The Morrison Cross By Dave Appleton

This is the story about how the Morrison Cross at Valley Presbyterian Church was instigated, designed, and installed. My name is David Appleton, a church member and de-facto Church Architect and Project Manager.

The cross was obtained as a memorial to Reverend Fred Morrison, who was revered as a friend and leader, who spent his retiring years with Valley Presbyterian as an Associate Minister. Reverend Morrison noticed that there was no cross located in the sanctuary.

When Reverend Morrison passed away in April 2009, his wife, Anne, who had been the Church Librarian for several years, decided that she and her family would like to commission a permanent cross as a memorial to Fred using his memorial gift funds. By late 2009, a plan was being formed. One Sunday morning, a wooden cross appeared outside and in the center of the large, front window. Members and woodworker, Ed Truitt, decided to start the ball rolling!

A number of members decided that they would like to join in providing a large cross to be installed outside, and in front of the large window. Anne asked if I would help to acquire and install such a cross, and I agreed saying that I would contact the builder who built the Spiritual Life Center.

From Pastor Craig

I grew up in the church, with a father who was a pastor, mother-of-birth who was a Religious Educator and a Mom who was a Church Organist. Baptized at 6 weeks, in Children's Choir at age 7, Confirmed at 12, teaching younger grades by 13. I served on Committees of the local Church, the Presbytery and Synod before graduating High School. I remember standing beside my father one Sunday when I was about 3, as a parishioner asked if I was going to be a Preacher like my father, and I proudly announced "No, I am going to be a Fireman." That was the last time I recall considering anything other than being a pastor. Christian faith has simply been part of my identity, that informed and challenged my decisions.

When I was in seminary, our Old Testament Professor Phyllis Trible candidly professed that what this book by this expert, or that professor said, is not nearly as important as what each believer hears reading the text. In a Doctoral Study, Walter Brueggemann had us write a biography of ourselves and our congregation, through application of 6 Old Testament stories. About 35 years ago, I began having a weekly Bible Study, the only curriculum for which is the Bible and those who participate. We read a chapter and listened for what speaks to us. Anything and everything is possible. The only rule is that you cannot criticize someone else. We tried this completely by Zoom at the start of COVID, learning a good deal, growing in faith and had great discussion. Many have asked if we could start this again. So, while Chuck Ramsay and Pastor Diane provide a class on Thursdays beginning September 8th, spending a week on each book; every Monday at 1pm beginning September 12th, I will lead "Bible Reflections", in-person in Room 5 and on Zoom for those away from the church building, we will begin reading together with the first chapter of Genesis. See page 11.

LISTENING TO EXPERTS

When I was installed in 2019 (BC=Before Covid), many in our congregation complained they could not hear, while others hoped we could broadcast worship off-of-our-campus, and still others desired to participate in meetings while in other parts of the world for part of the year. All very legitimate concerns for a community of active persons over 50. So we installed the Line Array Speakers, discovering from physics that these could be aimed at our pews better by being located back against the wall than suspended from the rafters. We were even able to balance the sound system to remove feedback which formerly occurred. We began recording and eventually livebroadcasting worship. We taught everyone Zoom even before teachers used Zoom in classrooms!

These solutions have addressed the problems named, however our choir continue to have difficulty hearing each other, as well as hearing the spoken word. Not only do our choir provide exceptional music, regularly the choir represents about 20% of attendance, and oddly enough in most churches the choir are among the most vocal about their concerns! Recently I was visiting with Dave Appleton, who described having chased this problem for decades. "We put horns on the ceiling." "We installed speakers under the chairs of Choir members." "We mounted little speakers on the back of the choir modesty wall." Nothing worked well. Additional bold solutions have been recommended.

Before going further or making any decisions, we have decided to contract with an "Acoustician." "Acoustics" deals with the sound dynamics of a space and how to appropriately balance sound. Think of the ringing resonance of a wine glass and different tones based on the shape and material, or how full the glass. Acoustics is different from amplification which only focuses on projecting sound louder. Rather than continuing to try anything and everything, we need to research this problem and finally correct it without making things worse!

