Installation

Temperatures are changing, snowbirds are returning, and we are in a season of thanksgiving. On Sunday, November 24, during the morning worship service, we will be receiving new members and commissioning our 2020 pledges of time, talents, and generosity. Sunday, November 24 at 3:00 p.m., will be our congregation's installation of our new Pastor. Somewhere there needs to be a cartoon of the delivery person unloading a carton with air-holes asking, "Where do you want the new pastor installed, and do you want 110 or 220 amp?"

The Presbyterian Church (USA) is the only church which elects, ordains, and installs our leadership. Truly, the only laypersons in the church are those who have never been ordained, because there is no distinction in ordination between pastors, ruling elders, and deacons. There are differences in responsibilities and job descriptions, but we answer exactly the same questions. The principle distinction is that ruling elders (Session members) and deacons, while ordained for life, are installed for three-year terms; whereas pastors are installed for as long as it is a good, healthy relationship for all involved. When I was first ordained, it was as a ruling and teaching elder, recognizing that since 1983 Presbyterian pastors have been members of Session, as well as the primary rabbi (teacher) of the congregation. At one point, we were called "Ministers of Word and Sacrament," and later, "Teaching Elders." As with the academic titles of Reverend and Doctor, what you call me does not matter, I am Craig, but I would not be a pastor if I were not your pastor of this congregation. Thank you for this call, and I hope you can join us in this celebration of the Presbytery.

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The Stranger Savior

It's been a long time a-comin'...a new Membership Committee has begun. Their purpose? The Membership Committee has the "active desire to invite, welcome, receive, and care for those who are strangers so they find a spiritual home and discover for themselves the unending richness of life in Christ" (quote taken from *The Five Practices of Fruitful Congregations* by Robert Schnase).

To invite, welcome, receive, and care for the stranger.

The Membership Committee has a challenge for all of us in order to help in this endeavor. Before I get to it, the Bible has a lot to say about the stranger.

One of my favorite stories in the Bible about stranger encounters comes from Abraham. Abraham was sitting outside his tent one day, and looking up, he saw three strangers approaching. Abraham ran to greet the three men and offered them water, a servant to wash their feet, a place to rest, and something to eat so they could be refreshed. A generous act of hospitality.

As a result, Abraham and his wife Sarah were blessed with the promise of a child. (Although, Sarah laughed in disbelief because she was past child-bearing age. How often do we deny God's blessings?)

Encountering the stranger theme runs throughout the Bible. God says to the Israelites: You were strangers in a strange land. Now that you know how that feels "you shall love the alien as yourself, for you were aliens in the land of Egypt: I am the Lord your God."

The great-grandmother of David (Ruth) was a stranger, an outsider, to the Jewish people.

Then, in Jesus, God becomes the stranger in our midst. And Jesus identifies himself in that way: "I was a stranger and you invited me in." (Matthew 25:35)

The stranger savior.

This is the God who, in Jesus Christ, welcomes and transforms us all so we are "no longer strangers and aliens" but "citizens with the saints and also members of the household of God."

The task of welcoming the stranger now comes to us. So here is your challenge from the Membership Committee: On Sundays, greet one person you don't know and have coffee with them in Fellowship Hall. That's it!

As it says in the Bible: "Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for thereby some have entertained angels unawares."

You just never know.

About the logo: The caring, supportive hands represent women who seek to build an inclusive community of Presbyterian Women. The leaf represents growth of our personal and corporate response to Jesus Christ as we nurture our faith. The dove indicates our work for peace in our own lives and throughout the world, shown in the globe. At the center of the design is the cross, by which our sins are forgiven and we are freed to live in Christ who is at the center of our lives. The overall design is of a butterfly, a symbol of newness in Christ.



