The late, great theologian, Jonathan Edwards, was quoted in the book *Closer Walk*, July, 1988, p. 15, about what new estate the Christian is in life. "The redeemed are dependent of God for all. 

To Thrive

During devotions one morning, I read the scripture passage about the Israelites being allowed to leave Egypt after years of slavery (Exodus 15). As they leave, the Egyptian Pharaoh changes his mind and decides he wants the Israelites back.

He sends his army after them, and as the Israelites walk out of Egypt, they notice the army of Pharaoh approaching. They are terrified and turn to Moses in anger, "What have you done to us by bringing us out of Egypt?...It would have been better for us to serve the Egyptians than to die in the desert!"

It is said that the future of the church will not be as we know it today. It was a topic of discussion at the Pastor Transition Training I attended. I've been reading about it in newspaper and magazine articles, and on the Internet. The church is declining, rapidly. And by church, I am talking about the church everywhere in America.

Many churches are trying to figure out how to stop the flow of people leaving the church, but at the same time, like the Israelites, they want to "remain in Egypt." They want the church to be the way it used to be, do things the way they have always done it. Yet, others are trying to find a new way, even though it may lead them into the wilderness.

Moses responds to the people's complaint: "Do not be afraid. Stand firm...the Lord will fight for you; you need only to be still."

You need only to be still.

In other words, keep focused on God. God will provide the way. So I think of our church as we look towards the future, as we look for a new way to do church. I think of The Thrive Project, a way to revitalize the church, along with other churches in our Presbytery (see information on The Thrive Project on page 12).

Therefore, I invite you to The Grapevine on Monday, September 10 at 10 a.m. in the Spiritual Life Center to learn about The Thrive Project. Discover the Seven Vital Signs of a Healthy Church and discuss how to move forward. Then let us stand firm, be still before God, and watch what God will do.

Standard Meeting of the Session, June 28, 2018

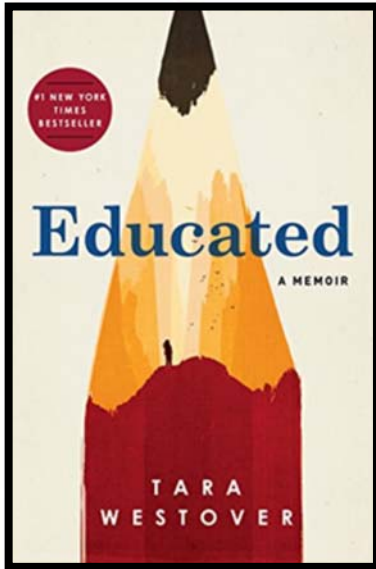
- Approved Valley's participation in the Thrive Project, "Discerning God's call and building disciples of Jesus in the power of the Holy Spirit," beginning the Fall.

What is the General Assembly?

In order to understand the function of the General Assembly, it is necessary to get a grasp of the structure of our church. There are six agencies in the Presbyterian Church (USA). They are the Board of Pensions, the Presbyterian Foundation, the Presbyterian Investment and Loan Program, the Presbyterian Mission Agency, the Presbyterian Publishing Corporation, and the Office of the General Assembly. Except for the Presbyterian Publishing Corporation, which is self-sustaining, the agencies give reports to the General Assembly and, in most cases, have boards that are elected by the General Assembly. The Office of the General Assembly (OGA), however, depends upon the General Assembly for its financial support that comes through the per capita provided by congregations.

The duties of the OGA include the following: it supports the co-moderators in their duties; it manages the call process for pastors, including a database of pastors who are searching for a position; it publishes the General Assembly minutes, the Book of Order, and the Book of Confessions; it compiles annual statistics and houses the archives through the Presbyterian Historical Society; it answers questions regarding the PCA (USA) Constitution; it organizes and manages the General Assembly and other national meetings; it prepares, administers and grades ordination exams; and it communicates with the larger church on immigration issues.

The only funding that the OGA receives to do all that comes from per capita giving. If every member of the church paid his or her per capita, which means "each head" it would amount to less than \$1 to support the Office of General Assembly, but not everyone pays. For instance, Puerto Rico has a large number of Presbyterians, but, since the hurricane and even before, they are simply unable to pay because of poverty. Many of our small churches are barely hanging on, so they can't afford to pay.

Next month I will explain more about per capita.

The History of the Bible: The Making of the New Testament Canon

Beginning September 21, Fridays at 1:30 p.m. in Classroom 1

On Friday, September 21, the Inquisitors will begin a six-week study of *The History of the Bible: The Making of the New Testament Canon*. There can be no question that the New Testament is the most important book—or collection of books—in the history of Western civilization; it is by far the “bestseller” of all time, since the invention of printing. However, many people today do not know a lot about the New Testament, including such basic facts as what books it contains, when they were written, by whom, when, and for what purpose; how the books were copied and transmitted down through the ages; and when and why they came to be collected together into a canon of Scripture. This course will examine these questions and more.

The class meets from 1:30 - 3:00 and views and discusses the Great Courses course entitled, “The History of the Bible: The Making of the New Testament Canon.” The professor is Dr. Bart Ehrman, Professor and Chair of The Department of Religious Studies at The University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. Professor Ehrman is one of the world's leading scholars on the New Testament.

Do you understand what you believe? And why? Do you understand the basics of your faith? Would you like a review of Christianity in a way that includes visuals and hands-on? Using the curriculum for the youth confirmation class (which begins September 9), Pastor Diane will cover such basics as:

Who wrote the Bible, God or humans?
Am I really supposed to believe that Mary was a virgin?
Was Jesus of Nazareth God?

Then once a month, we will cover really tough questions chosen by the confirmation class, such as:

Did God create evil?

What does God think about war?

This class will continue throughout the year. Come to all, or come based on the topic of the day. Here are the topics for September:

Sept 10 Who wrote the Bible, God or humans?

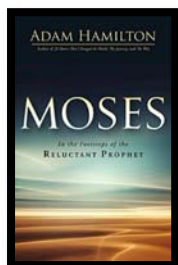
September 24 at 9:30 a.m., then October 1, 8, 15, 22, and 29 at 2:00 p.m.

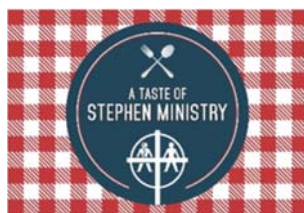
New Quilting Season Starting for Mission Quilters

Financial Update

As of the writing of this article, the Finance Committee just received the July year-to-date financial statements. The committee will meet on August 28 to review activity through July. The committee did not meet in July, but the financial statements through June were available to them on July 20. The financials as of July 31, 2018 show that the deficit has grown, and now stands at \$47,486 compared to an anticipated deficit of \$40,383.

As is typical for July, the revenues are down. Year to date revenues are now \$18,278 below our projected revenues. As we move into the fall, our hope is that the giving levels will rise again as it has in the past several years. When we look at budget to actual, the revenues are down 3.7% from the year-to-date budget and expenses are down approximately 2.1% (that is a good thing!!) as shown below:

The Finance Committee will be accepting budget requests from church committees beginning with the August 28 meeting. Hopefully, all committees will be prepared by the next Finance Committee meeting, on September 18, so that we will have a firm grip on the anticipated expenses for 2019 before asking the congregation for their support of these programs and projects proposed for 2019.

Visit to the camp

It was only seven-thirty in the morning as our motorcycle taxis navigated the puddles on the muddy road that led to the big camp at the edge of town. As we came over the hill, the expanse of white tents came into view, which stretched as far as we could see. Later, one of the pastors would ask, half-joking, "Do you see our white city? This is our Jerusalem!" This was POC3 (Protection of Civilians Camp 3), for South Sudanese people displaced from their homes. We had come on this Sunday morning to join them for church.

The strong voices of the youth belted out their song in such an arresting way, and made me wish I could understand the Nuer language that they were singing. The pastor whispered to us that they were singing about their suffering, and asking whether it was because of their sin, or the sin of Adam or their ancestors that the suffering had come. Another youth choir followed, singing a song of lament about the suffering in South Sudan. "We are all scattered;" they sang, "we listen for sounds of peace, but there are none." A third choir of youth sang later, about Jesus being our light in the midst of the darkness. It was evident that all of the congregation enjoyed the choirs and resonated with their songs. One woman, in particular, danced up and down the aisles during the songs, while holding high a small wooden cross.

Bob preached from Lamentations 5, which describes the suffering of Israel as they are in exile. This chapter describes several specific aspects of Israel's suffering that are true for the South Sudanese, thousands of years later. Homes being taken by foreigners, women raped, even going to gather firewood for cooking at the risk of their lives. This, of course, is why the Bible speaks to us today – because just as the suffering is the same, God's power and promises are also the same today. Bob reminded us of reasons for hope that we find in the midst of the suffering described in Lamentations: That God invites us to express our laments, and He hears us; that God grieves with us in our suffering; and that God has the final word (and not any of the governments or leaders that appear to hold people's fate in their hands). As Bob finished his sermon, one woman sitting near the pulpit solemnly came to shake Bob's hand. Several others followed, wanting to express appreciation, even as the service continued.

Yet, in the midst of the long period of displacement and suffering, these faithful people persevere. The church hosts Good Shepherd Primary School in its building – 2000 students study in clusters around the large sanctuary, without any barriers to block the noise or teaching of the class next to them. Several of the members serve as voluntary teachers, wanting their children to get some education. Pastor Peter has lobbied to try to get a separate building for the school, but has not yet found the funds and permissions.

As we prepared to leave, Pastor Peter expressed his appreciation to us for coming to worship with them. He said that our presence is a tangible reminder that they are not forgotten. We know that many of you far away are interceding for South Sudan, advocating for peace, and even contributing to efforts like education in the midst of the displacement. It is our privilege, in being present in South Sudan, to represent and communicate the concern and prayers of many of you. So, of course, we felt that Pastor Peter deserved our appreciation even more, for inspiring us with the faith and perseverance of these Christians, who gather to worship and seek God together in the midst of suffering.

Solar System Status

Now that we have two full months of documented power production (June and July 2018), we can see if the solar system is performing as advertised. The GOOD NEWS is; YES, the system is performing well.

Production: So far, production is exceeding our expectations. The company that installed the system, Technicians for Sustainability (TFS), estimated the system would produce 105,235 kWh of power/year. Based on the June and July power production, the system is on track to produce 136,188 kWh/year, which is about 29.5% more than what was initially projected.

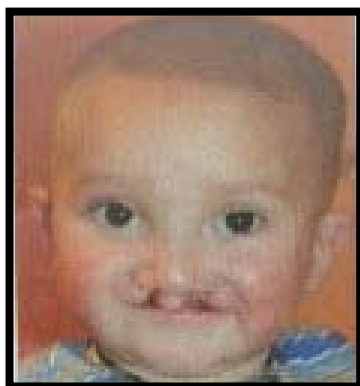
Power Costs - 2018 vs 2017: Combined power costs for June and July 2017 were \$3,905.47. The combined power costs for June and July of 2018 were \$2,836.23. This reflects a reduction in our electric bill of \$1,069.24, nearly a 28% reduction.

The plan is to purchase this system after five years of usage under our current leasing arrangement. So far, there is no reason to change that plan.

Stay Vertical

Remember the commercial with the lady who falls and says, "I've fallen and I can't get up!" This commercial repeatedly played over again. Maybe this commercial should have said, "I'm about to fall, now what will happen?"

Every second of every day an older adult falls in the US, making falls the number one cause of injuries and deaths from injury among older adults. Every 11 seconds, an older adult is seen in the emergency room (or department) for an injury that is fall-related (about 2.8 million people). Just in our area of Green Valley there are 120 – 150 falls each month that are reported. If all falls were to be reported, there would be about four times as many.

According to the CDC, one in four older adults (age 65 and older) fall each year, but less than half of all these falls are discussed with healthcare providers.

Most of these falls happen in the home, and may change our quality of life. Mobility issues, socialization, and emotional challenges may occur with any fall and its injury. There are also factors such as medical costs/bills, time in a hospital, and rehab, if an injury is sustained from a fall.

Most falls are preventable.

A local fall prevention program called SHiM®, Safety and Health in Motion, has been working to increase the awareness of falls, promote fall prevention, and reduce risks for falls in our community since 2011.

On Monday, September 24 join us in the Spiritual Life Center and Fellowship Hall to recognize National Fall Awareness Day. This day will include a fall prevention awareness program, Stay Vertical, from 9 a.m. until noon, an interactive presentation to learn about falls and how to prevent them. Local healthcare providers, and other organizations, will present information on fall prevention and health, and fall risks and awareness tips. In Fellowship Hall, there will be demonstrations on exercise and health and balance screenings, as well Green Valley Fire Department programs, and information on fall prevention resources from our community.

Stay vertical & watch for "Stay Vertical Vern" around our community.



I believe I have had a credit card number stolen at least two times over the past few years. Last time, when I was at the bank getting a new one, the person helping me said credit card theft had become ridiculously common. Two of the ways I suspect mine may have been stolen are in a restaurant and at a gas station. Waiters/waitresses often takes our cards away from us to process payment, and we think nothing of it. However, this time away gives dishonest employees an opportunity to use a device to "skim" your credit card info. In other cases, any unmanned machine that you can insert a payment into (gas stations, video rentals, vending machines, etc.) can have illegal skimmers attached to them, and they are not at all easy to spot. In both cases, once these skimmers capture your info, that info can be used to generate fake credit cards (or simply used to make purchases over the phone or online). Sadly, these aren't the only way criminals are stealing numbers, so it's pretty hard to really protect yourself.

Fortunately, in my experiences the bank caught it right away. I have no idea how they could tell since some of the stuff seemed like they could have reasonably been purchased by me, but the bank's system seems pretty effective. Legally, people can't be charged for purchases they did not make if the person has possession of their card, so the bank took the losses, not me.

Since I still don't know for sure how my numbers were stolen I haven't changed any of my behaviors to avoid it in the future, but if you want to be a bit more proactive, the experts say to monitor your card activity frequently, and pay attention to which companies have been breached or hacked, so you know if your information may have been compromised. The cards with chips are much harder to hack into, and are therefore safer, but I suspect it's temporary as the banks come up with a way to stop the crooks, and then the crooks come up with a way to defeat the new preventative measures, rinse and repeat.
