



Rev. Dr. Craig Lindsey, Pastor, Head of Staff ON LEADERSHIP & COMMUNICATION



One of the concerns of our Church has and continues to be leadership. While churches often seek the opposite of their last leader, I have and continue to seek a different way from all of our former pastors. Not that there was anything wrong, but after 40 years we need to change things up! The leadership style I try to emulate requires listening to you, not reframing the way in which I want, but listening and trying to hear you. Then working with you to establish a process that we all know and own for making changes as necessary. Then believing, working methodically and praying to God, that what we are doing will be made manifest. We may not all like the outcomes, but we will know and have opportunities to be involved along the route. At times, changes have to be made to our process, and at times there are changes to what has been familiar, but this is not change for the sake of change. As your

installed pastor, you will hear me in committees advocating for one decision or another, I do care passionately about this church and about you. When the committee or the congregation vote, I choose to abstain, in part because I want these to be your decisions; in part because I need to minister to everyone especially those unsupported. Once committees make a decision, I then stand behind that decision to the congregation and community.

A second concern which came up in the JAG Report, and Mission Study, and Session Minutes, has been communication. In Green Valley, we all come from other places and because of this we have differing expectations and assumptions. Someone commented recently "We talked about a concern, and you went ahead and fixed it! We are accustomed to talking about stuff for years." There are times when we think we hear one thing, however a person means something else. There are times when what we really want is not accomplishment but to control how something is done. The humor of a preacher is that sometimes you preach a sermon, and months or years later hear yourself being quoted differently than you intended! As your pastor, I am trying to listen and I will continue to try. After months of isolation someone said, "What do you mean the Pastors and Worship Leaders have provided daily E Blasts throughout this time? There has been daily Bible Study with Pastor Craig on Zoom? Worship has been available on the Website? YES, if you have not heard this previously, we are trying to do everything in our power to minister to you. If you have not been receiving please tell us, and we will work to get you connected to your church.

FROM THE PASTOR con't

On our first Sunday congregating in "Live-Action Worship" good friends at Valley recognized that Judy and I have been with you a full year (What a year); and that Pastor Diane and I have tried to go out of our way to be in ministry with you despite the circumstance of the world. Thank you. We have come to love our home here with you. I am told that if you can live through a summer with a record 107 days over 100, with less than 2 inches of precipitation for the year, and 210 days of social isolation, in Arizona you have earned being called a Desert Rat. Thank you for supporting us as we continue to minister to you.

FULL TRANSPARENCY ON CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS

All 23 of the Air Conditioning Compressors have been working throughout 107 days in excess of 100 degrees! A new outdoor LED Message Board has been installed! Replacement of the Sanctuary Sound System is able to be heard! A fresh Updating of the Kitchen has happened! A new Irrigation System is causing things to grow! Funds to repay the Solar System cost are being pledged! Video-Conferencing of Meetings and Video-Recording Worship! After years of talking about problems and being restricted by what we did not have, things are getting done; but how are we affording all this?

First, our Session has led us through difficult times in the life of our church, not only dealing with deaths, mourning, depression, but also significant financial cuts. However, our predecessors were wise stewards, who established funding streams for the future of our church.

- Our Budget covers annual costs of staffing, administration, maintenance, utilities, some mission.
- The Amigos provide an amazing ministry helping people with local moves, while generating a supplemental +\$50,000 annually through the Patio Sale for our Mission Giving.
- The Foundation invests Memorial Gifts and Reserves of VPC, as a separate corporation.
- There is also a Capital Improvements Fund, annually fed both by year-end balances and a percentage of income from Foundation Investments.
- Fifth, we have an incredibly supportive, creative, and responsible church-family, who when they see a place to make a difference step-up and do so.

The Building and Grounds Committee (B&G) has an annual inspection of our Air Conditioners, with plans for a rotation replacement, funded by Capital Improvements Fund. This does not come out of the Operating Budget, or the Foundation.

FUNDING NEW SANCTUARY SOUND SYSTEM and SIGN

While originally there were bids for very expensive LED Signs, Ruling Elder/Building and Grounds member: April Boysen found our new sign at Electronics Liquidators for \$1,000. A Tucson company initially bid over \$150,000 for a new

Sound, Lighting and Camera System; however, we found a company specializing in churches, who broke their bid into "ala carte phases" and for \$37,000 we replaced the Sound System, while also being attentive to the physics of speaker placement. When there were overages, Pastor Craig petitioned for these to be paid by the company providing saving \$4,000. Both the sign and sound system were funded by the Capital Reserve for this. Using our custodians, B&G member Skip Berry and our Pastor, saved the church a great deal in installation cost. None of this was charged against the Operating Budget or Foundation. Then, without request, members donated \$21,325 towards these costs! So, our Sound System has actually cost the church Capital Improvements Fund about \$16,000!

