucson and Southern Arizona to partner with the following organizations to meet the goals of the project:

Stop Domestic Abuse

Hands of a Friend is a religious-based non-profit shelter for women in Green Valley. Alexa Delgado, Hands of a Friend Executive Director, notes that Arizona has the fifth-highest domestic violence rates in the United States, with about 42.6% of women and 33.4% of men experiencing intimate partner physical violence, sexual violence, or stalking. The need for shelters in the Green Valley area is real. Several agencies refer women to Hands of a Friend, keeping the shelter full.

Currently, Hands of a Friend is facing a few big challenges. While replacing the security system at the Genesis Shelter, it was discovered that the main gate also needs to be replaced. In addition, both sets of washers and dryers need replacing. The Mission Committee was able to offer some assistance with the gate, however, additional funding is still needed for the gate and laundry facilities.

Dazee's - A High-End Resale Clothing Boutique in Green Valley opened 15+ years ago is operated by Hands of a Friend. The store is run entirely volunteers. Our church continues to be so supportive, and they are so grateful for the donations, sales and volunteers. All proceeds from the store go to the Hands of a Friend to help fund the shelter.

At present, sales continue to grow. So much so, that the store is currently in need of donations of men's and women's clothing and accessories.


