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PATIO SALE NEWS



The Patio Sale Amigos met recently and shared various thoughts about having a March 2021 Patio Sale. It was pretty much agreed that in order to make an informed decision regarding having a March sale, we needed to develop a well thought out plan(s) that incorporated COVID-19 best practices. It should be noted that we have until the first of February before we must make commitments regarding tents etc. To get the ball rolling for developing a best plan(s) a December 8th Departmental Heads meeting has been scheduled. Department Heads have received a notice by email.

Recently, we were asked how much did we net from our 2020 March Sale. The question, apparently, is often asked but seldom answered. The answer for this year (2020) is \$57,000 (\$88,600 March gross sales minus \$31,600 expenses for tents, storage, truck, labor, etc.) In the future we will plan on providing this number shortly after the end of the sale. It should be noted that, in addition to the March sale, Patio Sales activity occurs throughout the calendar year, activities such the holiday sale, internet sales, miscellaneous sales to individuals, individual donations, etc.

Again, thanks to everyone who has helped us continue our storied Patio Sale with their generous help. Special thanks to Dave Tompkins and his faithful crew for continuing to pick up and store donations using safe and acceptable protocols.

The last few months I have been discussing with the Missions Committee, what had been the focus of my Doctoral Research, a concept called "The Missional Church." Rereading the JAG Report that was completed during the Administrative Commission and Interim Pastor, Recommendation Number 1 was that Valley Presbyterian Church become a Missional Church! Being "Missional" not only means having a Mission Statement and adhering to this, being Missional is counter-cultural. Our culture emphasizes specialization over generalists, going to an expert. Being Missional emphasizes our listening to what is important to our community, which may or may not be nuanced

differently from the rest of the world.

Case in Point, in this greater Green Valley parish we are related to our own members, persons who are part of our church community for part of the year, and neighbors who live in this community and may or may not attend another church. Also because of our demographics, there is a need among people in this area, that when there is a death or persons move to assisted care, our Church sends volunteers to pack; regardless of if you are part of our church community or the larger community. If the Patio Sale did not exist, this is a ministry we would want to create for Green Valley! A supplemental part of the JAG Report (Recommendation 29) was that we work on the long-term viability of the Patio Sale. Simultaneously, the Amigos have been at work 1. To write down an Instruction manual for who does what when and how. 2. That each of the Amigos is working in partnership with others to train them to carry on this work for perpetuity.

I love God's sense of humor, that as being "Missional" had been my training and experience, Pastor Larry, Pastor Diane, Pastor Mark and the JAG Task Force had been working in the same direction!

PROCEEDING CAUTIOUSLY

In September, after months of isolation, we began sharing Fellowship outdoors following basic Public Health Protocols. After weeks of experimentation with external Thermometers and sharing together, we opened the Sanctuary for people to attend worship. After the first two weeks of asking for Reservations, we came to know whom to expect. November 15th we moved to having Coffee Hour fellowship at our regular after worship time, but still outdoors. Everything is not as it once was, or will be, but for now we proceed with an abundance of caution. What COVID has meant, is that while we had Internet connectivity at our church for word-processing and emails: we now have Video-Conferencing for Committee Meetings and Bible Study on Zoom; and we have Video-Recorded Worship on our Website. With the Sound System now working, so we can hear clearly everywhere in the Sanctuary, we are proceeding with replacement of the Chancel Spotlights. Once sound and lighting is working, the Deacons had set aside funds several years ago for our Church to expand with Live-Stream Worship. Because of health safety, we are not able to have our traditional Thanksgiving Dinner in the Fellowship hall this year. Because of COVID19 we are not able to have the Holiday Sale. HOWEVER, on Christmas Eve at 4:30pm and at 7pm WE WILL CELEBRATE CHRISTMAS WITH CANDLELIGHT.

BEING THANKFUL

This is a year to recognize all we are thankful for. Many times we have gathered at the Table, uncertain how we could talk together, and now we know to be thankful just to be together. For years we had to teach our children to wash their hands before eating, now we wash our hands while saying the Lord's Prayer. For years we wondered about making Mom's recipe correctly for this or that dish, this year we recognize what a gift it is to have food on the shelves. For generations, we as Americans have taken our Right to Vote for granted, this year we realize how important it is for all of us to vote. Many years we paused in silence during prayer, now we have many relationships and resources for which to be thankful to God.

