A Trip to The Holy Land April 8 – April 16, 2024 Submitted by: Pastor Craig Lindsey

Pastor Craig is putting together a trip for us to go to Israel, and we need to begin making reservations.

Israel: Galilee, Bethlehem, Jerusalem, the Dead Sea for less than \$4000.00.

<u>Monday-Tuesday, April 8-9, 2024</u>, fly Tucson to Tel Aviv, Israel. Drive to the seaside city of Netanya for dinner.

Wednesday, <u>April 10</u>, breakfast then tour Joppa, home of Jonah, and where Simon Peter dreamed of the Great Sheet being let down from heaven leading to Baptism of Gentiles. Drive along the coastal road to Caesarea, built by Herod the Great, where Peter was imprisoned. Visit the Crusaders' Fortress and Roman ruins, then on to Mt. Carmel where Elijah fought the Prophets of Baal. Lunch in a Druze Village, before heading to Megiddo in the Valley of Armageddon an ancient city inhabited continuously from 6,000 to 500 BC. Visit the Archeological site, continue to Nazareth where Jesus preached, continuing to Cana, continuing to Tiberius, where we will check in for dinner and hotel.

Thursday, April 11, Breakfast then board a fishing boat on the Sea of Galilee to Ginosar the site of the Igal Alon Museum which houses a fishing boat found in the Sea of Galilee, carbon dated to the time of Jesus. Next a stop at Capernaum, center of Jesus' ministry in Galilee, followed by a St. Peter Fish lunch on the shore of the lake. Head north to Caesarea Philippi where Peter identified Jesus as being the Messiah, drive through the Golan Heights where the guide will tell the story of the 6 Day War & Yom Kippur War. We will drive on to Yardenit, the Baptismal site for pilgrims on the Jordan River, returning to hotel for dinner.

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

From Pastor Craig

Years ago, the "Hi & Lois" cartoon-strip portrayed Dad & Mom waving goodbye to one set of visitors, while the kids facing the opposite direction greeted the next arrivals. There is an old adage, that "Humans plan and God laughs!" In the season of Lent when non-year-round residents are here, we refloored the Chancel and retiled the roof; removed the old, installed and dedicated a new Organ; held our 42nd Patio Sale; Holy Week and Easter! At the same time, we mourned the passing of 9 leaders who carried our church during difficult times; the departure of Wes Moulton for a full-time position; the death of my wife's mom; and I had a cold so severe as to miss the Sunday worship which is Easter (sort of like missing the Superbowl).

What this calls attention to is the Nursery finger-play of "Here is the church and here is the Steeple, open the doors and see all the people..." It is not "open the doors and see the preachers!" Pastor Diane and I do a great job and enjoy working together, but the truth of the matter is that we pray, and we provide pastoral leadership, but the work accomplished in the above paragraph could not have been possible without the volunteers and our administrative and custodial staff who get the job done. In Bible Study, we regularly mention Gideon and Moses, Jesus and the 12, with only passing reference to the six hundred-thousand-Hebrews in the Wilderness who carried the Tabernacle and fought the battles, to the crowds who listened to Jesus as being four to five thousand believers fed with 5 loaves and 2 fish, or to the three thousand who were sent out in pairs to work miracles in the world. Thank you for all you do as the Church!

On the front page and continued on page 3 of the Valley Voice, I have included the itinerary for Valley Presbyterian Church to travel to the Holy Lands in April 8-16, 2024! This will be a once in a lifetime experience that I hope you will take advantage of. At the conclusion of the Passover Seder meal there is a promise for the future: "Next year in Jerusalem!" And next year, right after Easter, we will be in Jerusalem!

PEACE IS IN SIGHT

Thank you to those who attended the showing of the film **Peace Is in Sight** about the work at the Clinic in South Sudan, which Pastor Craig helped to found. This was a simple idea, that while offering Western Medicine for Restoration of Sight to the Blind, to provide the opportunity for peace. The agony of peacemaking work is that the people involved must decide to stop hating the other, that the burden of anger and resentment is too heavy to continue to carry. Then, and only then, will the gestures of people to create peace become real.

