#### **Quilts for Ukraine!**

A story of a man's love for his mother and country.

During the gathering of our March Mission Quilters, one of our Quilter Volunteer, Karen Mitchell, shared with the group that her husband, Mike Mitchell, having a full-blooded Polish mother, had all he could bear without helping out the fleeing Ukrainian mothers and children from the destruction of their homes and towns.

Mike and his military buddies left for Ukraine March 25<sup>th</sup> to rent large vans, to drive refugees to a safe place. He informed his wife that he was willing to pack some guilts in his suitcase, even take another suitcase if the VPC quilters wanted to donate quilts.

Of course, when the group was asked if they wanted to donate quilts, there was a loud YES. We took all the darker colored quilts and bundled them up for Karen to take home to Mike.

Our quilters, being the generous souls they are, handed Karen money to use when she and Mike went shopping for the needed items listed to buy for the refugees. Mike had two full suitcases to lug along on his mission of love and concern for the war battered Ukrainians arriving in Poland. Mike and his friends were able to be in Poland for one week. cont. on page 8

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

#### Sabbath

The women's circle Bible study next year is on Sabbath. I have been asked to speak at the Presbyterian Women's Spring Retreat this month to introduce the topic of Sabbath.

Sabbath has many meanings and layers, but right now to me Sabbath means rest. Rest started with God who rested on the seventh day of creation. I think of Elijah, who was exhausted after serving God in an intense battle with false idols and hid in a cave to sleep. God's angel gently attended him with food and water.

After leading the people out of Egypt, God says to a tired Moses, "My Presence will be with you, and I will give you rest."

Everybody's favorite Psalm (Psalm 23) advocates rest: "He makes me lie down in green pastures, he leads me beside quiet waters, he refreshes my soul."

Jesus calls all who are weary and burdened to come to him, and they will "find rest for their souls."

And of course, Jesus took many opportunities to get away from the crowds to rest and pray. "Very early in the morning while it was still dark, [Jesus] went out....and prayed." Jesus even took naps in storms.

At times, he would take the disciples with him to withdraw and rest from the crowds. After the resurrection, the disciples took their own emotional rest by going fishing.



Even the Apostle Paul, known for his intensity and exciting life as a follower of Jesus, took a rest between his 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> missionary trips. (We are not sure how long he rested, but guesses range from 6 to 36 months.)

There is great value in an unhurried heart and body.

Your pastors are taking Sabbath time this month. Pastor Craig is taking vacation time for 10 days the first part of May. I am taking two weeks off at the end of the month to "play" with some friends and visit my mom in Minneapolis who will turn 100 on June 2. #### Just Sit and Take It All In



Do you ever just sit and absorb the moment? Do you ever watch the leaves just blow in the wind? Or flowers start to bloom?

In April, my daughter was married outside, on a ranch just outside of Prescott. Pastor Diane made this special day even more special by officiating the ceremony. Just before the wedding ceremony started, there was a brief quiet time before walking down the hill to our seats. There was a breeze, but not too strong. The air seemed refreshing and clean. Past the yard where the ceremony was to be held, were long horn bulls watching the people gather. Two doves flew overhead. It was incredible to just take it all in, and just stop for a moment to watch all that was going on and just breathe. The day was beautiful and happy for all, and all seemed perfect.

What happens when it is not? Do we still stop and just take a breath? The world is surely different after COVID, emotions are not the same. We see much more anxiety and depression. So, what is different? Why are we different?

The informal meaning of the word decompress is to calm down and relax. This would be similar to an adult time-out, in a way. Did we forget to breathe? A goal to decompress is to take one day, if you can, a week and just sit for one hour, maybe outside or by a warm sunny window, and do nothing but sit. Take it all in, from your breathing, to how you feel sitting, to the weather and temperature, to what is around you. Not only does this decompress us, physically we can change our blood pressure, our pulse, and our muscles. Just sit and take it all in.

### A Volunteer's Text to His Family from Poland!

Karen Mitchell shared a text from her husband Mike Mitchell had written to his family.

"The refugees are in need food and water, as well as gloves, socks and raincoats. All of the men are required to stay back in the Ukraine and fight. It is the women and children only passing through the border.

We hand out water, food, etc. to 2-3000 people a day as they pass by.

Unusual food supplies are streaming in from all over Europe. Truckloads of food arrive each day from England, Belgium and Germany. The trucks come and dump food off, then take off again. We try to move the cases/boxes off the street and into the tents as it comes in.

The trucks are full of different items each day. Sometimes they have potato chips and soda or uncooked noodles, even candy.

Luckily, there are organizations that serve pizza, soup and sandwiches. There are always bottles of water available to hand out.

Sometimes it takes several days for the refugees to travel short distances on the Ukrainian side of the border. Once they get to the border, the lines can be over a mile long. Many people are in need of healthcare.

It is very sad to know that over 4 million people are displaced. We watch thousands of people pass before us every day trying to escape the war.

The volunteers work up to 20 hours a day to support the refugee movement. Due to curfew on the Ukrainian side, people stop coming around midnight and don't start flowing again until 4 A.M.