We know that our Sanctuary is breathtaking aesthetically. However, imagine if you will a Billiard table, and rather than sound bouncing predictably off 4 sides (or even 6 including a flat ceiling and floor) our Sanctuary has 9 walls (plus ceiling and floor), of differing lengths, at differing angles, most of which are glass which is highly reflective. We also know that because the floor is raked downward to allow people to see over those in front of them, and the roof line rises from the back to front, that if sound travels like water, we are pouring sound into the mouth of a funnel trying to have equal sound at the small end; and our funnel happens to be carpeted on one side. So we have particular problems, which need to be mathematically tested and understood before making decisions or any major changes.

Miraculously, one of the people who worships God by watching our worship on-line and is not a member (has never even been to Arizona) recently sent a donation for us to designate where needed. We have split this contribution, with half going toward the costs of Acoustical Testing, as needed, and 50% reserved for correcting circumstances the Acousticians identify. Acoustics is not a field regularly taught in Seminary, but we hope to use the best wisdom of professionals to serve the needs of our congregation worshipping God.

The Church In The Midst of Storms

The Gospels report the disciples crossing the Sea of Galilee when a storm came up and they were terrified. In one version Jesus walks upon waves. In another the Messiah is asleep. In another place, Simon Peter tries to walk in the storm, but his fears get the better of him and he begins to drown. One of the topics emphasized with New Members is that "The Church" is not simply the building, but this Royal Priesthood, the Bride of Christ, the Body of Christ, the whole family of faith, all of us. This summer we have experienced many storms, and "the church", OUR CHURCH responded.

The evening of July 16th, I came over to inspect damage, mopping up and setting up dehumidifiers where possible, and letting our Building & Grounds Committee, Staff and Pastor Diane know. Steve and Randy set out fans to dry the carpet. The Choir determined how to process onto the Chancel without wading in the water. Wes verified that the rain had not damaged the Organ or its speakers. Monday, Rick Nau and I were on the Roof, as Rick began replacing Skylights; and I began contacting Insurance Agents about 13 of the 25 Air Conditioners severely damaged by hail. Tuesday, Randy, and Les Walter dismantled a portable wall that no longer moved, and Les was able to have his son manufacture special nylon washers no longer available to give new life to this portable wall.



From Pastor Diane

I had an experience with Jesus when I was 17 years old that changed my life. Shortly after that experience, I remember sitting on my bed, reading the Bible and the words leaping off the page as if they were on fire. The words entered my heart and soul. I couldn't get enough, and my love affair with the Bible began.

It has been my passion to share that love for the Scriptures with others, which is one of the reasons I became a pastor. I want people to know and love the scriptures as I do.

When I was first hired at Valley, my original title was Pastor of Christian Education and Outreach, and I had pastoral oversight of the Christian Education Committee. I eventually changed the name of Christian Education (CE) to Faith Formation because CE said to me head knowledge. I wanted to move that head knowledge down into the heart, so it formed people's faith. Thus, the name Faith Formation.

I desire for your faith to be transformed through the reading of the Bible. The Bible is a gift. I believe it is the primary way God speaks to us. It is God's story. Some days later, Kenny Woodward (owner of Woodward Construction Company) appeared with a number of various lengths of wood to begin the design of the cross. Anne, members of the staff, church members who happened to be there, Pastor Larry DeLong, and I quickly assembled in front of the church. Kenny proceeded to set up individual boards in the window and asked for comments. After some discussion, I made a selection, and the group agreed. The Church Secretary, Ken Bosma, suggested that the cross should be open so that it would not detract from the view through the window. This was quickly agreed upon, and the cross was designed as decided. Pastor Larry declared, "This way we would view the world through the cross."

Several weeks later, a pickup truck appeared in front of the church – standing high in its bed was the new, fabulous cross (see attached pictures).

Treasurer's Report-September 2022

I must open this report by saying thank you to the generous members of the Congregation for the support you have provided to the Presbyterian Church (USA) Ukrainian Relief Fund (\$24,143.25) and the Papago Church Repair Fund (\$15,000). The generosity of this Congregation never ceases to amaze me.