A Trip to The Holy Land in 2024 Continued from front page:

Friday, <u>April 12</u>, breakfast, then drive to Jerusalem. Our first stop will be Gideon's Spring where Gideon chose his army of 300 by observing how they drank from the spring. Then on to Beit-She'an, where King Saul and Jonathan died, and a recently excavated amphitheater and Roman Scythopolis. Stop for lunch, then atop Mt. Scopus for a view of the Golden City, before checking into our hotel in Jerusalem for dinner.

Saturday, <u>April 13</u>, breakfast, drive to the Dead Sea. Explore the Fortress at Masada, then to Ein Gedi: "Spring of the Goat" an oasis where David hid from Saul's Army, and God defeated the enemies of King Jehosophat by praise and worship. Continue to the Qumran Caves where the Dead Sea Scrolls were discovered. Stop for lunch and "floating" in the Dead Sea. Return to Jerusalem for Shabbat Dinner.

Sunday, <u>April 14</u>, visit Temple Mount with explanation of the two Temples and the Muslim Mosque. Visit to the Wailing Wall, then tour of the Rabbinic Tunnels leading through the Second Temple era. Travel the journey of Jesus past the stone rejected by the builders, move on to the Judgement Hall of Pilate. Visit the Pool of Bethesda, Stephen's Gate, St. Ann's Church. Visit Southern Wall Excavations which were the main entrance for common folk, whereas Priests and Levites had their own entrance from the higher eastern side. From here Jesus drove out the Money Changers, which is also the place of Peter's sermon on Pentecost, we spend the remainder of the day surrounding the birth of Christ with a visit to Bethlehem.

Monday, <u>April 15</u>, after breakfast, a panoramic view of the city, visiting Mount Moriah, Dome of the Rock. Mount of Olives, Garden at Gethsemane, visit The Upper Room, while we walk the Via Delarosa and visit the Church of the Holy Sepulcher. The climax of the day is a trip to Golgotha and to the Garden Tomb, where we share Communion, before dinner at the City View Restaurant on Mount Scopus and travel to the airport.

Tuesday, April 16, Arrive back in the USA.

Anticipated cost not to exceed \$4,000.00/person for ALL round-trip air travel from Tucson, travel in the Holy Lands, meals, double hotel accommodations.

This does not cover tips to Tour Guides & Driver, non-tour extras, or purchases.

PLANNING COMMITTEE BEGINS

Session has approved the creation of a new committee to dream new dreams and investigate new visions!

You folks do not need to be told that in 2015 Valley Presbyterian Church ran into a wall. The ways in which things had been working, no longer worked well. An Administrative Commission began working alongside our Session and fairly severe cuts were made to all spending, staffing and program. We went through a variety of leaders and staff, then Interim Pastor Mark led his own process called "The Journey Ahead Group" (JAG), which in management circles would be called a SWOT Analysis of "Strengths, Weakness, Other Threats." Enough thanks and recognition cannot be given to Pastor Diane and the leadership who carried us through and prayed for us during this time.

The "low-hanging fruit" of ripe concerns have been picked, worked through, and processed!

