

As we mask up and have social distance guidelines in place, we <u>hope</u> to start meeting again on Monday, October 26th.



## Rev. Dr. Craig Lindsey, Pastor, Head of Staff



Thank you each and everyone for your forbearance cooperation throughout the COVID Pandemic. Different from many places, everyone has cooperated and tried to work together. There have not been divisions over wearing masks and not wearing masks. We have all respected our leadership and tried to work together in very high anxiety times. You have submitted to having your temperatures taken, washing your hands while praying the Lord's Prayer, worshipping in our homes, preparing your own communion, singing solo, and mastering internet video conferencing. Good job! Please keep up the good work and we will keep working to join together safely as the people of God anew. Thank you for making my first

year with you so very welcoming. You hosted Judy and I in your homes and NOC's. You welcomed us as trusted friends and listened to our Session's leadership. Thank you.

#### **RAISING THE BAR**

There was a famous poem titled "Crossing the Bar" by Lord Tennyson that if I recall correctly, in nautical terms described becoming an adult, taking responsibility for our lives and preparing to meet our Master. The reality of 2020 is that we have had to Raise the Bar, just to stay current and connected. (Here "raising the bar" refers to Pole Vaulting, and the height of the horizontal bar one has to clear to stay in competition.) We have over a summer transformed, from: a congregation which worshipped on Sunday, worked together in committees, and accomplished marvelous things through the Patio Sale; to becoming a High Tech congregation who meet together to share ideas and make decisions via Internet Video Conferencing from around the world; who Worship God together through televised services, even sharing the Sacrament of Communion in each of our many homes. At the same time, when you come home to Valley, we hope you will now notice many improvements. Outdoors in September a new Irrigation System has been installed to water and care for all the native desert plantings around the church building and grounds. When we bow our heads and worship begins, new emergency handles have been installed on the Sanctuary doors, allowing us to leave whenever needed, to re-enter by pushing a silent doorbell for the Head Ushers, while ensuring that we are safe and secure from any threat.

#### FROM THE PASTOR con't

Anywhere and everywhere you enter the Sanctuary to Worship God, you will be able to hear clearly and succinctly with new speakers mounted so even the Choir and pastors can hear what is going on. The Choir loft has been modified slightly for our Choir, and the Organ Console and Piano have swapped for the grand piano to open appropriately for the congregation and for Wes and Jamie to have eye contact during their marvelous duets. Even with an International Pandemic, VPC has continued to help people move and downsize through the Patio Sale while raising funds for Missions. We have expanded in video Adult Education and Bible Study. AND our NOC leadership have kept tabs on how people are doing and where they are, even when the world was isolated and shuttered. We will never be able to go back, instead the bar has been raised and we will pray for you personally, care for you intentionally, and even when you travel the world we will be able to share together. Recently, we heard from several members that we missed seeing one another and sharing fellowship, so began having coffee hour outdoors before worship from 7am until 8:30am on Sunday mornings.

#### DOING THINGS DECENTLY AND IN GOOD ORDER

Attempting to encourage greater representation, in late 2018 our Interim Pastor encouraged expanding representation of the Nominating Committee to be six persons at-large from the congregation, plus two Session members and one Deacon. Even a year later, a nine member Nominating Committee had not become natural for us at VPC, as there were no at-large members on the Nominating Committee in 2019; or elected at-large from the congregation for the 2020 Nominating Committee. This concern was brought to our Session, and the Pastor and Clerk consulted with our Presbytery Stated Clerk for what to do. The Stated Clerk assured our Session that similar concerns are being faced because of the Pandemic in every congregation across the Country. The Stated Clerk provided guidance to our Session, for how to proceed "decently and in good order" at the next Session Meeting, and our hope is to elect new Elders and Deacons and a reasonable number of at-large members of the Nominating Committee, at a Congregational Meeting to be Called when we can safely gather at least a quorum.

#### FROM THE PASTOR con't

#### **CHURCH ADMINISTRATION**

While many of us only see and know the work of our church at Valley Presbyterian Church, and some consider "Administration" a "bad word," the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) empowers us to do a great deal more in ministry and mission than any local church could ever accomplish. When there are problems/concerns larger than what a local church can resolve, these are ministered to by the Presbytery. Pastor Diane is a member of the Preparation for Ministry Committee encouraging Seminary Students and those being trained as Commissioned Lay Pastors for pastoral ministry. Pastor Craig is serving on the Committee on Ministry, which listens to and guides concerns of congregations and the Calling of pastors. When there are matters larger than the Presbytery, these are ministered to by the Synod.