Operations

- **Current Operating Reserve Fund** This fund is our "rainy-day" fund and has been periodically used over the past 10 years when the churches revenues have fallen short of expenses. The balance as of 31 July 2022 is \$257,026.
- **Revenues** So far this year revenues are down. At this point in time (*end of week 32 31 July 2022*) we have budgeted the revenues to be \$483,376. Currently, we have received \$461,267 which leaves us (4.574%) below our budget predictions. Last year at the end of Week 32, we were (2.759%) below budget, but by mid Oct 2021 revenues were ahead of budget.
- **Expenditures** Thus far this year, our expenditures are down from what was budgeted. This is expected, as expenditures are usually seasonal in nature, and we are expecting these to catch up to the estimated expense budget later this year.
- **Net Income** Currently, Net Income is positive primarily because our expenditures are down. Balance, as of 31 July 2022 is \$46,086. If there is positive net income balance at the end of any year, Session in January of the following year will determine where those funds shall be placed.

<u>Capital Reserve</u> – As of 31 July 2022 the Capital Reserve Account Balance is \$236,433. These funds can be used for Capital expenses, and some are designated for specific capital projects such as the Solar Power System purchase.

Designated Funds - \$100,778 Non-Designated Funds - \$135,655

2022 Pledge Status – The current pledges of \$538,636 are \$ 67,639 (11.61%) behind the Pledge Goal of \$606,274. Based on history this does not seem abnormal since many of the congregation are out of town for the summer and the pledges get caught up after they return. Of the \$538,636 pledged for 2022, as of June 13, 2022, VPC has received \$309,078 (57.39%). This is in line with previous years, and this usually gets caught up in 4th QTR of the year. Non-Pledged Revenues, that are referenced in the chart below, are the contributions that are received during Sunday Services or other contributions not defined as a pledge.

Banks – Some years back, the External Financial Auditor suggested that we not have greater than \$250K at a single bank. So, we opened an account at BBVA Compass Bank which is now PNC. We now have more exposure, so we have opened yet another account, this one being at the Commerce Bank of Arizona. This an attempt to not have more than \$250K in any one bank as anything that exceeds \$250K is not FDIC Insured. The three banks that we currently have accounts with are:

BMO - Harris (Bank of Montreal) - Harris) PNC (Pittsburgh / Provident National Corporation) Commerce Bank of Arizona

Solar System Status

- **Production** Effective 31 May 2022, VPC has now completed 4 service years of power production with the system. The system has generated 475,675 kWh of power which is 96.71% of the church's power usage over those 4 years. According to my records, the total cost of power over those 4 years was \$67,104. If VPC had not installed the system, the power cost would have been \$83,328 based on Tucson Electric Power rates. Thus, a savings of \$16,224.
- Lease / Purchase VPC entered a 20-year lease contract with Technologies Credit Corporation (TCC) of Palo Alto, California. TCC installed the system free of charge to VPC, but we had to agree to enter into the aforementioned lease contract, which stated we must pay TCC for the power the system produces. The TCC rate was lower than the rate TEP currently charges, thus the savings mentioned earlier. One of the provisions of the lease is that after 60 months of service VPC can purchase the \$173,758 system from TCC for \$100,097. Thanks to all who donated to this cause over the past three years, we now have the dedicated funds to purchase the system. So, the plan is to purchase the system in the 2nd Quarter of 2023 which should save us approximately \$14,711 / year in future power costs. I calculate the Return on Investment (ROI) to be 14.70% and the cost recovery to be 6.804 years.

Solar System Status (Cont'd)

After Purchase Details - The system will remain connected to the power grid, so we will continue to pay TEP a small amount. (Grid fees / utility service fees, etc.) each month. We will also enter into a contract with the installer, Technicians for Sustainability (TFS), LLC of Tucson for the maintenance of the system, if required. The inverter warranties are for 10 years but they can be extended to 20 years, solar panels are warranted for 25 years. If anyone has any questions about the Solar System, please feel free to contact me.



Many people have heard the stories of the Bible (Noah and the Flood, The Ten Commandments, Joseph and the Technicolor Dreamcoat), but many do not know how they all tie together. There are people who want to read through the Bible from beginning to end, but once they hit Leviticus (book 3) it is all over.

