Passing the Peace

During Lent, I was teaching a class called "Liturgy of the Ordinary" based on the book by the same name. The class took the ordinary things we do every day (such as waking up, getting out of bed, and brushing our teeth) and made them sacred by helping us discover the holiness of our every day.

On this one particular day, our topic was "Fighting with My Husband." It didn't sound like a great chapter until we found out it was about peace. The author of the book, Tish Harrison Warren, says, "I am increasingly aware that I cannot seek God's peace and mission in the world without beginning right where I am, in my home, in my neighborhood, in my church, with the real people right around me."

Peace begins at home. Even Jesus said so. In Matthew 5, Jesus said if you approach the altar of God (or a communion service) and realize that you have something against another, go and make peace with that person first.

Which brings us to the "Passing of the Peace" in our worship service. Yes, we get to meet and greet someone we don't know. But the main purpose of the passing of the peace is to turn to that person next to you and say, "The peace of Christ be with you."

By extending the peace of Christ to one another, we are acting out how we are called to live - to practice peace in our everyday lives, to bring the peace of our Peacemaker to all that we know, even in the small moments of our day.

"In the end, this practice each Sunday - the passing of the peace - is a prayer. We are asking that God would do something we cannot, so that we can extend peace, not of our own making, but of Christ's, our Reconciler."

So next time you extend the peace to someone in our worship service, look them in the eye and extend the peace of Christ that surpasses all understanding. Because "let there be peace on earth and let it begin with me" begins in that moment in church.

Notes from the April 8 Grapevine

FINANCE - Revenue shortfall for the 2019 budget is 11%. Giving is very seasonal: Holidays (and Fall and Winter) bring in more contributions, summers less, while winter folks are gone and others are on vacation. Treasurer estimated each family member unit has given \$1,200.00.

Weekly reports are placed in the bulletin to let the congregation know how the church is doing with respect to revenue, and to encourage folks to step up. Online donations are not counted; they are in the bank.

What about Foundation money? The interest earned each year is available for Session to use for capital repairs on the church, such as roof repairs, air conditioners, etc. It is not included in the operational budget.

FLOWERS - What is the situation regarding flowers? The item was taken out of the budget as part of budget cuts. The alternative is for personal donations to cover the cost (an estimated \$45.00 plus tax for each Sunday). In the recent past, the church has spent an estimated \$2,000 per year on these flowers. Information is available near the Women's table. An alternative is to create a calendar signup sheet divided into months with week line shown below. Otherwise, the church will not have flowers to give to the homebound and sick congregants.

STAFF - Are replacements being undertaken for employees leaving? The search, and subsequent interviews, for a part-time choir director, a part time accompanist, and a part-time custodian are underway.

VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL - Bible school will be held this summer. Estimated cost is \$2,000. Funds do not come from the budget. Funds come from designated gifts.

MEMBERSHIP - Concern was expressed about people leaving the church. A membership committee is to be created. Two persons volunteered. One suggested remedy from the past is to hold a Saturday service, which has been tried and did not succeed.

OTHER COMMENTS - People are not accepting our situation. Question: Are we willing to step up and fill vacancies? More volunteers are needed.

We need to make a chart for donations (giving), and place it where all can see it.

We need to stop referring to our winter congregants as "visitors" as it is not inclusive and welcoming.

We have a responsibility to treat people with kindness and care, reaching out to all people and to welcome their presence here.


- Celebration of Communion by Intinction from June through September.

Although I am moving to Maine with Joel, as of now I will continue to work for VPC remotely doing the Valley Voice, NOC directory updates, our website and sound recordings, and a few other things until further notice. If/when something is going to change we will let you know. I am going to miss seeing you all on Sunday mornings

and throughout the week! Thanks so much for the warmth and kindness you have all shown me over the years. This is a very special congregation unlike any I've ever known, and I'm very sad to be moving away.

In the past I have talked about using an application called LastPass to store passwords in a secure way. The application has made some updates recently and I think it's better than ever.

LastPass has always been a program that securely stores login information so you don't have to remember, or write down (which is very insecure and easy to lose), all of your usernames and passwords, not to mention the website addresses you have to go to in order to use those logins. Now, LastPass offers even more. It's a place to store a variety of information, including sensitive information, that you may frequently type into form fields on websites, or that you simply may need to refer to now and then. Examples would include billing and shipping addresses, drivers license or social security numbers for you, your spouse, or your kids, bank account numbers, credit card numbers, and more. You are able to look this information up using a website or an app on your phone, and you can have LastPass fill in form fields online using that information if you choose. All of the information is easily searched by typing in a few letters. I cannot tell you the number of times I've tried to log into something and couldn't remember the password (because, as you know, they normally fill it in for you - until they don't!). Thankfully, I now pull out my phone (or open a web browser) and go to LastPass to get that information no matter where I am.

A feature that I haven't used often, but will since the latest update, is the browser extension. If you allow LastPass to install an extension into your website browser (which I recommend) they will place a small icon in the right edge of the top bar. You can click on the icon to see a drop-down list of options to fill in fields, or to save information. This will be very convenient when I'm trying to ship a gift and want to select an address other than my own for the shipping field, or when I want to log into a site where I have multiple accounts. Same for selecting which credit card I want to use.