CUSTODIANS STEPPING UP

Rather than replace kitchen cabinets, the Custodians purchased a gallon of paint and refinished the cabinets for us, themselves. Rather than paying to have Weed Control this year, our custodians have sprayed for weeds. The skilled work of our staff saved the church these costs. Way to go guys!

<u>IRRIGATION</u>

A member of the church concerned with landscaping, donated \$6,000 which encouraged others to join in supporting. Also, Ruling Elder/B&G member: Judy Christiansen worked with the landscaper on significant costs savings for this project to empower our native plantings to thrive rather than just survive.

SOLAR CARPORT

One of our body heard the report that the Solar Carport was saving our church 85% on our monthly electric bill, who then offered a \$25,000 Matching Pledge for gifts received in the last quarter of this year to purchase this outright.

ZOOM VIDEO CONFERENCING & VIDEO RECORDING

Our new Pastor had decades of experience with ZOOM Video Conferencing and Video-Recording Worship, which supported by Pastor Diane filming on her Cell Phone, Jeff Babcock editing, Dick Horn producing, brought these to reality without cost to the church. The Deacons are now investigating Live-Streaming using their accrued funds for this purpose. The net result is that the Session has not had significant additional costs that could not be paid by the Session's Capital Reserve funds, and our church family have been incredibly supportive of getting these things done. Thank you so much for your encouragement and faith in our Session and pastors.

As we take cautious steps to open up worship again, I hear this comment a lot: "My fear is people have become so comfortable watching the worship service online, they will not come back to church."

Here are the reasons:

- **People enjoy worshipping at home.** The relaxed atmosphere of being at home may have a long-term appeal for many church attenders.
- People don't feel safe in public places anymore. The current health crisis may make people quite leery about going to any public meetings in the near future.
- People like the freedom to watch services on their own schedule. It is convenient (and very American) to make your own worship schedule.

Having said all that, there are some great reasons why people will (and should) come back to church

- People will miss connections with other believers. We crave connections
 with others. We are designed to see and hear and taste and touch and feel our
 way through the physical world. The online world is great, but it has its
 limitations. Couples that try a long distance relationship know this is not ideal. It
 is the same with the church as the Family of God. We need to see each other.
- There is nothing like singing together. We sing to glorify God and to encourage each other. We sing to express our emotions to God. Of course, we cannot sing together yet, but we can still hum and hear the music live.
- People will respond positively to connections made during coronavirus situation. We have worked hard to communicate the gospel and the love of Christ through technology to minister to church members and our neighbors. Having made connections with the outside world, we may find those people entering our doors.

People will have a greater sense of commitment due to living through a
crisis. Some church leaders believe that the coronavirus epidemic
may be good for the church. Churches have had to figure out ways to fulfill
their mission without the opportunity to gather in large assemblies. The
emphasis upon a growing level of true community in small groups, in lieu of big
gatherings, may continue to be a significant priority in the church's future.

NEW SOUND SYSTEM

Sunday, October 11th we used the new Sound System for the very first time. Everywhere in the Sanctuary from the back of the Choir loft, to the last row of each section, the Sound System worked perfectly. Vocalists were microphoned, those making announcements from the Table could be heard and the system adjusted if needed. Pastor Craig learned to tape the microphone to his neck, but even the preacher's mic worked.

THE PASTOR'S RECIPES

When we first opened "Carport Church" Pastor Craig supplemented goodies with a Lindsey favorite: Date Bars. My Great Grandmother's Recipe did not use eggs, because in the days of iceboxes you could not keep them cold. so, this can be made without eggs, baking for 25-30 minutes; or with eggs baking for an hour. The original recipe called for two handfuls of this, a pinch of that, cooking in a warm oven until done. Overtime we have tried to routinize the amounts.

Cut 1/2 pound of pitted dates into pieces. Stew these Date Pieces in a small pot on the stove with $\frac{3}{4}$ cup of water and 1/8 of a cup of granulated sugar, until dates break down into a paste. Set aside to cool.

Cream together:

1 Cup of Brown Sugar

1 Cup of Butter

1 teaspoon of Baking Soda

1/2 Teaspoon of Salt

1 ½ Cups of dry Oatmeal

1 1/2 Cups of Flour

Divide this dough in half, pressing into the bottom of a standard baking pan (glass or metal).