Heavy rain is predicted for the next 14 days. This makes it very difficult for the refugees. It is also difficult for the volunteers to support the refugees in heavy rain, wind and snow. Today the tents were blowing down hindering the protection for refugees, volunteers and supplies.

Karen's quilting group sent several quilts to help warm the refugees. Today we provided a quilt to a man that was near death in the woods on the Ukrainian side. The nurses were hoping to warm him up with the quilt and get him medics. Many simple items are in short supply in this region. "

Each day of volunteering brought a different experience to Mike. A moment of pleasure for Mike was when the man next to him was serving Kielbasa, just like his Polish mother prepared for their family.

#### Most Emotional Part of Mike Mitchell's Poland trip

Mike met up with a Ukrainian translator, and she took him to a mall with thousands of refugees sleeping on cots. It was high security, so he had to get a pass to enter and was not allowed to take pictures. Unfortunately, Mike said this was the most emotional part of his whole trip.

The translator walked with him around the facility and asked if people needed a quilt, only if they saw families in need. The women literally cried as they received the quilts. Mike's wife had only seen Mike cry a few times in his life, and he said this event brought tears to his eyes.

Karen, Mike's wife, thinks these families appreciated the love that went into these quilts and the practicality of needing the warmth. There were many babies in this area, so the small quilts came in handy, Thank you, ladies for all your hard work.

Delivering the quilts to the refugees was an amazing experience for Mike.

### Mike Mitchell, back from Poland!

What a surprise we had at quilting today. Karen brought Mike in to meet our quilting group. We were thrilled to see them. Mike thanked the quilting women for giving him the privilege to deliver quilts to those who so desperately needed them. Delivering the quilts was the most memorable part of his trip and the most memorable of our giving, so far. None of us know what God has in store for our quilts in the future.

Mike said our quilts only weighed 20 pounds. He couldn't have taken more quilts though, because he had one suitcase that weighed 100 pounds. He also took 10 bullet proof vests that went to Kiev. The medical supplies that the couple bought with funds donated to them went to Kiev as well. They were well supplied with medical supplies at both train stations in Poland where many of the refugees first arrive. However, medical supplies were really needed in Kiev, so they were sent to Kiev.

We're glad to see Mike safe back home with his happy wife.

#### Your Ukraine Dollars

As of April 20, our congregation has donated \$23,333.25 for Ukraine relief.

How is your money being used?

The full amount you have given is going to Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA) designated for Ukraine. In situations such as Ukraine, PDA's role is finding organizations on the ground in the communities that need help.

PDA has five ecumenical partners in Eastern and Central Europe addressing the humanitarian crisis. Recipients include Friends of Community of Sant' Egidio (In Ukraine), Hungarian Reformed Church Aid (the PDA of the Hungarian Reformed Church), and Lutheran World Federation.

PDA has extensive experience responding to refugees in the United States and abroad. A quickly growing issue in the countries taking in Ukrainian refugees is the need for housing, as it becomes obvious many will not be able to go home anytime soon, if at all. PDA's specialty is long-term response, and its partner ministries in the Presbyterian Mission Agency and the Office of the General Assembly will be part of a broad, sustained response, as well as advocacy offices in Washington and at the United Nations.

### Operation Mobilization in Ukraine

The conflict in Ukraine has evolved over several years and through multiple stages, and this humanitarian crises is now critical. Many people were not prepared for war and have found themselves and their families shell-shocked- not just by rockets and gunfire, but by the pain of separation from loved ones and the uncertainty of abandoning their homes and livelihoods.



#### Trip to the Casa Vida Nueva para Niños

On March 12, Reed Olson escorted 10 people from the Green Valley area to Casa Vida Nueva para Niños (Orphanage) in Nogales, Sonora MX. This was the first coordinated visit since October 2019. The group spent the day with the children, listened to a presentation of their story, watched two singing performances by the children, toured their home, and ate a wonderful lunch. Support from VPC and RISE Scholastic Achievements was acknowledged for help in paying for all high school costs, laptops, and college / trade school expenses for these orphaned children. Currently there are three students in high school and two students in college. Next year there will be eight in high school and four in college. Traveling back home took only 10 minutes to cross the border. RISE thanks everyone for their kindness and love in making a huge difference in supporting the operations of the facility and educational lives of these wonderful children. On April 7, 2022, seven Mexican families brought children for treatment at St. Andrew's Children's Clinic in Nogales, Arizona. This was the first Clinic since the start of COVID in 2020. Laura Romero, the Executive Director, said the Clinic is up and running with enthusiastic, efficient staff and volunteers. The families are thrilled to have the medical help for their children.

The children came for Orthopedic help. All went very well. The next clinic on May 5, will serve 20 children with orthopedic, pediatric and/or speech problems. The Customs Border Protection personnel were able to process the families across the border efficiently and will continue to do so every first Thursday when children come from Mexico for help at St. Andrew's Clinic.