VIDEO LIVE STREAMING WORSHIP

A recurrent theme during the Interim was "Let us wait until the New Pastor is here." The Deacons had discussed and set funds aside for Live-Streaming Worship long before we knew how. Over the last eight months, volunteers from our church have worked in partnership with our pastors and staff to Record, Edit and Produce video recordings of Worship. During this time we were able to begin posting our Worship Video to La Posada for those who could not leave that campus. Our church has developed a regular viewership of parishioners in Green Valley and around the world through video, so truly we cannot differentiate between year-round attenders, snowbirds, desert rats and those around the world. We have been in conversation with leaders at other churches, how they are live-streaming, to learn from their wisdom and experience. Now that our Senior Pastor has been here a year, we have dedicated Internet connectivity to the Sanctuary, our Sound System is functioning clearly, once we have replaced all 14 of the Chancel Spotlights, we then will be able to use the funds set aside by our Deacons to Live-Stream, meaning for those who once described attending worship Sunday mornings as "Church," we will have "Live Church!"

Highlights from October Session Meeting


- *To use money from the Deacons fund plus additional donations for Live Streaming of Worship Services.

Solar Panel Update

I just completed the update of VPC"s Power Usage / Production / Costs through October, 2020. Our Solar System continues to produce in excess of the guarantee. So far this year by 12.85%. Last year production exceeded the guarantee by 8.98%. I suspect some of the increase in production can be attributed to the "NONSOON". In any case this is a good argument for the purchase of the system as we have a pretty good idea that it will continue to perform as advertised by the installer. Speaking of which we currently have had a total of \$18,450 donated to the purchase. \$5585.00 of the donation is matching funds. With these donations the additional funds we would need to purchase the system from Technologies Credit Corporation in the 3rd QTR of 2023 is currently projected to be \$81,686.50.

VPC Solar Power System Purchase Funding Status:

On September 16th, 2020, Valley Presbyterian Church (VPC) received an anonomous matching funds proposal from a member of the Congregation. The proposal reads as follows; "I would like to pledge that I would match dollar for dollar every donation during the 4th quarter until December 15, 2020 up to \$500.00 per person and up to \$25,000.00 total during this period." Thanks to this member, this provides an extra incentive for you to help fund the purchase of the Solar Power System from Technologies Credit Corporation (TCC) at the end of the 2nd Quarter of 2023. Once the system is owned outright, VPC will no longer have to pay TCC for the power the system generates thus, saving an additional \$14,000 per year in energy costs.

More Bloggers wanted (15 and counting) Note #15 blogger A blogger is anyone with access to a computer who can type in bobandkristi.blogspot.com. Have you ever wanted to read a missionary's diary? Consider blogging the real life story of Bob and Kristi Rice who share on a weekly basis the story of God working in their life.

Resilience

What does resilience mean to you? How would you describe it? I just finished a course called STAR (Strategies for Trauma Awareness and Resilience), and one thing that I really appreciated was exploring what resilience is, hearing from those who have gained it, and learning some ways to build resilience. A few descriptions of resilience that we used were:

Ability to bend and not break

Ability to adapt to challenges or change;

Healthy power amidst vulnerability and uncertainty

While living in Congo and now South Sudan, Bob and I learned some of the history of those places, which includes horrible exploitation, conflict, and suffering. 'Resilient' was often the first word that we would use to describe people in those countries who have survived, persevered, and adapted in the face of so much challenge.

But now I am realizing that simply surviving is not enough, because unhealed trauma continues to affect a person and their relationships for many years, even being passed down to their children genetically and affecting whole groups as historical or cultural trauma. Resilience does not mean merely surviving trauma – it means finding ways to heal and learning practices to maintain perspective and stability in situations that might be traumatic.

Rev. Peter Yien Reath is one person in South Sudan who has embodied resilience. He was falsely accused, imprisoned, and nearly killed in Khartoum because of his faith and his work as a pastor. After he was freed,

he attended college in Nairobi and was trained in an approach to Trauma Healing. He now serves in South Sudan, starting and facilitating healing groups in rural areas. He has had to adapt to living in different places and respond to various challenges and threats. He has experienced the peace and strength of God that sustained him through those times of challenge.

We learned in our class about a concept called the "Window of Tolerance," a zone where our nervous system is relaxed, calm, and engaged. When our 'window of tolerance' is

open, we can respond thoughtfully and more calmly to bad news or frustrations. But when we are already stressed, tired, or depleted, our window closes, and we might erupt in anger at a slight provocation or go into despair from bad news.