- The Sound System now allows worshippers to hear more clearly.
- Burned out light fixtures were upgraded to LED Lighting.
- The Chancel Choir has regrown, providing complex fun music with up to 60 voices.
- The Tiled Chancel allows music to resonate.
- Upgraded Internet gave us Zoom for meetings and Bible Studies, Live Stream Worship, etc.
- The Faith & Health Committee, Parish Nurse and Pastors ministered to us throughout COVID19.
- The Carillon was updated with new software and rings out to our community.
- The Exterior of the building was painted top to bottom.
- A computerized sign marquee was installed on Camino del Sol.
- The Columbarium cleaned up and records organized.
- Balancing increased costs, the Patio Sale has continually increased gross sales.
- The Parking lots were resurfaced, and lanes repainted.
- Monthly, we celebrate the Sacrament with our home-bound and in assisted care facilities.
- Visitors describe our church as loving, caring, with warmth and excitement.
- The tile roofing, which threatened to fall, was replaced, and upgraded for the next 50 years.
- Half of the Air Conditioners on the roof were replaced with new ones.
- Outdoor lighting was rewired and provides safety for those staying late.
- The worn-out 2000 Organ has been replaced with a 2023 state of the art Digital Organ.
- Multiple Bible Studies and other classed are providing faith formation and education.
- Prayer Ministry and Stephen Ministry meet regularly to hold our church in faith.
- NOCs have been reorganized and are alerting the pastors to their concerns.
- Musical concerts and celebrations are being provided through Valley Presbyterian to our community.
- New Photo Directories have been produced and integrated with the Church Database.
- New Members are continually joining the church.
- Congregational Care Committees have direct access to the Pastors, Session, and Deacons.
- Cost for purchase of the Solar Array System has been collected for July 2023 full repayment.

Over the 45-year history of our church, transitions and changes have often come at the suggestion of the pastors or the forcing of circumstances. Instead, the Planning Committee will try to proactively envision issues and alternatives for how we might proceed. Part of this work is traditional Long-Range Strategic Planning for what developments need to take place, before what others, who need to grant permission and costs. Another significant part is Systemic Planning, to discuss how else things could be done.





The setting: England during the 1520's.


The three most powerful men of the land




Caring for those in our congregation Faith & Health/Parish Nurse May 2023

Medical Minute: 2/3 of the human body is water. Stay hydrated as the weather becomes warm.



Stress can be defined as the brain's response to any demand. Many things can trigger this, including change, which can be positive or negative, real or perceived. Changes can be mild as in performing in a contest or winning a game, to major changes such as marriage or divorce, serious illness/terminal illness, or an accident. We are now seeing these changes with inflation and the world's economy. Changes can be short or long term. Other changes are extreme, such as exposure to violence, and can lead to traumatic stress reactions.

There are at least three different types of stress, all of which carry physical and mental health risks:


Routine stress related to the pressures of work, family, and other daily responsibilities.

Stress brought on by a sudden negative change, such as losing a job, divorce, or illness. Traumatic stress, experienced in an event like a major accident, war, assault, or a natural disaster where one may be seriously hurt or threatened.

The body responds to each type of stress in similar ways. Different people may feel it in different ways. For example, some people experience mainly digestive symptoms, while others have headaches, sleeplessness, depressed mood, anger and irritability. People under chronic stress are prone to more frequent and severe viral infections, such as the flu or colds, and vaccines, such as the flu shot, are less effective for them.

Of all the types of stress, changes in health from routine stress may be hardest to notice at first. Because the source of routine stress tends to be more constant, the body gets no clear signal to return to normal functioning. Over time, constant or continued strain on your body from routine stress may lead to serious health problems, such as heart disease, high blood pressure, depression, anxiety disorder, gastrointestinal problems, and other illnesses. Please be observant of stress and the changes that it may cause to your overall well-being. The effects of stress build up over time. What are your stressors and what can you do to reduce them?

POCKET PRAYER CLOTH MINISTRY

The Prayer Ministry team, along with the Creative Hands group, is starting a new mission at Valley Presbyterian Church called the *Pocket Prayer Cloth Ministry*. What is a pocket prayer cloth? It is a small (3x4 inch) knitted, crocheted, or quilted square with a symbol or message attached. It can be kept in a pocket or purse, by a bedside or chair, or even in the car. It is used to promote prayer and to help remind every person who receives one that there is hope and peace in every situation. The cloths are blessed and prayed over before they are given out. The Prayer Ministry team also prays for everyone who receives a prayer square. A prayer poem is included that states:

> This is a pocket prayer cloth, made especially for you. To feel God's Love and Grace, in everything you do. Lift your cares and sorrows and lay them at God's Feet. For His divine comfort is so precious and sweet. May this little prayer square help calm all your fears, And don't be afraid to use it to wipe away your tears.