The St. Andrew's Episcopal Church in Nogales has limited the space available to the Clinic. Therefore, it is too small for Clinic services. In April and May, Laura will spend time and effort searching Nogales, Arizona, for a bigger space in which to provide their clinic services. She hopes to finalize her search by this fall so the clinic can help up to 50 children. The Clinic staff and volunteers supports the efforts to expand their services which, in the future, might reach 250. Growth must come slowly and safely, but the Customs Border Protection agency is encouraging the Clinic help more families.

Laura is extremely grateful to Valley Presbyterian Church for our prayers, support and donations. This will be a stressful era of transition during which many Mexican Children will continue to get medical help at St. Andrew's Children's Clinic.



#### Your Presbyterian Theological Seminaries at a Glance

Everyday life has changed significantly since the first of your Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) theological seminaries were founded in 1794 and 1812. Over the years, additional theological institutions were established, carrying on the Presbyterian tradition of providing educated leadership for congregations from the Atlantic Ocean to the Pacific Rim. Each institution is represented on the Committee On Theological Education (COTE) where institutional representatives meet with General Assembly-elected members.



Today, your 12 seminaries have been entrusted to provide the educational foundation pastors need to be able to preach, teach, pray and lead.

#### Together they:

- Prepare men and women to be pastors, educators and musicians for congregations
- Provide continuing education and advanced degree programs for ministers of the Word and Sacrament and for lay church leaders.
- Serve as centers for theological discourse, reflection and research for the benefit of the wider church during changing times.

As we continue into the 21st century, each of your theological institutions will continue to provide a Presbyterian ethos for learning and spiritual formation — theological education in the Reformed tradition.

### At long last -- SSPEC General Assembly

Last week the South Sudan Presbyterian Evangelical Church (SSPEC) held their General Assembly (GA). That sounds like it would be a rather dry and officious meeting, but the long days were filled with lots of worship, prayer, animated discussion, laughter, and of course reports. One thing I enjoyed most was watching people from different parts of the country rejoice in seeing one another again. The repeated handshaking and expressions of delight and surprise as people from remote regions reconnected showed the deep level of connection that people had when they were all displaced or studying together in Khartoum.

Since Presbyterian structure includes governing by elders and by group decisions and not by a single authority, the General Assembly is a significant governing body and where a lot of the decisions are made, and reports are given. Representatives from all SSPEC congregations in South Sudan and also of South Sudanese in neighboring countries are expected to attend. For SSPEC, it was the first time since 2013 that they have been able to hold a General Assembly, due mostly to insecurity in South Sudan. They had hoped to hold the meeting in October, but it was postponed because many people were not able to attend.

### PRESBYTERIAN MISSION

I was told by a number of people that discussions would get heated, and it might feel like people were about to start fighting, but then everyone would cool down and the matter would get resolved. "That is just the way it is in GA", they said. And sure enough, I watched discussions play out like that. People were given an opportunity to ask questions or to share their opinions, and after a period of discussion there would be a conclusion, or they would move on. I appreciated that even those who disagreed about a certain topic could laugh together later.

On the last day of the GA was the election for new leadership. The executive committee is now completely new, and the previous leadership showed humble grace in stepping aside and supporting the new leadership. Everyone I talked to seemed pleased with the election and to support the leadership, whether their choice of candidate had been selected or not. The day after GA ended, the old and new leaders met together to hand over the responsibilities and to share information. At the end of the week, the entire old and new executive committees came together to pray and to express their hopes for the church going forward.

Thank you to those of you who prayed for this meeting, and please continue to pray for wisdom and vision for the new leadership as they seek to encourage and enable the spiritual mission of the church. We pray that God's people here will grow in unity as they focus together on Jesus Christ, our source of true life and peace.

### Studies show eating with others keeps you healthier

An abundance of research links social interactions with senior wellbeing. Eating is an area where the impact of isolation can be particularly destructive to senior health.

Not only does nutrition play a critical role in fostering healthy aging in older adults, but lack of proper nutrition and social engagement can have serious consequences. One study reveals that single adults over the age 50 ate fewer vegetables every day than peers who were in partnerships. These same people were also at increased risk for developing diabetes.

To look at the larger picture, the more isolated seniors are, the less likely they are to eat healthy, nutritious, and varied diets. Unfortunately, the implications of eating for one can be huge, and may include everything from weight loss to decreased immune function.

Even eating alone in the company of others can help stave off feelings of isolation. It's more than the meatloaf and cookies that draws senior citizens to congregate meals at community centers across the nation. It's something that doesn't show up on the daily menu. And it's something that many seniors can't get their daily dosage of at home.

#### **Encouraging Social Eating**

There are some things caregivers can do to help their aging loved ones simultaneously improve their nutrition while deriving the benefits of socialization, including the following techniques:

- If your aging loved one lives in a senior living community, encourage him or her to take meals in the dining room as opposed to eating alone in their room or apartment.
- If your loved one lives independently, look into congregate meals offered by senior centers, churches, and other organizations, and encourage your loved one to participate. Many adult day care centers also offer healthy meals for adults with a side dish of companionship. Almost as important as the nutrition served up at senior centers is the conversation shared around the dinner tables.

The Senior Lunch Program at the Posada Life Community Center is designed especially for individuals age 60 and over. 