I read about an interesting new (this year) feature in Facebook, and I think it's worth sharing even if you don't use Facebook because the concept is something to think about and apply wherever possible. Facebook is now providing settings for you to control what happens to your Facebook page after you die. If you use Facebook,

you've probably already seen alerts pop up on your feed telling you to wish someone a happy birthday, but unfortunately this can keep happening after a person is deceased. I've received these notifications for both of my in-laws and they've been gone for years. What's really horrible is that several of their Facebook friends continue to wish them a happy birthday with colorful, confetti-filled graphics, clearly not knowing they have passed away! Obviously those aren't coming from close friends, but rather casual aquaintances or previous co-workers, etc. who have no idea they've passed. Regardless of their good intentions, it's not fun, as a family member, to see those birthday wishes pop up on your feed year after year. There is a process for notifying Facebook when someone is deceased, but if no one notifies Facebook a page will continue to exist as if the person is alive, and those birthday notifications will go out to everyone on their friends list, and those birthday wishes will keep coming in.

Facebook's only option in the past was to notify them of the death (with documentation, like a death certificate) and they would delete the person's Facebook page. They later added an option to keep the page up, but label it as a tribute page (with the word "remembering" before the name) which allows friends and family to continue to share memories and write tributes, but blocks birthday notifications from going out (among other things, like suggesting them as a new friend). Now they offer another option. You can go into your own Facebook settings and look for Memorialization Settings. In this setting, you can tell Facebook you want your page deleted upon your death, or you can choose a person (also on Facebook) to be your "legacy contact," which will put them in charge of your profile when you die. Someone will still have to notify Facebook of your death (with documentation), but once that's done your legacy contact will have the authority to manage certain, limited aspects of your page, or they can choose to have it removed completely. They will NOT be able to log in as you, post as you, or see your private messages, and they will only have access after Facebook has verified you have passed away.

With all of the opportunities and benefits that come from social media, there also comes a number of problems. The death of the account holder and ongoing page activity is one such problem. It's good to see Facebook is providing a way to address it. I suspect other social media outlets have provided, or will provide, a similar feature. This is one more thing we can all do to plan for our passing and make things just a tiny bit easier on our surviving family members and friends.

Donate to Our Mission Partners at No Cost to You

Arizona residents can donate to **Qualifying Charitable Organizations** and receive an offsetting credit on their state tax return. A married couple can donate up to **\$800** and an individual can donate up to **\$400**. And, your Arizona Charitable Tax Credit donation is **separate from and in addition to** the foster care and public and private school tax credits.

Several of our mission partners are considered to be **Qualifying Charitable Organizations** by the Arizona Department of Revenue. This means that we can give to these mission partners and receive a 100% credit against the Arizona tax liability we would otherwise have to pay. The amount of tax credit in any year cannot exceed \$400 for a single taxpayer and \$800 for a couple filing a joint return. It also cannot exceed your Arizona tax liability for a given year, though any excess can be carried over to be applied to a future year. You have up to April 15, 2020 to make a donation and claim the credit on either your 2019 or 2020 tax return.

The following VPC mission partners currently qualify for the tax credit:

- Community Food Bank of Southern Arizona, in both Amado and Green Valley
- Crossroads Mission in Nogales
- Hands of a Friend
- Valley Assistance Services
- Youth on their Own

VPC is a qualifying pass-through organization, which means you can make your donation check out to VPC and indicate on the check that the funds are to be passed on by VPC to the charity. This enhances the support of VPC to the mission partner.

The mission committee at VPC encourages any of us to who are Arizona residents to be sure we fully utilize this tax advantage to support the organizations listed above. Tax forms 301 and 321 are attached to your AZ tax return to claim this credit (see www.azdor.gov).

Financial Update

The Finance Committee met on October 16 to review activity through September. As of September 30, the financials show that we are remaining in a positive position as we have been fortunate to report for each month of 2019.

When we look at budget-to-actual, the revenues exceed the year-to-date budget by 7.6% and expenses are under budget by 7%. This puts us significantly ahead of our budgeted year-to-date as shown below:

The Finance Committee watches the results closely each month. The difference between this year-to-date and last year at this time shows that our bottom line for the year-to-date has improved by \$134,990. Our operating reserves stand at \$183,019. To date we have collected and paid \$8,764 (43.9%) of the Presbytery de Cristo assessed \$19,949 per capita. This is paid only as collected

All committees have submitted budget estimates as of our October meeting. We have compiled the results and will be giving Session an estimated expense budget at their October meeting to assist the Stewardship Committee in their fall campaign. We are confident that we have laid the groundwork for a successful 2020.

