This year Lent is earlier than most, starting on Valentine's Day and culminating on Easter, March 31st. Lent marks 40 days (plus Sundays) as we prepare for Christ's Crucifixion and Resurrection.



From Pastor Craig



Usually, I am involved in visiting and listening to people. This month, I have been planning presentations for teaching. Every 3 years, Churches, like most businesses are required to provide Boundaries Awareness Training. Looking through my files, our Church had four Operations Manuals (which did not supersede or cancel out prior copies!?!) including a 2014 Boundaries Awareness policy in Draft form, which had never been officially adopted.


The policy chiefly pertained to children, which may be why this seemed less of a priority in a retirement community; however, at our ages, all of us could be considered vulnerable to being preyed upon. In addition, in recent years legislation has been adopted that Clergy are Mandatory Reporters when persons have harmed themselves or others; and that persons in authority may represent power to others. The earlier policies also described conflicting ways of responding, when we have members who have had legal problems in their pasts.

Over the last 20 years, I earned my doctorate and was a leader in the Presbytery, on developing and interpreting statistical information about a church and its neighborhood. As Maureen Ramsay describes elsewhere in this Valley Voice, our Mission Study Planning Commission has reached the point of reviewing studies provided by the Presbyterian Church (USA) based on census and related surveys. These are what I have been interpreting for other churches, and now can be used to help our church. Dry and boring? No Way! You folks live very interesting lives and are extremely diverse.



Rather than adding another worship service during Holy Week, this year, you are invited to a very special dinner at our church. This is not a Potluck (nothing against Meatloaf or Chicken Casserole, which are Pastor Craig's favorite dishes). According to Matthew, Mark and Luke, Jesus' Last Supper was the Passover Seder, which has its roots with Moses in Exodus.

The Passover Seder is a formal dinner with Candlelight and your best China; where throughout the course of the meal, we share in reading the story of GOD's deliverance. In the meal, there are four communion-size cups of wine (or grape juice for those who need) and breaking of bread; allowing us to explain the origins of our Communion sacrament.

As Worship, this will be a meal without cost (a freewill offering will be received), Tickets will be available at Coffee Hour on Sundays March 17 and 24, or in the Church Office. Just as at other annual family holiday meals there is a prescribed menu, dinner will include Lamb and Chicken, Soup, Bread, Vegetables and a Dessert.

Perhaps you have never been to a Passover Seder before, possibly you were at one several years ago; after this you will never think of Communion in the same way again. You are most welcome and invited. Because this worship service is over dinner, we are planning to begin at 4pm which will probably conclude about 6pm, in the Fellowship Hall March 28th.





You can become an affiliate member (whereby you keep your main membership with your church "back home") or an active member (full membership here at Valley Presbyterian).



The Caregiver's Compass "Full of Faith"



Stephen Minister trainees learn about the Caregiver's Compass in their very first lesson. The Caregiver's Compass provides direction for the journey on becoming a Stephen Minister and at the end of every lesson the trainees are asked to relate what they had learned in the lesson that relates to each "direction" of the Caregiver's Compass. This month I will give my viewpoint on what it means for Stephen Ministers to be full of faith, at the right of the Caregiver's Compass.

"No distrust made him waver concerning the promise of God, but he (Abraham) grew strong in his faith as he gave glory to God, being fully convinced that God was able to do what he had promised." Romans 4:20-21, NRSV. Stephen Ministers have faith that God will be with them as they meet with their care receivers, fully trusting in God to do what he has promised to bring comfort to the hurting. They realize that they are there to provide care while acknowledging that God will provide the cure.

"Do not, therefore, abandon that confidence (faith) of yours; it brings a great reward. For you need endurance, so that when you have done the will of God, you may receive what was promised." Hebrews 10:35-36, NRSV. Life is filled with pain and challenges that tax the human spirit. Jesus offers us a way of hope and reconciliation. Being full of faith, Stephen Ministers have the confidence and endurance to sit with those who are feeling "poor in spirit" and shower on them the love of God and the hope of Jesus.

"Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen. By faith we understand that the worlds were prepared by the word of God, so that what is seen was made from things that are not visible." Hebrews 11:1,3, NRSV. To quote Martin Luther, "Faith is a living, daring confidence in God's grace. It is so sure and certain that a [Stephen Minister] could stake his or her life on it a thousand times." Stephen Ministers can never know what the outcome of a caregiving relationship will be. But they have complete and utter faith that God will provide what their care receiver needs.

Stephen Ministers have uttered confidence that God is with them, and they care for people who are in pain, grief, and other hurting places. If you are in a hurting place right now, wouldn't you like to receive the assurance that God is with you and hasn't abandoned you through the presence of a Stephen Minister? Understanding Alzheimer's disease and dementia Friday, March 22, 2024 9:00 a.m. in the Spiritual Life Center

VPC's Stephen Ministry is inviting you to a free presentation on Friday, March 22 at 9 am in the Spiritual Life Center. Rev. Jerry Haas from United Methodist Church-Green Valley will educate and inform us about Alzheimer's disease and other dementias. There will be time after his presentation for questions and discussion.

