GOAL:

Café Justo is a coffee grower cooperative based in Salvador Urbina, Chiapas, Mexico – a ministry of the PCUSA Border Ministry Frontera de Cristo. They market a pure, organic coffee, which is grown, harvested, and marketed in the spirit of justice and providing incentives for people to remain on their family lands.

Their goal is to employ members of the community in the agriculture, production and management/administrative roles to create a sustainable, local business.

MISSION:

Café Justo's mission is to deliver the highest quality, organic, environmentally conscious, fresh roasted coffee to customers at a price that is fair and just. They work to create a bond between the members of the coffee growing community in Salvador Urbina and their customers throughout the world.

STORY:

Café Justo began with a discussion between the PCUSA Border Ministry, Frontera de Cristo, and the small coffee growers of Salvador Urbina, to determine how best to provide a living wage to the coffee growers. This resulted in the organization of those growers into cooperatives who would grow, harvest, roast, and market their own coffee thus shifting the profits from large, international companies to the members of the cooperative. This effort started with just one cooperative. Currently there are five co-ops supporting 115 families. Two are in Chiapas, one in Veracruz and one in Nayarit.

The financial benefits of Café Justo are significant when compared to Fair Trade coffee or local purchases. It is also easy to see the impact this business has on migration. The people involved in producing the coffee are now building concrete homes with access to electricity and water. They are no longer trying to immigrate into the U.S. to find jobs. The

value of this business to other residents of Salvador Urbina is also clear as the profits earned by the farmers are used to purchase goods and services provided by others in the community. Your coffee purchase is having a direct and dramatic effect on this community and others. The cooperative members and community are putting aside their differences to provide an excellent, chemical free, environmentally friendly product and business.

HOW CAN YOU HELP?

1. Purchase your coffee after church during fellowship on the second and fourth Sundays each month. You can purchase caffeinated or decaffeinated coffee in a medium or bold roast as beans or ground coffee. 100% of the money from our sales goes to the coffee cooperatives.

OVERVIEW: Casa Vida Nueva Para Niños, A.C. (CVN) is a “Home for Children” located in a very rural, rustic area about 20 miles southwest of the boarder in Nogales, Sonora, Mexico. It was envisioned in 2007 and opened in August 2012 with major financial support from New Life Church of God in Tucson, AZ.

CVN’s PURPOSE: To provide a safe place to call home for boys and girls (ages 1 – 18) who many have been abused and then abandoned by their parents. Left alone, they would have added to the sad statistics of abandoned youth in Sonora, Mexico. Currently they have 43 children with 10 adults.

CVN's GOAL: To become a home for up to 100 children that is a national model; decrease abandonment and abuse of children; support abandoned children in a comprehensive recovery process of physical, emotional, and spiritual growth; instill in them a character of high integrity which will help them develop into adults that are free of abuse and violence; and provide them with tools to integrate into society as healthy adults. When you visit the Home for Children, you will witness the happiest, most polite group of children that you will ever meet. All are grateful for the place they now call home .

THEIR NEED IS GREAT: CVN is located far away from any city-supplied electrical, water or utility services. **GOOD NEWS:** As of February 2016, most of their electricity is now provided by a solar system donated by members of local Green Valley community. **GOOD NEWS:** In November, 2016, donations helped erect an antenna that enables CVN to establish a house phone and web services so important to school age children. Water had been trucked in and stored in water tanks. Sometimes, the water pressure was not enough to flush the toilets. However, **GOOD NEWS:** In June 2017 a Green Valley resident donated the cost for a 250 foot water well, and water is now flowing into the home. Food, medical, living expenses, and school supplies are mostly supplied thru donations. Their immediate financial need is to finish the upstairs "common area" so the children will have a place to go and relax, watch TV and study - think college dorm room/common area. They also need furniture, couches, chest of drawers (for bedrooms). Their secondary needs are: plastic dishware sets; microwave; LED light bulbs.

RISE Scholastic Achievements, Inc. (Provides educational financial support for Casa Vida Nueva Para Niños, A.C.)

What is RISE? RISE is a 501(c)(3) non-profit corporation created to provide a sustainable source of revenue support to eligible students at Casa Vida Nueva Para Niños, A.C. who have been accepted for upper secondary education including high school, colleges, universities, trade schools, professional/technical studies and/or work/study programs. The financial support includes, but is not limited to, funds towards tuition, books, supplies and living stipends, and starts upon confirmed acceptance by the upper educational organization or program and continues through completion. Each participating student's progress is

monitored regularly to ensure that they are moving toward graduation or completion of the enrolled program. RISE board members do not draw a salary, and their time and travel expenses are not compensated. 100% of all donations go directly to supporting the children's educational goals.