Spoon stewed dates on top of raw dough like icing.

Layer remaining dough on top of date layer. It seems to work best to flatten balls of dough with your hands to jigsaw puzzle pieces to cover the top. Bake in a 350 degree oven until golden brown. With eggs, cook a full 60 minutes, so the dates are gooey but not the dough. Without eggs 25x30 minutes. Like a cake, this should be firm when done.

Remove and cut into small squares while still warm. This recipe is very forgiving, and can be doubled as necessary. Once baked, the cookies can be frozen. This is a great recipe to make with children. My own children love them; routinely arriving at Grandma's house to ask: "Did you make them?"

and precautionary distancing
requirements and after prayerful
consideration and lengthy conversation,
the Valley Galley has decided NOT to
sponsor a Thanksgiving meal this year.
It is our hope and prayer that sometime



in early 2021, when Covid 19 has subsided and health precautions are lifted, we ill be able to have a GIANT celebration of thanksgiving, a time to breat bread together and offer our gratitude for having survived.

CONTACT TRACING

PIMA County Health Department responded to Pastor Craig on October 10th the Saturday before our Sunday opening. The Health Department had reviewed our plans and procedures and gave our church an EXCELLENT Rating! In addition to practicing over coffee hour for several

weeks before opening for worship, we are taking temperatures externally, disinfecting hands, wearing masks, socially distancing, even having bulletins set out on the pews instead of picking up. Most important we have been tracking who was in attendance, so that if someone develops symptoms we could quickly verify everyone with whom they came into contact. Having initially requested persons to call ahead, we now have a fairly accurate list of regular attenders, so no longer do you need to call or email each week! Instead, please stop at the Welcome desks, where we can check your attendance, to be able to follow up if it should ever become necessary.

VPC Solar Power System Purchase Funding Status:

On September 16th, 2020, Valley Presbyterian Church (VPC) received an anonymous matching funds proposal from a member of the Congregation. The proposal reads as follows; "I would like to pledge that I would match dollar for dollar every donation during the 4th quarter until December 15, 2020 up to \$500.00 per person and up to \$25,000.00 total during this period." Thanks to this member, this provides an extra incentive for you to help fund the purchase of the Solar Power System from Technologies Credit Corporation (TCC) at the end of the 2nd Quarter of 2023. Once the system is owned outright, VPC will no longer have to pay TCC for the power the system generates thus, saving an additional \$14,000 per year in energy costs.

Why Stephen Ministry?

After a joint meeting with other faiths held at VPC, I had a Jewish couple come over to me and ask while pointing to my name badge, "Why Stephen?" They were inquiring as to why our ministry was called, Stephen Ministry. I had once wondered about the naming of the ministry, so was delighted to be able to explain to them,



"Many years ago, Dr. Rev. Kenneth Haugk was a pastor of a very large congregation and he was thinking of all the people in his congregation that needed his visits often and he didn't have nearly the time to be able to visit them. His thoughts then jumped to some of his members that had the gifts and time to make these visits, however, they weren't pastors. He developed the Stephen Ministry program and trained these people to have the skills in making visits and how to administrate the program. He chose the name, Stephen, because Stephen is the only <u>named</u> person in the bible who was put in charge of caring for the hurting people in the early Christian church."

Stephen Ministers aren't pastors. They are trained, compassionate and caring people who are willing to give an hour a week to another human being in order to make life more enjoyable or bearable for that person. That could be you too. If you have the inclination to want to make life better for a hurting person, you could fill out an application to see if you have the gifts for Stephen Ministry. Call Patti Bright (520-305-3275) to have an application mailed to you. Through an interview, the SM leaders will be able to determine if Stephen Ministry is the particular gift you have or if you appear to have the gift for one of the other pastoral ministries at VPC.

The bonus of being trained is finding that the training is valuable to you in other circumstances in life. The icing on the cake is the blessing of joy that you will receive when giving of yourself to another person that is in need of your caring spirit.


Radical Empathy

Recently I had a conversation with a family member about empathy. What does it mean to be empathic to others? Is empathy a natural gift or a skill we develop? When I lived in Rwanda, one of the greatest services the visiting short-term church teams performed was sitting quietly and humbly listening, giving space for widows and others to share their stories. In the midst of our current racial reckoning in America, as a means of becoming more empathic to the challenges faced by communities of color, a colleague recently recommended listening to the voices of persons of color, to not just read their autobiography or memoir, but to listen to them speak for themselves their own life story (via audio book).

