As of September 18, we purged everything down to one PODS unit, and the PODS has launched! We anticipate touching down in Green Valley on September 23, with the house closing on September 24, and beginning in the office on October 1.

With all of this love and cooperation, God is certainly going to bring great things among us at Valley Presbyterian.

The Presbyterian Church is different. We are the only Christian church who elect, ordain and install our leaders.

To me that means that the "call" is especially important. You have not hired a pastor, or been assigned, or contracted for services.

Throughout the Hebrew Scriptures of the First Testament, the people of God, and individual leaders of the community of faith, were called.

Despite circumstances, God never withdrew that calling. Our responsibility is whether we accept the call, and how we respond, but we cannot deny the calling from God exists.

At a Session meeting, during the interim before my last call, one of the elders said "I am tired of all this interim business and reconciliation stuff. When are we going to get a REAL pastor?" The Interim was only a little taken aback. But, like the Velveteen Rabbit story, my goal in ministry has been to be "REAL," to be genuine and honest and committed. To love, no matter what.

What have been especially encouraging are the echoes from central New York friends, who have been jealous of our moving to Arizona. No snow, hurricanes, flooding, etc.

For the last 20 years, I have been working with refugees from South Sudan, visiting there, and have been an active member in the Sudan Ministry Network of the PC(USA). In this capacity, we learned that customs and practices are different in Africa than in North America, which we described as T.I.A. (This Is Africa). The point being, as Americans we could not remake Africa and African customs to fit our expectations. So, Judy and I have begun saying TIA, "This Is Arizona" and in many ways we will adapt to be part of Green Valley. A friend did give me a going-away gift of cowboy boots complete with spurs stating that, "I had earned my spurs in ministry." Packing these up, Judy asked what "A-Z Boots" indicated on the packing box. I looked at her and said "Arizona." T.I.A.

Helping the Victims of Hurricane Dorian

Hurricane Dorian made landfall in the Bahamas as a Category 5 hurricane on September 1, 2019. Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA) is currently in communication with one of their partners in the Bahamas, Bahamas Methodist Habitat, as well as U.S. presbyteries in the path of Dorian. As part of PDA's initial response, a solidarity grant has been coordinated for response efforts in the Bahamas.

PDA has been in communication with several international response organizations, including Church World Service (CWS) and ACT Alliance, as well as National Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster (VOAD) and Puerto Rico VOAD. In conversations with ACT Alliance and CWS, they are identifying the best time and best way to travel to the Bahamas as part of a damage assessment team to implement a rapid, timely and effective emergency response to Hurricane Dorian's impact; identifying needs, local capacities, and providing updated information.

As PDA has learned from previous disasters and the shared experience of many relief organizations, the best way to respond to a disaster is through monetary donations. As USAID indicates, "Cash donations are the most efficient form of assistance. Unlike material donations, cash involves no transportation costs, shipping delays, or customs fees. It also enables relief organizations to spend more time providing aid by spending less time managing goods. Cash donations also allow relief supplies to be purchased in markets close to the disaster site, which stimulates the local economy, thereby boosting employment and generating cash flow."

If you would like to support PDA's response, you can write a check to Valley Presbyterian Church with Hurricane Dorian or PDA on the memo line. Checks can be placed in the offering plate during Sunday worship, or mailed to/dropped off in the church office.

The 10 Commandments for Welcoming a New Pastor

At Stephen Ministry on September 13, Cheryl Stepp gave a devotion on how to welcome a new pastor based on the Ten Commandments (originally given in a sermon by John Taylor). I share it with all of you as we welcome Rev. Dr. Craig Lindsey.

- 1. **Thou shalt keep God first.** Invite God into all your plans for welcoming and interacting with Pastor Craig, and your belonging to one another will get off to a fast start.
- 2. Thou shalt open yourselves to your new minister's ideas and gifts. Every congregation has tried and true ways of being a church together. Pastor Lindsey will bring experiences, gifts, and fresh eyes to our church. Allow him to exercise them in ways that strengthen our witness, even if that means smashing a few idols in the process.
- 3. Thou shalt be mindful of how you use God's name. Names and the ways we use them have power. Use God's in heartfelt prayers for Pastor Craig and your journey together. Try out using relevant adjectives for God in your devotional time: welcoming God, life-giving God, loving God, surprising God.
- 4. Thou shalt rest, and urge your pastor to do the same. We are at the end of a long interim period, which can deplete a congregation's energy. Take your hard-earned Sabbath so that you will be rejuvenated for the mission God has for this church. And remember that Pastor Craig, though no doubt excited to be with us, will likely be tired from all the physical, emotional, mental, and spiritual efforts that moving requires.
- 5. Thou shalt tend to your relationships with your new minister, his family, your current staff, and one another. Pay attention to people who are struggling with the transition. Be vulnerable with each other this will build deep trust that you will rely on in the years to come.
- 6. **Thou shalt encourage, encourage.** Share your hopes with Pastor Craig. Express your excitement that he is part of our community. When things go well, give him genuine and specific affirmation. That feedback provides replenishment, motivation, and focus.
- 7. **Thou shalt address concerns directly and promptly.** Don't allow problems to fester, and don't relay your beefs through a third party. Instead, give constructive and timely comments so that the issue can be nipped in the bud.
- 8. Thou shalt pay your minister fairly. Appropriate cash salary and benefits and annual cost of living pay increases will allow Pastor Craig to focus on ministry alongside us instead of focusing on finances.
- 9. Thou shalt refrain from making assumptions, and thou shalt stop rumors in their tracks. It's easy to make mental leaps about someone you're just getting to know, then spread them around as facts. Instead, be curious. Ask. Use your wondering to build the relationship.
- 10. **Thou shalt manage your expectations.** Remember that this is a new role for Pastor Craig, and there will be a period of adjustment. Be helpful and welcoming without monopolizing his time and attention.