Statement of Purpose: The Community Food Bank of Southern Arizona (CFBSA) is a 501c3 nonprofit organization that provides nutritious food to those suffering from hunger throughout Pima, Santa Cruz, Cochise, Graham, and Greenlee Counties in Southern Arizona. Our mission is "to change lives in the communities we serve by feeding the hungry today and building a healthy, hunger-free tomorrow." Administrative expenses are only 4% of our budget; 96% pays for direct food and services to those in need. The Community Food Bank in Amado & Green Valley (CFB-AGV) are branches of the CFBSA.

Description of Programs and Accomplishments: The eight staff members of CFB-AGV are assisted by 200 volunteers who provide the equivalent of twelve full-time employees. We provide the following services:

Emergency Food Boxes - These boxes supply a 2 to 3-day supply of nutritious food once per month to anyone experiencing a food crisis. Included are federal U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) commodities, donations from area grocery stores and food we purchase

with donated funds including bread, milk and eggs to ensure that the selection is nutritionally balanced.

- The federal Commodity Supplemental Food Program (CSFP) - A joint venture involving the USDA, Arizona Department of Health Services, and Pima County Health Department. It provides boxes of high-protein food such as cheese to seniors ages 60 and over.
- Client Choice System - One of the unique aspects of CFB-AGV is its “client choice” system, which was established early on by its advisory board to give more dignity to our clients. Instead of receiving a pre-selected box of food, clients can select the foods that meet their families’ specific needs. Volunteers guide clients through the food selection area, monitoring only the quantity of food clients receive within certain food groups. Abundant fresh produce, received daily from local grocery stores and the Nogales Community Food Bank, rounds out the selection.
- Additional Assistance - CFB-AGV provides miscellaneous food assistance such as second food boxes and holiday turkeys to local clients.
- Gleaning - Local volunteers visit participating residents and pick the citrus fruits grown in their back yards. We have collected as much as 55,000 pounds of fruit in one year in this unique program. This gleaning season is slated to begin January 1st and run through April 15th.
- DES ON THE GO - We partner with the Department of Economic Security to bring their mobile help program to the branches on the second Tuesday of every month, 9 a.m. - 3 p.m., no appointment necessary. Everything from SNAP to aging services can be addressed.
- REFERRAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (RAP) - This program is promoted to our clients as “We Can Help.” Does your family have needs other than groceries? Maybe we can help you find resources in your community. The program is available on the first and third Tuesday of every month, 12:30 - 3 p.m.

According to Feeding America’s latest hunger report, Arizona ranks 3rd in the nation for childhood food insecurity. One in four children (nearly 500,000) in southern Arizona are living in poverty and don’t know where their next meal will come from. In addition to the working poor who constitute the expected clientele of a food bank, we have served many families who have temporarily fallen on hard times due to job loss. Although the economy is slowly recovering, many people are still experiencing food insecurity in our region.

In most of our clients’ households, at least one person is working one or more jobs, but they are unable to meet their families’ basic needs due to low wages. At minimum wage, even with two parents working full-time, families can barely begin to meet their needs for food, shelter, utilities, transportation, clothing, and school supplies. Therefore, our services are so necessary.

In 2016 the CFB-AGV distributed 1,982,690 pounds of food to almost 20,000 individuals in need. Of these, 31% were children and 17% were seniors.

In 2016, Nogales Crossroads Mission served 36,000 men, women and children. They have seen that number rise considerably in 2017 due to the present economy of Nogales, AZ and the surrounding area. Each one who comes to them for help is treated with compassion and love. This year they opened a coffee house for youth on Friday and Saturday nights to give them a place to gather with their friends in a safe environment. They continue to provide a 6-month substance-abuse recovery program and a 6-month in-house probation program, as well

as providing a shelter for abused women and children. Besides serving lunch six days a week, the Crossroads Mission also provides free Thanksgiving, Christmas, Easter, and Mother’s Day dinners for families of the community.

HOW CAN YOU HELP?