Back in June, while we were living in an apartment lent to us by a church acquaintance, one of the regular highlights for me was listening to Trevor Noah describe growing up in Apartheid South Africa in his memoir, Born a Crime. Noah describes what it means to be "colored" or mixed-race, but not fitting into any of racial the categories because of his particular social location. Noah candidly describes a life of poverty, living on the margins, the challenges women like his mother face in their culture, a life of robbery and thuggery which many blacks are forced into because of poverty, and the challenges faced in the Homelands because of State-Sanctioned White Supremacy. Noah looks back on his formative years with a compassionate lens, describing for the listener the countless injustices he and his mother and his community faced. Noah astutely compares the Apartheid and racist South Africa of his youth with that of the United States of America, where he now lives. Listening to Noah, at times I found myself laughing, but other

times crying. I experienced a mixture of tears and joy with Noah's poignant and dramatic conclusion.

A colleague in mission cites the wisdom of an Asian proverb, "To hear is to forget, to see is to but feel remember. to to understand." May we 'feel' the pain of others, listening to their stories, and thus 'understand'. In a recent interview with Oprah Winfrey, Isabel Wilkerson, acclaimed author of The Warmth of Other Suns and Caste, describes the need for "radical empathy." Along with Wilkerson, I believe that this 'radical empathy' only comes when we hear the



stories of others, have a more complete picture of our history, and are motivated to action, action which will create a more just and loving world. Amen.

Crossroads Mission, Nogales

On October 12, 2020, I spoke with Ben Wenke, Co-Director of Crossroads Mission, via a phone call and received the following information:

The sad news is that Crossroads Mission is struggling financially now. Since COVID-19 virus has hit the world, each month only gets a little worse financially at the Mission. The three transitional houses for women are taking a hit, not operating as usual.

The Mission has stayed open during the virus pandemic because it is the only shelter in Nogales. All the sanitary precautions are being taken, and masks must be worn by everyone who enters any of the Mission's properties.

The Mission is still making take-out lunches, packaged in clamshell containers, and handed out to the needy people that come into the Mission. The Mission is preparing about 40 of the take-out lunches daily which is much less now because of the virus and that the Mexican border is still closed. The Mission is now distributing clothes again (clothing has not been available because of the COVID-19 virus).

At this time, Ben couldn't say if the Mission would be able to prepare and serve their normal Thanksgiving and Christmas dinners. He just said time will tell.

The Mission is in dire need of money to keep the Mission running. Canned food is also needed to prepare the take-out lunches. Food donations may be placed in the bin marked for Crossroads Mission in Fellowship Hall.

Please keep praying for Crossroads Mission, it is a vital part of Nogales, Arizona.

I later went to a local ER and found I fractured two vertebrae in my lower back.

Needless to say, I have cut back on a lot of physical activity, I am not climbing ladders, and I try not to bend, lift or twist! The doctors have told me it takes about three months for this kind of break to heal well.



So, Pam has been trying to take care of me although I am not a very good patient! But she has been awesome in supporting me and also cutting the lawn, weeding the garden and doing the heavy lifting! I do appreciate your prayers for a good and healthy recovery without long term back problems.

MILLIONS FACING STARVATION IN SOUTH ASIA FROM COVID-19 AND CYCLONE AMPHAN

We have become deeply involved in helping those suffering from COVID-19 in India, Pakistan, and Bangladesh due to people facing starvation from the

lockdowns there. Millions of day laborers suffered incredible hardships to try and get back home, with some walking literally 100's of miles to get to their villages. Then on May 20 Super Cyclone Amphan caused an even great humanitarian disaster on top of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Our teams met people who told them, "I would rather die of COVID-19 than starvation." So far we have helped raise \$185,000.00 in cooperation with our OM offices and other donors, and helped about 9000 families which means about 54,000 people with food rations, hygiene packs, and shelter materials as so many also lost their homes.




OPERATION CHRISTMAS CHILD

Valley Presbyterian Church has been participating in this wonderful ministry for years. Don't you want to make a needy child happy and put a smile on his/her face? This is




probably the only gift they will receive at Christmastime. Stop by our table on the designated Sundays listed below and pick up a Christmas shoebox(s) to fill.


ALL SAINTS DAY 2020




You are Never Alone: Trust in the Miracle of God's Presence and Power by Max Lucado Class began Tuesday, October 27 10:00 a.m. by Zoom