Alzheimer's disease is the most common cause of dementia, a general term for memory loss and other cognitive abilities serious enough to interfere with daily life. Alzheimer's disease accounts for 60 percent to 80 percent of dementia cases.

Rev. Haas has a mission to create a dementia-friendly community. He works to help those diagnosed with dementia to feel safe and to help eliminate stigmas that surround dementia. His goals include reducing the isolation and loneliness experienced by those diagnosed with dementia, as well as by their caregivers and loved ones.

Chances are you or someone you know is living with or caring for a person with dementia. Stephen Ministers are available to help you to deal with the isolation and loneliness this can cause. Our desire is to offer support. We hope you will join us and Rev. Haas to learn more about memory loss diseases and how to find assistance.



Pastor Craig and Pam Coggins were at the hospital until after midnight and word got out to all. Then the magic began.....a children's hospital 5 minutes away, the brilliant medical staff, and most importantly, an army of angels at Valley who set everything in motion with their prayers.

After working in numerous denominations as music director/organist for the past 62 years, I can honestly attest to the fact that the Valley family demonstrated the Gospel more intensely than one could ever imagine. No committee was formed; it just happened... Immediate, passionately and successfully. This little boy beat the odds of a rare condition that could have had a tragic outcome. Our family was constantly buoyed by support, cards, gifts, food, assistance, and flexibility with work schedules.



Do you know where to locate information regarding nutrition?


Two great websites with a lot of information are <u>FDA.gov/nutritioneducation</u> and <u>myplate.gov</u>. Both websites have information on label reading, portion, and even recipes.

One step that is encouraged is to plan weekly meals ahead of time, with a prepared grocery list. Not only preparing but writing down the items needed encourages more healthy food choices. In the grocery store, most of the ingredients that are healthy are often found on the perimeter or outside of the aisles, where fresh produce and protein are located.

To encourage nutrition, use label reading to compare foods, especially any canned or frozen items. The label contains ingredients in the order of how much they have. Example is sugar is listed as the third ingredient, that product has sugar as one of the top third ingredients. Labels also list calories, carbohydrates, sodium, cholesterol, fat, and protein. Remember to look at the top of the label to see how many servings that product contains.

On the myplate.gov website, there is information on how your plate should look regarding proteins, fruits/vegetables, and grains. There is also a kitchen source for healthy recipes.

Most of today's choices that are healthy can also be costly, but not all costly choices are needed. Budget tips for those on a fixed income, creative ideas/recipes can be found on these two websites. There are also other resources for those on a fixed income including SNAP assistance (supplemental nutrition assistance program) or food stamps. This can be of help when incomes are limited, affecting nutrition. There is application assistance for this program in our community. Over 750,000 people in Arizona are food insecure and face hunger. The ratio for children is 1 in 7.





CLERK'S CORNER

MAUREEN RAMSAY, CLERK OF SESSION Planning Commission

Most of you probably know that the church has embarked on a congregational self-study. This is an extensive process that involves many different areas of study, like strategic planning. It is done by a church when a pastor leaves and before a new pastor is called. I, along with the other members of the Planning Commission (Steve Ginader, Dick Horn, Bud Landry, Ellie Hargleroad, and Eloise Fredrickson), have chosen to use the Clerk's Corner to inform you of what this study entails, where we are in the process, and how everyone in the congregation can contribute to deciding what we want our church to look like in the future.

The planning commission was formed after our church got special permission from the Presbytery in June 2023 to embark on this study before Pastor Diane retired. They provided us with an outline of what they expected us to include in our report. After reading through all that was required of us, we were overwhelmed with the task ahead. With Pastor Craig's guidance, we began in late summer to accumulate data. We interviewed many long-time members and most of the former pastors to get a feel for what the church was like at various times in the past. We took all the information from the previous study that was done in 2007, after Rev. John Ross left. We looked through all previous annual reports and information about previous building projects, former staff members, church organizational charts, mission projects, etc. We assembled financial information and history from all previous reports. We went through multiple community and demographic studies of the Green Valley area provided by PC(USA). We consulted the Green Valley Council about future planning for the area.

The congregational self-study outline includes five basic areas of study. They are History and Description, Demography, Community Study, Beliefs and Practices, and Documents. We have gathered enough information to complete the first three areas. These reports are being written now. The next major step is to gather information from the congregation, and we have begun that process by asking you to describe the church and its strengths. Pastor Craig listed the most frequent responses earlier this month. In the coming weeks, we will ask for input from you to tell us about changes you would like to see, or areas of ministry not currently being addressed.