So how do we build resilience? I have fresh appreciation now for the amazing, complex brain that God designed to help us perceive threats and stress and regulate our emotions and our nervous system. Our brain is integrally linked with the rest of our physical bodies – so sometimes physical actions (deep breathing, movement) can help to relieve mental or emotional stress, or physical pain can be a source of psychological or mental stress. This is why we are told that it is important to exercise, get good sleep, and eat healthy to promote mental and emotional well-being. Prayer, meditation, and being in nature are also important for me to nurture my spiritual life and relationship with God, which helps my 'window of tolerance' to stay open by reminding me of God's perspective and presence. What are practices that you have found helpful? I'm sure that during this pandemic and election season we all need to have a few positive practices to help quell the anxiety and maintain hope.

MOMENTUM: SPOTLIGHT REGIONS



Sindh Region and Church Planting

We will continue to focus on the Sindh region in Pakistan. Currently, OM has three teams serving through health and holistic ministry in three different cities.

Nabor* and Jasmine* have served in this region for 16 years with the goal to see a church planting movement among the Sindhi people who number more than 35 million. They are one of the least reached Muslim people groups in the world.

This couple worked in Sindh for three years before they saw the first family come to faith in Christ. It took another 7 years until they saw seven house churches started. Nabor* said, "It was very tough to reach whole families. We would meet the men who had become believers in parks and hotels but not at their homes. Finally, we decided that as family we will meet with their families. My kids even spent time with their kids. It was very effective. After that, entire families came to the Lord."

Some Pakistanis, like Sajid*, have come to the Lord through dreams. One day, Sajid* shared with Nabor, "I saw a person in a white robe who met me in my dream. He said that a person at the university will tell me about Him." Nabor was surprised, because in that university

Sajid was their contact. Yet, Nabor followed up with Sajid and gave him the *Jesus* movie and New Testament. They started a Bible study in a park. Sajid took the NT home and at first was secretly reading it.

Then, Sajid and his mother read it together, and they both accepted Jesus as their Saviour. Nabor said, "After a year, Sajid and his wife came to our home to visit us. We were happy to see that his brother-in-law also came with them to study the Bible with us. Now, his brother-in-law, uncles and friends all have taken Bibles and are starting Bible studies!"

Today, Nabor and Jasmine have about 40+ house groups that are meeting together with both Jesus followers and those still seeking Jesus. Their vision is to see a VCJF in "walking distance for everyone".

St. Andrews Children's Clinic

On November 10, Laura Romero, the Executive Director of St. Andrews' Children's Clinic, told the Mission Committee about how the Clinic is functioning during the Covid-19 Pandemic. The Clinic in Nogales is not open, but staff have been going weekly to sort the many boxes of client files. They hope to scan all records and be "paperless" by the end of 2021. Children have been receiving help in Mexico,



but they cannot cross the border except for an emergency. Laura, the clinic staff and volunteers have been taking "Goodie Bags" to families in Mexico. Laura meets regularly with staff and volunteers to generate ideas on how to better help the children. Plans for future clinics include smaller groups each month, personal protective equipment and more services provided through telephone conversations. Volunteer doctors have made trips into Mexico to help some of the children. Cleft Lip/Cleft Palate surgeries have not been performed since March, the start of the Covid-19 Pandemic. St. Andrews' Clinic and the hospital in Hermosillo, Mexico, hope to resume these services in October of 2021. The list of children needing Cleft Lip/Cleft Palate surgery and orthodontic work continues to grow. Laura expressed thanks to VPC for support and donations. That has helped the clinic provide service during these desperate times.

On Sunday, November 22, Laura talked to the congregation about St. Andrews' Clinic because our Noisy Offering on November 29 was donated to this Mission. The Mission Committee and St. Andrews' express sincere gratitude for your generous donations.

Crossroads Mission, Nogales AZ

On November 5, 2020, I had a phone conversation with Ben Wenke, Co-Director of Crossroads Mission, and the following information was received:


Crossroads Mission is still struggling financially during this Coronavirus pandemic. The police department has requested Crossroads stay open during this time of great need. There is no other recovery facility or shelter in Nogales.

The women's transitional houses are still operating, accepting women (with or without children). A furnace had to be repaired in one of the houses in October.