Thank you to all who are continuing to meet your pledge for 2019. We will be doing a follow-up reminder to those pledges that are behind by November 30. A sincere thank you to all for your continued support of Valley Presbyterian Church.

In Disney's Christopher Robin, Robin, the main character, finds himself pulled between his family and his job. His boss scolds him, telling him "Nothing leads to nothing," in essence saying, "get out there and do something if you want anything in life." In the continued verbiage of Robin's employer, Robin can either "sink or swim." The inimitable Winnie the Pooh, confidant and friend to Robin, later counters, "Nothing leads to my best something!"

These last six weeks have been filled with a lot of 'nothing' for Kristi and I after the skateboarding accident I sustained on August 10th. Of course that is not entirely true, I have been faithful to my physical therapy twice a day and the daily tasks of life take more time during this recovery period. But there have been large swathes of time to do 'nothing,' to just "be." I have spent hours in the sun-porch just looking out into the green space behind the home of Jim and Sherri Bertolet, my parents in-law. We have been able to listen to baseball in the evenings, watch US Open tennis, watch movies, read books we have been chomping at the bit to read, spend time just chatting with neighbors, and take walks in the evenings as my

hip slowly heals. I have been able to slow down to a pace where I don't have to always be concerned about what to do and where to be next. Of course I have not been totally freed from my spirit of "do -ism" and planning, nevertheless, I feel more able to relax and "free" as a result of this forced rest.---For someone like me who too often feels driven to action, I feel like I am "seeing the light" afresh, that indeed, "Nothing leads to my best something." I am being confronted once more with the wisdom and truth that the notion of 'nothing leading to nothing' is a lie. --- For me, my accident was also a wake-up call. It was a reminder of my human frailty and, as a result of a broken hip and a broken elbow, a reminder of my dependency upon others around me, in this case for simple everyday tasks as simple as getting out of bed. Kristi and I have experienced a fresh appreciation for the gift of life and the simple pleasures of being able to move, walk, travel, and enjoy the outdoors. We trust that these weeks of 'nothing' and forced rest will indeed 'lead to our best something.' We do not know what that 'best something' is, but we trust that God has done something in us these six weeks which will prove profitable for His Kingdom here on earth.

Thank you for those of you who have prayed for us and encouraged us during this season. We appreciate the phone calls, the home visits, the meals, the cards in the mail, the emails, the puzzles, the movie recommendations, the Facebook posts, and the gifts sent. The words of the letter of the author to the Hebrews reminds us that we are surrounded by a great cloud of witnesses as we run with perseverance the race marked out for us in Christ Jesus (Hebrews 12: 1).

Indeed, as Winnie the Pooh reminds us, our "Nothing leads to our best something!"

Memory Loss and Dementia

Have you heard the phrase from Sir Norman Wisdom, "As you get older three things happen. The first is your memory goes, and I can't remember the other two." Sometimes Alzheimer's disease and dementia are much more than memory loss and they are no laughing matter.


Dementia is a kind of umbrella for Alzheimer's disease. There are many kinds of dementia, however Alzheimer's is the most common. Across the United States it is the sixth leading cause of death. In Arizona, it is number five. The numbers are growing across our nation with around 5.8 million having Alzheimer's disease in 2019.

How many of us have regular screenings? Do you know the 10 warning signs of Alzheimer's? Do you know the difference between normal aging and Alzheimer's? What can we do? Do we just call it a Green Valley moment? How do we care for those in our church? How do we care for the caregivers?

There are many questions. It is difficult for many to talk about this topic, and even more difficult to continue activities. Yet something in our memory holds on to music and art. At Valley Presbyterian Church, we are creating activities that may help those to remain engaged in community and in church. In the next few months, each Valley Voice article will discuss more about dementia, support, and resources, and what activities/workshops will be held.

Aging happens. Sometimes we cannot predict what may happen as we age. It is in God's hands. We need to ask ourselves if a certain disease or dementia happens to someone in our family, our loved ones, or us, do we let it define us? Do we let it destroy us? Or do we let it strengthen us?