All this information will help the Session to set the direction for our church, to decide what kind of leadership staff we will need in the future. What do we expect from our senior pastor? Do we need or want another full-time pastor? Should we hire a business manager so that our pastor can concentrate on pastoral care and other needs of the church? Do we want to provide more opportunities for community involvement? Do we want more programs to address the needs of the congregation? What do we want our church to be moving forward? We will be forming an updated mission and vision statement for the church also with the responses that we receive from you.

We all have an opportunity and an obligation to let our voices be heard. This is the time to dream big, to reach for the stars, to imagine what our church can look like in the future. This is an exciting opportunity, to be a part of deciding where we can go. What does God have in store for us? Think about it. Pray about it. Most importantly, let us know about it.

Operation Christmas Child

Packing the Christmas Boxes is another way for us at Valley Presbyterian Church to share our love of Jesus Christ and to help spread it into the world. By combining our efforts here locally with other cities and communities around the world we can make significant strides toward this goal. In 2023 more than 11.3 million boxes were packed by 11 countries, A NEW RECORD for numbers sent worldwide. In addition, 5.3 million children are getting instruction

and participating in the Greatest Journey Bible Series taught by trained teachers in over 100 nations.... Another NEW RECORD. 220 million boxes have been distributed in total to 170 countries and territories since 1993. 540,000 volunteers worldwide are involved in collecting, shipping, and distributing shoebox gifts. AND, just for our area (greater Tucson including Green Valley) 15,878 boxes were sent.

To put that in perspective, in 2022 9,789 boxes were shipped out. That is a 32% increase!! Well done good and faithful servants of the Lord. Our boxes this year were divided up into several bundles and were sent to the South Pacific Islands, all very small and very remote, many unnamed on a map. The children inthose areas will soon be receiving the Bible Series by teachers that travel to the area. Communities are being transformed by God's love, and churches get started. As Franklin Graham, President of Samaritan Purse says, "What a blessing it is when people come to Christ as children. But how can they hear this message without someone to tell them?"

Aren't you glad we at Valley Presbyterian Church we are part of such a huge global message...the shoeboxes are certainly a gospel message, carrying his WORD to the ends of the earth.

The audiologist at the clinic, is using a program by which non-speaking & non-hearing children can communicate. It is called Augmented Alternative Communication. The clinic needs iPads and programs for about 12 children. A most valuable addition to the clinic would be a donation of an iPad and/or the program which needs to be installed.

The next Valley Voice will give information of the exact type/generation of iPad that will be needed. A donation of \$300 via Apple Card can provide this program to a child with an iPad so that he or she can communicate with family. How thrilling that there is technology to help children who could not communicate with standard language.

The Clinic has a Wish List of items it needs. A few things will be highlighted in our daily E-Blast once or twice a week. The first is asking for Hearing Aid Batteries of sizes 13 or 675, Disposable Diapers, newborn to adult and Power Snack Bars.

On February 3, St. Andrew's celebrated their 50th Anniversary at the Stables in Tubac. Donors were honored, Silent Auction brought in contributions and a delicious buffet of was provided. It was a wonderful event, expressing congratulations and thanks for the service, St. Andrew's has provided to hundreds of children in the past 50 years.

A New Kitchen

La Posada Community Services has a brand-new kitchen service area in the Adult Day Services program. This much-anticipated renovation comes after being on the program's wish list for several years. Although food and snacks are not cooked in this service area, meals and snacks are provided by La Posada Community Services and Catholic Social Services and delivered to Adult Day Services and the La Posada Senior Lunch program.

The new space features a modern, updated counter with a sleek new finish and new decor decorating the walls. The floor has been recently replaced in Adult Day Services and also in Los Niños del Valle Preschool.

These new renovations have created a very simple, but clean and uncluttered look to the Adult Day services room.

Adult Day Services is a lifeline for those family caregivers needing respite

Most caregivers find themselves in their new roles out of an instinctive, loving response to the needs of an adult loved one who requires some day-to-day level of care. Because it's rarely planned for, and seldom eased into, many caregivers look up weeks or months later needing a break. We created our Adult Day Services to provide the respite all caregivers need to continue being of most value to the loved one they're tending to.

The health aides, licensed nurses and activity specialists that make up our state-licensed program offer participants both group and individual activities to provide stimulation as well as exercise—and the break you need without guilt.

Our compassionate nursing staff manages medications and provides mental and physical health consultations, while health aides manage personal care. If ongoing therapy is part of a participant's schedule, it is integrated seamlessly into his or her day at our on-campus outpatient clinic.

Open to the entire community, our Adult Day Services are available weekdays from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Participants can choose the number of days they want care for a daily fee of \$91.75 per day.


Nogales Crossroads Mission Easter Lunch Saturday, March 30 9:00 a.m. – 2:00 p.m.