Donovan, one of the men in the Missions recovery program was just hospitalized. Donovan has been addicted to Heroin and Morphine for so many years that his body is having a difficult time coming off these drugs. Donovan is determined to "kick the habit" that has afflicted his body. Ben asked for prayers for Donovan's recovery.





has faith that money and food will be donated to the Mission for those dinners. If there are still Coronavirus pandemic restrictions in serving meals buffet-style, the Thanksgiving and Christmas dinners will be put in individual clamshell containers for the needy to pick up at the Mission. If the United States/Mexico border is still closed the dinner attendance will be less, but the meals are needed in the local area.

The Mission is in desperate need of canned foods, especially canned vegetables. There is a plastic container (marked Crossroads Mission) sitting on the table in the church's Fellowship Hall awaiting donations of canned food. Turkeys are needed for the Thanksgiving dinner. The Mission's kitchen help are roasting turkeys now with the turkeys they have received so far. After roasting, the turkeys are carved and the meat and carcasses are put in the freezer so the meat will be ready when needed. If people want to donate money for the Thanksgiving or Christmas dinners send a check to: Crossroads Mission, 338 N Morley Avenue, Nogales, AZ 85621. Please mark your check and mailing envelope with the designation "For Thanksgiving and Christmas dinners). A gift of \$20.70 will feed 10 people a holiday dinner.

Special Note: At our November 10, 2020 Mission Committee meeting, it was voted to give Crossroads Mission \$500.00 to help supply the food for their Thanksgiving and Christmas dinners. The money will be taken from the Mission Committee's Emergency Fund.





According to Matthew 22, 34-46, we are the body of Christ. We long for the presence of our other body parts during this long COVID-19 confinement. Aloneness is a cross that we are bearing during this time of keeping safe and is the same cross that some people have been bearing for years.

What matters in this world of aloneness? What matters is that there are people who care. There are some people who choose to serve these parts of the body that need attention by becoming Stephen Ministers or by being active members in one of Valley Presbyterian's other pastoral ministries. Stephen Ministry is preparing for their training season, which starts the first Friday of January and each Friday through March 26. Connections, during this time, are also essential for those to receive socialization and to know others care.



COVID UPDATE


"Here we go again", "the numbers are getting higher" and "are we going to be shut down" are just a few of the statements or comments in our community. As you watch the local news channels, they are reporting numbers of Arizona, which are very much higher than we were. North Dakota and other states are mandating masks, and starting to restrict activities. Tucson school district has canceled hybrid learning. According to the AZDHS (Arizona Department of Health Services), the number of cases have gone up across Arizona. This website is a good resource to use, www.azdhs.gov. Another website is CDC (Centers for Disease Control and Prevention) www.cdc.gov.

Being informed about the most current information on COVID is essential. COVID is thought to be spread from person to person through respiratory droplets, coughing, sneezing, talking and even singing. Some of these droplets can stay on an object or surface and live for short periods of time. Masks are helpful in slowing the spread of COVID, and in most areas required. Masks should fit snugly around the nose and chin, not under the nose since COVID is spread from droplets. Face shields are for prevention of splattering droplets, but leave an opening around them, which may expose that person to COVID. The CDC does not recommend using face shields or goggles as a substitute for masks. Please reference the CDC website for more use on face shields and masks, and proper use of them. For more information on the face shields, please visit the CDC website.

Cleaning and disinfecting surfaces may be helpful as well. Some of the symptoms may look to be the same as a cold or the flu: fever or chills, cough, fatigue, muscle or body aches, sore throat, headache, congestion or runny nose, nausea or vomiting, and diarrhea. The symptoms, besides these listed, that are being seen in COVID are shortness of breath and new loss of taste or smell. Prevention including social distancing of 6 feet, and wearing masks are good hand sanitation and not touching your eyes or face. Washing your hands for at least 20 seconds (to the tune of Happy Birthday twice) is a good everyday prevention. If soap and water are not available, use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer with at least 60% alcohol.

Please stay home if you are ill or not feeling well. Talk to your healthcare provider if you are not feeling well and have any symptoms. They might be able to test or order the test at the local lab site, as well as other sites like Kino Sports Complex, Next Care and other urgent care centers. Most of the sites are by appointment. Please call them and verify that they will be able to test you. Take your form of insurance and find out if appointment is required. If you have been exposed to someone with COVID, self-isolate and call your healthcare provider.

Please stay safe and stay healthy. Masks are essential as well as social distancing. One should not replace the other. Also washing your hands or use of hand sanitizers.