- Pray for the Mission and their staff because the decline of donations this summer has hit them hard.
- Help supply food for their pantry: Canned fruit and vegetables, pasta, mac & cheese, powdered milk, sugar, rice, canned beans, jelly, peanut butter, and tomato sauce are all useful items. Clothing is also needed. You may place your donations in the Crossroads Nogales donation box on the second shelf of the Food Bank Cart. Items must be placed in the box to be taken to Crossroads
- Become a VPC team member that goes to Nogales on the second and third Wednesday of each month to prepare the lunch meal for approximately 65-100 persons. Pick a time that fits your schedule. Most volunteers go once or twice a year.

General Mission Support

country are building up 1,001 new worshipping communities and empowering congregations to seek out new beginnings and engage their diverse communities.

Recognizing the need to support Presbyterian Church (USA), a portion of the mission budget directly supports Presbytery de Cristo and Presbyterian Mission Agency. While the funds to the mission agency are undirected, the monies to the Presbytery de Cristo support Youth and Young Adult Ministry, New Church Development, Church Revitalization, Community services, and Border Ministries. Specific needs can be addressed through the web sites of PCUSA and/or Presbytery de Cristo. Prayer support for Christ's church is critical.

The local Genesis House shelter is run by Hands of a Friend, and is partially funded with proceeds from DaZee's consignment shops. Serving as a "safe haven" for female victims of domestic violence and sexual assault, Genesis House has provided over 35,000 bed units since its opening in January 2007. The shelter currently has 24 beds, at an expense of approximately \$32 each day. Victims range in age from newborns to 87 years old, and may stay in shelters for up to 24 months.

Additional services provided by Hands of a Friend include: Poverty and Payroll program (an aid to employment development), parenting classes and child development aid, nutrition and health counseling, a GED program, computer classes, and medical and dental emergency work.

Hands of a Friend Foundation and Genesis House Shelter are run entirely with volunteers. The founder/executive director and the assistant executive director work ten to twelve hours per day, six days a week, unpaid. Because Hands of a Friend is a faith-based agency, they accept no County, State or Federal funding.

HOW CAN YOU HELP?

First, donate clothing and small household items to the DaZee's consignment shops or volunteer your time at the shops, located at 231 Duval Road, just off of La Cañada near W. Duval Mine Road. Second, contribute financially through the church (or if your contribution is made directly to Hands of a Friend, up to \$400/person or \$800/couple may be used annually as an Arizona Tax Credit). Third, obtain the necessary required training and volunteer at Genesis House.

VPC Mission Quilts started many years ago as ABC Quilts, which was a nationwide effort to make and give baby quilts to mothers who had little or nothing in the way of clothes for babies. Our mission aim now is to target any child, baby, or person in need of the warmth of Jesus wrapped around them. We do so by donating quilts, mainly to Casa Vida Nueva, MX, Continental Medical Center, St. Andrews Clinic, Holy Cross Hospital, Nogales, Banner University Medical Center, Diamond Children's Center, Project Linus, Aviva Children's Services and Wounded Warrior Summer Camp.

Much love goes into the making of each quilt as it is passed from one set of hands to another until many hands have handled the quilt to its completion. The monies received from the Mission Committee are used to supply needed items, such as material, thread, sewing machine repairs, and batting.

HOW CAN YOU HELP?

VPC Mission Quilters meet on the 1st, 3rd and 5th Monday, from September through mid-May, starting at 9:00 am with the last person leaving by 2:00 pm. Those volunteers able to stay the entire day usually bring something to eat around noon. Sometimes during a quilting session, we stop work and share in a pot-luck lunch.

We welcome anyone who wants to experience the joy of creating and giving to those in need to be a part of our quilting family. Our faithful

quilters consist of full-time residents and snowbird members, nonmember attendees, and friends outside of our church. Our goal, besides making quilts, is to always enjoy each other.

Pam and Dave are regional directors for three Muslim nations with 39 years of mission work with Operation Mobilisation (OM). They travel regularly to dangerous lands to direct and serve forgotten souls in need of Jesus Christ. In addition, Pam and Dave L have a growing ministry traveling internationally, speaking and teaching at churches and conferences. OM's role in the body of Christ is to motivate, develop and equip people for world evangelization, and to strengthen and help plant churches, especially among the unreached in the Middle East, South and Central Asia and Europe. OM currently has more than 6,100 people working in more than 110 countries around the world, seeking to "demonstrate and proclaim the love of God." In every situation OM teams attempt to adapt to the local culture and situation, endeavoring to find the best ways to share the gospel using literature, the creative arts, friendship, bible studies, video and cassette tapes, correspondence courses, relief and development work as well as other methods such as the ship, LOGOS HOPE. OM for over 50 years is a faith mission, dependent upon God to raise support for their ministries from individuals and churches. Posada Life Community Services, (formerly Casa Community Services) offers programs open to the public with a mission to connect people to a better life through social interaction, education, and caring support. With roots in community support, including Valley Presbyterian Church and other generous community organizations and individuals, Posada Life Community Services is able to maintain a breadth of programs on behalf of the greater Green Valley community.