For us the Synod is the Synod of the Southwest comprising all of Arizona and New Mexico. Recently, Pastor Craig has been nominated to serve on the Permanent Judicial Commission of the Synod, which resolves disputes within congregations and with pastors, as an Appellate Court from the Presbyteries. As a denomination, the General Assembly, located in Louisville, Kentucky has six different agencies: The Board of Pensions (Administering the Health Insurance claims and Retirement investments of all pastors and many church staff); the Presbyterian Foundation (managing finances and investments of the PC(USA) just like our VPC Foundation); the Presbyterian Investment and Loan Program (PILP: which loans money for New Church Development and Redevelopment of existing churches); the Presbyterian Mission Agency (which supervises and funds all of our Missionaries around the world, and makes grants available for local mission projects); the Presbyterian Publishing House (which prints books and magazines); the Office of the General Assembly (which in addition to managing the every-other year Assembly meeting, includes the Office of the Stated Clerk and their committees). The ONLY funding for the Presbytery, the Synod, and the General Assembly is our Per Capita Giving, or Designated Giving from local churches. Per Capita simply means "per head" and is an equal distribution of costs per member. When Presbytery Disaster Assistance came to help us; whenever there is a flood, fire, hurricane or earthquake; all the Presbyterian Missionaries in every country around the world; the only source of funding for all of this is our Per Capita Giving. VPC has a wonderful tradition of members paying their own per capita, which if this is not done must be funded through VPC's Operating Budget. Our annual cost of per capita is \$46.00 please give generously.

## Diane Christopher: Pastor of Discipleship

As I write this, the church building has technically been closed for 6 months. We never guessed that this pandemic would last this long. When we first closed (mandated by the governor), we didn't know what to do. How are we going to do worship? Are we going to have meetings? Classes?





we use the sanctuary or Spiritual Life Center? Should we even do it from the building? Do we record from our homes? Those of you who remember the early weeks of our recordings, you couldn't hear very well. The music was too loud. Craig was too loud and I was too soft. The soloist was hard to hear over the music. We tried different cameras, different microphones. We slowly figured out what worked best for us, and it was the simplest of all: a cell phone with a little microphone plugged into it. I humbly admit we now produce a pretty wonderful recorded worship service.

We did the same thing with meetings. Step by step. We taught many of you how to use Zoom. Including me. We started having classes and committee meetings over Zoom. We figured out how to live and do things differently during this pandemic. Now the time is coming to open again. We want to be careful. We want to take it

step-by-step just as we did in closing. Lord willing, by this writing we have met under the solar panels for a couple of weeks, and prayerfully by Sunday, Oct 11, we can invite you into the building for worship. With restrictions, of course. Step by step.

This has been an incredible learning experience on how to do ministry in new ways. I pray that we will continue to do ministry in new ways. We've learned that our recorded worship services reach more people than inviting them into the sanctuary. How do we keep doing that? Many people are worried that people are so used to watching worship at home that they will not come back again. I am not worried because I know you all long to see each other, and we have come to appreciate each other more fully.

#### Pastor Diane con't

We continue to look towards God for direction and guidance from the Holy Spirit. May we not go back to the way things were, but move forward in new ways because we are different people. Our faith has changed. We are changed. Therefore, may we be better people. May we be deeper followers of Christ. May we think more outside the box. May we be more creative in how to bring the love of God to others.

So pray for us. Pray that we will live up to what God is expecting of us and leading us to do. Not just our church but every church in the world, so people will truly come to know the love of God through Christ.

We will have Fellowship time underneath the solar panels from 8 a.m. – 9:30 a.m. (This new time will start Sunday, Oct 4.) Please wear a mask and practice social distancing.

When you walk into the church building, here is what will happen.

- Please wear a mask
- Your temperature will be taken with a forehead check.

- Give your name to one of our ushers/greeters. It will be written down in case we need to contact you.
- Use the available hand sanitizer
- Pick up a bulletin

#### What to expect in the sanctuary and during the worship service:

- Ushers will help in seating you (you will sit at the blue tape on the back of the pew)
- There will be no congregational singing; instead, enjoy our cantor.
- Communion will not be served on the first Sunday (however, communion can be viewed on the recorded worship service)
- Ushers will not pass an offering plate (however, you will have the opportunity to leave your offering in a basket at our exits)

#### **Finance Committee**

The Finance Committee met on Wednesday, September 16th to review the current financial activity through August. We continue to remain in a positive position. In the following report we have defined "Giving Support" as contributions for current operations and "Other Support" as Patio Sale Fund or other Fund transfers in support of operations, investment income, fees for services (memorials, events, concerts, etc.)

This report shows that we are behind the 2020 Budget. Again, no surprises because of the State shutdown. Green Valley churches normally receive the majority of their support during the high season November through April. We are seeing that many are still sending in their pledges and that online giving has increased significantly. To date, the 2020 pledges are 72% collected. For this we continue to thank you.

#### **VPC Solar Power System Purchase Funding Status:**

On September 16<sup>th</sup>, 2020, Valley Presbyterian Church (VPC) received an anonymous matching funds proposal from a member of the Congregation. The proposal reads as follows; "I would like to pledge that I would match dollar for dollar every donation during the 4th quarter until December 15, 2020 up to \$500.00 per person and up to \$25,000.00 total during this period." Thanks to this member, this provides an extra incentive for you to help fund the purchase of the Solar Power System from Technologies Credit Corporation (TCC) at the end of the 2<sup>nd</sup> Quarter of 2023. Once the system is owned outright, VPC will no longer have to pay TCC for the power the system generates thus, saving an additional \$14,000 per year in energy costs.

Now, the truck which she uses to deliver needed supplies across the many miles, has blown an engine. 
brand new Chevy Colorado pick-up but had nothing to trade in on it.

#### **Disasters upon disasters**


Last week there was severe flooding in several regions of South Sudan, particularly along the Nile River in Jonglei state and in the region of Pochalla in the east. In Pochalla, hundreds of homes were destroyed, crops were ruined, and thousands of people were displaced. Everything is underwater in the village, a central population center for hundreds of miles.



You can imagine how disruptive and scary this would be. In the U.S. we are learning more and more about disruption with the impacts of the Coronavirus coupled with natural disasters like hurricanes, wildfires, even a derecho that swept through the Midwest this week. So please join in praying for protection for people in South Sudan. Our colleague Rev. Philip Obang lamented this week as he shared the news that now they are facing floods, Coronavirus, desert locusts and regional, ethnic fighting. #### The New CARES Act

As a result of the 2017 tax reform, the vast majority of taxpayers lost their ability to choose itemized deductions due to a dramatic increase in standardized deductions. That eliminated the ability for many to write off charitable contributions on their taxes. The new CARES Act allows for a \$300 above-the-

line deduction for charitable contributions made to 501 (c)(3) organizations for taxpayers who take the standard deduction or those who itemize. The deduction applies to cash contributions effect the beginning of the 2020 tax year. Charitable organizations that you can consider are those the Mission Committee supports. You may make your contribution anytime during the year.

#### St. Andrews Children's Clinic

Laura Romero, the executive director of St. Andrews' Children's Clinic, has arranged for new office space in Green Valley for the Clinic. In early September they established an office at Valley Community Services, 3950 S Camino del Heroe. Staff is managing that office and Laura is usually working from her home or from the office in Rio Rico. Through Eloise Frederickson, our church helped find the office space in Green Valley. Donations

of clothing, diapers, blankets, etc. can be taken to the new office. Laura is willing to conduct a ZOOM meeting for anyone interested. The Mission Committee is interested and will ask for a presentation in November. Let Kay Brouwer know (573 -552-2313) if you would like to learn more about St. Andrew's Children's Clinic via a ZOOM meeting. The Clinic staff and volunteers are working hard to help children, although not in the regular location in Nogales, Arizona, which is closed this month, October and maybe longer. Doctors are volunteering time and making appointments with patients in Mexico. A few Cleft lip/Cleft palate patients will be treated first. Future services will not be the same, but Laura and the staff are fully committed to continuing help to children of Mexico as they have in the past 45 years. Our concerns, prayers and donations are greatly appreciated.