Why read the Bible? We say that the Bible is living because God speaks to us through it. We believe it contains the word of God. We believe it is the Good News of Jesus Christ. We believe it is practical for everyday living. Pastor Adam Hamilton says the Bible "contains every truth we need to know about God and God's will for human race." That is why we spend much of a worship service on the words of the Bible. That is why I encourage people to read the Scriptures.

The purpose of this class is to see the grand story of the Bible by going through each book of the Bible. Each one-hour class will cover one book of the Bible. We will answer such questions as:

- What story does this book of the Bible tell?
- How does it fit into the rest of the Bible?
- What truths can we learn from this book?
- How does this book speak to us today?

Come and join this class as I (Pastor Diane) and Chuck Ramsay take you through the grand story of the Bible, book by book. You will discover how God continues to call us back, again and again, into relationship. (The class will be recorded and placed on our website.)

No prior knowledge or experience is necessary to have fun and get a great deal out of this and I have known those with advanced degrees in Bible who have been challenged!

September 12th we will begin with some basic understanding, then read Genesis 1 and 2.

Feeling thirsty, a dry mouth, and being lightheaded or dizzy, might be the first symptoms of dehydration. Make sure you stay cool and drink plenty of water.

Slips, Trips, and Falls

Falls are the leading cause of fatal and nonfatal injuries among older adults. (36 million each year in the US) About 3 million older adults are treated in the Emergency Room each year for fall- related injuries. Just in our area of Green Valley there are 120 – 130 each month that are reported. If all falls were to be reported, there would be about 4 times as many.



According to the CDC, one in four older adults (age 65 and older) fall each year, but less than half of all these falls talk to their healthcare providers about it. Falling once may double your chances of falling again. Many have a fear of falling and limit their activities and socialization because of this fear.

Most of these falls happen in the home and may change our quality of life. Risks may include mobility issues, medications, vision, hearing, proper footwear, lower extremity weakness, neuropathy, social and emotional difficulties, environmental circumstances with uneven surfaces, rugs, cords, wet floors, and other risks. Those with mild hearing loss are almost three times more likely to fall.

There are also factors associated with falls such as medical costs, and time in a hospital and rehab if an injury is sustained from a fall.

A few questions to ask:

Have you reviewed your medications with your provider?

Do you exercise (improve your balance and strength)?

Have you had your vision, hearing, and feet checked yearly?

Are there fall risks in your home?



Most falls are preventable and are not a part of aging. September 22nd is the National Fall Awareness Day. Faith and Health Committee is planning a Fall Prevention and Resource Fair at VPC on September 30th, via E-blast and bulletin on Sundays. *Chris Erickson, RN, Parish Nurse*








Men's Weekday Bible Study Will Resume September 14 Wednesday at 9:00 A.M.




Our Daily Bread, June 24, was about Walking with others-It described so well what Stephen Ministers do:

St. Andrew's Children's Clinic:

The Executive Director, Laura Romero, told Kay that the Clinic is moving forward in any way they can without a permanent facility. She has been searching but cannot find anything with the appropriate space at an affordable cost.

As always, there was no clinic in July and, because of high heat and lack of available space, there was no clinic in August.

On September 8th there will be a clinic somewhere serving as many families as possible. Since there is no facility available yet, she must try to figure out a way to serve 46 children and their families. If necessary, the Knights of Pythias facility in Nogales, Arizona, will be used, but it is too small and does not provide the necessary privacy for Speech and Dermatology. Speech needs quiet а environment and dermatology needs privacy so those services may be brought to her home in Tucson. That is the only way, at this time, that all the families can get help.

From September 20th to 30th Laura, with staff and volunteers, will take 60 children to Hermosillo for Cleft Lip/Cleft Palate surgeries. The children, with their families, must be quarantined in a hotel 2 days prior and 2 days after the scheduled surgery.

Laura is praying that she can find an appropriate facility. St. Andrew's Children's Clinic is in desperate need of our prayers, support and donations.



Nogales Crossroads Mission Update

The new board is meeting this month to plan shortand long-term efforts to help recover from the border being closed for over a year. The acting Director of the Mission at the time of the Wenkes' retiring this Spring has been asked to continue her duties. The day-to-day operations have continued without a pause. The renewal of documents for people to cross back over the border has been slow, as long as nine months for some.

The last event that included the Wenkes was Easter ham dinner where 180 people were served and 8 volunteers from VPC were there for serving and cleanup. The attendance for morning chapel and lunch has fluctuated between 40 and 60 daily. Bags of food and clothing items are popular at the Mission.

The women's shelter is operational as well as the men's dormitory. There are cases where the facility can't accept overnight guests without proper documentation from the border patrol.

The last report received was that all the bills were paid and up to date. Donations are down but the staff and board members are looking forward to getting programs back up and functioning. The Wenkes' dream and efforts of "changing lives" over past 25 years will continue. The transition at the Mission has been facilitated by City Gate Network. This organization is comprised of 300 Gospel Missions throughout the country. Their function is to provide legal assistance when needed and registration with state and local governments as well as reports necessary for non-profit status.

I spent a week with twenty-eight wonderful young men from different parts of Sudan and South Sudan. It was an incredible time together. In this course, I highlight and teach on the spiritual practice of lament. Lament is a practice found in many of the psalms and even whole books of the Bible, such as the book of Lamentations

On that note, I gave my students the opportunity to write a lament, coming out of the depths of their souls, representing the heart cries of their peoples. Several students shared their lament with the class. It was a powerful and poignant time, hearing the heartaches and hopes of God's children. Below is one of the laments from a student whose initials are YSA. He gave permission for me to share his lament with a wider audience.

From a student YSA of South Sudan -

God, you are so powerful. There is no one like you. You have created us in your likeness oh God. Lord, we have seen and acknowledge your goodness in the land of Africa, your greatness, your majesty, and beauty are seen in the land of Africa – green land, full of resources, gold, silver, mountains, rivers, animals and with all kinds of trees. By your goodness you make the land of Africa green and different than any other land worldwide. And by your grace you create us in it. Thank you, God.

But, my God, let me ask some questions. All other people compare Africa with none other than paradise. But we Africans, we do not see the benefit of this land and the benefit of the resources in it. Why, why God? We plant and we plant, but we reap no thing in our land. Your people are dying because of hunger and from thirst. Where is the benefit of this land for us God? Africans lose hope from their lands; they are hoping outside their land. Believers draw back and worship other gods like you are not here. We service idols and are reigning under evil spirits which cause hatred, jealousy, and war among our nations within Africa. People become like cannibals. We are hunting ourselves like nothing.

We Africans totally lose any confidence in this land. We are secreted all over the world. We are secreted like simsim* mixed with soil. Who can separate simsim from soil? Only you God can do that. Not only people are secreted, even the animals and the birds of our land are fleeing away to places where we do not even know. We who remain in Africa, we are struggling with a bad situation and there is no change.

We really, really lose hope oh God. I think if we get wings today no one will remain in this land, oh God. Why are we suffering like this God, especially in Sudan and South Sudan. Those who are living in the desert are better off than us who are living in green land of Africa.

God, why are we suffering like this, oh God?

The number of dead people increases every day. People are dying everywhere. I think the blood of African people is raining like water in the river under the ground of land. I think their souls are crying before you. When will their voice and the voice of their children be heard, oh God? When will you respond?

African orphans hope that things will change, but today things become worse and worse than yesterday. Every year becomes more bitter than last year. The hours of yesterday are better than the hours of today. Africa is like a fatherless child who sees his friend walking with their father, feeling happy and enjoying life. White people help us every year from generation to generation. God when will you help us so that we can reward our brethren white people?

God, hear my prayer. Forgive my people and heal our land. Forgive all Africans their sins.

God, one day one time you gather us like a hen gathers her brood in her wings. Your name is most higher. God thank you for hearing this prayer of mine. I believe my dream will pass. In Jesus' name I pray.

(***simsim** is a colloquial term or translation in South Sudan for sesame seeds).




PRESBYTERIAN WOMEN