Chisel these guidelines into a couple of stone slabs and keep them constantly before you, and you will have laid the groundwork for years of growing in God and serving your neighbors together.



Today, her daughter, Laura Romero, is the executive director of St. Andrew's Clinic, managing to get children and their families from Mexico to the clinic on the first Thursday of every month except July. "Coca" Romero has truly influenced many children and families, helping them to find better health, happiness, and stability. Financial Update

(Based on financial data through August 2019)

The Finance Committee met on September 18 to review activity through August. As of August 31, 2019, the financials show that we are remaining in a positive position as we have been fortunate to report for each month of 2019.

When we look at budget-to-actual, the revenues exceed the year-to-date budget by 4% and expenses are under budget by 5%. This puts us a little ahead of our budgeted year-to-date as shown below:

The Finance Committee watches the results closely each month. The difference between this year-to-date and last year at this time shows that our bottom line for the year-to-date has improved by \$107,957. Our operating reserves stand at \$167,496. To date we have collected and paid \$8,708 (43.6%) of the Presbytery de Cristo assessed \$19,949 per capita. This is paid only as collected.

The 2020 budget process has begun and we have asked ALL committees to get their budget estimates to the finance office by October 1. Hopefully, all committees are working toward this goal.

Thank you to all who are continuing to meet your pledge for 2019. We will be doing a follow-up reminder to those pledges that are behind by November 30. It has been reported to the committee that we have collected 80% of the 2019 pledges, and non-pledge giving is obviously more significant than last year.

More Blog Readers Wanted (13 and Counting)

A blog reader is anyone with access to a computer who can type in "bobandkristi.blogspot.com." Have you ever wanted to read a missionary's diary? Consider reading the real-life story of Bob and Kristi Rice, who share, on a weekly basis, the story of God working in their lives.

Stopped in Our Tracks - September 18, 2019

"I have to try this out!" Bob said, admiring the skateboard he had just found in the garage. His decades-old passion for skateboarding took over, and I watched him sail swiftly down the driveway and into the street before I turned away to finish packing the car. Three seconds later, Bob was lying motionless in the street, unable to move. The skateboard had stuck in a big crack in the street, and Bob's body flew forward and fell hard, completely breaking his hip at the widest part and fracturing his elbow. Time seemed to both stop and blur over

the next few days in the hospital, filled with emergency surgery, nurses, relieving pain, and grappling with this life-changing situation. Suddenly, Bob could not even get out of bed by himself, and taking a few steps was a slow and arduous effort.

Four weeks after the accident, Bob is making significant progress in recovery. He used a walker and was in an arm brace for nearly three weeks, but graduated to using a cane last week. He sees a physical therapist twice a week and diligently does his exercises at home twice a day. He is now able to climb stairs (as long as there are good railings), walk for 20-30 minutes at a time, and use his arm again. The pain in his leg is still there, but is slowly subsiding. All of these things feel like victories in the recovery process, and we thank and praise God for healing. Walking is still slow and arduous, but we trust God that healing will continue to improve.

In South Sudan, we are encouraged by news from our colleagues. In July, a healing and reconciliation workshop was facilitated by Kristi's colleagues for people living in camps for displaced people near Juba. Several different tribes and churches were represented, and the time of giving over pain to Jesus on the cross was particularly meaningful. We continue to hear the need expressed from churches in remote regions for training in trauma healing and reconciliation please pray for the support and people to respond to these requests.

Bob worked hard with a team of students at Nile Theological College (NTC) to finish the second edition of the newsletter before we left Juba in July. NTC is renovating some classrooms this semester, and they hope to hold classes in the new location in January. The school continues to grow, with about 85 students in the degree and diploma programs this semester. We are grateful that NTC can help meet the deep need for training of pastors and church leaders in South Sudan. NTC has had a few visiting professors this semester, both for intensives and normal courses. We thank God for these people who are willing to share their experience and knowledge with students in South Sudan.

The government of South Sudan is in the process of implementing a peace agreement with groups who have opposed the government and caused instability for the past 5 years. Please pray for this process to be successful and for integrity and cooperation among the leaders - there is a deadline of November 17 for many of the changes to be put into effect. We pray that there truly would be peace, that displaced people could leave the camps, that people would be able to farm again, and

that people could live without constant fear of attack. Seeing the faith and perseverance of Christians in South Sudan in the midst of the insecurity, famine, and economic crisis that they have endured is truly humbling.

Thank you again - we have been very encouraged by the messages and prayers that we have received during this unexpected time of recuperation. When we are physically broken, we are reminded how much we need each other. As you join us in partnership in serving with our partners in South Sudan, we rejoice that we are God's body, working together for His Kingdom. We hope that you are encouraged as we are at how God is at work in South Sudan - please keep praying for the work that God started to come to fruition there. And yes, we think Bob's skateboarding career is sadly over!

Change, stress, and loss can add up. It can lead to higher blood pressure, gastrointestinal issues, irritable bowel syndrome, anxiety, weight problems, heart difficulties, and other illnesses. By taking care of ourselves, we can better take care of others. In the next few months, watch for upcoming classes here at VPC that may help promote healing.

Have you ever talked to a pet dog, cat, or bird? Pets become therapy even when we least expect it. What's With All The Different Colored Name Tags?

Have you ever noticed that people at Valley wear different colored names tags? Have you ever wondered what those different colors mean?

Here is your key:
