What is normal? Was 2020 normal, with a total of 3.12 inches of precipitation and over 100 days of over 100 degrees? Was this summer normal with more rainfall than ever recorded, nearly 3 times as much as the year before? Do we budget compared to COVID 2020; compared to Interim Pastor Mark Medina 2017-19; compared to the Presbytery imposed austerity budget; compared to 2016 with Pastor Larry and the Administrative Commission; compared to when we had 3 full-time pastors plus a full-time Administrator?

Reading the Bible, I perceive no reference to "normal". Jesus changing water into wine and

walking on water, are assumed to not be regular occurrences. But the focus is always on the here and now, rather than how much precipitation did Noah's family endure the years before the 40 day and night flood; or what was life like before 3 years of drought.

In recent days, my bride Judy and I have enjoyed much needed 2 weeks of vacation and the celebration of our 40^{th} anniversary. In the world today, 40 years with one another is a major accomplishment. We have just taken one day at a time. You folks do set a very high-bar, as around those married 50 and 60 years, 40 years just makes us "Newlyweds." I guess this means that if anyone asks we are "Honeymooning in Green Valley!"

August 27-30, we will be upgrading all of the Sanctuary lighting to LED lightbulbs. Not only will this provide far longer-life to the bulbs (the choir will not be counting how many burned out bulbs are in the Chandeliers), decreasing energy use to 1/8% what was previously used. But while flame shaped bulbs just like the previous, at full power these will be the equivalent of 120 watt bulbs, or able to be diminished as needed. The Chancel Choir will also receive new LED lighting. This means our Choir returning for our Grand Re-Opening October 3rd will have new ability to hear the Worship Service and listen to the Sermon, their own new microphones, new theater lighting on the Chancel and also new overhead lighting. All we need is more of you in the choir!



In the last several months, I have received emails from various ministry organizations asking the following questions as churches start up again:

- Do we do ministry the way we have always done it?

Another email gave these suggestions:

Do less and go deeper. There is a common held belief in churches that the "business" of the church must be taken care of first, and then if there is time, invest in spiritual vitality. But what if we invest more time and energy in things like faith, hope, and love?

Less program orientated ministry. Churches have many programs, but seldom ask why they are done. What if the church invested in more ministries that nurture faith, meet community needs, and move people into deeper discipleship with Jesus?

As we look at our church, what should we do? What adventure is God calling us to? We have already done some things differently. We recorded worship services, and now have developed live-streaming. Not because everyone else is doing it; rather, so those outside our doors can worship with us. Faith Formation discovered Zoom for classes, and now offers many classes over Zoom. What a wonderful discovery for now winter residents can join us all year long.

I encourage you to look at your ministries and evaluate them. Are you going to go back and do it the way you always have? For some ministries, this may be the best thing. Can you find ways to improve the way you do your ministry? Or, start over? Or, do something totally different? Be creative and seek where God's spirit will lead you and your ministry area.

I know for me personally, I came back from Greece with a renewed call and passion for Jesus Christ in my ministry. To point to Christ. To uphold Christ in all I do. I know that I do not want us to be a social club, but a place where people's lives are transformed by the power of the Holy Spirit. I want to invest in ministries that nurture faith, meet community needs, and move people into deeper discipleship with Jesus. This is my continuing adventure.

By now you have figured out that the Presbyterian denomination does not have a service book with a fixed order of worship and collections of prayers. Our *Directory of Worship* does describe the theology that underlies our worship, outlines forms of worship and highlights the connection between worship and the



Christian life. Since God has poured out the Holy Spirit on all flesh, each congregation is encouraged to reflect its individual traditions and responses in forming the content and form of worship within its community.

A key concept is the fact that people *gather* in worship. Yes, God is worshiped by individuals in private. But isn't there something special about a group of people who gather for the purpose of glorifying God? Meaningful worship demands the active participation of the whole body of Christ, with heart, mind, soul, and strength. The order of worship should provide for and encourage the participation of all; no one is to be excluded.

It is awe-inspiring to gather in worship in a setting different from your weekly worship. I remember of the richness of services at General Assembly, Synod and Presbytery meetings. I looked around and saw unfamiliar people singing with me, praying with me and reciting a statement of faith together. My soul is revived, and my faith is renewed. And the feeling lingers following the benediction.

Take a look at our Sunday bulletin and note the major parts of our Sunday service. Whenever and wherever we gather in Jesus' name, we join the praise and prayer of the people of God in every time and place.


On Sunday mornings, grade school children will be in classroom 5 having a Bible lesson. Children under grade school will remain in the Nursery with Alice.







Slips, Trips, and Falls



Every second of every day an older adult falls in the US, making falls the number one cause of injuries

and deaths from injury among older adults (36 million each year in the US). Every 11 seconds, an older adult is seen in the emergency room or department for an injury that is fall-related (about 2.8 million people). Just in our area of Green Valley there are 120 – 130 falls each month that are reported. If all falls were to be reported, there would be about 4 times as many.

According to the CDC, one in four older adults (age 65 and older) fall each year, but less than half of all these falls talk to their healthcare providers about it. Most of these falls happen in the home and may change our quality of life. Mobility issues, socialization, emotional challenges may occur with any fall and it's injury. There are also factors associated with falls such as medical costs, and time in a hospital and rehab if an injury is sustained from a fall.

A few questions to ask:

- Have you reviewed your medications with your provider?
- Do you exercise (improve your balance and strength)?
- Have you had your eyes and feet checked yearly?
- Are there fall risks in your home?

Most falls are preventable and are not a part of aging.
September 22nd is the National Fall Awareness Day. During the month of September, information on falls, prevention and

aging without injury will be sent out via E-blast and be available on a Faith and Health table on Sundays. Please watch for future presentations on fall prevention at VPC in the future.

After Kristi and I finished our run on an early Sunday morning, we walked it off through our Hai Malakal neighborhood. Suddenly a young boy collecting plastic bottles standing in the middle of the road fifty feet ahead of us made a loud shriek as he saw us coming. He stood there, transfixed. He stood there in recognition. He stood there in silent surprise. The woman sitting at her corner shop shouted to silence the boy until she was arrested by the unfolding scene.

"Simon?" I asked, tentatively.

"John Akwan," the boy asserted, standing in the road half-naked in the lightly falling rain. Yes, I said to myself. Of course, it is John Akwan. It was the meeting of souls long estranged, a poor discarded child in the heart of a war-ravaged land and two white persons of privilege from a far off place. We exchanged pleasantries and I explained that we had returned to Juba. I moved towards the boy and grasped his arm in fellowship and loving concern.

John responded, "Ana gait" (I am here, I am around).

As we turned to walk on, the eyes of the woman at the corner shop turned towards the ground. "John Akwan, you are alive!" I whispered to myself. "You are here," I thought. Praise the Lord! I wondered then about the others, particularly Grovener and Simon. These lost boys who live off the streets of Juba live in my heart. Thank you, Lord, for John Akwan.

<u>Daniel Mawer</u>

My phone rang. I answered it. The other side felt garbled, difficult to distinguish voices which seemed somehow in conversation with each other and not with me. Suddenly, I heard my name. Then I heard the voice on the other end identify its owner, "I am Daniel Mawer."

"Daniel Mawer?" I answered in grateful surprise and joyful recognition. Daniel was at a loss for words. Nuer men do not cry, but it seemed that my former student was choked up. I gave him a moment to recover.

"Teacher, you are back in Juba."

Yes, I replied. Daniel gave me a short update on his life. Though our conversation did not last more than ten minutes, I walked away from my phone feeling blessed, reconnected to the life of one of my dear students. Over the next few hours, I recalled special memories I shared with Daniel – my first meeting with Daniel at the



college in 2017, going with Daniel to visit his pastor in the hospital, getting caught together in a massive rainstorm and huddling together under a large Neem tree, visiting Daniel's church and Daniel treating me afterwards to a Nuer specialty called "Wal Wal" at a local eatery.

Stephen was one of my first students. Classes had become a challenge for Stephen, being separated from his family. The then Acting Academic Dean and I, along with other faculty members, were sympathetic to Stephen's plight. Stephen faced many challenges but pressed through them all. On graduation day, Stephen's smile remains indelibly imprinted on my heart.

When our current Academic Dean mentioned the name Reverend Stephen as the one we were picking up on our way to church last Sunday, I wondered, "Is it same Stephen?" Sure enough, it was my former student. Stephen packed into the car and we enjoyed exchanging greetings. Stephen leads a ministry to street children at a new church plant on the outskirts of Juba, teaching the children about trauma healing and giving them simple instruction which they would otherwise miss, not being in school. Stephen leaves his home every day at 6am, Monday to Saturday, to take three buses across town to go and minister to these abandoned children.

Various people support Stephen in different ways. Stephen expresses gratitude to now have his family with him in Juba, and he expresses profound gratitude for the gifts given to sustain him and his family and his ministry. I am humbled by Stephen. I stand in awe of his posture of service and his heart of gratitude.

Of course, there are many other "reunions" I could recount since our return, but may these three serve as a sampling. God is good, all the time. All the time, God is good. Amen!

Laura Romero, the executive director at St. Andrew's Children's Clinic was extremely disappointed to announce the cancellation of the September and November mission

trips to the Hermosillo Hospital with children who need Cleft Lip and Cleft Palate surgeries. There is too much risk due to the increase in COVID cases. The St. Andrew's board, staff and volunteers want to take no chances of exposing the children to this virus and the Delta variant.



Getting adequate vaccinations has been a problem in Mexico. Families are worried and effective shots are not easily available. Arizona is making an offer to help get more reliable vaccines to the people of Sonora, Mexico.

St. Andrews hopes to conduct very small clinics later this year. The Border Patrol will allow children to come across for appointments at St. Andrews. The doctors and support staff are looking forward to providing medical help to the children as soon as it is safe.

St. Andrew's Episcopal Church in Nogales, Arizona has agreed to serve as a Clinic each month. COVID has been a challenge for this mission. Above all, they certainly need the prayers and support of Valley Presbyterian Church.a





Operation Mobilization (OM) Bangladesh continues church planting in five northern and southern districts, this is challenging during the pandemic; but, God has opened many doors for sharing the good news. Currently, 135 attend church services in our seven churches. We established 16 new fellowships that welcome 190 to openly share Jesus and teach scripture.

Another way to show the love of Christ is through education to those who have no money. OM in 2021 started 22 schools in which 660 poor students' study. One, Farhana, is five years old, with a brother and two sisters. Her father is a fisherman with not enough money for education, so he enrolled her in an OM tuition-free school in the village. The curriculum includes learning the Bangla and English alphabets, singing, dance, and playing games.

The OM schools provide an excellent opportunity to build relationships with parents. The OM team visits children's homes monthly and conducts parent meetings at school. This is a great way to share the good news of Christ. Pam and Dave L oversee and advise on activities in Bangladesh.

Prayer from the OM Website:

Thank You, Father, for Bangladesh, with its waterways and green fields. Thank You that the people haven't lost their hope despite poverty and catastrophes. Thank You that they are instead eager to learn, to improve their situation and that they are always open to discuss matters of faith. We pray that You will use disasters as opportunities to show Your love and mercy, and that the seed scattered by Your people will fall on fruitful soil in the souls of the Bangladeshi.





Currently the Home has 51 children and 7 adults – all are healthy. Two students are attending college and 4 are attending high school together at the same location – see photo to the left. All costs associated with education – including lap tops, school supplies, tuition are paid for with your donations to RISE Scholastic Achievements. The two children attending college (Edgar and Carolina) still live at the Home and have taken

on adult responsibilities of cleaning the home and looking after the younger children.

On Wednesday, July 14, 2021, I texted Bert Wenke, Co-Director of Crossroads Mission, and received the following information:

<u>Health Report on Ben Wenke, Co-Director of Crossroads Mission</u>. Ben has had health problems the past few years because of a fall, which has sent him in-and-out of hospitals and rehab facilities in Phoenix and Tucson. Ben fell in 2018 and bruised

his brainstem and cerebellum of the brain. Bert was happy to report Ben will be coming home July 15, 2021, after months of rehab. Ben is still having problems with his right arm and his body still shakes. His left arm has a steel plate from the elbow to the wrist. Ben's arm will heal but the shaking will get worse.