#### **Crossroads Mission, Nogales AZ**

On Friday, September 4, 2020, I spoke with Bert Wenke, Co-Director of Crossroads Mission, via a phone call and received the following information:

The great news is that Crossroads Mission now has their 3<sup>rd</sup> transitional house for women and children. The house is open and has 1 lady living there. This house is for <u>working women</u> who need a place to live for a maximum of 4 months; hopefully the women would have saved up enough money by then to get out on their own. The Mission would also help the women if they need furniture, etc., to get started at their new residence.

#### **Crossroads Mission con't**

The Mission has stayed open during the virus pandemic because it is the only shelter in Nogales. All the sanitary precautions are being taken, and masks must be worn by everyone who enters any of the Mission's properties.

Bert stated she would really like to have the churches start sending their volunteer cooks to the Mission's kitchen to prepare the take-out meals. They are making lunch and dinner meals which are packaged in clamshell containers and handed out to the needy people that come into the Mission. Starting September 5, 2020,

they began distributing clothes again (clothing has not been available because of the COVID-

19 virus).

The Mexican Border is closed, so Mexicans must have a United States ID card to proceed through the Border. This does affect some of the people that come to the Mission for food.

Canned food is needed to keep the Mission's pantry stocked so lunch and dinner meals can be prepared. Hands of a Friend (Manos Amigas) provides shelter for victims in need of escaping domestic violence, human trafficking, and sex trafficking. Genesis House is our domestic violence/sexual assault & human trafficking shelter, which serves Green Valley and the local areas.

It is only 12 months since the untimely and tragic death of Patti O'Berry, founder and Executive Director of Hands of a Friend. In that short time there have been changes in leadership, downsizing, moving office space, closing of Dazee's II, and the effect on all of the Covid-19 virus.

Colleen Hansen, the new Executive Director, has worked with victims and families of domestic violence sexual assaults, and trafficking for 36 years. She began her career counseling incest victims in Utah. After moving to AZ with her family, after volunteering with victims she became the first designated Domestic Violence (DV) Victim Advocate in Coconino County. After several years, her husband was transferred to Pinetop, AZ. She worked as Family Service Director for Whiteriver School District and during this time she was appointed to the newly formed Victim Services Rapid Deployment Team (VARDT) of the FBI. For the next 17 years she worked with victims of federal crime and crisis throughout AZ, Sovereign Nations, and National Trafficking Operations. With prior military service, she retired in 2017. Colleen worked with Patti and come to value each other's roll in the fighting against domestic violence. She joined the Board of the Hands of a Friend and has now assumed the role of Executive Director.

As Hands of a Friend moves forward there has already been changes. The website and Facebook have been updated. There is a designated 24/7 crisis line in place. The Hands of a Friend Foundation and the revised DaZee's re-sale shop

provides proceeds, which help the running of Genesis

House.

They do not have the equipment for schooling from home nor the educators to help them with all the children.

#### Flu Season and COVID

October will soon begin and with that, the Flu Season is once again starting. Can you get the Flu as well as COVID? According to the CDC, It is possible to test positive for flu as well as other respiratory infections and COVID -19 at the same time.



COVID is thought to be spread from

person to person through respiratory droplets, coughing, sneezing, talking and even singing. The Flu can be spread similar to COVID. Some of these droplets can stay on an object or surface and live for short periods of time. Masks are helpful in slowing the spread of COVID. Cleaning and disinfecting surfaces may be helpful as well. Some of the symptoms may look to be the same: fever or chills, cough, fatigue, muscle or body aches, sore throat, headache, congestion or runny nose, nausea or vomiting, and diarrhea. The symptoms, besides these listed, that they are seeing in COVID are shortness of breath and new loss of taste or smell. Washing your hands for at least 20 seconds ( to the tune of Happy Birthday twice) is a good everyday prevention. If soap and water are not available, use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer with at least 60% alcohol.

Testing is available for both COVID and the Flu. Talk to your healthcare provider if you are not feeling well.


Finally, when you are notified of your acceptance into the program, we need to do a background check (done on all people working in the church's ministries).