There is also a guide that uses the sides of the cloth to encourage you to pray for HOPE, THANKSGIVING, PEACE, and ENDURANCE.

Our goal is to make these squares available to anyone who is going through a tough time or who needs a little encouragement and love. We would like to give them to any visitor who comes through our doors. We want members to take them to give to friends, neighbors, family, or just someone you meet. What a great message that we can send to the community about Valley Presbyterian Church: We are a loving, caring congregation that believes in prayer and the message of God's Healing Power.

How do I get involved in this new ministry? First, we need lots of help making the squares. If you are a knitter, crocheter, or quilter, please consider adding prayer squares to your project list. They are easy to make and take a very short time. We have patterns available for all. Come and join Creative Hands. Second, take a couple squares and give them to anyone who may need one. Third, pray for everyone who receives one or needs one. Together we can make the world a better place.

St, Andrews' Children's Clinic Mission - May 2023

Laura Romero, St. Andrews' Children's Clinic Executive director, reports that there were many families who showed up to attend the April 6 clinic. It was necessary to limit the number, again, to 50 children because of limited space and congestion. She knows the clinic needs more rooms to accommodate the numbers of children who need services. Remodeling and building rooms are on the top of her list. However, she is waiting to be sure the building will continue to be available beyond the one-year commitment.

Re-naming the clinic is also a priority. This issue is on the agenda for the June Board Meeting.

A new service will be provided by Dr. Michael Fritz, who travels from Cleveland to Hermosillo, Sonora, Mexico. He will donate his time the second weekend of November, to provide reconstructive surgery for teenagers who need the bridge bone in their nose built up. These children had Cleft palate surgery as babies but need the rebuilding process completed. Although his time is donated, the use of the Hermosillo Hospital must be funded by the Clinic. For this surgery, the children need a hotel room in which to stay after the day's surgery. Again, the clinic covers the cost.

Another doctor, Jordan Jenesa, travels from Hermosillo to Nogales to serve children who need orthopedic services. Her specialty is that of caring for children who have had Cleft Palate and Cleft Lip surgery. She needs water to do her work. That is something the current clinic lacks.

In cooperation with Shriners' groups, two or three children each month are taken from Hermosillo to Spokane, Washington or Sacramento, California for orthopedic examination, diagnosis and treatment.

When Laura was asked about the possibility of having more than one Clinic per month, she clearly explained the complications. First, the Customs Border Protection must supervise the safe crossing of the border by the families. Laura cannot ask more of them. Second, the volunteer doctors, nurses and staff can often only commit one day per month away from their professional and personal lives.

Third, the families of the children usually make stressful, long trips on the day they come to the clinic. Many would not be able to make more than one trip a month. Fourth, the process of coordinating every clinic is extensive. There are three office personnel to handle the monthly schedule and to make arrangements necessary for every appointment. Laura, herself, has found it impossible to do presentations, informing the public of the value of this clinic. She would like to have more staff to help her with publicity and setting up times for her to give talks. There is huge work involved to have the once-a-month clinics. Volunteers who show up on the day of Clinic do not realize what has gone on to make the Clinic run smoothly.

On April 11, the Mission Committee discussed ways our church might help this Clinic and its problems. The Mission Committee has some contingency funds available which might be used when we learn of specific needs. There is also a possibility of joining with other Green Valley churches to have an Ecumenical Church Fund Raiser. On April 20, Kay Brouwer will meet with Laura Romero and Diana Ward to discuss specific needs and ways we might help. We'll keep the congregation up dated of future plans.

As of now, St. Andrews' Children's Clinic is doing all it can to help needy children of Mexico. Prayers, donations and support are needed and greatly appreciated.

Honoring the President, Seeking Real Peace

Evangelist John Odhong Mayik, my friend and research collaborator, arrived at our home around 6:30am. I had been waiting all week for this day. John helped me put on a lawo, the traditional dress of the Chollo people. John also brought for me a staff, a cultural instrument assigned to older Chollo men, used for walking but also carrying the symbolic value of dignity and status.

His Excellency, the President, General Salva Kiir Mayardit, did not arrive until almost 11am, so we had plenty of time to soak in the atmosphere. Two things were clear as we waited. The Chollo people are a well-organized people, and they are serious about their culture. Different Chollo clans and groups from different regions wore matching lawo as they marched in preparation. The energy and excitement of the day were palpable. Then, the organizer and instigator of today's event arrived, Reth Kwongo Dak Padiet, king of the Chollo kingdom. Songs were sung about Padiet, the grandfather of the current king, and how people were happy during that time as there was peace and people were able to cultivate, having "food in hand."

Today's event was billed as an opportunity to promote unity, peace, and cooperation amongst the Chollo people of Upper Nile, South Sudan, and by extension, to promote peace and unity among all peoples of South Sudan. The event was also promoted as a day for the king of the Chollo to honor His Excellency, the President of the Republic. The king of the Chollo had been recently rescued by the President as a marauding militia from a neighboring state who had "called for the head of the king" as they invaded the heartland of Chollo land and killed innocent civilians by the thousands. The king was evacuated and brought to Juba until it is same for him to return home.

For the next hour we watched a colorful parade of troupes from different parts of the Chollo kingdom march before the king, sit in reverence before him, and then continue marching. It was not only the Chollo who paraded before the king. They were followed by the other tribal groups of Upper Nile and then by several different tribes from different parts of South Sudan. The marching and dancing was a marvel, a demonstration of the unique strength of the peoples of South Sudan. When the marching ended, prayers for the day were offered by a Christian pastor and a leader from the Islamic community.



Speeches then commenced, starting with a member of the organizing community, and then from the representative of the king of the Azande people, the king of the Anyuaak people, the Governor of Upper Nile State, and the Governor of Central Equatoria State (the host)." Finally, we heard directly from Reth Kwongo Dak Padiet of the Chollo kingdom, and then from the President of the Republic of South Sudan, General Salva Kiir Mayardit. Both speeches echoed the great themes of the day, peace, unity, reconciliation, and the development of the peoples of this great land. My friends and colleagues encouraged me to attend this event for the purpose of observing traditional dress, music, and dancing of the Chollo people, and how these cultural components have been introduced into the church, an important component for my doctoral research. As important as this reason was for me to attend, what other significance does such an event signal?

What comes to mind is the story of Esther from the Hebrew Scriptures. When the Hebrew peoples were slated for death by King Ahasuerus who ruled a diverse kingdom of more than one hundred twenty-seven provinces spanning from India to Cush (Esther 1: 1), Queen Esther organized two banquets to honor King Ahasuerus. It was during the second banquet that Queen Esther revealed to the King the truth of the situation concerning the decree to exterminate the Hebrew people, which included Esther. The King listened to Esther and redacted the decree to kill the Hebrew people. Thus, Esther successfully intervened on behalf of her people. We remain in hope that such an honorific event for the president of South Sudan, intended, it seems, as a humble and magnanimous plea, will help move the country towards real actionable peace, a peace not intended only for the Chollo people of Upper Nile, but for all peoples in South Sudan.

Its purpose is to support women and children who are involved in abusive situations by providing a home at Genesis House. Owned by Hands of a Friend, Genesis House is a residential house in Sahuarita with living quarters for women and children. Staff coordinates with outside resources to provide job skills, counseling and other necessary resources to help women become independent. Genesis house is a safe place for these women and children who often have been terrified in their previous home situations. Residents may stay at Genesis house for up to two years. There are separate quarters for women 55+ with no children. The re-sale shop, DaZee's, supports the shelter.