Posada Life Community Services reaches across the community by helping:

- Working families with children ages 12 months to age 5 in our year-round program and through age 8 in our summer program. Our specialized pre-kindergarten program is dedicated to preparing children to be “ready to leave” and succeed in kindergarten and beyond.

On behalf of the greater Green Valley community, Los Niños del Valle offers a program that in its entirety is unduplicated:

- Four-star rating in the Arizona First Things First - Quality First program that provides intensive coaching, program assessment and resources.
- Intergenerational programs offering rich, regular programming between children and older adults attending programs at the Community Center, Casa’s Adult Day Services, and La Posada’s various senior living settings. Quality time spent between a child and an older adult enhances natural development, builds self-esteem, and improves the quality of life.
- Fee assistance to help low-income working families cover the cost of child care or for families who need short-term help while waiting for paychecks from newly found employment to catch up with expenses.
- Qualified teachers with early childhood education focused on

developmentally appropriate materials and learning environments.

- Department of Economic Security certification allowing families who have qualified for, and received approval for, these extremely limited state child care funds to enroll their child.
- Endorsed by Eco-Healthy Child Care, meeting national standards for providing a “green” and healthy environment for children.
- Older adults also enjoy a range of programs. Social opportunities and Senior Lunch are available at the Community Center. This is Green Valley's setting for life-long learning, meetings, events and a nutritious lunch five-days-a-week.
- Older adults and their caregivers are served by Adult Day Services. This person-centered program serves individuals with Alzheimer's, stroke, Parkinson's and other health concerns, offering activities, nursing care and social opportunities. The many advantages of intergenerational activities benefit the older adults and children from Los Niños del Valle. Caregiver respite and support are integral to this program.
- Individuals and families can benefit from Behavioral Health Services. BHS offers counseling both in our offices and in the clients' homes. Depression, grief, anxiety and many other mental health concerns are addressed with the help of licensed, experienced therapists. Medicare coverage is accepted; fee assistance is available for those unable to pay.

HOW CAN YOU HELP?

Volunteers help us make the most of our resources and, in turn, find greater purpose in their own lives. A special program, Victory Volunteers, is a casual approach, attracting people desiring short-term, project-based volunteering. They complete projects for other community nonprofit organizations.

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**Presbyterian Theological Seminaries -
Presbyterian Mission Agency**

Presbyterian Theological Seminaries are the theological heart of PCUSA, with 10 schools and two theological institutions. 3,100 students are enrolled, and must graduate with a Masters of Divinity to be ordained. 85% of graduates enter parish work, while 15% become missionaries. The average cost per year is \$78,600, with 80% of the students requiring scholarships. The average age is 41, with 33% identifying themselves as minorities. The male/female ratio is 1 to 1. Each congregation is expected to support Presbyterian Theological Seminaries by financial aid and prayer.

In May 2017, Bob and Kristi Rice began a new role and call in South Sudan. Bob serves as an instructor at Nile Theological College (NTC) and teaches a broad range of courses in theology and biblical studies. Kristi serves as an economic and development advisor for the South Sudan Presbyterian Evangelical Church. She works to strengthen the identification, development, and management of church development projects that support the financial goals of the church and improve the health and wellbeing of the communities. They live in Juba, the capital city of South Sudan.

South Sudan became an independent nation in 2011 and a second Nile Theological College (NTC) campus was established in Malakal, South Sudan. Civil war broke out in December of 2013, affecting the entire nation of South Sudan, leaving no one unaffected. Malakal, being strategically located on the Nile River, was a contested city, much of it being destroyed including the young college, which was then moved from Malakal to Juba in 2014. NTC has grown from five students to more than seventy. Roughly ten of these students live in Internally Displaced Person (IDP) camps and a majority of the students have been displaced from all over the country. Due to the compromised security situation and challenges with education in South Sudan, wives and children of the leadership of the NTC live in surrounding countries such as Egypt, Sudan and Uganda.