One of the very useful features of LastPass is that it will create super-strong, unique passwords for you - and then store them - so you don't have to use the same few passwords for everything. Using the same password across various sites is extremely unsafe because one hack exposes several of your accounts. If you allow LastPass to set unique passwords for each account, especially sensitive accounts like bank logins, then your data is much safer. You can also set it up to use multi-factor authentications for those super sensitive accounts. This means in addition to needing a password, the site will require a second login step (like sending a code to your phone that you must then type in online) to make sure it's really you logging into the account. Tedious, yes, but extremely secure.

I know there will be a whole lot of people out there who are uncomfortable storing all of this information on the computer or online, but LastPass takes extreme care to protect your data. From LastPass: "Your data is encrypted and decrypted at the device level. Data stored in your vault is kept secret, even from LastPass. Your master password, and the keys used to encrypt and decrypt data, are never sent to LastPass' servers, and are never accessible by LastPass." This makes it incredibly difficult (dare I say impossible? Probably not, but close) to hack into all your passwords and other sensitive information. However, make sure you don't forget your Master Password!

The best part? LastPass has a free version that will do everything I've described. At one time the paid version (\$3/month or \$36/year) offered additional features on their phone app, but if I'm reading correctly, those features have since been incorporated into the free version (yay!). Try it out, maybe starting with information that isn't sensitive, and see how easy, convenient, and secure it really is. Then, burn those written lists of passwords!

Patio Sale News

As a wrap-up to our 38th annual Patio Sale, we celebrated and enjoyed each other and some great food at our March 26 potluck dinner. It was a fun time recognizing individual contributions while having a chuckle or two listening to Eloise's jokes.

At our annual Department Head follow-up meeting on March 26, we had a very positive exchange of ideas and decided we needed to:

- Find a different tent vendor who could better meet our needs at an acceptable cost.
- Do a better job of separating the "good from the bad" at our sorts and pickups.
- Find a source of outside help capable of assisting with picking up and moving heavy furniture.
- Be sure Department Heads know it is their responsibility to keep their respective volunteers informed of sort dates and other important information.

In April, two of the Amigos met with the Mission Committee and discussed ways we could better support each other's efforts and strengthen our relationship. We agreed that we would put together a report that shows the total number of dollars raised by the Patio Sale over our 38 years. That contribution number could be used to promote both groups. We also decided to have members attend each other's meetings.

Our gross sales number for the year so far has grown to \$81,400 as a result of internet sales and other miscellaneous sales. We are projecting that we will hit \$86,000 gross by year's end with the addition of our Holiday Sale and other sales. We are grateful to all our volunteers who make this level of success possible.

Financial Update

The Finance Committee participated in the April 8 Grapevine and hopefully addressed some members' concerns regarding the current financial status. Please know that the committee is available to answer questions. The Committee met on April 17 to review the year-to-date financial status as of March 31, 2019. The financials show that we are remaining in a positive position as is anticipated at this time of the year.

The Finance Committee is watching the results closely each month. When we look at budget to actual, the revenues are down less than .5% from the year to date budget and expenses are also down approximately .5%. This puts us slightly ahead of budget as shown below:

Of course, this is the strongest part of the year when our winter residents are still here and activities are abundant. April should remain strong as we were moving through the Lenten and Easter season. Likely we will see a downturn in May as people travel north. We hope that as people travel this summer they will remember their pledge commitments to keep the operations of the church moving along.

As previously reported, for 2019, the finance committee recommended to Session that we pay the annual per capita payment only as received. To-date we have paid \$7,413 that was collected in January through March which covers approximately 184 of the members. Based on the membership number of 496 on December 31, 2017, we will be assessed \$19,949, so we have only collected 37% of our assessment. **Hopefully, many more members will step up and pay the \$40.22 per member per capita** (note: associate members pay their per capita through their home church).

We greet you in the name of our Savior, Jesus Christ! We hope that you are well, seeing God at work, revealing grace and truth in the midst of the turmoil in our world. We want to thank you again for your partnership with us in ministry and the church in South Sudan. The prayers and financial support from your church are a big encouragement to us and enable us to continue to serve with the people of South Sudan. We are very grateful, and we hope that God's work here is an encouragement to you also!

Bob is teaching Spiritual Formation this semester to two classes – the junior degree students and a class of diploma students. He traveled to Rwanda with some colleagues in February to explore how Nile Theological College (NTC) can more fully incorporate principles of reconciliation into their curriculum. The college held its first graduation since moving to Juba in December, and now some of those graduates are being sent out to plant churches in remote places. A new class of students started the four-year program in January. Kristi went to the town of Pochalla in January to conduct a healing and reconciliation workshop with some colleagues. We praise God for bringing inner healing and helping people be able to forgive – our most recent newsletter shares more about that workshop. Our church partner (SSPEC) hopes to organize more of these healing and reconciliation workshops, because so many people have been traumatized by war. Please pray for God to guide the process, open doors, and provide resources.

Thank you again for your faithful partnership with us! God provided all the financial support that we needed to meet our support goal in 2018 – thank you for your participation that helped meet that goal. We truly depend on your prayers for us and for the ministry through the church in South Sudan. We know that God desires to bring hope and healing through His people to this land that has suffered much. We pray each week for your church, that God's grace would fill all of you as you seek to share God's love and be His hands and feet in your community. If there are any specific ways that we can be praying for you, please let us know. We are hoping to visit you this year during our Interpretation Assignment (Furlough). We will follow up with another email within the next month or two. We would most likely come in the fall, late October or early November, if that seems to work for you. We were sad not to visit you in 2016, and grieved by the death of your pastor.