OVERVIEW: For over 45 years, St. Andrew's Children's Clinic (The Clinic) has provided free, specialized medical care to children living in Mexico who cannot get or afford the care they need in their home country. The Clinic is held at St. Andrew's Episcopal Church in Nogales, Arizona. As far as they know, it is the only one of its kind along the U.S./Mexico Border. The Clinic is a non-denominational, non-profit 501(c)(3) tax-exempt organization. The volunteer professional health care staff sees approximately 225-250 patients on the first Thursday of each month except July.

THEIR NEED: The children suffer from a wide variety of serious medical problems and disabling conditions, and their parents bring them to The Clinic for a miracle. Children are seen from age 1 month to 18 years old. All patients have legal border-crossing documents. The Clinic operation in the U.S. has worked closely with Immigration Services to ensure proper documentation of all the patients and families. In turn, Immigration Services personnel have volunteered their own time to come in early on Clinic Day to ensure that the patients have the documents they need for a timely crossing. The love of the volunteers is everywhere as they faithfully return each month to help patients.

Additionally, every October, in cooperation with Children's Surgery International of Minneapolis and CIMA Hospital, approximately 50-60 children have cleft palate/cleft lip surgery in Hermosillo, Sonora, Mexico. This special mission involves volunteers on both sides of the US/Mexico Border who work with the medical team to give patients smiles and a much better life.

HOW CAN YOU HELP?

Getting involved is easy: Call St Andrew's Children's Clinic main office (520-648-3242) and tell them you would like to help. They will recommend you first sign up to visit their Clinic on the next Clinic day (first Thursday of each month except July) to take a tour and watch their video. Next, they will ask you to visit their visitor center and review the

list of volunteer possibilities. If you would like to donate, ask them what kind of items are in high demand. Cash donations are always welcome. The Clinic welcomes tours, volunteers (medical and nonmedical), in-kind donations, and year-round friends and supporters. 98% of all donations go directly to patient care.

The Valley Assistance Service’s (VAS) mission is to help seniors and families live independently. VAS motto is “Helping Hand Forward”. Each program takes into account the diversity of seniors as a group yet considers the individual needs of seniors at different stages of their lives. VAS incorporates a vision that is supported by five inter-related principles: dignity, independence, participation, fairness and safety/ security. In our present economy the need for VAS services continues to grow; however, community resources that provides assistance to many agencies has decreased because of the economy and loss of corporate donors.

Volunteers brighten a senior’s day with helpful transportation, grocery shopping, running errands, making phone calls, friendly home visits, and limited repairs by a handy person. Other opportunities to volunteer may occur in specialty programs listed. One of the programs is called Map a Plan. Volunteers with financial experience teach clients to stretch the use of their dollars by learning to use discount programs and planning how to effectively use their resources. Ultimately they learn the beginning steps of building a savings plan. Training for women returning to the workforce (resume-writing, on-line job search and mock interviewing) is another way to strengthen and provide confidence to women 55 years and older who have been out of the work force. The Valley volunteer programs were recognized by the AZ Governor’s Commission on Service and Volunteerism with an award for excellence in 2013.

A nationally acclaimed program developed by VAS and the Green Valley Fire Department is the fall prevention program called SHiM (Safety and Health in Motion). This free program provides home safety and health risk assessments by a team (RN's and Green Valley Fire Corps Volunteers). Each client's home is evaluated for fire safety hazards and a plan is developed for a fire evacuation. A Registered Nurse (RN) evaluates health concerns, and a handy person may install lock boxes, smoke alarms, fire extinguishers, and in some cases grab bars, night lights, and bath treads. During the first year of this program the number of falls in Green Valley decreased by 95%.

Our community benefits from a variety of services offered. VAS has many volunteers who help with transportation, grocery shopping, errand running, making phone calls, friendly home visits, and limited repairs by a handy person. One special program is called MAP (Map A Plan). Clients are taught to stretch their dollars by using discount programs and planning effectively. Currently VAS also has limited housing/rental assistance available. The beginning steps of building a savings plan are also taught.

The newest program developed by VAS is called Tubac Regional Neighbors Helping Neighbors. The need was developed so those 55 years and older would have one place to call if they need help. It serves those living in Amado, Elephant Head, Tubac , Tumacacori and Carmen. They call VAS in Green Valley if they need a ride to the grocery store, dentist, post office or even to Tubac. VAS was able to assist this new organization as the organization put in place written policies for insurance and background check protocols. Methods of funding this program have been secured from the Tubac Health Care Foundation and the Greater Green Valley Community Foundation.
